



A Day's Work Done For

Love

This year we are asking readers to support Knit for Peace by creating a dressing-gown or jacket. These are essential to keep vulnerable people warm and there is always a huge demand for them.

- We are asking readers to knit or crochet a dressing-gown that will fit most people. You can vary the size or make a smaller jacket if you prefer. For the best results use double knitting yarn and a 4 mm crochet hook or knitting needles. Do not use a thicker yarn as this can make the garment too heavy.
- This is an ideal project to use up odds and ends of yarn but check that the yarn is machine washable and that the colours do not bleed. Avoid yarn that requires special care with washing. It is also a good idea not to use too many pale shades as they show the dirt more quickly.









To Make

Using 4 mm needles or a crochet hook, make 52 squares, each one measuring 12 cm square. You can knit these in garter-stitch, stocking-stitch, textured stitches, cables, solid colours, stripes — whatever you prefer — but we do not recommend lace patterns.


If you prefer to crochet, we would suggest double crochet or treble stitches. Work round all four sides to form a square or work in rows, whichever you prefer.

Once all the squares are complete, follow the charts opposite and arrange your squares into a pattern.

Following the charts and instructions, stitch the squares in place. You can use a contrasting colour to create more interest. Alternatively, crochet the squares together.

C h a r t s

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To Complete

Join seams A + B together and C + D together.

Sleeves: Join seams E + F together and G + H together.


Edging: If you can, add a crochet border (double or treble crochet) around all the edges – neck, front opening, hem, cuffs.

A pocket is useful and this can be made by making another square and patching it in place.

Belt: knit or crochet a belt 6 cm wide by 180-200 cm long.


Loops: Add belt loops at the seams, on the third square from the top (see diagram).

To make a shorter jacket, work three rows of squares below the sleeves and complete as before.



Shorter Length Dressing-gown

To make a shorter length dressing-gown, work 3 squares (36 cm) from hem to armhole, not 6 as before.
