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

It was confirmed this week it will remain a testing centre until at least March next year.

In the meantime, residents of Brodick and the north of the island will need to keep travelling to alternative medical centres elsewhere on the

The Brodick centre closed for general medical services in June last year and a concerned patient, who previously used the facility, told the Banner: 'Brodick residents are facing difficulties going to doctor's appointments in other villages due to the Brodick surgery being completely closed to appointments.

Residents have to travel to Shiskine or Lamlash. These

appointments do not always fit into bus timetables and many residents do not have cars. Some are having to resort to taxis, at considerable cost.

'If, as is being mooted, Brodick is permanently closed, surely there must be a free travel system put in place similar to the wonderful ArCaS one for those travelling to the mainland for chemotherapy cancer treatments. and Residents who need help in any way should get it.

'There did not seem to be any consultation with any local group, to my knowledge, that Brodick would be totally inaccessible to patients.

'There are many elderly and infirm people who will feel helpless when asked to go to Lamlash or Shiskine. Cost and accessibility are definitely issues, especially when their illness is taken into the equation. Who thought this was a good idea?'

Craig McArthur, director of East Ayrshire health and social responded: 'Brodick Health Centre is currently being used as the Covid-19 testing site for Arran residents.

'The health centre was identified as the most central and accessible location on the island and has been used since June 2020 as an integral part of NHS Ayrshire and Arran's Covid testing programme with more than 1,600 tests carried out so far. The site will continue to be used as a Covid testing centre until at least March 2022 and

this will be kept under review. To ensure general medical services continue to be provided to Arran residents, the GP practice sites at Lamlash and Shiskine remain open.

'Patients can access GP services and other healthcare professionals appropriate to their need at these two locations. The site at Whiting Bay also remains open for limited services. Whilst a central location for testing, we are aware Brodick Health Centre is also the most central location for patients accessing GP and healthcare services. This will be taken into consideration as part of the GP practice remobilisation plans as we continue to phase out of the Covid pandemic.'

There was no mention of Lochranza Health Centre which only offered a limited service before the pandemic

Parents urged to get children vaccinated against flu this winter

Parents are being encouraged to get primary and secondary school children vaccinated against flu this winter as the Covid-19 pandemic shows little sign of being over.

Scotland this week recorded its highest number of daily cases since the pandemic began with first minister Nicola Sturgeon warning she cannot rule out the re-introduction of some Covid restrictions.

Health secretary Humza Yousaf said: 'Flu can be extremely serious and is very infectious. With Covid-19 still circulating in the community, we can best protect the people

of Scotland by encouraging everyone eligible to get vaccinated against flu too.

'That's why this flu season, we are extending the vaccination programme and offering the flu vaccine to around four million people in Scotland, including all primary and secondary school children. This will help to protect those most at risk as well as ease pressure on our National Health Service and social care services. The vaccines are safe and the best way to help protect you and others from flu this winter.'

NHS Ayrshire and Arran wants parents to ensure the flu vaccine consent forms being distributed through primary and secondary schools this week are completed and returned to schools before Tuesday August 31 to protect their children, family and friends from flu this winter.

Secondary school pupils will join all primary school children in Scotland in being eligible for this year's flu vaccine, given as a painless nasal spray at school.

Consent packs containing a letter, leaflet and consent form will be sent home to parents and carers of primary school children. Consent forms must be returned within seven days.

Secondary school pupils will also receive a consent pack, letters to school in plenty of time

They will also receive a digital leaflet with information, which will be emailed from school, or they can request paper copies at school. Consent forms must be returned within seven days. Secondary pupils can self-consent, though they are encouraged to speak to a parent or carer first.

Dr Elvira Garcia, consultant in public health medicine for NHS Ayrshire and Arran said: 'It's more crucial than ever that as many eligible people as possible get vaccinated against flu, so please ensure your child's completed consent form is returned on time if you wish them to receive the vaccine. If you have any questions or concerns about the vaccine, you can visit nhsinform.scot

or speak to a health or immunisation team, practice nurse, or GP.'

The flu vaccine will be given in schools between September and December. The flu virus changes every year, so you need to get the vaccine every year to stay protected. The flu vaccine cannot give you flu, but it can stop you catching it.

The Covid-19 vaccine does not offer any protection from flu. You need to get the separate flu vaccine. In a small number of cases, the nasal spray may not be suitable, and the vaccine can instead be given as an injection in the arm

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Cancer patients need more cash

The Scottish Government is being urged to ensure North Ayrshire and Arran cancer patients are treated as quickly as possible.

The call comes from West Scotland MSP Jamie Greene, following the release of new figures.

The latest statistics show that 21 per cent of cancer patients in NHS Ayrshire and Arran Health Board have waited longer than the SNP's 62-day target to begin their first treatment after being urgently referred during the Covid pandemic. Across Scotland as a whole, almost 2,000 patients have exceeded this 62-day target between January and March of this year.

Mr Greene believes the recent announcement of £10 million from health secretary Humza Yousaf to improve cancer waiting times across Scotland is not enough to guarantee patients will be treated urgently and is backing proposals to invest £600 million into the health service to specifically target treatment waiting times.

Mr Greene said: 'These figures highlight the devastating effects the pandemic has had on so many cancer patients across North Ayrshire and SNP Ministers must go further and faster to urgently tackle the backlog.

'Being treated as quickly as possible gives patients the best chance of survival, but the key targets are being missed time and again.

'Even before Covid, patients were facing long waits, but now the situation for cancer patients requires even greater attention and resources.'

Making the announcement, Mr Yousaf said: 'This £10 million will enable boards to further recover and redesign cancer services for patients across Scotland and drive improvements in waiting times.'

Over the coming weeks, the funding will be divided between Scotland's 14 health boards to enhance cancer services where they are needed

Hero Liz springs into action to get Lynn home

Liz Mclean, store manager of the Co-op in Brodick, has once again demonstrated why she is the recipient of the order of the British Empire (BEM) after coming to the rescue of an elderly lady stuck in hospital on the mainland.

Named as a Covid hero, Liz was awarded her BEM last year for her work during the pandemic which included going above and beyond for customers on Arran, particularly elderly and vulnerable members of the community.

The story started last Thursday when Lynn Ross, of Glen Estate retirement housing complex, called Liz to cancel her weekly shopping order as she was not going to be at home following two weeks of treatment at Crosshouse Hospital in Kilmarnock.

Lynn was actually ready to be discharged on Thursday but was told she had to wait until Monday before she could receive an ambulance to transport her to the ferry. Despite the nurses' best efforts to secure transport, they had no success and were told they needed to provide 48 hours' notice. Lynn picks up the story: 'I resigned myself to reading more books on my Kindle and relying on my cousin Claire in Kilmarnock to do another load of washing for me.

'I couldn't take the risk of going to Ardrossan by taxi in case there was a problem with the ferry.

'So I phoned the Co-op to cancel my weekly order.'

Hearing the disappoinment in Lynn's voice, Liz aked Lynn how she was recovering and was astounded to hear of the situation Lynn found herself in.

Phoning

Liz immediately sprang into action and started phoning around to see how she could help.

Liz told the Banner: 'When I heard of Lynn's predicament I thought this is not right. Lynn is a lovely lady and I knew that whatever obstacles were in her way of getting home and recovering, they could surely be overcome.'

She negotiated with two taxi companies, Mainland Taxis on the mainland and ARC Private Hire on Arran, and secure

assisted boarding at Ardrossan after speaking to Brodick port manager Colin McCort.

With these arrangements in place Liz convinced the nurses at Crosshouse to discharge Lynn, although there were some good-humoured quips about Lynn being returned home via a Co-op delivery van.

Lynn added: 'It all went smoothly and I was home by 6pm on Thursday. Liz also had my shopping delivered later in the evening.

'I am very, very grateful to Liz Mclean and Carol Harwood from the Co-op, Colin McCort at CalMac, Mainland Taxis and ARC Private Hire, as well as the helicopter service, the nurses and staff at Arran Hospital and all at ward 2F at Crosshouse.'

In addition to Liz being characteristically humble about her accomplishment and refusing to take all of the credit for her assistance, she is going to write to Arran MP Patricia Gibson to see what can be done to prevent such a situation arising again.

Liz is due to be presented with her BEM next month.

Appeal after pensioner hurt in crash at Sannox Bridge

A pensioner was airlifted to hospital after a serious road crash at Sannox Bridge on Arran which left him fighting for his life.

Police Scotland is appealing for information following the crash which happened on Thursday August 19.

Around 2.55pm, a 71-year-old man was cycling north along the A841 at Sannox Bridge, near Corrie Golf Club, and appears to have lost control, falling onto the southbound carriageway.

Emergency services attended and the man was taken by air ambulance to Crosshouse Hospital for treatment. Medical staff described his condition as critical. Sergeant Craig Beaver from the divisional road policing unit based at Irvine said: 'The road was relatively busy at the time of the incident, with other cyclists and motorists, and it is important we speak to anyone who may have information to help us establish the full circumstances.

Dash-cams

'I am appealing for any witness to get in touch and would also urge motorists with dash-cams, who were travelling on the A841 at the time, to please check their footage for anything of relevance.

'Anyone with information is asked to contact Police Scotland through 101, quoting incident number 2066 of Thursday August 19, 2021.'

Arran staff shortages reaching critical level

The extent of the staffing crisis facing Arran businesses has been laid bare in a new survey.

The snapshot survey conducted by VisitArran for the Arran Recovery Group also shows where businesses in the hospitality and tourism sector are being hardest hit and looks at what solutions, if any, can be found.

All businesses have had considerable staff shortages over the summer season and 56 per cent had experienced staff shortages prior to this period.

Of these vacancies, 25 per cent were long term; 12.5 per cent were short term; 56.25 per cent were both and 6.25 per cent related to dependency on students who are returning to full-time education.

The survey found that the 16 businesses which responded had 107 vacancies between them. But given the survey was carried out in a limited timeframe and during a time of additional pressure on businesses, at the height of the recently ferry disruption, the true figures are expected to be much higher.

One medium-sized business said: 'Everyone will have built up holidays which we will be unable to honour given shortages so will need to close



to give holidays or change business model.'

Finding waiting staff

Asked for the reasons behind staff shortages, the biggest was housing shortages, which came ahead of the Covid-19 pandemic and Brexit.

When asked what way staff shortages had impacted business, the impact on health was high, both for owners and staff, loss of income was also cited as was reduced service and/or hours and the inability to plan ahead. Businesses were asked

to suggest any solutions that could alleviate staffing issues and 10 of those respondents highlighted affordable housing as being vital in recruiting staff. Other issues covered improving bus services, linking in more with Arran High School careers department, reduced tax for hospitality and, of course, the impact in employing people when the ferry service is so unreliable.

Projected staff shortages for the coming winter were, the survey found, difficult to estimate but three businesses said they wouldn't open in winter. One couldn't make a guess and the remaining 12 had a total of 75 vacancies so far. Winter opening is also seen as raising fresh challenges.

VisitArran chief executive Sheila Gilmore said: 'I think this highlights that everyone is doing their best under very trying circumstances. Everyone wants to give their best customer service at all times, and if you're covering extra shifts or working with limited team members, there can be a great deal of pressure. As such, we'd ask all customers to please be kind, be patient and be appreciative. We are all in this together.'

The number of job vacancies in vital education and health services are also revealed in the snapshot, with a warning the true picture is likely to be even worse.

There are currently 19 vacancies across all health and social care services on the island and Arran Medical Group says this has not changed for the last three to four years and runs between 15 to 20 posts on average, with the cost of housing always cited as the key issue facing applicants.

Most posts are offered with a relocation package, access to a staff house that is rented as a stop gap till they find suitable accommodation, but this does not suit most as it is a shared house and many have families.

Health officials say if the proposed integrated hub where the Arran health and social care partnership can consolidate 24/7 staffing does not happen, this will continue to be a major challenge in delivering care. And unless affordable housing is made available soon, this again will have significant impact on care.

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Consultation to end fire alarm call-outs

Fire chiefs have aired plans to end automatic attendance at fire alarms in workplaces in North Ayrshire.

The service has launched a consultation over the move to downgrade de facto turnout for automated warning systems.

But one councillor has criticised the proposal, branding it a 'cynical' ploy to cut firefighter numbers.

Kilbirnie councillor Donald L Reid told North Ayrshire's Police, Fire and Rescue Committee last week: 'Call me cynical, but I suspect they will want to cut back on the number of firemen employed.'

The suggestion, however, was denied by Scottish Fire and Rescue officers. Station commander Kevin Rennie told the meeting: 'I would rather see the service turn up to my mother who is in a wheelchair rather than turn out to non-domestic premises for an unwanted alarm.'

Scottish Fire and Rescue Service bosses have launched a consultation over plans to downgrade the response to what they described as 'unwanted fire alarm signals' - when automatic warning systems are operated for a cause other than actual fire.

In a consultation document on the topic, the service says it responds to an average of 28,479 such calls every year, caused by the activation of automatic systems in the workplace.

Scottish Fire and Rescue says the systems are designed to provide early detection and save lives, but instead 97 per cent of such call-outs are false alarms. They have compiled a range of options to tackle the issue – out to public consultation until October.

Area commander Iain McMeekin told councillors: 'It's a 12-week consultation on how we respond to automatic fire alarms, particularly unwanted fire alarm signals.

Arran Library in Brodick has re-opened to the public on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays from 10am to 4pm.


Staff have an extensive cleaning schedule in place and are requesting visitor details for Test and Trace, along with a one-way entry and exit system to ensure social distancing.

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Prime development site is put up for sale in Brodick



A rare development opportunity in a prime position in Brodick has become available.

At offers over £350,000, there is already said to be lots of initial interest in the large plot of land adjacent to the Douglas Hotel, which is owned by the hotel and previously had planning permission for development.

In 2016, the hotel unveiled plans for 59 self-contained holiday units in a new woodland hotel development which would have seen the 12 Apostles of Catacol replicated in modern form. However, the proposal never went ahead before the death of Douglas Hotel owner Sean Hendry two years ago and planning permission has now lapsed.

The site is now being marketed by estate agents KW Caledonia which, in its sales material, say the 0.8-acre site

'offers outstanding potential to be developed into several residential units or to be sold as serviced building plots, both of which would be in huge demand'.


'The land is competitively priced and currently contains the building of a former garden centre,' it adds.

'The land is accessed via the car park and ancillary areas of the Douglas Hotel as well as Shore Road and there are walled boundaries to Shore Road.

'To give an idea of previous development plans for the site, the land has previously been granted planning permission for 59 self-contained holiday units, however, this permission has now lapsed.

'New planning permission would need to be sought with local authorities for the new owner's plans for the site.

'It should also be noted the site has a number of trees with Preservation Orders and we hold a report on file which is



available to prospective buyers to view if required.

'Development land is currently in high demand on the island, therefore this plot offers an enticing, truly unique proposition for budding or experienced developers to tackle a new project.'

The sales material adds: 'The Arran's

route, ensuring swift travel across the island and links to nearby amenities.'

Glamping pods get go ahead at Machrie

Revised plans for a new glamping pod site at Machrie have been approved, despite local objections.

The original proposal was for a motorhome short-stay park (Aire) plus six luxury glamping pods which was later withdrawn after the application attracted more than 30 objections.

In a supporting statement for his new application for 10 glamping pods and associated facilities at Tormore Cottage, applicant Angus Smith told planners: 'This received a relatively high degree of just and unjust objections which generally concerned themselves with the visual intrusiveness of parked motorhomes in this location and the interruption of the scenic views from the elevated walk to the Kings Caves.

'Some objections suggested the proposal would somehow directly spoil the Machrie Moor Standing Stones or the Machrie Low Moss Hen Harrier breeding area, but both are absurd straw-clutching suggestions. The developers have clearly and commenadably altered their plans to take into consideration all sensible and relevant comments made and re-submitted their proposals accordingly. This has resulted in a very practical and sympathetic plan for 10 well-spaced wooden glamping pods, with associated reception hut and vehicle parking.

'The revised proposal now has all motorhome and camper van facilities removed. It displays a structure with mono-pitch green living roof (turf roof), wood chipping path surfaces and similar visual and ecologically considered measures, precisely to satisfy such meaningful and relevant objections as put forward by local people and the wealthy second-home owners in the

'With specific reference to the North Ayrshire Local Development Plan (adopted in 2019) I would consider the current glamping park proposal for Tormore in Machrie to be extremely well aligned and firmly in accordance with the relevant policies and conditions

'In conclusion, with all the serious objection comments addressed in the modified proposal using advice and guidance obtained from the above professional bodies detailed consultations, it can be safely assumed this proposal is fully compliant with the North Ayrshire local development plan and, in my view, planning permission should be granted without hesitation.

'This business will be an excellent contributor to the Arran local green economic recovery, provide employment opportunities for young people on Arran and provide the Arran tourism portfolio with an inexpensive, well-designed Covid-19 compliant facility for the new generation of 'staycation' visitors.'

The application was granted by North Ayrshire Council planners with nine conditions.



Head injury victim evacuated by rescue helicopter

A woman with a serious head injury had to be evacuated from the blue pools in Glen Rosa last Wednesday after Arran Mountain Rescue Team (AMRT) was sent to help.

The team was called out around 12.50pm and upon arrival at the scene they treated the casualty and prepared her for a medical evacuation due to the seriousness of the injuries.

Rescue 199, the HM Coastguard rescue helicopter from Prestwick, arrived shortly after and the casualty was taken to a mainland hospital for further treatment.

An AMRT spokesperson said: 'We wish the casualty a speedy recovery. Thanks to everyone for their assistance.'

Island health and wellbeing groups invited to apply for funding

Community groups and organisations that promote health, social care and wellbeing on Arran are being invited to apply for funding from the Scottish Government's Healthy Islands Fund.

The £1.3 million fund is open to groups focusing on health and wellbeing projects on Scottish islands with applicants able to receive up to £100,000 for capital projects or up to £5,000 of revenue funding.

The fund is being delivered on behalf of the Scottish Government by Inspiring Scotland which also delivered the Islands Green Recovery Programme in 2020 and the Island Communities fund in 2021, both support developing sustainable island economies.

Cabinet secretary for rural affairs and islands Mairi Gougeon said: 'I am pleased to see this new fund open to support the delivery of our National Islands Plan. The Healthy Islands Fund, which is being delivered on behalf of the Scottish Government by Inspiring Scotland, aims to provide islanders with opportunities and services to support their health and wellbeing in a post-pandemic recovery. This might include, for example, the provision of sporting equipment, training for clubs or the delivery of much needed mental health services.'

Celia Tennant, chief executive officer of Inspiring Scotland, added: 'The Scottish Government's new Healthy Islands Fund will support our island communities in engaging in healthy lifestyle choices, in turn supporting their physical and mental wellbeing. This new funding stream will build on the work of the Scottish Government's Island Communities Fund helping our islands to build back greener, healthier and happier post Covid-19.'

Lynn finds Arran solutions to create pure island piece



Hampered by being unable to source materials for her artwork during the pandemic, artist Lynn Jones has kept it local and found materials close to home to create a pure Arran piece of felt art.

Operating from her studio in Whiting Bay, Lynn from Lynn's Art On Arran, created the felt picture of an Arran landscape, using Arran wool, which is dyed with organic ingredients from the island.

The project started last year when the pandemic struck and Lynn found it difficult to get hold of the merino fleeces which are mostly imported from Australia and New Zealand.

With help from a small grant from Creative Scotland - which offered support for artists during the pandemic - Lynn set about creating her pure Arran piece with a carding machine purchased with the grant funds.

Next, she sourced some fleeces from local farms, Bellevue farm in Blackwaterfoot and Creagraineach farm in Kildonan, as well as some alpaca fleece from Arran Alpacas at Balmichael.

Āfter washing and carding the fleece, she began looking

for natural dyes on the island. 'I wanted everything that went in the dye pot to be from Arran,' said Lynn.

Foxglove flowers, cow parsley leaves and nettles were found in the fields and hedgerows around the island while local businesses and organisations helped support the project.

Ingredients

Robin Gray's Island Gourmet farm donated blackcurrants and carrot tops and volunteers and allotment holders at the Arran Community Land Initiative donated interesting ingredients, from marigolds to comfrey.

They even allocated Lynn a

small plot where she has been growing plants for the project, including woad which she hopes will give her the elusive blue dye she is still looking for.

Lynn said: 'It has been a steep learning curve and I am no expert but I have learnt so much about the dyeing process and the colours that our island nurtures.

'Thank you so much to everyone that has helped support the project.'

The finished picture of Goatfell hangs from a piece of driftwood that Lynn found on Kildonan beach but, unfortunately, for those eager buyers like those who snapped up her art during the recent

in helping to effectively ban shock collars in Scotland after campaigning for it since 2011.

Mrs Gibson said: 'We really enjoyed visiting Dogs Trust Glasgow and we would like to thank the team for spending some time with us and showcasing the amazing work they do.

'It is clear to see how passionate the staff at Dogs Trust are about their work, which really shone through when we got the chance to meet everyone.

'The applications for the








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
