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## It's all yours! Celebrations as Pirnmill marks hall transfer

The villagers of Pirnmill were this week celebrating that at long last they have a village community centre to call their

cabinet of North Ayrshire Council on Tuesday agreed a community asset transfer which saw ownership of the centre go to Pirnmill Village Association which has been successfully operating the hall for more than 30 years under a lease agreement.

The proposed change from lease to ownership of the centre will allow the association to continue with its work and any future improvements on a se cure footing. The transfer will not be finalised until the association agree a fee of around £2,000 which the council estimate to be 10 per cent of the value of the property.

While the association will save the £50 annual rent, as owners, it will now be solely responsible for the

maintenance and repair of the building. While some internal improvements have already been made in recent months, a working party will now be set up to explore its development.

The provision of a fit-for-purpose community centre within the village will ensure that inclusive, intergenerational activities can be provided for residents and visitors – improving quality of life and well-being. This links with Arran Locality Partnership's priority of reducing social isolation.

The centre is currently used by the adjacent Pirnmill Primary School for various activities and the transfer of the asset will not alter this arrangement.

As part of the proposal, the association also aims to build closer working relationships various island-wide organisations, festival organisers and organisers of charity events to raise awareness of the centre and offer quality facilities on the west coast of

#### Bond set for Brodick in November

The latest Bond blockbuster No Time to Die will be one of the films featured in the mobile cinema line-up when the Screen Machine returns to Arran in early November.

The spy film, which had its delayed Royal premiere this week, is highly anticipated, particularly as it may be lead actor Daniel Craig's fifth and final performance as the fictional MI6 agent.

The Screen Machine will be in Brodick between November 4 and 8 and tickets are expected to go on sale in the next few weeks. Demand for bookings is expected to be high as physical distancing measures will only allow for 40 seats to be available for every screening.

Frontline and essential workers can also take advantage of a new ticket discount category, Welcome21, which recognises their hard work during the pandemic.

The full screening list and booking options will be available at www.screenmachine.co.uk as soon as the online bookings open.

## Arran offering booster jabs and youth vaccines



Preparations are well under way to offer Covid-19 vaccines to young people who are newly eligible for their first dose and to those who are fully vaccinated who are now eligible for a third booster vaccine on Arran.

A single dose of the Pfizer BionNTech vaccine for the 12-to-15-year-old age group was recently recommended by the Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation (JCVI) to reduce the disruption caused to education by Covid.

The booster vaccine programme is aimed at maintaining protection levels against coronavirus for the most vulnerable groups during winter.

The third dose can only be

given to people in the eligible groups and where it has been at least six months - 24 weeks since their second vaccine.

Arran High School is being used for the mass vaccination campaign and the following groups will be welcomed soon:

All Arran residents aged 70 years and over

Clinically extremely vulnerable residents who are aged 16 and over, previously shielding

12-to-15-year-olds

Members of these groups should call Arran Medical Group on 01770 600516 to make an appointment with clinics scheduled to take place on Saturday October 9 and Sunday October 10.

Arran Medical Group has asked that people in these categories please call between 5.15pm and 7pm, Monday to Thursday, by Thursday October 7, to make appointments. This arrangement is to keep the practice lines clear for routine enquiries and appointments during the daytime.

Ruth Betley, senior manager, Arran Services for North Ayrshire Health and Social Care Partnership, said: "The vaccination programme for Arran has been highly successful. We are now delighted to be able to welcome those eligible for a third booster dose of Covid-19 vaccine. Now that the vaccination programme is being rolled out to younger people, those in the 12-to-15 age group will be offered one dose. The Covid-19 vaccines

have demonstrated they are safe and effective in this age group and vaccination offers the best chance of protecting young people from Covid-19 and preventing further disruption to education. Getting the vaccine is a decision to be made jointly between parents or carers and young people, but it's really important to use reliable and trusted sources such as NHS Inform when making a decision. Individual choice should be respected for the decisions young people and their parents or carers make in accepting or not accepting the vaccine offer. Parents or carers are encouraged to attend appointments with their children and both can ask questions about any queries they have before the vaccination is given.

'Vaccination teams will also be delivering booster vaccines to residents of our care homes and those who are housebound on the island from next week.

'Thanks once again to all those on Arran who have helped to ensure the vaccine programme runs smoothly. In particular, I would like to thank our colleagues in North Ayrshire Council for allowing us to use Arran High School for the vaccination programme.'

Young people aged 12 to 15 who do not attend the clinics on Saturday October 9 and Sunday October 10 will have another opportunity for vaccination at school on Monday October 18 when school vaccinators will also be delivering seasonal flu vaccines at Arran High School.

People in the other eligible categories who are unable to attend the clinics scheduled for their group will be offered a further opportunity to get their vaccination in November.

# No panic at Arran fuel pumps but business is brisk

Fuel stations on Arran have experienced a massive surge in business over the past week however nothing on par with the lengthy queues and panic buying seen elsewhere in Scotland.

The rush for fuel started last week after oil firm BP announced some petrol stations needed to close because of a lack of lorry drivers, prompting fears fuel shortages would be imminent.

In England, and parts of Scotland, many fuel stations shut altogether as supplies ran out and lengthy queues formed at forecourts that still had petrol and diesel.

On Arran, demand sky-rocketed with one fuel station reporting doing the equivalent of one week's worth of sales in just two days. And while there have been queues, at times, the customers have all been served within minutes, rather than hours or even days, as experienced by those in densely populated areas south of the border.

Flora Lammie at the Brodick fuel station said: 'Monday was our busiest day in well over three years.

'Queues formed around the corner towards the ferry terminal but all of the customers were able to fill up.

'We did run out of diesel for two-and-a-half hours on Monday but were able to secure supplies quickly. The bulk of the customers have been from the mainland, people either arriving on the island and finding availability, or people departing the island and wanting to make sure that they had enough fuel for their journey.

'Other petrol stations on the island have all experienced the same increase in demand and

staff are being kept very busy. I was run off my feet over the weekend and on Monday but it does make the day go very quickly.'

The Petrol Retailers Association has stressed there is plenty of fuel available and that the shortages are only at the point of sale because of temporary spikes in customer demand. UK transport secretary Grant Shapps said he expected panic buying to subside as the exceptional demand decreased, while it was confirmed that army tanker drivers would be brought in if required to deal with long queues and pump closures.

## Older car owners hit by E10 switch

Owners of vintage and classic cars on Arran, and even those with old petrol lawnmowers, have been left with no fuel supplies since the introduction of E10 petrol at the start of last month.

E10, which contains 10 per cent bioethanol, will work on 95 per cent of modern vehicles and engines, however those that are not compatible need to use E5 (containing five per cent bioethanol) which is not available from any petrol provider on Arran.

The introduction of E10 petrol on Wednesday September 1 is part of a UK Government strategy to reduce greenhouse gas to net zero by 2050.

The changeover to E10 is expected to reduce CO2 emissions by two per cent and an approximate one per cent reduction in fuel performance can be expected by motorists.

It is not all bad news though, as most petrol combustion engines can still work with E10, however, long term use

is discouraged as it can lead to rubber fuel components perishing over time.

Another alternative is to use a higher octane fuel, such as super unleaded, which is once again not available on Arran, but it can be purchased at mainland forecourts for roughly 8.7p a litre more than standard petrol according to AA figures. A petrol provider on Arran told the Banner: "There are no E5 providers on

Arran as we all purchase our petrol from the Grangemouth oil and petrol refinery which does not supply E5 petrol.

'Those with cars manufactured before 2000 and machines which require higher octane fuel, unfortunately have no options on Arran and the likelihood of it being provided is relatively slim as the demand for it is just not great enough to justify providing it.'



## Whiting Bay community council election





There will have to be an election for Arran Community Council members in Whiting Bay after three residents applied for the two places available on the council.

As a result a postal ballot will now be held among the electorate to decide on the selection of the three nominees: Suzie Dick, Bob Haddow and Thomas Young.

Two villages, Corrie and Pirnmill, have no nominations and Lamlash and Shiskine, which are allowed two nominations, have just one each, leaving the community coun-

cil short of four members. For the uncontested villages all nominees will be formally appointed at the election results meeting, currently scheduled to take place on Tuesday November 2, in the Ormidale Pavilion, Brodick.

Further members may be co-opted to fill any outstanding nominations, at the discretion of the community council. For the Whiting Bay contested election, postal packs, comprising a numbered ballot paper and a booklet containing the candidates' supporting statements, will be prepared and ready for issue on request to local electors residing in the 'extended village' area.

Local electors can apply for a pack by telephone: 01294 324131 or by email: committeeservices@north-ayrshire. gov.uk. Postal packs will be issued following a check of the Register of Electors.

Completed ballot papers can either be returned by post to North Avrshire Council local office at Lamlash, or hand-delivered to that location.

The Lamlash local office is not currently open to the public, but any ballot papers returned by mail or posted through the letterbox will be stored securely in a sealed ballot box, ready to be taken to the election results meeting for counting.

Postal packs will automatically be sent to Whiting Bay candidates, their proposers and seconders. Packs will otherwise be available on request from Monday October 4 and must be returned to Lamlash

local office no later than Friday October 29. This information will be publicised locally at Whiting Bay Hall and in the local shop as well as on the NAC website.

## Ormidale astroturf given new lease of life

Work to extend the life of the all-weather astroturf at the Arran Sports Association's Ormidale Pavillion has been completed with the playing surface now expected to last for another seven years.

The restoration of the astroturf is largely due to a £22,279 funding boost from SUEZ Communities Trust which was secured earlier this year with the assistance of Derek Shand and Arran Community and Voluntary Service (ACVS).

While regularly being used by both the junior and adult hockey clubs on Arran, the pitch suffered from poor drainage and deterioration due to old age.

Now, with the 10-day refurbishment, which involved re-

moving the old sand and dirt, the carpet pile fibers cleaned and untangled, and the pitch re-sanded, the new surface will improve the playing conditions and drainage.

The pitch will, however, needs to be utilized before it is at its best.

The new sand needs to be tamped down and compacted, which can only be achieved with frequent use and a few cycles of rain.

The rejuvenated astroturf has been welcomed by the Junior Hockey Club's 62 members and the Arran Ladies Hockey Club, which competes in the West District women's hockey league and who train on it every Thursday between 7pm and 8.30pm.

The association held a community consultation asking residents for their thoughts and all responses were supportive. The story of Pirnmill community centre is a long one. After a long community campaign in the 1980s, and several false starts, the hall was finally built using redundant huts from Arran High School and opened in 1988.

Hazel Cranstoun, woman of Pirnmill Village Association, said: 'The community centre will be a facility in the heart of the village that can host an extensive range of activities and services beyond what it currently provides. Thanks to the excellent support from NAC throughout, the community asset transfer process has been much simpler and we are delighted with the positive outcome,' she added.

Raise Your Voice with Ardeer (RYVA) was also successful this week for an asset transfer of land at Stevenston shorefront. The land will be used to build a new community-owned building for activities for residents and visitors.

Councillor Louise McPhater, cabinet member for participatory democracy, said: 'Community asset transfers provide a chance for people to be involved in providing opportunities or services for their communities.

'This is community empowerment in action, not just words. It gives power and resources to groups that are making a real difference in communities, she added.







## Poignant protest held at peace tree in Whiting Bay

More than 50 people of all ages gathered at the Peace Tree in Whiting Bay last Sunday.

In the run up to the forthcoming COP 26 in Glasgow there has been a renewed focus on the environment and the issue of the Weapons of Mass Destruction based in the Clyde. At the same time some Arran CND members went to the gates of the Faslane submarine base for a protest; their particular emphasis was on the specific implications for the marine environment of radioactive pollution and the more general carbon footprint impact of military resources.

Those who gathered in Whiting Bay regretted the recent decision of the UK to increase by 44 per cent its stockpile of nuclear warheads despite the urge for international cooperation and investment in measures to mitigate and adapt to climate breakdown.

The opening paragraph of a widely praised essay by Arran High School pupil Louis Gray entitled: There is No Planet B was read out: 'We are living on this planet as if we have a new one to move to. Mother nature can only take so much of a beating until the biosphere of this gentle planet collapses. Right now we are at an important point in history - we choose if future generations get to live on a prosperous biodiverse earth or one that has been reduced to ruins.

'Throughout previous decades we have found out more about the complex workings of our climate and maybe a few decades ago you could be forgiven for not doing anything about climate

change, but now we have the facts, we have the knowledge and there's no excuse for not playing your part in saving the planet.' A lively discussion ensued about the possibility of an Arran Greenpeace branch and starting a reading group based on the recently-published Penguin Green Ideas Slipcase of 20 short classics of the ecology movement.

Whilst some get the publicity, Peter has analysed many planning applications and advised the council in much detail. I pass my personal appreciation to him for his contribution and support.

Liz Evans carries out the duties in a quiet and efficient manner and has represented her community in a positive manner for more than 11 years.

I know her contribution is recognised by both the village residents and also a wider group with her other work caring for those in need. She has my sincere appreciation and I wish her and Ray well for the future.

Colin Mackenzie has been my partner for the last six years representing Brodick and also brought experience and knowledge of education and other island aspects to the discussion and has had to cope with house moves, IT system changes etc as well as the pandemic. All the best to you and the family.

#### People's views not heard

It was great to see the determined peaceful protest of some 40 Arran pensioner ladies in persistent rain reported on the front page of The Arran Banner last week, alongside the fuller report of the visit of the new Scottish transport minister Mr Graeme Dey.

The ladies came to personally voice their concerns over the difficulties they were experiencing due to the continuing Arran ferry issues.

As reported, unfortunately the ladies were snubbed by the minister as he attended the organised IoAFC meeting via the back door of the Ormidale Pavilion.

Considering all the ferry dramas Arran residents have all been experiencing over the past 18 months or so of the Covid-19 pandemic, surely the greater Arran public should have been given greater access to put their current ferry concerns to Mr Dey and the several NAC, Transport Scotland and Scottish government officials who accompanied him, albeit socially distanced?

In that regard it is pertinent to note the quote given by the chairman of IoAFC in the January 8 2021 issue of The Arran Banner.

This quote was made about one month after the multi-MSP Scottish government enquiry report of the RECC into the reasons behind the cost and build schedule overruns of the Glen Sannox project at the Ferguson shipyard, the famous 'catastrophic failure' report.

Viz: 'IoAFC will continue to voice views from the community and work with all parties to ensure from this calamitous episode, lessons are learned and we can finally receive the levels of service and capacity which we have not enjoyed for some time

I have to say that there was not much evidence apparent on the occasion of Mr Dey's visit of 'views from the community' being heard or 'working with all parties' or past 'lessons being learned'

Rather, the treatment of these retired Arran ladies seems typical of the IoAFC. Will that change going forward?

CMAL has agreed to commission a study to look at impacts of easterly winds, waves and swell at Brodick. This will include the possible construction of a breakwater. The move was suggested in a letter to the transport minister Graeme Dey from the Arran Ferry Action Group. Here is his reply.

Thank you for your letter dated September 13 2021 on behalf of the Arran Ferry Action Group (AFAG) regarding the mis-alignment of Brodick pier and the direct impact of this on the resilience of ferry services to Arran.

I am aware that Caledonian Maritime Assets Ltd (CMAL) has already communicated with AFAG on the design of the new Brodick pier therefore I will not go over this, but will re-affirm the position that the berth orientation was the optimum solution delivered at Brodick.

You have outlined that the best solution to address this mis-alignment would be for CMAL to construct a breakwater to the east giving protection to moored vessels from the North East to South East wind-generated sea swells.

The breakwater being constructed from dumped rock rubble and concrete tetrapod blocks as illustrated in the sketches attached

to your correspondence at an estimated cost of around £10million. CMAL has confirmed that it is commissioning a study of the impacts of easterly winds/waves/swell at Brodick.

The study will look to analyse the conditions that lead to cancellations informed by various data sets such as wind, wave and weather as well as obtaining input from vessel masters from CalMac Ferries Ltd (CFL); with the objective being to identify all potential solutions and/or mitigation measures that can be implemented including the construction of a breakwater as suggested.

CMAL expect to commence the data gathering exercise and study during winter 2021/22 and will feedback to Transport Scotland who will fully consider any recommendations as a result of the study.

I thank AFAG for its suggestion. Following receipt of your letter I took the opportunity to discuss any issues around berthing, with the vessel master myself, whilst travelling to Arran on my recent visit.

Then followed 198 paces along the walkway, making a total of 337 paces to set foot on the

On my return, it was 56 paces from the booking office to the foot of the ramp, 33 paces up the ramp, and I was on the boat.


A total of 89 paces at the as-yet-unimproved Ardrossan terminal

## Arran author tackles tale of Typhoid Mary

Arran author and live storyteller Marty Ross makes his professional debut as stage playwright in his home city of Glasgow next week.

His play, The Tale of Typhoid Mary, debuts at A Play, A Pie and A Pint, the lunchtime theatre at Oran Mor in the west end, which has become Scotland's pre-eminent forum for new stage writing.

The play is based on the true story of Mary Mallon, an Irish cook in early 20th century New York who, without showing any symptoms herself, was carrying Typhoid bacillus, causing outbreaks among the wealthy households of America's East Coast.

After tracking her down, the New York Health Department forcibly confined Mary to an island in the East River for the rest of her life.

'It's a story I had been obsessed by for a long time,' said Ross, 'but it's gained a whole new currency in the light of the Covid pandemic – a story about the hard choices in public health between respecting individual liberties and defending society as a whole from infection.

'Mary suffered the severest lockdown imaginable and we can debate to this day the rights and wrongs of the way she was treated, but my play aims to be a thrilling story

above all – a detective story, a dark comedy and a deeply moving tragedy.

## Fish and shellfish in Arran's waters – 'a fishy business'

The Community of Arran Seabed Trust (COAST) is running a year-long media campaign to raise awareness of the many exciting habitats and species to be found in Arran's seas, many protected by the South Arran Marine Protected Area. Each month, they are focussing on a particular habitat or collective group of inter-linked species. The September article features fish and shellfish. 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If we are asked what the sea provides for us, most of us probably think of the food that it produces.

This will include fish and shellfish (such as lobsters, crabs, prawns, scallops and mussels) which are some of the more familiar species that we find around Arran and elsewhere around Scotland and the UK.

Fisheries were once seen as a limitless resource, a viewpoint illustrated by the words of the Victorian scientist T H Huxley in his inaugural address to the Fisheries Exhibition in London in 1883: 'I believe that .... probably all the great sea fisheries are inexhaustible: that is to say that nothing we do seriously affects the number of fish.'

#### Over-fish

Today we now know that it is all too easy to over-fish wild stocks of marine life with serious consequences for both ourselves and the marine environment.

The community on Arran experienced this directly with the catastrophic decline of commercial fish stocks in the Clyde through the 1980s and its associated loss of livelihoods, income and even island events such as the annual Lamlash Fishing Festival.

Action by COAST and the Arran community to establish the Lamlash Bay No Take Zone (NTZ) and protect the South Arran Marine Protected Area (MPA) from dredging and to this loss of fish stocks and marine life.

This hard-won protection is working, as shown by the results of collaborative projects with universities and researchers - increased marine life in parts of the NTZ and MPA, and larger shellfish in the NTZ which produce more eggs.

Studies also show that young cod prefer areas with more seabed marine life.

While we do not yet know whether fish stocks in the Clyde will ever recover, the NTZ and MPA are showing the potential for protected and recovering seabed habitats to contribute to the recovery of commercially important fish, shellfish and other species; increasing numbers of snorkellers and scuba divers want to see this recovery for themselves, bringing additional economic benefit to the island.

Altogether around 500 fish species may occur in UK seas although only around 250-300 of these are likely to be permanent residents; both the largest European fish species, the basking shark, and the second-smallest European fish, the diminutive goby, have been recorded around Arran. the latter seen for the first time this year during citizen science surveys as part of the UK-wide Seasearch project.

Identification of many fish species can prove difficult as they are masters of camouflage meaning you cannot rely on colouration as a method of identification.

Instead a starting point is to look at the variable body shape of different fish species, which adapts them to their particular lifestyle and the environmental conditions in which they

Some species living predominantly on the seabed, such as gobies, blennies and sea scorpions, may have quite a short, chunky body, sometimes with a relatively large head (such as with the long and short-spined sea scorpions and angler fish).

Others that live in the water column, such as mackerel, saith and pollack have more torpedo-shaped bodies that enable them to move quickly and efficiently through the

#### Unique

Flat fish go through a very unusual and unique anatomical change when they are very small, where the eve on one side of the body moves round so that both eves are on the upper side of the fish, while the other side becomes the underside in contact with the seabed.

As with fish, we have a wealth of different shellfish in our seas, with some, such as winkles, dogwhelk, shore crabs and hermit crabs, relatively easy to find.

Others, however, can be more cryptic.

Nut crabs, for example, are small crabs with a body that is only the size of a fingernail.

They are generally found amongst gravel and broken shells and so can be hard to spot as they look very similar to the small stones and shell fragments in the areas they

Equally cryptic are bivalve shellfish that live within the sediment - often the only sign of these are their filter feeding siphons protruding above the surface of the seabed.

Fish and shellfish have

important ecological roles in the marine environment - as described in the article in the Banner in July, fish provide food for larger marine species such as dolphins, porpoise, sea birds and otters.

Through their own feeding activities, both fish and shellfish play an important role in the cycling of nutrients in the sea and influence the structure of marine life communities.

Some shellfish, such as lobsters and crabs scavenge on dead and decaying material as well as feeding on smaller animals and organic particles within the seabed sediment.

Others, such as limpets and winkles, graze on marine plants or, in the case of scallops and other bivalves, feed on small food particles that they extract from the sea water they filter through their bodies.

Fish and shellfish are affected by a range of different human impacts in addition to those





associated specifically with fishing, including loss and damage to marine habitats as a result of developments and pollution.

#### Climate change

Warming seas as a result of climate change are leading to shifts in the distribution of marine fish in UK waters, meaning some species such as cod are shifting their range further northwards.

Research has found that while juvenile fish of some species are getting bigger as sea temperatures rise, adult fish are getting smaller.

Warming seas can also

lead to more frequent and severe harmful marine algal blooms which can be directly harmful to fish and shellfish and increase the risk of marine biotoxins being present in

It is in our own interests to look after our seas - evidence shows how fish and shellfish populations can respond when areas are protected and not overfished or degraded.

A well-managed South Arran MPA has significant potential to support sustainable fisheries and other sustainable marine-based businesses into the future.
