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# Eagle attacks on sheep threaten farm's future

They are just what Scottish food and farming needs – a young couple continuing a family farming tradition going back generations.

Ricky and Kirsten Rennie of Garvachy Farm are in the second year of their farming journey since taking over the reins after Kirsten's dad, John Paterson, retired.

The 2,500-acre hill farm above Minard, plus rented grazing, carries 1,200 ewes and 20 Dexter cattle – with the couple aiming to farm in a sustainable way while maintaining the best traditions of Argyll hill farming.

But there is an obstacle. Not only do they have to deal with industry-wide challenges including Brexit and the Covid pandemic, but their sheep flock has been decimated by attacks from sea eagles.

After being hunted to

extinction in the early 20th century, white tailed or sea eagles – with their 2.4 metre (eight foot) wingspan – were reintroduced to Scotland in the 1970s and bolstered in the 1990s and early 2000s. The first successful breeding occurred in 1985 on Mull and they spread from there. There are now estimated to be more than 150 breeding pairs in Scotland.

Ricky believes that six juvenile eagles hunted on Garvachy this year, joined by an adult pair later in the season – and they killed sheep by the score.

From a scanning percentage pre-lambing of 97 per cent - almost one lamb per ewe – by the time the lambs were weaned in late summer that figure had fallen to 55 per cent.

In total, 220 lambs were lost, 'unaccounted for' in 2021. The vast majority of these, says Ricky, were taken by sea eagles. He has witnessed it himself, many times.

# Vodafone feels the Furnace heat over 'deplorable' service

Villagers in the Loch Fyneside village of Furnace say they feel 'abandoned' by telecoms giant Vodafone after a month without a mobile signal.

Anger and frustration has built while residents contacted Vodafone to report the problem – only to be held in customer services queues for up to an hour; given various 'reasons' for the outage, including the presence of a river, a points problem – and that it would be quickly restored.

One caller was even told

there wasn't a problem at all. Vodafone has offered the strongest signal of very few available mobile providers in the Furnace area, so many villagers use their services.

### Run around

Furnace resident Ruth Tott said: 'Every one of us has been given the run around and the fob-off and we are at our wits end.


'Many in our village rely totally on their mobile with no landline, and many are elderly or vulnerable. 'The situation is deplorable. We do not know where to take this to get it resolved.'

A Vodafone UK spokesperson told the Argyllshire Advertiser on Wednesday: 'We apologise to our customers in the Furnace area who may be experiencing problems with our service at the moment.

'An engineer visited the site yesterday to carry out further essential repair work and we hope to be able to resolve the issue very soon.'

# Tarbert loses ferry to Cumbrae route

The ferry serving the route between Tarbert and Portavadie was taken as cover last week after a vessel on the Largs-Cumbrae service collided with the seabed.

The Tarbert-Portavadie service has been out of action since Friday October 15, when MV Isle of Cumbrae was moved by ferry operator CalMac to the Largs-Cumbrae route while repairs were carried out to the MV Loch Shira.

Another vessel, MV Loch Riddon, is also being used on the Largs to Cumbrae route in Loch Shira's absence.

It is understood MV Loch Riddon is unable carry dangerous goods vehicles, whereas MV Isle of Cumbrae has that



capacity which is needed on the route.

CalMac confirmed that an

engineer was working on MV Loch Shira earlier this week and Tommy Gore, area

operations manager (Clyde) for CalMac, said: 'I apologise for the disruption this has caused to customers using the Tarbert-Portavadie service.

'Engineers are working hard to fix the issue with MV Loch Shira and we hope to have normal service resuming as soon as possible.'

# Rest and be Thankful petitions pile pressure on Holyrood over 'fiasco'

As one Scottish Parliament petition seeking swift action on the landslide-prone A83 opened for signatures earlier this week, a second is on the way – this time calling for a public inquiry into the handling of the issue.

A petition by the business-led Rest and be Thankful Campaign group went live on Monday, calling for a permanent solution to the A83 at Glen Croe by 2024.

It asks the Scottish

It asks the Scottish Parliament to urge Transport Minister Graeme Dey MSP and the Scottish Government to recognise 'the crisis' at the Rest and be Thankful as an emergency due to the economic and environmental impacts, and the 'high risk' that 100,000 of debris is ready to fall, which could be a 'risk to life'.

John Gurr, the campaign group's chairperson, said: 'We ask that Graeme Dey MSP and the Scottish Government deliver a robust two-way temporary alternative to the A83 by 2022 – the current mitigation works of planting trees and digging pits does not stop landslides or stop the road from being closed every time it rains.

'We ask Mr Dey and the Scottish Government to stop wasting time on lengthy consultation and deliver a permanent solution by 2024.'



Prior to the petition being launched, the campaign group engaged with local councillors and MSPs to raise support.

This led to a meeting with Transport Scotland and Mr Dey, who, according to the group, 'will not alter their current plans to continue closing when it rains, without a suitable temporary solution, and will not rethink the lengthy project to decide on a permanent solution'.

'The road is used by 1.3

million vehicles annually yet was closed for 200 days last year, creating an unnecessary barrier to our region,' said Mr Gurr

'Furthermore, we know that 100,000 tonnes of debris is ready to fall. This is a risk to life and should therefore be treated as an emergency and addressed with the urgency that it deserves, yet Transport Scotland is now proposing a further 10 years to deliver a permanent solution.'

Within a couple of days of going live, the petition had received more than 1,500 signatures.

In a separate move, Argyll and Bute councillors Dougie Philand (Mid Argyll) and Donald Kelly (South Kintyre),

of the political group Argyll and Bute First, have submitted a petition to the Scottish Parliament asking for a full public enquiry into the management of the Rest and be Thankful project.

Councillor Philand explained: 'In 2012 after we submitted a petition to the parliament calling for a permanent solution to the Rest and be Thankful, which attracted 10,000 signatures and was supported by more than 400 businesses.

A meeting of the A83 taskforce in 2013 discussed six options by consultants Jacobs for a permanent solution, Major landslides at the Rest and be Thankful in August and September 2020 caused major disruption – but these were just the latest in a series of such events in recent years.

including the 2020 preferred option, but all were dismissed out of hand by the Scottish Government. The government decided to go ahead with 'mitigation measures'.

'We all know this was just the start of the sticking plaster exercise. Since then it has been a constant string of borrow pits, fencing, drainage etc, with the cost to the public purse racking up year-on-year and the only people benefiting being the consultants and contractors. The current cost of these mitigation measures is in the region of £90 million and rising. In 2012 the same preferred option as the one now proposed was costed in the region of £68 million.

'We were told at the last taskforce meeting it will be at least seven years before any permanent solution will be put in place. I am still sceptical, because my opinion is that if the money is required for the central belt, there it will go.

'We are calling for a public enquiry into the management and cost of this flasco.'







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# Love for pier lifts Inveraray's musical fundraiser

Pier positivity was in the air with beautiful music provided by artists of all kinds on a big fundraising day for Inveraray.

This was the first opportunity people have had to show public support for the community's bid to buy the neglected pier.

And show it they did, with a 10 per cent boost to funds in just one day thanks to the efforts of volunteer bucket-shakers and musicians who freely gave of their time for the Inveraray Pier campaign.

The busking event on Saturday October 16 was started in fine style by Pipe Major Stuart Liddell, indisputably one of the best solo pipers in the world today and a son of Inveraray.

Stuart grabbed the attention of passers-by at the pier head with some favourite tunes and a rendition or two of 'Baby Shark' - before moving on to help relieve tourists of spare change at the Woollen Mill and Londis, with Inveraray Co-op the next stop on a



whirlwind tour of the Royal Burgh. He was later joined by three Kilmartin pipers from Mid Argyll Pipe Band - Rod and Jojo Buchanan and Nick McLean - to entertain at the

Stuart said: 'The pier has very special memories for me, having grown up in Inveraray. It's iconic and it's a shame to see it in such a state of disrepair. But it's great to see the movement to change that and it will be nice to have it open to the public once again.

He added: 'And it's a great chance today for me to get out, play a few tunes and to see people again.'

Affection for the pier is not restricted to Inveraray folk.

Margaret Hartfel from St Minnesota, started coming to Inveraray for a few weeks' break five years ago.

'I love the town, I love the people and I just enjoy being

here,' she said. 'The pier is such an asset. It's sad to see it's closed. I'm hopeful this campaign will mean that it's open the next time I come to Inveraray.

The fundraiser was the brainchild of folk musician Robin Campbell, now resident near London, who co-ordinated the event with Inveraray Community Council convener Linda Divers the driving force behind the community bid.

Inveraray is a favourite place for Robin, going back to the days when he was one half of folk duo Lomond Folk in the 1960s and 1970s. And he was out on Saturday too, belting out some folk classics.

Later in the day, talented local singers Feorlin Renton and Abi Cuthbert entertained with the equally talented Jackie Kerr and young Katy McLeod on her clarinet. Joe Quinn from Balloch and Cairndow's Craig MacIntyre of the Camans also performed with support from Gordon Neish.

The action moved to the George Hotel beer garden between 6pm and 8pm.

The grand total was revealed by Linda Divers, who said: 'We raised £1,614.20 on the day. It was fantastic, right from Stuart kicking things off.

'I can't thank all the performers enough and am so proud Inveraray could come together like this. I also want to thank the bucket shakers and my fellow community councillors who always go above and beyond to support me. Thanks as well to Brian and Margaret Elder, all the people who put donations in buckets and to WD Semple for their generous donation.

'We also appreciate the support of the George Hotel for

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# Eagle attacks on sheep threaten farm's future

After lambing the ewes expecting twins in a shed, 130 fit and healthy lambs were turned out to pasture. Just 36 lambs survived.

'We were out all the time in the park,' said Ricky. 'We were careful to control other predators, so it's definitely the eagles that got them bar one or two.'

The farm would normally keep the best ewe lambs for breeding, but Ricky explained: 'We're 110 breeding ewe lambs short on the hill this year. Last year we sent 260 away to wintering and sold 40 of those. This year we've got 170 all-in.'

This year's financial loss is estimated at £16,000 to £20,000 – but that fails to take account of loss of future breeding potential.

Ricky explained: 'It's not just the loss of the lambs. It's got to the stage where we have to keep every ewe lamb rather than selecting the best, so the quality of stock goes down. I had to keep my old ewes as well, so we didn't have them to sell.'

Garvachy is a member of the Sea Eagle Management Scheme, run by NatureScot, formerly Scottish Natural Heritage. Participants can get up to £5,000 through the scheme for management measures such as pasture improvement and supplementary feeding to promote strong and healthy lambs – the theory being that the eagles predate weaker animals.

This has not been Ricky's experience.

'I've seen them taking lambs around 20kg on a neighbouring farm. They even fly across the dogs when we're gathering. I think they would have a go given half a chance.'

And in February 2020, five in-lamb ewes in the same field were killed over eight days by sea eagles – a fact confirmed by NatureScot, says Ricky.

He added: 'They've killed fit, healthy ewe hoggs and gimmers too.'

Ricky concluded: 'They say they're trying to encourage new entrants to farming, but this is just discouraging people.

'We're not against the sea eagles, and there is no doubt they're impressive birds, but there's just too many of them. You can understand why people like to see them, but they

'Another few years like this year and our business won't be here.'

MSP for Argyll and Bute Jenni Minto said: 'I heard about the impact of the eagles on lambs first-hand on a visit to a Mid Argyll farm this summer. I have spoken with NatureScot to raise the concerns of farmers and crofters.

'It is essential that those impacted engage with NatureScot to ensure they are given the support they need and to help inform all future decisions and action required.'

A NatureScot spokesperson said: 'The reintroduction of

these native birds to Scotland has been successful and benefits tourism.

'In some locations, however, sea eagles impact farming and crofting by predating lambs. We understand the concerns of farmers and crofters and continue to work closely with them, and a range of stakeholders at local and national level, to offer management support through the Sea Eagle Management Scheme and to trial management techniques which can help reduce these negative impacts.

'Following consultation, the scheme was revised significantly in 2020 and now offers more flexibility and an increased level of support to those affected by sea eagle predation.

'The scheme budget has increased to £350,000 for 2021/2022 and is now better placed to address the costs that some individuals have incurred as a result of adapting their management practices to mitigate impacts from sea

NFU Scotland president Martin Kennedy said: 'NFU Scotland cannot comment on the specifics of individual cases, however, the very real and impacts that sea eagles have on so many farms and crofts across a vast swathe of Scotland cannot be dismissed. 'We are members of the

National Sea Eagle Stakeholder Group and represent farmers and crofters who have endured in some cases decades of predation by sea eagles. In places where eagles continue to cause significant damage through predation, NFU Scotland looks to NatureScot to deliver further action through the White tailed Eagle Action Plan. We need urgent delivery and implementation of key actions using the knowledge and evidence already gained.

'NFU Scotland and its members remain optimistic that through careful management of the sea eagle population there would be a balanced, sustainable environment to enable and support both profitable agricultural activity as well as the eagles.'



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# Argyll teachers to speak at council climate summit

Argyll and Bute Council will host its first education climate summit next week, with local teachers playing a pivotal role in the event.

On October 27 and 28 speakers from schools, businesses and charities will address the online event to raise awareness of a broad range of climate issues.

Taynuilt teacher Jennifer Love will tell those attending about how her pupils have been working with a local textile company to create natural, powerful messages to raise awareness of climate change.

Taynuilt Primary School pupils worked with textile company Crubag as part of a project documenting research they had carried out into plastics on their shorelines. The children created mood boards of their findings and created designs using printing techniques taught to them by Crubag.

The designs were inspired by the results of their shore investigations, using microscope images of the plastics and ma-

terials they had found on the beach. The result was artwork with a powerful message. The designs were printed onto organic cotton and used to cover recycled paper notebooks.

Also speaking at the summit will be Rhu Primary School head teacher Linda MacBeath who will talk about the Queen's Green Canopy project, a tree planting initiative the school has been taking part in. Each session will last approximately one hour and will include presentations by the Scottish Association for Marine Science, ALIEnergy, Wreckspeditions Dive Charters Ltd, Time for Change Argyll and the Hebridean Whale and Dolphin Trust.

The council's policy lead for education Councillor Yvonne

McNeilly said: 'Argyll and Bute Council has signed up to meet Scotland's target of achieving 'net zero' by 2045. We have one of the lowest carbon footprints anywhere in the UK and I firmly believe that if we all make some changes, even small ones, we could become the first local authority to achieve 'net zero' per head of population.

'Êducation is at the heart of this if we are to succeed and our schools are already doing amazing things to help raise awareness of global issues in our fight against climate change. This summit will be a great opportunity for our communities to come together and showcase what they are doing to make a difference. The key speakers have each geared their presentations towards a specific audience so there is something to interest everyone. I would encourage everyone to sign up to at least one of the sessions.

# Housing focus to help tackle Argyll and Bute population decline

Housing will be a key focus of a repopulation scheme by Argyll and Bute Council as it bids to reverse the area's population decline.

The National Repopulation Zone approach sees pilot areas taking steps to address their own particular challenges, with their experiences used to develop effective repopulation initiatives elsewhere.

At a meeting of its policy and resources committee last week the council agreed that the pilot zones for research into issues affecting local population levels should be the Rosneath Peninsula, the islands of Tiree and Coll, the Kintyre peninsula and the Isle of Bute.

Councillors also agreed a wider pilot project with a focus on addressing housing needs across the whole of Argyll and Bute.

This pilot project will include employing a settlement officer for a year, funded by the council and Highlands and Islands Enterprise to examine the availability and quality of housing across Argyll and Bute and factors such as cost, legislative barriers, land supply and infrastructure.

The council will develop

repopulation zones alongside the Western Isles, Highland and North Ayrshire councils which have identified their own pilot zones.


Argyll and Bute's repopulation proposals will be on the agenda at the next meeting of the Convention of the Highlands and Islands (COHI) as part of discussions about an inter-agency response to the acute population challenges in the Highlands and Islands.

Councillor Robin Currie, Leader of Argyll and Bute Council, said: 'Having enough housing, and of the type that people need, is obviously key in making it possible and desirable for people to live in Argyll and Bute.

'Our population is falling and is predicted to continue to fall. To keep our communities and our economy going, Argyll and Bute needs people to stay and others with key skills and investment to move here.

'The next meeting of COHI is on October 25. We will take that opportunity to press COHI and the Scottish Government on the importance of addressing Argyll and Bute's population challenges quickly.'





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# Climate-friendly island projects given boost

Four Argyll island projects are to benefit from Scottish Government funding designed to support employment, community resilience and health and wellbeing.

They are among 29 community groups and businesses across 23 islands which have been awarded grants of up to £150,000 each through the £2 million Island Communities Fund. Projects focus on developing sustainable economic activities on islands with the majority of projects having a net zero theme, while also supporting the delivery of the Scottish Government's National Islands Plan 2019.

Gigha's Active Travel Hub, Cornabus Tree Nursery on Islay, Ulva Housing Refurbishment Project and Islay leisure's resilience and sustainability project will all receive awards.

# Carbon-neutral plans drawn up for Islay's 12th distillery

Though it may seem like 11 whisky distilleries is plenty for the small Hebridean isle of Islay, plans are being drawn up for a twelfth.

A Proposal for Application Notice has been submitted to Argyll and Bute Council for Islay's newest distillery and visitor centre, named after the island's oldest name 'ili', at Gearach Farm west of Port Charlotte.

'Islay is already known for its distilleries,' explains the new distillery's website: 'ili will not just serve as a continuation of this legacy, but a development of it: ili's product will be carbon-neutral, with the creation of high-quality jobs and apprenticeships.

'An economic analysis undertaken by BiGGAR Economics indicates that by its tenth year of operation, ili could contribute 21 jobs within Islay

and 53 jobs across Scotland. The construction phase is estimated to support six years of employment on Islay.

'The proposed distillery will have a target capacity of 200,000 litres per annum, highlighting the smaller, more bespoke approach. For comparison, this is a similar size to that of Kilchoman pre-expansion.

'ili is the brainchild of Bertram Nesselrode and Scott McLellan. Scott is a local farmer and Bertram's family has owned Gearach Farm for many years.

'Seeking a sustainable future for Gearach Farm, they turned to Islay's existing importance as the home of high-quality whisky and saw an opportunity to enhance this legacy with the addition of a new, contemporary, sustainable distillery.

'The name of the enterprise is



'ili', the oldest name for Islay. It is inspired by the ancient standing stones found on the farm and in other places on the island and beyond. Physically, the built form of the distillery will also represent a point of difference. It will respect the built vernacular of the

island and complement the natural form of its spectacular surroundings.'

The plans, sited within the Rinns of Islay Site of Special Scientific Interest, include renewable energy infrastructure: a hydrogen plant, solar panels and a wind turbine up to 76.5 metres high to blade tip. 'Consideration is being given to abstracting water directly from Loch Gearach situated close to the proposed distillery site or from a borehole located on site,' the website says.

'Two buildings are envisaged,' reads the council's report

of handling: 'North of the Port Charlotte to Kilchiaran road towards Loch Gearach is the distillery, cafe, shop and tour building. South of the road is a building to replace an existing cattle shed for grain storage, distilling by-product management and barrel warehousing.'

A virtual exhibition is currently open at iliwhisky-consultation.co.uk, where you can also find details of a second online consultation from 3-7pm on November 4. The closing dates for comments will be November 18.

Islay's nine working distilleries are Bowmore, Bruichladdich, Kilchoman, Caol Ila, Bunnahabhain, Ardbeg, Laphroaig, Lagavulin and Ardnahoe. Planning applications have been approved for two more: a revived Port Ellen Distillery and Elixir Distillers at Farkin Cottage.

# Ideas sought to help boost mental health on Gigha

A brain-storming session will be held on Saturday on Gigha following the island's successful, first-round bid for funding.

Run by the British Science Association, the Ideas Fund offers support to rural communities to try out ideas that address problems related to mental wellbeing and now islanders are being asked to contribute to the process.

Local organisation 'Our Gigha and Me' has been successful in the first round of funding with its bid focusing on issues of social isolation which were magnified during lock-down, particularly for young people and families, as well as the wider community.

Maggie Wilkieson explained the thinking behind the funding bid: 'The aim of the project is how we can best use our beautiful Island to connect with nature to bring us the best in terms of wellbeing.

'So now it's over to us. To make sure we're capturing all the best ideas of how to achieve this, there is an introductory drop-in session at the village hall on Saturday October 23 from 12.30pm to 3pm.

'Everyone with ideas of what might work is welcome. The initial application suggested story trails, nature activities, a den and meeting place, but these are just initial ideas, there might be much more, especially from the local children and their parents.'

The Ideas Fund aims to connect communities with research professionals so they can work together to bring their ideas to life, building new skills and relationships. Grants of up to £25,000 are awarded to help develop ideas that are at a very early stage, while grants of around £90,000 are available to support, adapt and expand ideas that have already been developed and tested.

# Fyne Ales 'bready' with latest brew


Fyne Ales has brewed a new limited-edition pale ale – New Skies - using surplus bread that would otherwise have gone to waste.

The Cairndow brewerv is part of a coalition of 25 ale-makers from across the UK and Ireland which have brewed a new beer using surplus bread.

Known as the 'Companion Series', the new creations form a limited-edition collection of 26 beers.

New Skies is described on the Fyne Ales website as 'a new world pale ale brewed using Summit, Meridian, Mosaic and Kolibri hops, as well as the breadcrumbs from surplus bread. It's lightly hazy, with a soft tropical fruit flavour profile'.

Toast Ale, which co-ordinated the initiative, has supplied pre-prepared surplus bread crumb and shared expertise



with the fellow breweries to enable the creation of their new beers.

will be 2,600 Companion Series boxes available to buy, with £26 from each sale invested in conservation and regenerative agriculture projects.

Toast Ale is partnering with Rainforest Trust UK to protect  $3.25\,\mathrm{million}$  trees in threatened tropical rainforests, while a collaboration with Soil Heroes will support UK farmers to replenish the health of soils, sequestering 360 tonnes of CO2 as well as holding more water and improving biodi-

versity. The Companion Series is expected to raise more than £65,000 for these projects.

The coalition of 25 breweries has also published an open letter calling on world leaders to make concrete commitments to tackle the climate emergency at COP26 next month.

Fyne Ales managing director Jamie Delap said: 'From day one, our farm brewery set out not only to protect our local environment, but to enhance

'Our corner of rural Scotland isn't just home to our brewery. Our herds of red deer and highland cattle are fed on spent grain from the brewing process and we have a long track record of sustainability initiatives we've undertaken to ensure our Glen Fyne home thrives for years to come.

'We believe we all have a role to play in protecting our planet for future generations.

'The opportunity to join Toast's project and learn more about using food waste to further reduce our impact on the wider environment, and highlight the role of food waste in climate change, was too good to miss - especially with COP26 taking place down the road in Glasgow this year.'

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# Support for Argyll's unpaid carers doubled

Around 1,055 unpaid carers in Argyll and Bute are to have their Carer's Allowance Supplement doubled by the Scottish Government.

The Carer's Allowance Supplement (Scotland) Bill passed its third and final stage at Holyrood, meaning unpaid carers across Scotland will have their supplement doubled to £462.80.

This is the second time the supplement has been doubled - the first time being in July

Argyll and Bute MSP Jenni Minto said: 'Unpaid carers in Argyll and Bute have had an incredibly difficult time during the pandemic and without their heroic efforts our services would have been under greater

'That is why the SNP Scottish Government has doubled the Carer's Allowance Supplement, recognising this vital work and the difficulties that these dedicated carers will face as we head into winter.

'Unpaid carers will be facing a squeeze on incomes in the coming months with skyrocketing energy bills and food prices, so the doubling of the carers allowance supplement will provide a vital lifeline for unpaid carers in Argyll and Bute and across Scotland.

'The passing of this Bill is another example of how we are building a social security system in Scotland based on dignity, fairness and respect. Contrast that with the system at Westminster which has just cut Universal Credit at a time when those on the lowest incomes need it most.'

A UK Government spokesperson at the Department of Work and Pensions said: 'We've always been clear that the uplift to Universal Credit was temporary.

'It was designed to help claimants through the economic shock and financial disruption of the toughest stages of the pandemic, and it has done so.


'Universal Credit will continue to provide vital support for those in and out of work and it's right the Government should focus on supporting people back into work and supporting those already employed to progress and earn more.

'Vulnerable households across the country will be able to access a new £500m support fund to help them with essentials over the coming months as the country continues its recovery from the pandemic.

'The Scottish Parliament has significant welfare powers and can top-up existing benefits, pay discretionary payments and create new benefits in areas of devolved responsibility.'



# Inverness Royal National

The Royal National Mòd 2021 closed in style on Saturday as the sounds of singing from choirs the length and breadth of Scotland rang out across Inverness, celebrating the nine-day festival's triumphant return.

The 129-year-old event closed with a Massed Choirs Event at The Northern Meeting Park, where the Mod flag was handed over to the city of Perth, hosts for 2022.

After last year's event was unable to go ahead in person, An Comunn Gàidhealach went for a hybrid approach, with performances, competitions and cultural activities in-person and online.

There were 70 competitors in the live children and adult singing competitions, including the Silver Pendant, An Common Gàidhealach Gold Medal and the Traditional Gold Medal. There were also 16 senior choirs present, with 320 choristers taking part in showcase concerts.

Barra's John Joe MacNeil, a former head teacher of the Gaelic primary school in Caol and now a senior teaching fellow in Gaelic education at Edinburgh University, scored the highest marks in a test of Gaelic singing for the second time, making him a rare double gold medallist.

He impressed the judges again to win the coveted Gold Medal after winning the Traditional Gold Medal in the Lochaber Mòd four years ago.

'I don't think it's quite sunk in yet,' said John Joe, a tenor in Oban Gaelic Choir, 'but I'm just delighted to have won

the Gold Medal this year and the Traditional Gold Medal in 2017, and to be a double gold medallist. I'm particularly proud of the fact I can take that home to my island of Barra.

'I was very fortunate growing up to be immersed in such a wonderful culture of Gaelic song and music, particularly thanks to my grandparents who were very involved in passing on stories and songs. I'm just delighted to be taking this medal home.' Young singer Màiri Aisling

Callan from Annathill near Coatbridge put on a show-stopping performance to claim the ladies Gold Medal. A music student at Edinburgh University, Màiri's principal study is the lever harp clarsach and her family is originally from North Uist.

'I've really enjoyed singing again,' she said, 'and I'm delighted to have won. This is my first time competing in the adult competitions, having competed in the juniors previously.

'I was brought up listening to songs, so singing in Gaelic is part of my heritage and there's something very special about continuing the tradition. I'm lucky to have such great tutors, including Savourna Stevenson and Kenna Campbell.'

It was also a golden result for Calum MacColl of Fort William, who came out on

great moment winning the Traditional Gold Medal and it meant a lot to me. Performing made me think of my Dad who

Emma said: 'It means an awful lot to have won the Traditional Gold Medal. This is my third time trying for it, so I wanted to make sure I was prepared this year. I actually really enjoyed performing, it was a lot more comfortable and my previous experiences did me justice. I'm just absolutely delighted, especially when so many members of my family came to support me. It was definitely worth the

'I come from a very small island so it's so important to me to keep our traditions alive. All three songs I sang are all from Scalpay, so it's great to sing songs that represent the island, it's something that's very close


Up and coming vocalist Peter MacPherson, a 23-year-old student at Sabhal Mòr Ostaig on Skye, won the men's Silver Pendant this year.

He said: 'It feels great and quite overwhelming to have won. I've been working really hard and friends have all been so incredibly supportive and encouraging, alongside Christine Primrose my tutor and John Joe MacNeil. I feel really blessed to see the rewards of all the hard work.

'I did Gaelic at school and really enjoyed it, my grandparents on both sides are Gaelic speakers from the Isle of Skye, so I'm dedicating this to them.'

Shona MacQueen from Drumnadrochit won the ladies Silver Pendant Ms MacQueen made an emotional return to the Mod following a 30-year break. She previously competed as a teenager. The 43-year-old is now following in the footsteps of her mum who won the Gold Medal in the 1990s.

'I'm so excited and I'm still in shock that I've won,' she said.



I unfortunately didn't manage to make it up to the Mòd in Inverness last week but, thanks to the competition's increased presence on social media, I was able to follow what was going on from the comfort and sobriety of my flat in Glasgow.

Congratulations to all the prize winners. I am sure a few celebratory drams were had in the Highland capital as the week progressed.

The winners this year were very popular ones indeed. Male medalist, John Joe MacNeil, is a top guy who has done a great deal for Gaelic, both through his work as a teacher but also a lot of voluntary work. Twenty-year-old Mairi Callan won the women's prize and it's always great to see young winners of these premier competitions.

The winners of the Traditional Gold Medal this year are both people I know very well. I've enjoyed Emma MacLeod from Scalpay's singing for years at various cèilidhs and concerts, and always felt she was a certainty for the trad medal. That's not to suggest that winning it this year was anything other than a tremendous achievement. The quality in the female competition was very high indeed; both on paper, with some well-known names competing, and on the night, with some really excellent performances that were shown on BBC Alba.

While I'm delighted for all the singers listed above, I have to admit I'm particularly thrilled for my fellow Lochaber man, Calum MacColl, who won the male Traditional medal. Calum is incredibly musical with great ability on both the pipes and the three-row accordion, as well as a profound understanding and appreciation of his Gaelic musical heritage. Many times when I was a school kid I enjoyed Calum playing a 2/4 march or a Gaelic waltz at the Lochaber Accordion and Fiddle Club.

Singing, and learning the language to fluency, is a relatively

more recent endeavour of Calum's and I think it's fair to say it's going rather well! I recall bumping into Calum's father, the late Charlie MacColl, in a pub in Paisley the year I won the Gold Medal and he told me over a dram how delighted he was that a Lochaber boy had won the medal. Well, think how proud he would be now to know that his son had won the Trad. A brilliant achievement for a very deserving guy.

Finally, congratulations to Alison Rapson and Seumas Campbell who celebrated winning their gold medals 50 years ago this year. Seumas was the first person who adjudicated me at the national Mòd in 2007 and, years later, when I first adjudicated a national competition myself, I arrived at the venue feeling nervous about the role until I saw that my co-adjudicator that day was none other than Seumas - and I immediately felt much calmer! It's been tough not getting to the Mòd this year and catching up with all the people mentioned above and many more. Roll on Perth next October where, fingers crossed, we'll all be together again!

# Mod ends on a high note



'I haven't sung in 30 years and just thought if I don't do it now, I'll never do it. A lot of my family members sing, many of them have won the Gold Medal, so thought it was time I got myself along to the Mòd.

'I never felt my Gaelic was good enough, but I've gone right back to the start and I'm just going for it.'

And one Skye singer showed his dedication, travelling 200 miles to help secure victory for Largs Gaelic Choir Quartet, which won the Stornoway Gaelic Choir Cup at the Royal National Mòd.

Largs Gaelic Choir Quartet is composed of Marie Ann McCord, Linda McCallum and

Colin Fisher, who all live in Largs in Ayrshire, and Angus Allan MacDonald, who stays on Skye - five hours' drive

Angus Allan MacDonald, a 75-year-old retiree living in Tarskavaig, said: 'It feels very lucky!

'Because I live in south Skye and the others live in Skelmorlie, Largs, we don't get many chances to practice, so we feel quite good about it. We've been a quartet for 23 years.'

Marie Ann McCord, 62, added: 'It felt amazing to win, unbelievable because we've had so little chance to practice between lockdowns and everything. We had actually started this song two years ago in preparation for last year's mod before lockdown.'

The quartet also won the The Marshall Stormonth Memorial Trophy, and jointly won the The Ian Crighton Memorial Trophy with Na Gillean-Brìghde, at this October's Royal National Mòd in Eden Court Theatre, Inverness.

# Brexit chickens coming home to roost in Scotland

With latest statistics highlighting Scotland's trade has plummeted since leaving the European Union, I was struck by recent research undertaken by economists at University of Groningen in the Netherlands.

Using state-of-the-art modelling to look at the

impact of Brexit on trade for the UK and the devolved nations, it notes Scotland could 'undo the damage' of Brexit if it joined the EU as an independent nation.

As part of its 'Global Britain' strategy, in the wake of Brexit the UK is pursuing a series of free trade agreements with countries around the world including Canada, Japan, Korea, Mexico, Norway, Switzerland, Turkey and possibly the United States.

The research, however, finds that 'Global Britain' yields insufficient trade creation to compensate for Brexit trade losses and any losses due to Scottish independence from the rest of the UK could be entirely removed conditional on a renewed trade deal with the EU.

The Brexit chickens are coming home to roost and it is increasingly clear that the only way to insulate ourselves from the long-term damage of Tory narrow nationalism is to become an independent nation, regaining the economic and trading benefits of EU membership.

# Work gets under way to improve yacht centre

'After completion of the project, it is envisaged Ardfern Yacht Centre would be capable of achieving at least the 3 Gold Anchor Award from The Yacht Harbour Association.'

While work is carried out at the site, there is a temporary cabin providing toilets and showers next to the workshop for staff and customers.

A centre spokesperson said: 'We apologise for the disruption over the winter and early spring months while work takes place and thank everyone for their patience and understanding while the build is under way.

'We look forward to bringing you all a much-improved more modern centre at Ardfern for the summer 2022 season."

# **Escalating costs and delays** with pavilion redevelopment

The redevelopment of Rothesay Pavilion will take more than a year longer and cost £7 million more than originally planned.

In response to the escalating cost and timescale, Argyll and Bute Council has called for a revised proposal to be drawn up by the end of November.

The project to renovate the building began in November 2017 and was due to finish in June 2020, however, the estimated completion date

# Nine new distillery warehouses planned

# **ISLAY**

Plans for nine new whisky warehouses at an Islay distillery have been recommended for planning permission.

The proposal by Ardnahoe Distillery Company for the addition to its distillery at Port Askaig would give capacity for 6,000 casks of whisky, each of them holding approximately 210 litres, per year.

A council planning officer recommended planning permission is granted by Argyll and Bute Counci at the virtual meeting of its planning, protective services and licensing committee on Wednesday October 20.

The proposal, which qualifies as a major application under the terms of the Hierarchy of Development (Scotland) regulations, would see nine spirit warehouses being built to the northwest of the existing distillery as well as a dunnage warehouse alongside.

A new road system would serve all the warehouses and connect to the existing distillery roads and to the main road. The report to go before the committee states: 'An exceptional case was presented demonstrating this as an appropriate site. In the absence of a large warehousing which may be used island wide,

the options tend to be on site storage, shared storage and transport to the mainland. Overall capacity at most existing warehousing is, or is close to, being reached. The option of mainland storage is deemed to increase traffic with what may be unnecessary traffic movements compared to on-site availability. The proposers also state that an economic advantage may be gained by the supply of Islay matured whiskies at a premium price. Additionally, it has been stated cask visiting is becoming popular as part of the tourism offer being developed on the island. The exceptional land use case is compelling and is deemed to be consistent with policy.'

has been pushed back to autumn 2022 following the main contractors going into administration.

An Argyll and Bute Council report has now stated a fully-costed proposal is due by the end of November, with a further report to go before councillors the following month.

A report on the situation forms part of a larger document on the current financial situation for the council, which went before its policy and resources committee at its virtual meeting on Thursday October 14.

Having had an initial budget of £13.8million, the project is currently running at a £20.8m budget and is classed as 'off-track' by the council.

A council official said: 'The impact of Covid-19 has been significant.

'The site was closed in March 2020 followed by

the main contractor being placed into administration in April 2020.

'This resulted in additional security, remedial repairs, temporary building fabric, engineering service and heating protection works, including utility costs, to protect the council's investment

'There are also increased project and design consultant staff costs due to repatriation of the sub-contractors' plant and equipment, including a detailed reassessment of the building and engineering service works completed and still to be finished.

'Works have further been hindered by the lockdown restrictions and general lack of interest from local firms capable of completing the

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# Planning for the next generation

More than half of Scottish farmers have a succession plan in place - the highest rate in the UK.

According to new research by rural insurer NFU Mutual, the number of Scottish farms with succession plans in place increased from 33 per cent in 2020 to 52 per cent in 2021.

More than half - 51.5 per cent - now have a formal plan for how they're going to hand the farm on to the next generation, increasing from just a third – 33.1 per cent – in 2020, a survey of 1,652 farmers across the UK has shown.

These considerations can make it complicated to plan for the future of the farm, especially when it comes to handing over the reins to the next generation.

'There is currently plenty for farmers to contend with from Brexit to Covid, to subsidies and rising costs. Confronting these challenges often leaves little time for planning for the future. However, it is also true events such as the Covid pandemic can shine a much-needed spotlight on the need to plan for the future. 
