Medical services hit by staff crisis

GP appointments and other medical services are being cancelled as a result of a staff crisis at the Arran Medical Group.

NHS Ayrshire and Arran confirmed that 'urgent measures' have been put in place to ensure ongoing patient care.

However, patients have been warned that the practice may need to cancel appointments at short notice or arrange a telephone consultation rather than a face-to-face appointment.

And it has warned that the situation may last for a number of weeks.

The staffing crisis is the result of illness and a number of members of staff having to self-isolate following contact with a positive case of Covid. The interruption to health

services comes as the island braces itself for the 'likely **Continued on page two.**

Hospitality fears for Christmas as industry hit by new rules

Hospitality venues were left reeling again on Arran after the latest curbs announced by the Scottish Government, writes Hugh Boag.

Many hotels and restaurants have already had Christmas cancellations while work continues to hastily reinstall improved distancing measures required to save what they can of the festive season.

The new rules, due to come into effect tomorrow (Saturday), see the return of measures to cut down crowding in shops and at bars, and physical distancing and the use of protective screens inside hospitality venues.

Businesses are also legally required to take steps to reduce the spread of Covid with cafés and other outlets still deciding what to do.

Auchrannie ready to weather storm

Arran's biggest resort complex, Auchrannie, has already had some Christmas cancellations and is expecting demand to be down for its restaurants over the festive season.

However, it believes, with its business model, it is ready to weather the latest storm.

Co-founder and managing director Linda Johnston told the Banner: 'Auchrannie's residential market is mainly leisure breaks, predominantly couples, small groups and families. We have seen little change in levels of residential bookings over Christmas and New Year.

'There have been some cancellations but these are mainly being replaced by new bookings.

'The food and beverage side of the business is again focused on these markets. We have not restarted functions, we don't do party nights and we have no major gatherings planned. Therefore, we have lost relatively little on this front to date as this is normally a very quiet time for us.

tsunami' of Covid cases as a result of the fast-spreading Omicron variant.

The number of positive cases on the island has jumped to 12. latest official figures show.

Arran Medical Group posted on social media this week a note which read: 'Our team is currently being impacted by illness and self-isolation, this may mean that we need to cancel appointments at short notice, or arrange a telephone consultation rather than a face-to-face appointment.

'We envisage this situation may last for a number of weeks and ask that you bear with us during this time.

'Please be assured that if you have an urgent matter you will be able to speak to a GP and will be seen if appropriate.'

Craig McArthur, NHS East Ayrshire health and social care director, said: 'A number of staff within Arran Medical Group are currently self-isolating following contact with a positive case of coronavirus. The practice is following

public health guidance and urgent measures are being put in

place for ongoing patient care. 'Patients can continue to telephone the practice on 01770 600516 where they will be triaged and offered remote consultations where appropriate.

'If a patient is assessed as requiring an urgent in-person consultation, this will be arranged at the practice.

'We thank Arran Medical Group patients for their continued patience during this current situation.

'For anyone with non-urgent health care needs, more information on self-care is available at NHS Inform at www.nhsinform.scot/campaigns/rightcare-right-place or, your local pharmacy, dental practice or optician may be the most appropriate route to treatment and care.'

Meanwhile, Arran's vaccination clinic held on Sunday went smoothly with patients reporting a quick and efficient service.

The mass clinic was for all people aged 18 to 49 who were due their booster shot and for 12- to 17-year-olds who were due their second vaccination. In addition to the booster

appointments, AMG also invited anyone who had not booked to drop in on Sunday afternoon to receive a booster and this offer was repeated on Wednesday.

NHS Avrshire and Arran says visiting in all of its hospitals has, once again, been suspended.

Jennifer Wilson, interim nurse director, said: 'Rising community prevalence of the new Covid variant, Omicron, and the current demand for hospital services means we must once again restrict visiting to all our hospitals.

'In order to limit the spread and maintain the safety of all our patients and staff, we have had to make the difficult decision to suspend visiting to essential visits only.

'But please be assured that all decisions about visiting are made with the safety of the patient and the visitor in mind,' she added.

Exceptional reasons for visits will still be considered on a case-by-case basis and, by contacting wards, staff can facilitate virtual visiting using technology such as video calling

Refuse stuck on island by early ferry cancellations



Refuse is piling up on Arran due to the repeated cancellation of 7am ferry from Ardrossan to Brodick.

As a result the household waste recycling centre (HWRC) in Brodick has had to close as it cannot accommodate any further refuse and recycling.

As reported in last week's Banner, worrying figures show that 29 per cent of the early ferry sailings - which allow for goods, workers and contractors to arrive on Arran by the start of the business day - have been cancelled in the last 15 months.

Compounding the situation caused by adverse weather and technical difficulties, ferry operator CalMac has been berthing the ferry in Brodick overnight during inclement weather to avoid hull damage as the fenders at Ardrossan harbour - owned by Peel Ports - are damaged and vessels are unable to overnight there in high winds or sea swell conditions.

This has resulted in the first

sailing from Ardrossan being at 9.45am, only arriving on the island at 10.40am, which happened again this week.

North Ayrshire Council vehicles, which usually collect refuse from Arran on the 7am ferry, have been unable to secure bookings to Arran, leaving council officials with no option but to close the HWRC.

A council spokeswoman said: 'Arran's waste and recycling is collected from the island by transport which has priority on the 7am sailing from Ardrossan.



'Due to recent disruptions to the 7am sailings, this transport has been unable to reach the island to uplift the material. 'We are currently in dis-

cussion with CalMac and are hopeful that this issue will be resolved imminently and the

recycling centre can reopen. 'We apologies for any inconvenience caused and ask for your patience and understanding as the matter is outwith our control.'

The Arran Ferry Committee described the removal of refuse as an essential service and upon making inquiries were informed that NAC representatives were liaising Arran residents found cones blocking the entrance at the council's recycling centre in Brodick this week. 01_BS1HWRC01

Petrol supplies threatened by north end ferry disruptions

Arran faces a real threat of running out of petrol supplies this weekend owing to the cancellation of the Lochranza to Tarbert ferry service, writes Colin Smeeton.

Petrol and gas is transported to Arran via the north end of the island as legislation requires it to be transported on a vessel with an open deck. Diesel, however, is not bound by the same restrictions and it can be brought in via the

Ardrossan to Brodick route. With the cancellation of the Lochranza ferry, which is expected to continue until Monday December 20, there are fears that petrol supplies on Arran may run dry. The Lochranza ferry service was cancelled on Monday as the MV Loch Tarbert had to be diverted to serve on the Largs to Cumbrae route.

The ship normally serving that route, MV Loch Shira, was removed from service as a result of a suspected leak within its propulsion system.

A garage owner from Brodick told the Arran Banner that island petrol supplies are usually replenished once a week when a 40-tonne lorry arrives from Grangemouth refinery via the Lochranza route.

With the cancellation of the Lochranza ferry, he had concerns that petrol and gas may run out before a tanker is able to make it over to the island again.

By his estimates, and judging by usage which may fluctuate, he estimated that petrol supplies could be depleted by tomorrow (Saturday).

Late on Tuesday afternoon, a CalMac spokeswoman said: 'We're aware of the petrol/gas bottle issue on the island and are currently investigating a contingency solution to ensure that we can get the necessary supplies delivered to the island.'

At the time of going to print on Thursday, a cargo-only sailing had been arranged for 'essential lifeline supplies'.


Society stages 'safe' annual show dinner

Changes to bin collection over the festive period

Arran residents are being reminded to check their bin collection arrangements for over the festive period.

That's because the Christmas and New Year public holidays will bring changes to some waste and recycling collection services across the island.

Commercial bin collections due on Monday December 27 will be collected on Tuesday December 28.

Similarly, collections due on Monday January 3 will be collected on Tuesday January 4. Additionally, the household

waste recycling centre in

Brodick, currently closed, will also be shut from 3pm on Friday December 24 to Tuesday 28 December 28 and from 3pm on Friday December 31 to Tuesday January 4, 2022. Special uplifts will stop on Friday December 17 and can be requested again week commencing Monday January 10, 2022.

The council will collect any surplus cardboard that is flattened and placed next to the blue bin on its collection day.

The council is advising residents and businesses to have their bins out for collection by 7am on their collection day, as the timing of collections may vary, particularly if adverse weather affects the area over winter.

David Hammond, head of commercial services, said: 'Our waste team has worked incredibly hard all year to maintain normal household bin collections for our residents, despite the challenges faced due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

'To allow our crews to get through the collections as quickly as possible and back to their loved ones during the festive season, we ask that you are well organised when it comes to your waste by ensuring you put the right stuff in the right bin and have it out by 7am on your collection day.

'We would like to thank everyone for their recycling efforts during 2021.'

Holiday let licensing will hit Arran providers hard

A councillor has warned that Scottish Government proposals to introduce licensing for short-term lets and bed and breakfast businesses will have a devastating effect on Arran.

And he argues the measures will have no effect on improving the chronic shortage of affordable housing on the island - one of the measures they are intended to address.

Conservative councillor for Arran Timothy Billings raised his concerns at last week's full North Ayrshire Council meeting but was out-voted on the Scottish Government proposals which the council has now backed.

Councillor Billings proposed that a registration system would achieve the same results but at less cost to the businesses and would be less onerous for North Ayrshire Council to administer, however, SNP, Labour and independent councillors supported the government's licensing proposals.

Councillor Billings said 'This is hugely disappointing as these licensing proposals are totally unnecessary and will cost these small businesses a huge amount of time and money.

'As our tourism industry starts to recover from the Covid shock, the last thing it needs is to be hammered with burdensome and costly red tape

'The supporters of the government's licensing proposals seem to be under the delusion

that it will in some way help with affordable housing shortages.

'This is totally not the case as licensing deals with safety and not the control of business numbers.

'I know that Arran has an affordable housing crisis, but at no point will licensing legislation tackle any housing issues.

'Licensing is only concerned with safety and possible nuisance - both of which can effectively be addressed using a registration system similar to that used for long-term let landlords.

'I am hugely worried about these licensing proposals and the harm it will cause to the tourism industry, especially on Arran which I represent. 'Operators I speak to all are

considering stopping offering holiday lets which will not only harm their livelihoods but will also adversely affect other businesses that rely on tourism, such as restaurants, bars and local shops.

'The government is using a hammer to crack a nut, and has no regard to the damage it will cause to so many small business owners and Scotland's vital tourism industry.

Fiona Campbell, chief executive of the Association of Scotland's Self-Caterers, said: 'These licensing regulations could not have come at a worse time for Scotland's self-caterers, most of whom are still reeling from the devastating

businesses and livelihoods.

the Scottish Government seems intent on kicking self-caterers while we're down by imposing these damaging and potentially ruinous regulations on a sector that contributes £867 million to the Scottish economy each year, as well as supporting 24,000 FTE jobs.

'Instead of an onerous limandatory

The Scottish Government needs to change its course and show that it is on the side of thousands of small businesses across the country by giving them the room and flexibility they need to get back on their feet.

This year the charity has heard of many kittens that were taken from their mothers at too young an age and sold online for the sake of a quick profit. Kittens should be at least eight weeks old so that they are fully weaned and developing normally from a health and behavioural

Unsuspecting buyers did not realise that they bought a potentially sick kitten until after purchase which meant they were sometimes left with high veterinary bills, or in some cases, a kitten which tragically died.

MSP Clark demands Transport Minister 'sets the record straight'

Clark Katv MSP called has on Scottish the Government to fully recognise the Arran Action Ferrv Group as a stakeholder on all matters affecting the Arran ferry route, writes Hugh Boag.

The plea came after the group was snubbed from last week's Ardrossan Harbour Task Force meeting despite the First Minister Nicola Sturgeon identifying the 'Arran Ferry Group' as a stakeholder in FMQs earlier this month. A statement which was later claimed to be a mistake.

Ms Clark, who represents Scottish Labour for West Scotland, has asked the Minister for Transport Graeme Dey, pictured, in a letter to set the record straight, as well as calling for island representatives to be invited on to the boards of CalMac and CMAL. Ms Clark

said:'Islanders should be better represented in decision-making processes on the routes

that affect them. The Arran Ferry Action Group is supported by over 1,300 Arran residents with knowledge and expertise that could be effectively utilised by the Scottish Government, so it is baffling that they continue to be left out in the cold

'The views of islanders are going to be particularly vital in the ongoing discussions about how we put a ferry plan in place to assess the longterm failure to invest in a new fleet.

'Islanders and the workforce need to be part of the consultation process every step of the way to address the crisis we currently face.' A second West Scotland MSP, Jamie Greene, has also criticised the Transport Minister for failing to engage with the Action Group, saying his snub is the latest in a long list of 'insults' to island residents.

Mr Greene said: 'The refusal of the Transport Minister to meet with this key Arran ferry stakeholder, let alone include them in the taskforce, is the latest in a long line of snubs and insults from this SNP government.

'Barely a week goes by without another drama in this beleaguered ferry saga – the least he could do is listen to those affected by his government's decisions and work with local groups towards a positive outcome.'

Transport Scotland told the Banner last week that there was a error in the Scottish Parliament's draft official report and that the Arran Ferry Committee remains the recognised body on the island for engagement on ferry issues.


The Burns Big Night In made its debut in January 2021 when Covid


The three performances of the mini-panto, Albert Laddin, hit all the right notes with audiences who packed the Whiting Bay Hall last weekend.


