#### Flytippers cost Dunollie charity thousands

Woodland Trust Scotland is considering using CCTV to catch flytippers dumping waste in Dunollie Woods.

Tipping rubbish is illegal -culprits caught could face a fixed penalty notice of £200 or fines up to £40,000 with up to five years in prison for non-payment if the case goes to court.

Work to remove flytipped material and control invasive plants introduced through dumped garden waste has cost the charity over £3,500 this year at Dunollie alone.

The area at the top of Bealach an Righ near the Corran Halls and at Cruachan Crescent has become a hotspot for dumping.

Junk previously hauled out of the woods by clean-up volunteers have included a four cylinder engine, mattresses, a car chassis, office chairs and bikes.

Laura Corbe, who volunteers with work parties and community groups restoring the woodland to a greener space, said: 'It's really important that people stop trashing our woods. Dunollie Wood is a beautiful, accessible, wild green space - we don't have many spaces like that in Oban so we need to look after this one.'

The actress, who is the charity's patron, recorded a special festive message to boost sales of the hospice's 2022 calendar.


Oban Hospice's David Evans reached out to the actress's PA in an email and said he 'hit the jackpot' when he got a reply.

#### Reduce social contacts before Christmas, urges First Minister


Christmas can go ahead but people should cut back on contact with others as far as possible, says First Minister Nicola Sturgeon.

People have been asked to reduce their socialising to a maximum of three households at a time in the run-up to the Christmas because of worries over the rapid spread of the Omicron variant of Covid. Although that advice will not be enforced by law, and does not apply on Christmas Day, people should be sensible and keep gatherings small and safe. Places of worship will be staying open, Ms Sturgeon said during a Covid briefing on Tuesday.

There will be a new legal requirement on businesses and to take measures to minimise the risk of Omicron infection such as avoiding overcrowding and bottlenecks. New guidance will also make it clear that it will be a legal duty that employers will need to enable staff who were working from home at the start of the pandemic to do so again.

# Minister visits Oban home energy project

Energy minister Michael Matheson has been on a fact-finding mission in Oban.

The minister was visiting Argyll Community Housing Association (ACHA) which is spending just over £5.7 million on insulating external walls to make its flats more thermal-efficient.

Almost 600 households across Oban and Lorn will benefit once the project is complete, Mr Matheson was told.

ACHA secured more than £2.7m in Home Energy Efficiency Programmes for Scotland funding through Argyll & Bute Council and the Scottish Government, with ACHA contributing over £3m from its own resources.

Chief Executive of ACHA Alastair MacGregor said the project has delivered external wall insulation at zero cost to all owners. He added: 'This is one of the best projects ACHA has ever been involved in. Not only does it improve thermal efficiency but it reduces fuel costs and improves the

aesthetic appearance of the buildings. Could I thank everyone from ACHA, Argyll and Bute Council, the Scottish Government and our contractor, OVO Energy Solutions, for their hard work in delivering this project. It was good to be able to show the cabinet minister the benefits of all of us working together.'

Argyll and Bute Council leader Robin Currie said: 'These grants are a great opportunity for people to make their homes warmer and in turn save money on energy costs

'This project will provide long-lasting benefits, help-

ing to reduce fuel poverty and carbon emission'

Mr Matheson said: 'On the day we committed to a further £64m for area-based scheme projects, I was delighted to visit Oban and see for myself how this funding has helped local residents reduce bills and make their homes warmer.'

Head of OVO Energy Solutions Neil Donald said: 'Many households have been able to cut their bills by more than 50 per cent. We look forward to continuing our work with ACHA to create warmer, healthier homes in more local areas and progress the journey to zero carbon living.'

# Flytippers cost Dunollie Woods charity thousands of pounds

'In times like this, people need to be able to enjoy these spaces for their mental and physical wellbeing - we don't want flytippers spoiling it for them.'

Woodland Trust Scotland spokesman George Anderson said: 'We are sick of our woods being used as dumps by selfish people.

'Householders should be aware that this is a criminal offence. And if a householder hires a tradesman who dumps rubbish illegally, then both parties are legally accountable.

'If you pay someone to do a bit of work, make sure they will use legal routes to dispose of any waste. A cheap contractor can suddenly become expensive if they earn you a fine. 'Be assured our staff, volunteers and many of the people who enjoy the woods are on the lookout, and we may deploy cameras to gather evidence.

'We do not intend to just keep clearing up this mess. We will be pursuing consequences for the culprits.'

In June, The Oban Times reported complaints from people living near Cruachan Crescent who claimed abandoned waste was encouraging flytippers.

Residents said the waste was clogging up the car park right next to the woods and was being added to by others wanting to get rid of scrap bits.

Councillor Elaine Robertson said: 'The Woodland Trust and their local volunteers have to be complimented on the huge improvements they have made to Dunollie Woods. They have greatly enhanced this valuable amenity ground for the good of the woodland and the benefit of the whole community.

'I am saddened to hear that they have encountered an issue with flytipping and if the trust feels CCTV will assist in deterring unauthorised refuse being deposited in the Dunollie Woods, then that is a way forward.'



# Going, going, gone... rare Bowmore whisky reaches record sum

Sotheby's has sold an exceptionally rare Islay whisky for £400,000, writes Sandy Neil.

The one-off 51-year-old single malt from Bowmore, the island's oldest distillery, went under the hammer at the first Distillers One of One auction in Edinburgh.

The auction of never-to-be-repeated lots took place at Barnbougle Castle as a ticketed event.

Bowmore Onyx, in a hand-blown black glass vessel inspired by Islay's landscape, contains 1.4 litres of ultra-rare whisky, matured in an American oak refill barrel, which was filled on February 17 1970. This single malt was the first 51-year-old released by the distillery.

The glass bottle was designed by the same expert team at Glasstorm that previously crafted the exclusive Bowmore 1957, which sold at Sotheby's for £363,000.

Before the auction, the reserve estimated for Bowmore Onyx was between £100,000 to £189,000.

The eventual price tag showed just how highly sought after it was, with bidders keen to add it to their collection.

#### No change to bin collections over Christmas

If you want to check if the paper is foil, scrunch the paper up. If it springs back, then please put it in the general waste bin.

'Our recycling centres will be closed on December 25 and December 26 and also on January 1 and January 2 but you can find a full list of centres on our website for household rubbish and recycling at argyll-bute.gov.uk'

Residents who want to recycle their Christmas trees can also take them to household waste and recycling centres at the end of the season.

You can also download 2022 bin collection calendars from the council website.

'We are very grateful that few

people now request printed calendars - this allows us to direct scarce resources to vital services and saves paper. If you are unable to access the internet, you can check your next bin uplift day by calling 01546 605514 and pressing option two for a 24/7 response. If necessary, you can request one printed calendar for your household by calling 01546 605514 and choosing option three to ask for a printed copy. Please remember, staff are mostly working from home so it may take two to three weeks before someone is in the office to print out a calendar to send it to you,' added a council spokesperson.

# Argyll's rubbish could be sent elsewhere to be processed

Rubbish could be sent outside Argyll and Bute for disposal when the Scottish Government landfill ban is imposed, a council official has admitted.

But it was added that the possibility of doing so was 'hardly at the top' of the priority list for the authority as it bids to reach net zero carbon emissions.

Peter Leckie, project manager for the council's waste strategy review, addressed the concerns of councillors at a virtual meeting of its policy and resources committee on Thursday December 9.

The council currently sends waste from Helensburgh and Lomond to landfill in Alexandria, in West Dunbartonshire. The landfill ban is due to come in during 2025, having been pushed back from 2021.

Mid Argyll Independent Councillor Douglas Philand asked Mr Leckie about the transportation of waste when the ban starts.

Mr Leckie replied: 'With the landfill ban coming in 2025, authorities have to move to a system of energy from waste.

'We don't have the facilities in Argyll and Bute and lack the tonnage required to operate an energy-from-waste system economically. So the only option is for us to send it to energy from waste plants in the central belt, which will have a huge impact.'

He added: 'We are in discussions with the Scottish Government and looking for ways forward. We are asking for support with this transition.'

Councillor Philand then said: 'I am thinking of lorries going into the central belt, and the carbon emissions for them. How are you going to offset that?'

Mr Leckie replied: 'There are



actions we can take, such as shredding materials, so we are looking to mitigate as many trips as possible – not only for CO2 purposes, but for overall costs.

Kintyre and the Islands Independent Councillor Alastair Redman also voiced concerns at transporting waste out of the area and the country.

Mr Leckie said: 'We are having to work with the facilities that we have in place. We have an area where we are in charge of our own waste and have facilities in the area.

'In Helensburgh and Lomond

we send waste to landfill in other areas. It is currently done in Alexandria.

'When the landfill ban is enforced in 2025, we don't have any energy-from-waste facilities in Argyll and Bute, or in immediate proximity except in the central belt.

'So we will have to send waste to those facilities, because we lack the sufficient tonnage to maintain such a facility within Argyll and Bute. That is the position as it currently stands.'

The Scottish Government is about to embark on a review of energy from waste in Scotland.

Mr Leckie told the meeting: 'The Scottish Government is on record as saying that it does not want waste going outside of our borders, or to energy-from-waste abroad.

'But if there is insufficient national capacity we will have to look at options outside the immediate area. I would not say that is top of the list of things we are considering.'

Council services will also be encouraged to reduce their use of single-use plastic (SUP) products as confirmed by the same Policy and Resources Committee last week.

This policy is being put in place ahead of upcoming Scottish Government legislation which will ban the supply and manufacture of certain types of plastic products in June 2022.

Leader Councillor Robin Currie said: 'Changing our policy on SUP is yet another step we take at preventing waste. We are now asking services to think long and hard about what they are buying and what other options are out there to replace SUP.

'Preventing waste is better for the planet and saves public money. We can, and must, do it at home and in businesses.'

# Continued lack of islanders on CalMac board sparks anger

Hebridean councillors have slammed the Scottish Government for not appointing an island resident to CalMac's board of eight directors.

Comhairle nan Eilean Siar, the Western Isles Council, has expressed disappointment that the Scottish Government has appointed the David MacBrayne Group Board, but 'ignored pleas from councils and stakeholders across the ferry network to address the fundamental gap in user experience of those appointed to that board'.

'Not one single resident of an island served by David MacBrayne Group or its subsidiary CalMac Ferries Limited sits on the company board,' the council said, 'and this opportunity to right this wrong has been passed up by ministers.

'Instead they have appointed a new chairman and three new non-executive directors with no residential tie to the communities the company serves. 'At a meeting of the Hebrides Ferry Stakeholder Group (Thursday December 2) community stakeholders supported the call for lived experience of these ferry services be a pre-requisite of any and all future appointments to the Board of David MacBrayne Group.'

The chairman of the council's

transportation and infrastructure committee, councillor Uisdean Robertson, said: 'The recent failure to address the absence of residents of the islands served by CalMac in the appointment of board members to David MacBrayne Group has caused real anger in our communities.

'It is little wonder company management are so detached from the reality of their decisions when they are based at a headquarters in Inverclyde, and those appointed to hold the company to account have limited experience of how the company's actions affect people from Lewis to Arran.

'Having raised this issue with the transport minister, I had hoped our concern was understood and these vacancies would be filled by islanders. The comhairle will continue to press the case for real and meaningful change in the voice communities have in shaping our lifeline ferry services.'

Chairman of the Independent Ferries Community Board Angus Campbell attended the meeting and shared the frustration, saying: 'The Ferries Community Board firmly believes experience of living on islands and first-hand knowledge of how lifeline ferry services impact on island communities are an essential part of the skill mix required to undertake these roles. An opportunity has been lost to add knowledge and improve decision-making for both the company and the communities they serve.'

A Scottish Government spokesperson said: 'Scottish ministers are committed to ensuring that island residents and communities' views are represented appropriately and have asked the new chair, as a priority, to consider how this might be achieved. Board members were appointed for their experience and abilities.'

The Scottish Government added it had advertised the recent chair and three non-executive director positions widely, including on the vessels travelling to island communities, and it was pleased to receive a high number of applications.

'Residents of island communities are free to apply to become members of the board if they wish,' it said.

# Nine steps to a safer home this Christmas

A campaign encouraging householders to minimise the risk of a fire this Christmas and throughout the year has been launched by the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service.

Latest figures show firefighters attended more than 450 accidental house fires in around one month last winter.

During the same period, accidental house fires claimed the lives of seven people, with 58 casualties. The incidents happened between December 7, 2020 and January 11, 2021.

Deputy Assistant Chief Officer Ali Perry is head of prevention and protection at SFRS. He said: 'Fire is a risk for everyone, but some people are more at risk than others. If you know someone who is over 50 and smokes, and who has either mobility issues or uses medical oxygen or lives alone, please arrange a Home Fire Safety Visit on their behalf.

'Reaching out to those who are vulnerable can help save lives in our communities.'

A free online self-assessment on the Scottish Fire

and Rescue Service's website is available to everyone in Scotland to find out how safe their property is.

On completion, participants can download a unique report about their home, which gives advice on how to rectify risks and problems.

There are nine steps to a safer home – as participants are asked to consider their use of smoke detectors, cooking in the kitchen, smoking and candles, electrics and heating, emollient creams, medical oxygen, air pressure mattress, night-time routine and fire action plan.

DACO Perry said: 'By walking through the nine steps you can massively reduce the risk of a fire in your house. Taking a few minutes to do the self-assessment and identify the hazards in your own home can help keep you and those around you safe.'

# Possible extra day's holiday for schools

#### Queen's platinum jubilee plan approval pending

Schools in Argyll and Bute could enjoy an extra day off next year if plans for a holiday to mark Queen Elizabeth II's platinum jubilee are approved.

Councillors are being recommended to agree an extra holiday for the area on Friday June 3 to celebrate 70 years since Her Majesty's reign began.

The plans would mean pupils would be off for consecutive Fridays, as Friday May 27 is earmarked as a teacher in-service day. The planned holiday for staff and pupils on Monday May 30 would move to Thursday June 2.

The Scottish Qualifications Authority has no exams planned for the proposed holiday date, with the 2022 diet due to finish on Wednesday June 1. A report has also revealed that the additional cost to the council of paying employees to work on a public holiday has been estimated at £46,000. The authority's policy and resources committee will debate the possibility of the extra holiday today (Thursday December 9).

# 'Any change will require communication...to avoid confusion'

Executive director Kirsty Flanagan said: 'SMT (senior management team) have given consideration to a range of options and have recommended granting an additional public holiday on June 3, 2022 as the best way to accommodate time to celebrate Her Majesty the

Queen's 70 years on the throne. 'Granting another public holiday will align with other organisations who will likely be on holiday. It will also

organisations who will likely be on holiday. It will also allow staff and their families to participate in the planned three or four-day weekend of commemorative events.

'Schools have a scheduled in-service day for teaching staff on Friday May 27 and a holiday for both staff and pupils on Monday May 30.

'Should the authority grant an additional public holiday they would plan to retain the in-service day for teaching staff on Friday May 27 and move the May 30 holiday to Thursday June 2 and award an additional holiday for teachers and pupils on Friday June 3.

'Any change will require

communication to customers, staff, pupils and their families to avoid confusion over service delivery, though the impact of the national change would likely lead to confusion if it was not adopted.'

Ms Flanagan added: 'The additional cost of paying employees to carry out essential work on a public holiday has been estimated at £46,000. This is based on the average overtime for a public holiday claimed in the month of May, where we already have one public holiday, in the last three years.'

The UK Government recently announced plans for the four-day weekend to mark the Queen's 70 years on the throne – the first time a British monarch has reached such a milestone.

# New Lismore ferry to arrive later this month

The new Lismore ferry is expected to arrive at Port Appin this month and be ready to serve the community once the Passenger Safety Certificate is issued by the Maritime and Coastguard Agency.

After its sea trials, the vessel was due to leave Pembroke on Monday December 13 to begin its 302 nautical mile journey to its destination. However, due to poor weather conditions, the departure was rescheduled and will wait for a fair weather window. Until then, the current ferry will remain in operation.

Argyll and Bute Council's Environment, Development and Infrastructure Committee welcomed the news last week and endorsed the ferry's name, the Lady of Lismore.

Residents and primary school pupils chose the ferry's name through a poll organised by Lismore Community Council. A community event will be held to celebrate the arrival of the new ferry in early January. Argyll and Bute Councillor

Rory Colville, Policy Lead

for Roads and Infrastructure Services, said: 'We wish the Lady of Lismore a safe passage to Port Appin and we await her arrival with great excitement.

'The old ferry sailed the route for more than three decades and we look forward to the new ferry future-proofing this lifeline service for decades to come.'

The new all-steel vessel, designed by Keel Marine and built by Mainstay Marine Solutions, will have a crew of two and can accommodate 23 passengers all year round with a cruising speed of eight knots.

The new ferry is designed and built to current exacting specifications defined by Maritime and Coastguard Agency. These specifications take account of passenger safety and accessibility requirements. Funding was made available by Transport Scotland.



# Watchdog to tighten rules on fish farms to protect wild salmon

Protecting Scotland's wild Atlantic salmon is a 'national priority', says Scotland's environmental watchdog SEPA, launching a consultation on wild salmon protection zones and a sea lice exposure threshold.

'Scotland is renowned world-wide for the quality of its rivers, lochs and seas,' explained Terry A'Hearn, chief executive of the Scottish Environment Protection Agency (SEPA). 'Despite this, in nearly 60 per cent of salmon rivers across Scotland, including on the West Coast and Western Isles, salmon populations are in poor conservation status.

'Whilst the causes of the poor conservation status of wild salmon stocks are complex and believed to be due to a range of different factors rather than a single cause, we know that sea lice from marine



finfish farms can be a significant hazard. The protection of Scotland's wild Atlantic salmon is a national priority which is why, following the Scottish Government confirming SEPA as the lead body responsible for managing the risk to wild salmonids from sea lice from marine finfish farms, we're today launching a consultation on ambitious

proposals for proposed wild salmon protection zones and a sea lice exposure threshold that applies in these zones.

'Over the coming months we look forward to meeting and hearing views from a broad range of stakeholders with an interest in wild salmon, from community and environmental groups to the aquaculture sector itself before

SEPA has been confirmed as the lead body responsible for managing the risk to wild salmonids from sea lice from marine finfish farms.

taking a final view in 2022.' SEPA said the Scottish Government has identified 12 high-level pressures on the status of salmon stocks: 'These include different pressures on river habitats, such as loss of trees/shade, man-made barriers to fish migration and impacts on river levels resulting from climate change; exploitation (recreational fishing & commercial sea fisheries); predation; sea lice and disease; escapes; and invasive non-native species (including signal crayfish in Scotland).

Sea lice from marine finfish farms remains a potentially significant pressure with scientific evidence being clear that sea lice from open-net pen finfish farms in Scotland can pose a significant risk to wild salmon populations.'

The consultation, which is open until Monday March 14, 2022, focuses on a proposed framework to protect wild salmon populations against harmful increases in sea lice by assessing the risk to wild salmon when determining applications for proposed farms, and increases in the number of fish farmed at existing farms.

Permits for all existing farms that can contribute to infective-stage sea lice in wild salmon protection zones would be changed to include conditions that control the number of juvenile sea lice emanating from the farms, and require sufficient information to calculate the number of juvenile lice hatching on the farms.

# Green light for ferry termina

Plans for a new terminal building at Port Ellen Ferry Terminal, with more parking and marshalling space, have been announced by CalMac's owner, Caledonian Maritime Assets Limited (CMAL).

Transport Scotland recently approved the findings of a study which identified space constraints at the busy terminal, and CMAL developed a range of options to address the issues.

The Port Ellen Terminal Development project has now been established to increase the vehicle marshalling area, increase staff and visitor parking, improve port operations for commercial use, improve passenger access to vessels, and explore the location and size of an area for a proposed new terminal building.

CMAL has appointed engineering consultancy Mott MacDonald to work alongside its in-house civil engineers to develop costs, assess a range of solutions, and recommend a preferred option.

been appointed to represent the views of the community, including ferry users, marina users, the fishing community and commercial users. The first reference group meeting was held on Wednesday December 1. Engagement with the wider community, through virtual or in-person events and meetings (depending on Covid guidance), is scheduled for spring.

Paul Colenso, senior civil engineer at CMAL, said: 'We are still in the early, but critical, planning stages of this project. We have identified the need for investment in the infrastructure at Port Ellen. Our proposals will also enhance the ferry passenger and harbour user experience with improved facilities and access.

'Survey work will begin within the next couple of months. This won't impact ferry services. We're planning comprehensive consultation so all interested parties can engage with the project, and we will be able to share more details on this early next year.'

# **Tribute: Barry Dowson-Park**

Barry Dowson-Park, an engineer by profession, and his wife Shirley, a public relations specialist, sold their "roses round the door" cottage in Sussex in spring 1999 and bought Foxholes Country Hotel at Lerags by Oban.

With no formal hotel training, they knew what they would want as an hotel guest and so set up an operation that met those desires.

I first stayed with them within a year of their arrival and was immediately struck by the warmth of the welcome, the superb food, accommodation and the friendliness extended to me. Shirley ran front of house arrangements, while Barry, as chef, produced a range of wonderfully cooked dinners with a relaxed professionalism.

Over the next 20 years I stayed at Foxholes every year, sometimes two or three times, as I explored and photographed the Hebrides.

I met other guests who also stayed several times a year, as Barry would tell me when I arrived. And as one of their first guests, Barry told me later that he considered me 'a long-time regular'.

During these stays I built up a friendship with them both, which I cherish to this day. To arrive at Foxholes, after a 500-mile 'all in the same day' drive from southern England, and be greeted with such warmth and friendliness was like arriving at 'my secret little bit of heaven in

he hills'.

Sadly, Shirley died in 2010, but Barry carried on undaunted, tailoring the operation to just his long-time regulars and any other guests recommended to him.

Interestingly, he was descended from Mungo Park, the 18th-century Scottish surgeon who charted the River Niger.

Barry was a quiet and very polite gentleman, who would go the extra mile if one of his guests or staff asked, including running a staff member to Glasgow airport when she needed to fly home suddenly to New Zealand for a family bereavement. In the last 11 years, my visits to Foxholes were the highlight of my annual trips to the Hebrides. More latterly joined by my wife, Barry excelled in making her stay as comfortable as possible and a rapport was soon created. Our friendship seemed to gain strength and I took a personal interest in all he wanted to do with Foxholes Hotel.


He loved fast cars and owned a Jaguar XKRS, which he used often to run into Oban when purchasing supplies for the hotel.

Unfortunately cancer got a hold of him a few years back but he persevered with a very sanguine attitude to his illness.

Barry died peacefully in his sleep on Monday November 29, aged 76.

For me it is the end of an era, a much enjoyable era in so many ways. He was the hallmark of a good friend as well as a superb hotelier, with a dignity of eye and bearing that one no longer expects to meet, save once or twice in a lifetime.

# Islands ideal for electric planes, says consultation on future of air services

Electric planes, air taxis, changing the Air Discount Scheme and a single body operating all council-run airports - just a few ideas in a new Holyrood consultation on the future of aviation in the Highlands and Islands.

The Scottish Government is considering how Scotland can continue to enjoy the economic and social benefits of air travel while meeting its ambitious net-zero targets.

Its goals include 'decarbonising scheduled passenger flights within Scotland by 2040' and getting 'good value' air services in the Highlands and Islands for passengers and the taxpayer. Transport Scotland's online consultation seeks views on achieving those goals, by Friday January 21 2022.

One way, it proposes, is adopting electric aircraft for the Highlands and Islands. 'Norway is aiming for the first regular domestic scheduled flights to be operated with electrified aircraft by 2030,' the consultation says.

'The short distances and low passenger volumes on many scheduled flights within Scotland mean they are ideally suited to early adoption of zero and low emission aircraft.

'However, as most are operated on a commercial basis, the airlines rather than the Scottish Government decide what aircraft they will use on their routes.

'One option is for the Scottish Government to buy new zero emission aircraft as they become available on the market, then lease them to the airline(s) operating the routes.'

Another way, it poses, is consolidating airport operators, including Argyll and Bute Council, into a single body.

'Airport services for scheduled passenger air services in the Highlands and Islands are



currently provided by Highlands & Islands Airports Ltd (HIAL), Shetland Islands Council, Orkney Islands Council and Argyll and Bute Council

'None of the airports operated by these bodies can currently run on a commercial basis and all require subsidy to maintain operations. Having four different airport operators means it is more difficult to achieve economies of scale, for example, through bulk buying of equipment.'

The Scottish Government is also considering the effectiveness of, and improvements to, the Air Discount Scheme.

'Air services have high fixed costs but whether this results in high airfares depends on the number of passengers on the aircraft,' it explains.

'With more passengers each person pays less as the costs are split between them. However, with fewer passengers the cost per person is higher. 'In the Highlands and Islands even the busier routes have relatively low passenger numbers over which to spread costs.

'This leads to fares that are higher than what passengers would likely pay on longer, busier routes. The Scottish Government has sought to address the cost of flying in the region through the operation of the Air Discount Scheme.'

The consultation also seeks views on complementing scheduled flights with on-demand air taxis and open charter services.

Councillor Robin Currie, leader of Argyll and Bute Council, urged people to have their say: 'It's absolutely vital our rural and island communities continue to have access to properly funded, reliable and regular air services to connect them to essential support and services.'





#### **Promoting Oban worldwide**


I was pleased to see the report in the Oban Times about the plans to promote Oban as a must-visit destination from 2022 and beyond. The town certainly has much to offer but there's more to attracting visitors than showcasing restaurants, hotels and marine tourism. It's not a very good welcome to Oban. 'Keep Oban Beautiful' tries hard to stay positive, but it's certainly not easy!



Furthermore the report to the Harbour Board failed to include, as it should have, an estimate of how much it would cost the council to set up their Municipal Port. We are advised this will be a six-figure sum which could be better spent on other council services. This perverse decision of the Harbour Board must be overturned.

### Niteworks ready to release its cinematic new album A' Ghrian

this album we've sought to create a more expansive sound that's cinematic in its nature.

'We were partly inspired by our work writing the music for Edinburgh's Hogmanay Fare Well film that reflected on what 2020 had been like for many during the pandemic. The nature of the project required broad expansive sounds, and that led to us going further in that direction through the writing and recording of the album. Our upcoming orchestral concert for Celtic Connections further reinforced our desire to keep down that path. A lot of the material from this album will lend itself well to that show and with the backing of a full orchestra it's going to be really powerful - we still can't quite believe it's happening!'

The band will tour the album with live dates scheduled from this month until the end of 2022, including a sell-out return to Celtic Connections in January.

## **SHINTY ROUND-UP**

## Gareth Evans reviews Lochside Rovers' season

It was so near but yet so far for Lochside Rovers as their only two defeats, both coming late in the season, meant they were unable to repeat their two-cup haul from 2019.

Gareth Evans, who recently stepped up to the Oban Camanachd manager's role, took time to reflect on a season which opened with a battling draw at home to Bute as Ryan Craig's late leveller canceller out Lewis Buchanan's early opener.

'We had a young squad at the start of the season and I thought we would do well to finish mid-table,' Gareth said. 'I expected Bute and Ballachulish to be strong and it just so happened we faced both these teams in our first two games.

'Bute actually came to Oban with a young side and we had a good game with them at Ganavan when a draw was probably a fair result.'

Lochside then came from behind to win 2-1 at Ballachulish before the holders beat the Lochaber seconds 5-1 in the opening round of the HIS Sutherland Cup.

Gareth recalls: 'Our under-14 skipper Alexander MacDonald, a versatile player, got the equaliser against Balla' and Robbie Brown, who joined from Taynuilt, got the winner. The big down-side from that game was a back injury suffered by Chrissie MacMillan. It looked innocuous enough at the time but it turned out to be serious and he is still receiving treatment for it.

'The Lochaber win was good as we always look to do well in the Sutherland.'

A return to league duty and a 2-1 victory at the Inveraray colts on a wet midweek followed before a strong Lochside team then beat Taynuilt 5-1 in another midweek fixture.

Gareth said: 'We had David Cameron back from rugby and he got the first goal. David is a player who could push for a place in the Oban Camanachd team.' That match against Taynuilt took place on Wednesday 21 July and it was to be the last league fixture Lochside would play.

The HIS Sutherland Cup second round threw up a tough tie at home to the Fort William colts and Lochside had to work hard for their 4-3 victory.

'The Fort William tie and the Bullough Cup Final were probably the best two games of the season. The Fort game was end-to-end with two young teams going for it on a hot day at Mossfield. I was pleased we won but couldn't have complained if we had lost.'

Lochside's defence of the Bullough Cup opened with a 6-3 victory in Glasgow against the Mid Argyll reserves, aided by Ross Campbell's hat-trick. 'We played Ross at full forward and he did really well. In fact they all did well as GMA had no first team match that weekend so fielded a good physical side against us. Our fitness was good though and saw us over the like as it did a few times during the season.'

September opened with a 2-1 win over on-form Kinlochshiel seconds in the quarter-finals of the HIS Sutherland Cup. Lewis Buchanan and Alexander MacDonald got the goals with Gareth saying: 'There was some drama around the 'Shiel game and we led 2-0 through Lewis Buchanan and Alexander MacDonald before they pulled a goal back with 16 minutes remaining but we got there in the end.'

However the Lovat second team were to prove too strong in the Sutherland semis at Spean Bridge as the Balgate men won 5-0.

Gareth said: 'It still rankles with me that we had to play that tie on the same day as our first team were in the Glasgow Celtic Society Cup semi-finals.

'We were nine players short for one reason or another and that made it really difficult for us. We had to field so many of our younger players that it really was men against boys. We ended up with young players getting injured during the game and I would have liked to have played the semi-final with the team we had out against Fort William in the earlier round.'

The Bullough semis were more straightforward as lower league Oban Celtic colts were dispatched 10-0 so the season ended with the Bullough Cup Final against the Kyles Athletic reserves. The venue was decided by the toss of a coin which gave the Tighnabruaich men home advantage. In the end, it took penalties to separate the sides following a 3-3 draw with Kyles eventually taking the trophy.

Gareth added: 'I think I said at the time that I'd normally be unhappy about losing a game of shinty never mind a final but it was a brilliant game. It's not often Kyles get to play a final on their own pitch and there was a great crowd who created a wonderful atmosphere. Young Matthew Sloss was terrific for us that day and he is just one of several younger players coming through the system. Innes Jackson is another brilliant prospect. He is

so keen and such a good player. Callum MacMillan came in this year. He's only 14 but can be such a hard player in the tackle. Daniel Pearson also broke through and he will get more game time next season.

'Scott Robertson is another who has had a great season. Scott is still young but seems to have been around for years.'

As he prepares for the new season with Oban Camanachd, Gareth had a word for those who helped him with Lochside last season.

'Managing a shinty team is no one-man-band,' he said. 'Iain MacMillan, Duncan MacMillan and Andrew Pearson have been a huge help. I thank them for that and of course wish them well as they manage Lochside next season.'

The managerial changes trigger a new era for both Oban Camanachd and Lochside Rovers and the preparations start now.

## Oban Times Shinty Team of the Year

Oban Times shinty reporter Alasdair Bruce has selected his 2021 shinty team of the year.

With so many excellent players to choose from, only those who played most of the season were considered so the likes of Mark MacDonald, Blair Morrison, Thomas Borthwick and Conor Cormack, who would have pushed for a place in the side, weren't considered as injury forced them out during large chunks of the year.

Stuart MacDonald (Lovat)

It was another season of game-changing goalkeeping from the Lovat's Mr Consistent. Lovat's Camanachd Cup run would have ended against Skye in Portree had it not been for Stuart MacDonald's heroics and he also shone in the semi-final win over Kingussie. Stuart remains Scotland's number one.

Finlay MacRae was the rock at the centre of 'Shiel's defence in a season the club will never forget. He defied the odds to recover from a leg injury to play such a crucial role in the Camanachd Cup Final. Finlay is a class act and a fine reader

Camanachd Cup Final. Finlay is a class act and a fine reader of the game. The 36-year-old's performances were all the more remarkable given the changing nature of Kinlochshiel's defence this season as injury ruled out Conor Cormack, Mark MacDonald and David Falconer for long periods.

#### Daniel Cameron (Oban Camanachd)

Oban Camanachd boasted arguably shinty's best defence last season, only losing six goals over 11 games. They weren't always tested to the same extent as in the Premiership but the statistics are still impressive, keeping clean sheets in seven of their 11 matches and only losing one goal in three of the other four matches. Scottish international Daniel Cameron is a leader whose skilful defending has been a key component in the Oban side's back line. Daniel captains this select team.

#### Daniel Sloss (Oban Camanachd)

Daniel Sloss is one of shinty's most talented youngsters who can be a mainstay of the Oban Camanachd side for at least another 15 years. He is usually given a man-marking role on the opponents most dangerous forwards which speaks volumes of the trust placed in him.

The Covid pandemic probably robbed him of the opportunity to captain the Scotland U17s at a time when he was already an established Scotland U21 international.

Andrew King (Kyles Athletic)
Andrew King seems to get better with each passing season.
He can break up an attack and set up an attack with equal ease. Andrew covers a lot of

ground and has all the attributes of a modern-day defender. Craig Mainland (Lovat)

Wing centre is not Craig Mainland's usual position but his displays at buckshee back for Lovat this term merit a place in the team of the year. A tenacious tackler and a clean hitter of the ball who has a keen will to win.

Donald Nixon (Kinlochshiel) Donald Nixon is a powerhouse in the 'Shiel midfield, slotting perfectly into the full centre role after switching from wing centre. One of shinty's best shy takers who had forced his way into international recognition before Covid interrupted the game.

#### William MacKinnon (Skye Camanachd)

William's versatility has seen him feature in defence, midfield and attack for Alvance British Aluminium Balliemore Cup winners Skye this season. The 19-year-old came through the youth ranks at Inverness before playing for Skye at under-17 level to follow in his father's footsteps. He is an athlete who is good in the tackle.

## Ruaridh Anderson (Kingussie)

Kingussie play-maker Ruaridh Anderson offers a creative edge to the side, providing opportunities for his fellow forwards. The 21-year-old is an exciting

The 21-year-old is an exciting player to watch, he is super-fit and has a fine work ethic, often tracking back to help the midfield and even the defence at times.

#### James Falconer (Kingussie)

As shinty's top goalscorer in 2021, James has more than earned his place in the side. He has an electric turn of pace and is a clinical finisher when through on goal. James never gives his marker a minute's peace.

Keith MacRae (Kinlochshiel) It was a year to remember for Keith MacRae. After battling back from a serious knee injury, he captained Kinlochshiel to their first-ever Camanachd and MacTavish Cup successes. Keith has great close control and scores key goals as his hat-trick in the Scottish Final underlined. His skill and experience would be an asset to any side.

# Craig Morrison (Caberfeidh) Craig was shinty's top scorer in 2019 and he carried that prowess into the 2021 season, netting 18 times in 12 matches. He isn't always fielded in attack but when he is there, he is a handful for any defence. Substitutes

## Steven Macdonald (Newtonmore)

It has been a rare trophyless season for Newtonmore first team who are going through a period of transition. However Steven Macdonald's performances in the middle of defence have still been to the usual high standard.

Alexander Michie (Kingussie) Kingussie's defensive record is another to be admired, losing just 12 goals in 16 matches. Alexander Michie has been a pivot at the back, covering so much ground at the back with his athletic defending. He is

also an excellent penalty taker. Lachie Shaw (Fort William)

One of Fort William's talented youngsters, Lachie can fulfil a number of roles. He is a creative player and also a good finisher. Lachie was one of the top players in the National Division in 2019 and is sure to set the Premiership alight next season.

#### John MacRae (Kinlochshiel)

John is a strong full forward who enjoys a physical battle. He has an eye for goal but can also pick out a chance for a teammate. John defends from the top of the pitch, never allowing defenders to clear their lines with ease.

#### Roddy MacDonald (Kyles Athletic)

Roddy MacDonald scored six goals in 11 games as Kyles lifted the Scottish Sea Farms Glasgow Celtic Society Cup. He is equally at home playing in defence or attack and has maintained a high level of form for a number of seasons

Kinlochshiel manager Johnston Gill is the outstanding candidate as to manage the side. This year's Camanachd and MacTavish successes mean Johnston has now managed 'Shiel to all four majors during his three terms in charge. He has also had an keen eye on introducing a number of the club's promising youngsters to build the squad size for next season.

Oban Celtic's Andy MacDonald will miss the first match of the 2022 shinty season.

MacDonald returned to the Celtic side for the club's final game of the season, an 8-0 win at Aberdour in Mowi Senior League C. However, a yellow card in that game, his first booking of the season, now triggers a one-match suspension for a disciplinary points accumulation.

## **Lovat Cup Returns**

Possibly the most popular out-of-season shinty clash returns in 2021 as Lovat meet neighbours Beauly to contest the Lovat Cup at Balgate on Monday 3 January 2022.

The Lovat Cup wasn't contested in 2021 because of Covid restrictions.

Lovat are holders as Greg Matheson's brace helped them beat Beauly 3-1 in 2020 to win the trophy for the fifth successive season.

## **Feeding negative** thoughts

We learn several ways to deal with negative thoughts originating from chronic pain but many are ineffective in the long run.

We think they will rid us of the thoughts but in reality they can feed the problem. We often try one of three common strategies.

Suffering - This involves thinking about the same set of thoughts over and over which reinforces a negative neurological circuit. Suffering takes the form of complaining, arguing, blaming, manipulation and gossip.

Those in chronic pain are often so consumed that they endlessly discuss their problems with colleagues, friends and family which unfortunately reinforces negative thought pathways and the release of stress chemicals. Obviously



this can have a detrimental effect upon close relationships. Some will

Suppressing instead choose to suppress their thoughts and emotions which can also be damaging in the long term and takes a lot of energy to keep under wraps. This can lead to a critical 'tipping point' where negative emotions can no longer be suppressed and an irrational, explosive and disproportionate reaction occurs which again can be very difficult for close friends and relatives. Men are often more prone to this strategy utilising the old 'big boys don't cry' approach.

Masking - This strategy in-

volves covering up uncomfortable thoughts and emotions by doing something else. This can be very positive in the case of hobbies and interests which are done for the right reasons and encourage alternative positive neurological pathways to improve mental health. However following a passion is different obsessively pursuing activities to outrun your anxiety. Not so helpful choices are masking with alcohol, drugs, cigarettes, excessive work, gambling or over-eating. These options have significant social and physical consequences.

## Gart are 'coshed' by last gasp Saints' winner

Central Scottish AFL Premier Division

Oban Saints' final home fixture of 2021 brought their long-awaited first home Central Scottish Amateur Football League Premier Division win of the season.

Last Saturday morning's heavy rain forced a switch of venue from Glencruitten to Oban High School and with it a much-needed change of fortune.

Matty Kelly gave Saints a deserved first-half lead but the home side were pegged back after just two second-half minutes after an excellent turn and shot from former Celtic and Scotland

striker Craig Beattie. This has been an all too familiar story in Saints debut season in the top division in Scottish amateur football. However, spurred on by the large and unusually vocal home support, the D&K Lafferty and MKM Building Supplies sponsored side dug in and bagged the three points when Dene Cassells headed home an 85th minute Gavin Forgrieve free-kick.

Gartcosh kicked off in torrential rain attacking the school end and were immediately on the front foot forcing Ruaridh Horne to make a good block to divert a Ross Fisher shot behind for a corner kick. The delivery from Scott Starrs on the right found Craig Beattie but the big central defender couldn't

direct his header on target.

The deadlock was broken in the 33rd minute when Saints broke with pace after repelling another Jordan Murphy long throw. Dene Cassells won the header which was picked up on the edge of the box by Matty Kelly who sent Cammy Hill off on a run up the left. Hill's perfectly weighted pass into Kelly's path was met with crisp finish into the bottom corner past Gartcosh keeper Andrew Barlow's left hand.

Saints' good first half work was undone after just two second-half minutes when cheaply conceded possession was clinically punished by the visitors. David Beaton's clearing header from Jordan Murphy's throw-in was picked up by Daniel

MacCuish on the Saints' right but his flick intended for Matty Kelly was easily read and intercepted by Murphy whose raking ball to the far post found the still up in attack Craig Beattie. Despite now operating as a central defender Beattie has lost none of his striking prowess and, after taking the ball down expertly and turning away from Ruaridh Horne, he slammed an unstoppable shot past Graham Douglas to level the scoring.

Ruaridh Horne's first start of the season came to an end after 65 minutes when he was replaced in the back three by veteran Alex Craik.

Saints' winner came when they were awarded a free kick in the 85th minute after a late challenge by Callum Galloway on Gavin Forgrieve. 

## **Interpreter from Afghanistan** enlists MP's help

A former Afghan interpreter for the British Army who fled the clutches of the Taliban with his immediate family and now lives in local MP lan Blackford's Ross, Skye and Lochaber constituency, believes the lives of other family members in hiding in the war-torn country are at serious risk.

The man, whose identity has not been disclosed, is one of a number of asylum seekers resettled in Mr Blackford's constituency. He believes his family in Afghanistan are now at enormous risk as a result of his former role.

He told the SNP Westminster Leader: 'Our family members are hidden and struggling to survive. There is no one to look after them. My father-in-law is an elderly and ill man. He needs proper treatment but he is hidden.

'The others are women who are banned by the Taliban from going out. No iobs, no food for them...the Taliban are going door to door searching for people who worked with the former Afghan government or western countries.

'I believe my working background as an interpreter causes them a big and serious threat to their life.'

Mr Blackford has demanded the UK Government acts

## **Reduce social** contacts before Christmas, urges **First Minister**

Christmas can go ahead but people should cut back on contact with others as far as possible, says First Minister Nicola Sturgeon.

People have been asked to reduce their socialising to a maximum of three households at a time in the run-up to the Christmas because of worries over the rapid spread of the Omicron variant of Covid. Although that advice will not be enforced by law, and does not apply on Christmas Day, people should be sensible and keep gatherings small and safe. Places of worship will be staying open, Ms Sturgeon said during a

Covid briefing on Tuesday.

There will be a new legal requirement on businesses to take measures to minimise the risk of Omicron infection such as avoiding overcrowding and bottlenecks. New guidance will also make it clear that it will be a legal duty that employers will need to enable staff who were working from home at the start of the pandemic to do so again.

# Crazy depicting Fort as 'crimeridden blackhole', says Baxter

There was an online backlash this week as irate residents of Fort William hit back after a national daily tabloid newspaper portrayed their town as being in the midst of a worrying crime wave, likening it to places such as Watford and South Africa.

The article in the Scottish Daily Express drew more than 260 comments after a link was posted on a local Lochaber social media page, with many complaining it was just being used as an excuse to attack the SNP government over police

The article quoted a number of apparent incidents, some alleged, and quoted people criticising the police for apparently not doing enough to combat crime, including rising

vouth-related crime, in the town. Among those who took to social media to challenge the claims was Mark Linfield, chairman of Fort William, Inverlochy and Torlundy Community Council.

It's deeply disappointing the Daily Express and opposition are taking every opportunity to talk Fort William down...

He told the Lochaber Times he was disappointed to read the report and while not denying there have been some incidents recently as reported in the article, he and his fellow community councillors did not believe their area to be particularly worse than any other Highland towns or villages.

'The police are well aware of the anti-social behaviour of groups of youths. Fort William Inverlochy and Torlundy Community Council has voiced our concerns to them, said Councillor Linfield.

'We do not believe the area deserves to be labelled as a crime hotspot due to a few recent isolated serious incidents.'

William Fort Ardnamurchan councillor Andrew Baxter said it was disappointing to see a national newspaper attempt to 'sensationalise' recent incidents in Fort William.

'Of course these are crimes and should be treated seriously. Yes, we have problems from time to time, no area is perfect. But most people's experience is we live in a safe place where crime is relatively low,' he told the Lochaber Times. 'It's crazy to try and paint Fort William

as some sort of crime-ridden black hole where lawlessness roams every street corner. I normally co-operate with journalists but I refused to comment on this occasion.'

Kate Forbes MSP also commented on the article saying: 'At a time when a lot of investment is going into Lochaber, such as Nevis Range, the cinema on the High Street, the advanced manufacturing centre, the marina and, hopefully, a new hospital in the not too distant future, it's deeply disappointing that the Daily Express and the opposition are taking every opportunity to talk Fort William down. Comparisons with South African townships are wildly inaccurate and deeply unhelpful. Whilst the Highlands and Islands is one of the safest places to live, that doesn't mean we get complacent. I am saddened to hear

of these incidents and Police Scotland are monitoring the situation locally.

'If constituents believe more needs to be done to reduce crime in Fort William, I am happy to be contacted and will investigate further, but my mail bag suggests that is not the main concern for the town at this moment in time.

Asked to comment, a Police Scotland spokesperson said: 'The Highlands and Islands is one of the safest places to live in Scotland. Crimes recorded for 2020-21 showed one of the lowest rates of recorded crime

'Of the crimes that do occur, the number of these which are solved by police is one of the highest in the country. Anyone who has concerns about crime in their area can speak to a member of their local community policing team.'

# Call for increase in climate change teaching in school

There has been a call from Lochaber councillor Denis Rixson and local environmental campaigners to increase the amount of teaching about climate crisis as part of the curriculum in schools.

The comments from Councillor Rixson (Caol and Mallaig) came during a discussion at Friday's meeting of the full Highland Council on the local authority's approach to developing a net zero carbon strategy and action plan.

Councillor after councillor stressed the importance of tackling the climate crisis as a matter of urgency and several referenced the important role young people had to play.

The council has now agreed an 'ambitious approach' to developing a net zero strategy and action plan for the region that will maximise external funding to deliver its climate change targets.

Councillors welcomed feedback on staff and members' attendance at the recent COP26 climate event in Glasgow.

Members also agreed to endorse COSLA's call on the Scottish Government to recognise the vital role local government is playing to tackle climate change and to acknowledge additional external funding is required to fully deliver the council's climate emergency duties. Councillors agreed on Friday

that the council will establish a Net Zero Strategy Group comprising officers working across council services with governance of projects scrutinised by councillors.

Leader of the council Margaret Davidson said: 'Local government is the implementer of this and our role cannot be understated. We need to align what we are doing with national targets and with what is important in Highland.

'We need a clear action plan

and milestones and I really want to see us engaging more with our young people as well.

Councillor Rixson said the Highland landscape had suffered from desertification. 'What desertification means is to make a desert and to an extent we have over the last 200 years. It sounds incongruous because the Highlands are anything but dry, but it does worry me,' he added.

He went on to echo the remarks from Councillor Davidson about the critical role young people had to play in any solutions to the climate crisis.


'As an ex-school teacher I absolutely seize on that. I think young people will embrace the idea of learning more about climate change in schools and I endorse what Councillor

Davidson said in that respect.'

His fellow ward member, Councillor Allan Henderson, warned that when some people raised the issue of how much council measures to help address the climate crisis would cost, there was a far greater cost in doing nothing: 'The cost of not doing it will cost us the opportunities that are available for us to take this forward. It [COP26] has highlighted the opportunities things like hydrogen are going to bring to us,' he said.

And council convener, Bill Lobban, did not mince words: 'We should be heading for zero and not net zero. Carbon off-set is just a fudge. It stops us from getting to a zero carbon economy.'

Commenting on the council's plans, Dr Kate Willis from the Lochaber Greens, said the climate and ecological crises needed to be at the heart of the Scottish curriculum, embedded in every subject, because more than anyone else, the young will bear the brunt of the crisis. She added: 'It is essential that the youth of today understand why this is a crisis, what the causes and impacts are, and what the solutions are to tackle it. As a parent with a daughter in year five at Lochaber High, I am very aware that the current curriculum is not educating this generation of secondary students about the climate and ecological crises or equipping them with the skills needed for a sustainable future.

Sunday December 19 – Loch Laggan: Stob Coire Dubh (916m, Munro Top) – peak of the black corrie; Carn Liath (1006m, Munro) – grey cairn

A fine walk over two outliers of the Creag Meagaidh group, with great views across Loch Laggan and into Coire Ardair.

The summit of Carn Liath is a gentle rise on a broad ridge running NE for more than 4km to terminate in the crags of Coire a Bhein.

To the N of this ridge there are gentle slopes down to the Glenshirra Forest but to the S, steeper slopes are punctuated



by the crags of Coire nan Gall and Coire Dubh.

S of the summit a broad ridge leads down to Na Cnapanan from where easy access to the path in Coire Ardair can be attained. To the W of this ridge are steep heather slopes into Coire Ardair.

There is an avalanche risk

# Fort man admits extorting £2,000 from his 'vulnerable' uncle

A man who extorted £2,000 from his uncle by pretending to arrange a prostitute for him will be sentenced next month. Sean McCuish, of Wallace Place, Fort William, appeared

Sean McCuish, of Wallace Place, Fort William, appeared at Inverness Sheriff Court on Monday December 13, and admitted a charge of extortion and also possessing a lock-knife.

The 30-year-old had sentence deferred until Thursday January 13 by Sheriff Sara Matheson for a background report and restriction of liberty order assessment. His bail was continued.

Fiscal depute Martina Eastwood told the court that McCuish's uncle, Anthony McCuish, inherited money following the death of his parents.

Mrs Eastwood described Mr McCuish as 'a vulnerable adult' who had a conversation with his nephew about women on social media in May 2018.

'It led to the accused offering to organise a prostitute. He said he could arrange for a woman to come to his uncle's house for sex for £100.

## He then threatened his uncle with the consequences of nonpayment, saying the pimps may shoot him

"There is then an exchange of messages over the next few days during which the price of the prostitute rises, money is required for her travel and then the "pimps" require a deposit, all leading to Mr McCuish transferring money

to his nephew. When no prostitute appears, the accused tells his uncle that the pimps are now angry and that he can still make an appointment with her but further money upfront is required.

'He then threatens his uncle with the consequences of non-payment, saying the pimps have guns and that they may shoot him.

'Overall between July 5 and July 27, 2021, he extorted £2,000 from his uncle,' Mrs Eastwood told the court.

The court heard that when police went to arrest McCuish he was outside his home and had a lock-knife in his pocket.

'He told police it was for cleaning out oil on his bong,' Mrs Eastwood added. Defence solicitor Pauline Chapman reserved her comments until sentencing.

## Council rejects boundary plan

Councillors have made it clear to the Boundary Commission for Scotland they do not support transferring a slice of the Ardnamurchan ward to Argyll and Bute Council as part of its proposals in the 2023 Review of UK Parliament Constituencies.

# More than 16,000 council taxpayers to receive £180 fuel payment

More than 16,000 council taxpayers in Highland will benefit from a discretionary £180 payment towards the cost of rising fuel bills.

Councillors on Friday agreed to fund the scheme at today's meeting of full council.

The payment will be made to households in receipt of means-tested council tax reduction by March 2022. It is expected this will benefit around 16,440 council tax-payers in Highland.

Highland has among the highest rates of fuel poverty in Scotland, despite contributing significantly to energy generation.

Councillor Craig Fraser captured the mood of the chamber when he blasted: 'This is one of the richest countries in the world in terms of energy. There's no way we should be in fuel poverty when we

generate the flipping stuff.' Councillor Ian Cockburn agreed that there was a fundamental problem. Councillor Cockburn said that the National Grid is 'the wrong way around', being situated too far away from the power source.

'We've got to change our whole way of thinking regarding energy in this country,' he said.

Indeed, council leader Margaret Davidson said the payment is a 'sticking plaster' and the council will lobby both the UK and Scottish Governments for a fairer system. The council will also ramp up its efforts to fit better heating and insulation across its housing estate.

Councillor Davidson said skyrocketing energy bills are of 'huge importance to so many of our constituents.'

Many members spoke

emotively about the impact on constituents in their own wards. 'It's a perfect storm that will lead to increased debt, increased poverty and a huge impact on people's health and wellbeing,' said Councillor Alasdair Christie.

Councillor Angela MacLean said fuel poverty is now so pronounced in Highland that it does not only affect people on benefits, but also the working poor. She said heat should be a basic right.

'This is not the time to be embarrassed about coming forward,' she added. 'All our bills have gone up – food has gone up, heating has gone up. Nothing has come down. We are all in the same boat.'

The council agreed to fund the £180 payment using just under £1m of the Scottish Government's Winter Support Fund and £1.961m from council reserves.

# Call for changes to controversial groundworks near iconic lighthouse

Ardgour community councillors want to see a number of changes to already constructed controversial groundworks close to the famous Corran Point Lighthouse.

Ardgour Estate is seeking retrospective consent for the footpath which runs from the local war memorial monument to the Sgiath Dhubh footpath, plus retention of a bellmouth and access road to the telecoms mast site at Lismore View and which joins up with the A861 near the lighthouse.

At their monthly meeting month, community councillors had discussed the matter, while several members of the public raised concerns.

Ewen Maclean, a member of the Maclean family which owns and manages Ardgour Estate, and Shaun Corrigan from Corrigan Contractors which carried out the groundworks, pointed out that the temporary paths created as part of the work were already being used outwith working hours by walkers and cyclists and would be beneficial to the community.

Corran Lighthouse Lodge is

owned by Catherine Collins who bought the Category C listed property in 2017 and she has lodged an objection to the application.

The adjacent Corran Point Lighthouse is also a Category C listed building as are the former lighthouse keepers' dwellings and garden wall.

The lighthouse was built in 1860 by Thomas and David Stevenson, father and uncle to Robert Louis Stevenson, and is still working and operated by the Northern Lighthouse Board.

Ms Collins believes the groundworks have negatively impacted on the setting of the lighthouse.

'The introduction of the sub-

stantial earthworks has created a visual scar on the hillside and has physically changed the landscape form and therefore how the lighthouse is appreciated in the wider landscape,' she told the Lochaber Times recently.

She had told November's community council meeting that she felt the application was 'wholly inadequate' and did not address a number of important issues.

Ms Collins pointed out that while the rectangular construction site and road across the field were part of an essential infrastructure project by SSEN and therefore within the permitted development plan, the altered access to the

road from the A861 were not. Responding, Mr Maclean told the community council that there had always been an access there. 'It is an improved access in terms of safety, although I can see it is a little bit bigger,' he said.

It creates a better and safer access into what is essentially a farming field. It is a safer access off the road for any farm purposes.

'And I think from the community point of view, the ability to walk through from the ferry to the village without using the main road, apart from one small stretch, is of great benefit.'

Following several site visits, the community council has now informed local authority planners of its official view, telling them it recognises that the retention of the footpath would create a useful addition to the local path network, although as far as it is aware, at present the formed path does not fully link with the pre-existing paths.

The access road would also allow improved access to the war memorial and access by

car for those unable to climb the current steep access path,' continues the council.

'However, we acknowledge concerns from the community about the retention of the widened access road and in particular the scale of the bellmouth formed during the current works.

'We would suggest a number of measures if the decision is made to allow the access road and bellmouth to remain.

'These include reducing the scale and extent of the current bellmouth while ensuring easy access to the war memorial is maintained; landscaping to soften the current steep edges around the access road; planting of trees and vegetation to reduce the current unsightly visual it has created; and the gating of the access road to prevent unauthorised vehicular access.

## College merger pledge to see no job losses Afghan inte


The proposed merger of three colleges within the University of Highlands and Islands, including West Highland College (WHC) which has centres in Fort William, Mallaig and Kinlochleven, will not directly result in any compulsory staff redundancies.

A strategic project is currently examining bringing together WHC – which also has centres in Kilchoan, Portree and Broadford - together with Lews Castle College UHI at Stornoway, and North Highland College UHI, to form a new college by January

The merger plans, which could involve 9,000 students and around 600 staff, follow a detailed options appraisal earlier this year.

As well as a no job loss guarantee and a pledge to work closely with staff and trade unions throughout the process, two other key principles for the merger have been agreed.

These are that the creation of a new college will not result in any centralisation and any savings identified will be reinvested to strengthen the educational offering.

## Nine steps to a safer home this Christmas

campaign encouraging householders to minimise the risk of a fire this Christmas and throughout the year has been launched by the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service.

Latest figures show firefighters attended more than 450 accidental house fires in around one month last winter.

During the same period, accidental house fires claimed the lives of seven people, with casualties. The incidents happened between December 7, 2020 and January 11, 2021.

Deputy Assistant Chief Officer Ali Perry is head of prevention and protection at SFRS. He said: 'Fire is a risk for everyone, but some people are more at risk than others. If you know someone who is over 50 and smokes, and who has either mobility issues or uses medical oxygen or lives alone, please arrange a Home Fire Safety Visit on their behalf.

'Reaching out to those who are vulnerable can help save lives in our communities.'

A free online self-assessment on the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service's website is available to everyone in Scotland to find out how safe their property is.

On completion, participants can download a unique report about their home, which gives advice on how to rectify risks and problems.

There are nine steps to a safer home - as participants are asked to consider their use of smoke detectors, cooking in the kitchen, smoking and candles, electrics and heating, emollient creams, medical oxygen, air pressure mattress, night-time routine and fire action plan.

DACO Perry said: 'By walking through the nine steps you can massively reduce the risk of a fire in your house. Taking a few minutes to do the self-assessment and identify the hazards in your own home can help keep you and those around you safe.

# Househ poverty

Proposals to provide almost £3million to help households in fuel poverty in Highland this winter were approved by members at a recent meeting of full council.

A payment of £180 will be made to around 16,440 eligible Highland households where residents are in receipt of means-tested council tax reduction.

Thirty-three per cent of households in Highland are experiencing fuel poverty compared to the national average of 24 per cent and 22 per cent of all households in Highland are facing extreme fuel poverty, which is nearly double the national average, at 12 per cent.

The significant recent increases in fuel prices will place even greater pressures on an increased number of Highland residents.

On October 29, the Scottish Government announced a £41m Winter Support Fund for low-income families which includes £10m nationally to help

# Highlands and Islands still safe place to live, says top cop

Recently published police performance figures reveal a slight rise in some recorded crime categories during the first half of the year.

However, we know there is still much more to do to improve reporting of traditionally under-reported crimes such as sexual offending.

Chief Superintendent Trickett added that comparing statistics is always challenging as there is a unique set of circumstances behind every incident and the different levels of restrictions faced due to Covid will have an impact for some time to come.

He concluded: 'One thing that remains unchanged however, is the commitment from officers and staff to make the Highland and Islands Division a safe place for all.'

# Glenfinnan bus idea could ignite greener opportunities

by Mark Entwistle

A new 21st-century visitor centre on the outskirts of Glenfinnan, combined with a park-and-ride shuttle bus service, may be the key to more sustainable tourism for the village and which could bring long-term 'green' benefits for the whole area.

That is the view of local Highland Council ward member, Councillor Allan Henderson, who was giving his thoughts to the Lochaber Times following a recent meeting of the local community council.

Outwith a Covid-impacted year, Glenfinnan can expect to welcome more than 400,000 visitors annually, many desperate to see the Jacobite steam train cross the viaduct as immortalised in the Harry



Potter films. Along with the large numbers visiting the iconic 1745 Rising monument on the nearby shores of Loch Shiel, it means Glenfinnan can

often feel like a village under siege in the summer.

A new community car park has taken much of the pressure off the adjacent National Trust for Scotland (NTS) car park, as well as providing a welcome financial boost for the community.

However, at this month's community council meeting, NTS, which looks after the 1745 monument site and has a small visitor centre nearby, revealed it has been in discussions with Forestry and Land Scotland (FLS) about a proposal that would see additional off-site overflow parking created to cope with the huge number of visitors wanting to stop at Glenfinnan.

The two organisations have been liaising over the currently closed Callop Bridge and boardwalk - these are in need of repairs. It now emerges they have also been discussing expanding off-site overflow parking at the nearby FLS Callop car park site, plus the erection of a message sign to display 'full car parks in Glenfinnan' information and

a park-and-ride shuttle bus

It has been suggested the park-and-ride shuttle bus service could stop at the NTS visitor centre and link with Glenfinnan Station.

Once the Callop Bridge and boardwalk are reopened, the proposed scheme would create an option of walking or cycling from the Callop car park, along the off-road tracks, to the Callop Bridge and into Glenfinnan.

NTS site manager Emily Bryce said she has been in discussion with Colin Simpson, principal officer (Europe, Tourism and Film), from the Transformation and Economy Service in Highland Council, about visitor infrastructure improvements required in high tourist areas in Glenfinnan, Glencoe and Torridon.

And Ms Bryce suggested that the Callop car park expansion and shuttle service could be included in the next round of the Rural Tourism Infrastructure Fund (February 2022).

Highland Council has trialled shuttle buses at Glen Nevis and these could be extended to include Glenfinnan.

Ms Bryce said NTS is anticipating a resumption of, and an increase in, bus tours in 2022 and is trying to find ways to accommodate the growing demand.

Councillor Henderson, who knows the area and its issues well, told us that the recent virtual consultation night staged by NTS and the problem-solving idea for coaches floated at the community council meeting, had made him think.

'It really made me think that there are opportunities for change - change to a greener, slower approach while taking the opportunity to capitalise on the popularity of the Glenfinnan area. It may just be that Harry has sprinkled a little fresh magic dust on the slightly dusty old NTS,' he said

'Using the Callop site while working with Forestry Land Scotland, there is an opportunity to build a 21st-century visitor centre able to convey the full Jacobite history to visitors before sailing them along the Callop river, or walk/cycle for the more active along the forestry track to a reconstructed FLS bridge, opening up the full view of Glenfinnan and the Jacobite rising monument - jobs and tourism working in harmony with less disruption to the actual village.

"The current visitor centre could be leased to the community, capitalising on the Harry Potter phenomenon whether that be small pop-up cafes, or an enlarged restaurant with local arts and crafts at the centre, to try to slow down the frantic pace of Harry Potter magic.

'Combining all this with Glenfinnan's desire to create an active travel route from Fort William, it really would be a win for all - green tourism and a far better experience for all visitors and locals.'

# £1bn 15-year council capital plan approved

Highland Council has agreed a 15-year capital plan with a £1 billion investment in schools, roads and flood schemes.

At Friday's full meeting of the local authority, budget leader Councillor Alasdair Christic called the medium-term financial plan a 'holistic, inclusive and horizon scanning' vision.

'This is a good news story,' said Councillor Christie. 'It's a £939m investment in education, property and the maintenance and safety of our buildings. It will create jobs and opportunities across Highland.'

Councillor Christie said this was the first time that the council had produced a 15year vision – made up of five years' firm commitments, five years' indicative spend and five years' showing 'where we want to be'.

However, his administration



colleague Matthew Reiss resigned as vice-chair of corporate resources committee saying it was only 20 per cent affordable.

He added that major infrastructure projects including the Corran ferry, Stromeferry bypass and waste-to-energy plant were all under threat.

Conservative group leader Councillor Andrew Jarvie dubbed the 'long list' the 'long grass'.

Council leader Margaret Davidson insisted that the projects were priorities.

'We need more capital and we're not finding it, so we're asking for help,' she said.

The report states that the

larger capital spends require additional external funding, or a means of becoming self-sustaining. The state of Highland's roads

The state of Highland's roads – and the blame for their condition – continued to divide opinion. Councillor Jarvie said the capital commitment was 'nowhere near good enough.'

He tabled an amendment that the entire capital plan should be delayed for discussion at a special meeting of the council.

Councillors at last week's economy committee heard that 39 per cent of Highland roads needed to be repaired, and the council needed to spend £26m each year for 'steady state' – ie to stop the roads deteriorating further.

The council has committed just £8m in capital from 2023.

'This is nowhere near good enough,' said Councillor Jarvie. 'The £26m should be sewn into the fabric of the budget. If we can't sustain that we'll continue to decay.'

Councillor Peter Saggers summed it up briefly: 'We can't afford to do half of what we'd like to do and there's no hope of Edinburgh riding to the rescue.'

Councillor Davidson acknowledged that while officers were still combing through the detail, it appeared that the Scottish Government grant to Highland Council represented flat cash. 'If that's the case we need to find savings to invest more in our roads. We can't keep dipping into our reserves.

'Our roads need capital but they also need revenue to rebuild the service,' she said.

SNP and administration members voted together to defeat Mr Jarvie's amendment, and Highland Council's capital plan was agreed.

# Preparations under way for local government elections next year

Preparations are well under way to run the Highland Council local government elections in May next year.

At Friday's meeting of the Highland Council, members agreed the resources required to run the elections which will take place on Thursday May 5.

The total cost of running the 2022 council election is estimated to be £550,000.

This is based on all ordinary expenses to run the election but excludes any potential Covid costs.

For this election, the Scottish Government has put a national framework agreement in place to deliver the printing of the ballots and the electronic counting of the votes.

As the Local Government Boundary proposal for Highland was rejected by Parliament in October, the current council membership and ward boundaries with its 74 members elected across 21 wards and respective three or four members remains unchanged.

The council's current polling scheme which lists the venues used for poll will be used.

However, to minimise disruption to schools and pupils, and as previously agreed, an in-service day for all Highland schools is in place on Thursday May 5 and because of the exam period, no secondary schools will be used as polling stations.

The council says its election team will continue to work closely with the Electoral Management Board, the Scottish Government and The Electoral Commission to ensure compliance with all directions before, during and after the election.

# Watchdog to tighten rules on fish farms to protect wild salmon

Protecting Scotland's wild Atlantic salmon is a 'national priority', says Scotland's environmental watchdog SEPA, launching a consultation on wild salmon protection zones and a sea lice exposure threshold.

'Scotland is renowned world-wide for the quality of its rivers, lochs and seas,' explained Terry A'Hearn, chief executive of the Scottish Environment Protection Agency (SEPA). 'Despite this, in nearly 60 per cent of salmon rivers across Scotland, including on the West Coast and Western Isles, salmon populations are in poor conservation status.

'Whilst the causes of the poor conservation status of wild salmon stocks are complex and believed to be due to a range of different factors rather than a single cause, we know that sea lice from marine



finfish farms can be a significant hazard. The protection of Scotland's wild Atlantic salmon is a national priority which is why, following the Scottish Government confirming SEPA as the lead body responsible for managing the risk to wild salmonids from sea lice from marine finfish farms, we're today launching a consultation on ambitious

proposals for proposed wild salmon protection zones and a sea lice exposure threshold that applies in these zones.

'Over the coming months we look forward to meeting and hearing views from a broad range of stakeholders with an interest in wild salmon, from community and environmental groups to the aquaculture sector itself, before SEPA has been confirmed as the lead body responsible for managing the risk to wild salmonids from sea lice from marine finfish farms.

taking a final view in 2022.' SEPA said the Scottish Government has identified 12 high-level pressures on the status of salmon stocks: 'These include different pressures on river habitats, such as loss trees/shade, man-made barriers to fish migration and impacts on river levels resulting from climate change; exploitation (recreational fishing and commercial sea fisheries); predation; sea lice and disease; escapes; and invasive non-native species (including signal crayfish in Scotland).

'Sea lice from marine finfish farms remains a potentially significant pressure with scientific evidence being clear that sea lice from open-net pen finfish farms in Scotland can pose a significant risk to wild salmon populations.'

The consultation, which is open until Monday March 14, 2022, focuses on a proposed framework to protect wild salmon populations against harmful increases in sea lice by assessing the risk to wild salmon when determining applications for proposed farms, and increases in the number of fish farmed at existing farms.

Permits for all existing farms that can contribute to infective-stage sealice in wild salmon protection zones would be changed to include conditions that control the number of juvenile sea lice emanating from the farms, and require sufficient information to calculate the number of juvenile lice hatching on the farms.

# Reiss resigns amid budget concerns

Councillor Matthew Reiss has announced his resignation as vice chairman of Highland Council's corporate resources committee.

Mr Reiss says the council has failed to grasp the nettle regarding the state of its budget. Central to his concerns is the medium-term financial plan put before council last Thursday – a plan he believes is 80 per cent unaffordable.

The Caithness councillor also objects to a declining future spend on roads, and claims rural Highland is 'neglected' both by the council and the Scottish Government.

'I'm sad to be resigning, but I've watched the storm clouds gathering for some time,' he said. 'Now, in my judgement, it's completely impossible to deliver on our ambitions.'

## CalMac seeking community views on Uig harbour works

CalMac is hosting a series of public consultation and engagement meetings this week to gather feedback on the proposed temporary changes to timetables during the closure of Uig Harbour, pictured above on Skye.

Due to infrastructure upgrades being undertaken by Highland Council, the harbour will be closed for 21 weeks, from Monday September 12 next year until Friday February 3, 2023.

Consultations will be held on the following dates/times and locations: Uig Village Hall: today (Thursday December 16, 11am-1pm; Tarbert Community Centre: today (Thursday December 16), 6-8pm.

Uig, Tarbert and Lochmaddy harbours are all being upgraded to replace life expiry infrastructure and to enable CalMac to deliver an effective service when new vessel 802 is introduced into service.

Operations director Robert Morrison commented: 'The upgrades will deliver many improvements, but the closure of a port means that we have to carefully plan alternative timetables. We recognise that the closure will be challenging for our customers, and for this reason, community views are extremely important. I would encourage people to attend the consultation events and to let us know what they think.'

# Continued lack of islanders on CalMac board sparks anger

Hebridean councillors have slammed the Scottish Government for not appointing an island resident to CalMac's board of eight directors.

Comhairle nan Eilean Siar, the Western Isles Council, has expressed disappointment that the Scottish Government has appointed the David MacBrayne Group Board, but 'ignored pleas from councils and stakeholders across the ferry network to address the fundamental gap in user experience of those appointed to that board'.

'Not one single resident of an island served by David MacBrayne Group or its subsidiary CalMac Ferries Limited sits on the company board,' the council said, 'and this opportunity to right this wrong has been passed up by ministers.

'Instead they have appointed a new chairman and three new non-executive directors with no residential tie to the communities the company serves.

'At a meeting of the Hebrides Ferry Stakeholder Group (Thursday December 2) community stakeholders supported the call for lived experience of these ferry services be a pre-requisite of any and all future appointments to the Board of David MacBrayne Group.'

The chairman of the council's

transportation and infrastructure committee, councillor Uisdean Robertson, said: 'The recent failure to address the absence of residents of the islands served by CalMac in the appointment of board members to David MacBrayne Group has caused real anger in our communities.

'It is little wonder company management are so detached

from the reality of their decisions when they are based at a headquarters in Inverclyde, and those appointed to hold the company to account have limited experience of how the company's actions affect people from Lewis to Arran.

'Having raised this issue with the transport minister, I had hoped our concern was understood and these vacancies would be filled by islanders. The comhairle will continue to press the case for real and meaningful change in the voice communities have in shaping our lifeline ferry services.'

Chairman of the Independent Ferries Community Board Angus Campbell attended the meeting and shared the frustration, saying: 'The Ferries Community Board firmly believes experience of living on islands and first-hand knowledge of how lifeline ferry services impact on island communities are an essential part of the skill mix required to undertake these roles. An opportunity has been lost to add knowledge and improve decision-making for both the company and the communities they serve.'

A Scottish Government spokesperson said: 'Scottish ministers are committed to ensuring that island residents and communities' views are represented appropriately and have asked the new chair, as a priority, to consider how this might be achieved. Board members were appointed for their experience and abilities.'

The Scottish Government added it had advertised the recent chair and three non-executive director positions widely, including on the vessels travelling to island communities, and it was pleased to receive a high number of applications.

'Residents of island communities are free to apply to become members of the board if they wish,' it said.

# Timber movement restrictions

Woodland managers and landowners around Loch Carron and the north of Kyle of Lochalsh are being advised on new measures affecting the movement of timber.

The new restrictions have been put in place because the tree disease Phytophthora pluvialis has been found in the area.

Scottish Forestry has introduced a demarcated zone around the infected site at Loch Carron to help avoid the accidental spread of the pathogen.

Within this zone, no-one can move any timber of western hemlock, Douglas fir, tanoak and pine species within or out of the area, without notifying Scottish Forestry in advance.

James Nott, Scottish Forestry's head of tree health, said: 'We've moved quickly to put measures in place to help prevent the spread of this tree disease following the well-established biosecurity protocol used for tree pests and diseases. We are asking woodland owners to check the health of western hemlock and Douglas fir trees.

'Key symptoms to look for are lesions on the stem, branch or roots. Any possible sightings of the symptoms should be notified on the Tree Alert online system immediately.'

Phytophthora pluvialis is a fungus-like pathogen which causes needle cast (where needles turn brown and fall off), shoot dieback, and lesions on the stem, branches, and roots.

It was first discovered earlier this year in Devon, Cornwall and Cumbria in England. Mr Nott added: 'Everyone can play a

part in preventing the spread of pests and pathogens by taking simple steps.

'They should clean their shoes, bike tyres and pet's paws before visits. Everyone has a part they can play in protecting our woodlands.'

## Traffic management as flood protection works continue

As work on the new £11 million flood protection scheme at Caol and Lochyside continues, the Highland Council says it and contractor, RJ McLeod, are working hard to ensure that any disruption for the local community is kept to a minimum.

The new 1.2km flood embankment will run along the shores of Loch Linnhe from the Caledonian Canal embankment to the Caol Spit and an 800m flood wall will be constructed up the side of the River Lochy adjacent to the road and finishing at Soldier's Bridge.

Enhanced environmental benefits to the wider community will be included as part of the works with improved access to the towpath at the Caledonian Canal and improved walking and cycling routes along the length of the scheme with planting, seating, paths and a play area.

The installation of road drainage and a new water main continues to progress well along Kilmallie Road.

The intention is to complete the current section under the traffic management past Riverside Park and temporarily reinstate the road carriageway to allow the traffic management to be removed for the forthcoming holiday period.

The site will be closed from Christmas Eve until Monday January 10.

On the return to work on January 10 the traffic management will be reinstated for the next phase which will be across the Old School Court junction, again requiring three-way temporary traffic lights. During these works, the bus stop opposite Old School Court junction will be temporarily relocated.

A temporary bus stop will be installed under a short stretch of traffic management on the week commencing Monday December 20.

As for work along Erracht Terrace and Glenmallie Road, road drainage is required to be installed around the corner of Erracht Terrace / Glenmallie Road.

Work is scheduled to start on this section on Monday January 10 and is expected to last six weeks. A temporary road closure with a diversion via Glendessary Street will be in place but access will be maintained at all times for pedestrians, emergency vehicles and vehicles to/from Caol Spit treatment works.





from the OCHDA proposals, omissions which were down to the council. They then claimed that as a result of the omissions, it would take too long to deliver a Trust Port, while in fact the alternative adopted – a Municipal Port - is a blank sheet of paper. These are the same officials who previously and repeatedly stated that they lacked the expertise to run Oban Harbour.

Furthermore the report to the Harbour Board failed to include, as it should have, an estimate of how much it would cost the council to set up their Municipal Port. We are advised this will be a six-figure sum which could be better spent on other council services. This perverse decision of the Harbour Board must be overturned.

# Niteworks ready to release its cinematic new album A' Ghrian

Ruairidh continued: 'With

this album we've sought to create a more expansive sound that's cinematic in its nature.

'We were partly inspired by our work writing the music for Edinburgh's Hogmanay Fare Well film that reflected on what 2020 had been like for many during the pandemic. The nature of the project required broad expansive sounds, and that led to us going further in that direction through the writing and recording of the album. Our upcoming orchestral concert for Celtic Connections further reinforced our desire to keep down that path. A lot of the material from this album will lend itself well to that show and with the backing of a full orchestra it's going to be really powerful - we still can't quite believe it's happening!'

The band will tour the album with live dates scheduled from this month until the end of 2022, including a sell-out return to Celtic Connections in January.

## **SHINTY ROUND-UP**

## **Gareth Evans** reviews Lochside Rovers' season

It was so near but yet so far for Lochside Rovers as their only two defeats, both coming late in the season, meant they were unable to repeat their two-cup haul from 2019.

Gareth Evans, who recently stepped up to the Oban Camanachd manager's role, took time to reflect on a season which opened with a battling draw at home to Bute as Rvan Craig's late leveller cancelled out Lewis Buchanan's early opener.

'We had a young squad at the start of the season and I thought we would do well to finish mid-table,' Gareth said. 'I expected Bute and Ballachulish to be strong and it just so happened we faced both these teams in our first two games.

'Bute actually came to Oban with a young side and we had a good game with them at Ganavan when a draw was probably a fair result.'

Lochside then came from behind to win 2-1 at Ballachulish before the holders beat the Lochaber seconds 5-1 in the opening round of the HIS Sutherland Cup.

Gareth recalls: 'Our under-14 skipper Alexander MacDonald, a versatile player, got the equaliser against Balla' and Robbie Brown, who joined from Taynuilt, got the winner. The big down-side from that game was a back injury suffered by Chrissie MacMillan. It looked innocuous enough at the time but it turned out to be serious and he is still receiving treatment for it.

'The Lochaber win was good as we always look to do well in the Sutherland.'

A return to league duty and a 2-1 victory at the Inveraray colts on a wet midweek followed before a strong Lochside team then beat Taynuilt 5-1 in another midweek fixture.

Gareth said: 'We had David Cameron back from rugby and he got the first goal. David is a player who could push for a place in the Oban Camanachd team.

That match against Taynuilt took place on Wednesday 21 Iuly and it was to be the last league fixture Lochside would play.

The HIS Sutherland Cup second round threw up a tough tie at home to the Fort William colts and Lochside had to work hard for their 4-3 victory. 'The Fort William tie and the Bullough Cup Final were probably the best two games of the season. The Fort game was end-to-end with two young teams going for it on a hot day at Mossfield. I was pleased we won but couldn't have complained if we had lost.'

Lochside's defence of the Bullough Cup opened with a 6-3 victory in Glasgow against the Mid Argyll reserves, aided by Ross Campbell's hat-trick. 'We played Ross at full forward and he did really well. In fact they all did well as GMA had no first team match that weekend so fielded a good physical side against us. Our fitness was good though and saw us over the like as it did a few times during the season.'

September opened with a 2-1 win over on-form Kinlochshiel seconds in the quarter-finals of the HIS Sutherland Cup. Lewis Buchanan and Alexander MacDonald got the goals with Gareth saying: 'There was some drama around the 'Shiel game and we led 2-0 through Lewis Buchanan and Alexander MacDonald before they pulled a goal back with 16 minutes remaining but we got there in the end.'

However, the Lovat second team were to prove too strong in the Sutherland semis at Spean Bridge as the Balgate men won 5-0.

Gareth said: 'It still rankles with me that we had to play that tie on the same day as our first team were in the Glasgow Celtic Society Cup semi-finals. We were nine players short for one reason or another and that made it really difficult for us. We had to field so many of our younger players that it really was men against boys. We ended up with young players getting injured during the game and I would have liked to have played the semi-final with the team we had out against Fort William in the earlier round.'

The Bullough semis were more straight forward as lower league Oban Celtic colts were dispatched 10-0 so the season ended with the Bullough Cup Final against the Kyles Athletic reserves. The venue was decided by the toss of a coin which gave the Tighnabruaich men home advantage. In the end, it took penalties to separate the sides following a 3-3 draw with Kyles eventually taking the trophy.

Gareth added: 'I think I said at the time that I'd normally be unhappy about losing a game of shinty never mind a final but it was a brilliant game. It's not often Kyles get to play a final on their own pitch and there was a great crowd who created a wonderful atmosphere.

'Young Matthew Sloss was terrific for us that day and he is just one of several younger players coming through the system. Innes Jackson is another brilliant prospect. He is

so keen and such a good player. Callum MacMillan came in this year. He's only 14 but can be such a hard player in the tackle. Daniel Pearson also broke through and he will get more game time next season.

'Scott Robertson is another who has had a great season. Scott is still young but seems to have been around for years.' As he prepares for the new season with Oban Camanachd, Gareth has a word for those who helped him with Lochside last season.

'Managing a shinty team is no one-man-band,' he said. 'Iain MacMillan, Duncan MacMillan and Andrew Pearson have been a huge help. I thank them for that and of course wish them well as they manage Lochside next season.

The managerial changes trigger a new era for both Oban Camanachd and Lochside Rovers and the preparations start now.

## **Oban Times Shinty** Team of the Year

Oban Times shinty reporter Alasdair Bruce has selected his 2021 shinty team of the year.

With so many excellent players to choose from, only those who played most of the season were considered so the likes of Mark MacDonald, Blair Morrison, Thomas Borthwick and Conor Cormack, who would have pushed for a place in the side, weren't considered as injury forced them out during large chunks of the year.

**Stuart MacDonald (Lovat)** 

It was another season of game-changing goalkeeping from the Lovat's Mr Consistent. Lovat's Camanachd Cup run would have ended against Skye in Portree had it not been for Stuart MacDonald's heroics and he also shone in the semi-final win over Kingussie. Stuart remains Scotland's number one.

Finlay MacRae was the rock at the centre of 'Shiel's defence in a season the club will never forget. He defied the odds to recover from a leg injury to play such a crucial role in the Camanachd Cup Final. Finlay is a class act and a fine reader of the game. The 36-year-old's performances were all the more remarkable given the changing nature of Kinlochshiel's defence this season as injury

ruled out Conor Cormack.

Falconer for long periods. Daniel Cameron (Oban Camanachd)

Oban Camanachd boasted arguably shinty's best defence last season, only losing six goals over 11 games. They weren't always tested to the same extent as in the Premiership but the statistics are still impressive, keeping clean sheets in seven of their 11 matches and only losing one goal in three of the other four matches. Scottish international Daniel Cameron is a leader whose skilful defending has been a key component in the Oban side's back line. Daniel captains this select team.

**Daniel Sloss** (Oban Camanachd)

Daniel Sloss is one shinty's most talented youngsters who can be a mainstay of the Oban Camanachd side for at least another 15 years. He is usually given a man-marking role on the opponent's most dangerous forwards which speaks volumes of the trust placed in him. The Covid pandemic probably robbed him of the opportunity to captain the Scotland U17s at a time when he was already an established Scotland U21 international.

**Andrew King (Kyles Athletic)** Andrew King seems to get better with each passing season. He can break up an attack and set up an attack with equal ease. Andrew covers a lot of ground and has all the attributes of a modern-day defender. Craig Mainland (Lovat)

Wing centre is not Craig Mainland's usual position but his displays at buckshee back for Lovat this term merit a place in the team of the year. A tenacious tackler and a clean hitter of the ball who has a keen will to win.

Donald Nixon (Kinlochshiel) Donald Nixon is a powerhouse in the 'Shiel midfield, slotting perfectly into the full centre role after switching from wing centre. One of shinty's best shy takers who had forced his way into international recognition before Covid interrupted the

#### William MacKinnon (Skye Camanachd)

William's versatility has seen him feature in defence, midfield and attack for Alvance British Aluminium Balliemore Cup winners Skye this season. The 19-year-old came through the vouth ranks at Inverness before playing for Skye at under-17 level to follow in his father's footsteps. He is an athlete who is good in the tackle.

Ruaridh Anderson

(Kingussie)

Kingussie play-maker Ruaridh Anderson offers a creative edge to the side, providing opportunities for his fellow forwards. The 21-year-old is an exciting player to watch, he is super-fit and has a fine work ethic. often tracking back to help the midfield and even the defence at times.

James Falconer (Kingussie)
