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Tarbert Academy ranked fifth in Scotland for Higher results

Headteacher says school consistently produces good pass rates

HIGH achieving pupils in S6 at Tarbert Academy have helped rocket the school to fifth place in a national league table which rates schools based on students Higher results.

The academy, with 43 per cent of its S5 pupils gaining five Highers in 2013, was named in the top 10 best performing schools in Scotland.

The league table, compiled by a national newspaper using data from the Scottish Government, ranks state schools based on the percentage of the S4 roll who go on to pass five or more Highers in S5.

Tarbert Academy statistics show the school's

pass rate at Higher level in 2013 was more than three times the national average, where 13 per cent of students in Scotland gained five or more Highers in S5.

The average in Argyll and Bute is 13.1 per cent.

In August the Advertiser reported that three of Tarbert Academy's 15 S5 pupils were awarded A grades in their Highers. Twelve of those 15 students have continued their education into S6.

And while Tarbert's small school role can impact percentages, the school's headteacher Neil McKnight states the school has consist-

£20,000 play park to be built in Ardrishaig

Plans to upgrade football pitch continue

A NEW £20,000 play park to be built at the King George V park in Ardrishaig will not scupper plans to upgrade the existing football pitch, it has been confirmed.

Ardrishaig Community Trust, the group behind the project, says the installation will not hamper plans to improve drainage and upgrade the surface of the adjoining football pitch.

The play park, which has been funded by Ardrishaig ACTion Fund, will sit on waste land between the existing swings and village primary school.

Hamish Nicol from the trust said a decision was made to proceed with the play park as the necessary funding was in place.

He said: 'The project was further ahead than the plans for the pitch by about 18 months. If we put this in place Argyll and Bute Council has said it could be possible to move the play park at a later date if necessary.

The park, which will see a roundabout, multi play unit, donkey and dolphin spring and tunnel installed next month, will be maintained by Argyll and Bute Council.

Meanwhile the King George's Field Improvement Group and Mid Argyll Youth Development Services are progressing with plans to improve the pitch and build a pavilion.

John Woods, from the group,

said members had already met with an architect about the improvements.

He said: 'We will probably have to get the architect to re-draw the initial ideas, which were very early drawings and designs. The architectural survey will be much more detailed this time.

'I am optimistic about improving the pitch. Whether we upgrade to a 3G surface or improve the grass pitch will be down to the community.'

John said the group plans to meet after the play park has been installed to discuss the next stage of the project, which will include sourcing further funds to carry out the survey.

Human remains found could be that of missing Russian student

Speculation it could be Suzanne Pilley quashed

HUMAN remains discovered in Arrochar last Thursday could be those of missing student Yulia Solodyankina, Police Scotland has confirmed.

The remains were discovered by hill walkers in Succoth Forest, in Arrochar, near the A83, on January 9.

Formerly identified

Police Scotland said on Tuesday it could be two weeks before the badly decomposed body was formally identified but confirmed the discovery was being linked to the search for Ms Solodyankina.

Yulia, 22, was studying for a physics degree at Edinburgh University when she was reported missing on June 12 last year.

Boarded a bus

She was last seen at Buchanan Bus Station in Glasgow at around 4.55pm on Friday, June 7, from where it was believed she boarded a bus to Argyll or the Highlands - areas she had previously visited.

Inquiries about the student were made in Ardrishaig, Oban and Campbeltown at the time of her disappearance.

A spokeswoman for Police Scotland said: 'Formal identification has still to take place and further forensic examinations, including DNA tests, are to be carried out.

'Enquiries are continuing and no further information is available at this time.

'However, there appear to be no suspicious circumstances

in connection with the death.'
Police Scotland had earlier confirmed that the remains did not belong to Edinburgh woman Suzanne Pilley, who disappeared in May 2010.

Convicted

Her former partner David Gilroy, who was convicted of her murder, was thought to have dumped her body somewhere around the Rest and Be Thankful, a few miles away from Arrochar where the remains were found last week.

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The discovery of human remains in Arrochar is being linked to the disappearance of Russian student Yulia Solodyankina. She was last seen at a Glasgow bus station.

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Loch Sween home to impressive coral-like seaweed

THE BIGGEST and mara, by Scottish Natubest known example of an unusual habitat in the UK was found in Loch Sween, where large, impressive mounds of mud up to a metre high cover the seabed.

Formed by a marine animal known as the mud volcano worm, the mounds cover about 660 hectares and were recarried out on the west coast of Scotland.

Researchers discovered the beds of maerl, a hard coral-like seaweed, found in the tidal narrows of Loch Sween ney and the south of Arwere among the richest examples of the habitat in Scotland.

The marine surveys were carried out in the loch, situated between Tayvallich and Achna-

ral Heritage (SNH).

Part of a wider research project across the west coast of Scotland, the results of the surveys will be used to inform decision makers about locations that could be made Marine Protected Areas (MPA).

Thirty-three around the coast of Scotcently discovered when land are being considmarine surveys were ered as possible MPAs by the Scottish Government, following a nationwide consultation earlier this year.

Other surveys were carried out around Orkran.

The most contentious proposed MPA, the south of Arran is the main fishing ground for much of Mid Argyll and Kintyre's fishing fleet.

Surprising wind farm appeal decision

A decision by developer Renewable Energy Systems (RES) to mount an appeal against the refused planning application for Freasdail Wind Farm is surprising given that the report to Argyll and Bute Council, advising refusal, was well argued and convincing.

I suspect the cost of mounting the appeal will be fairly marginal to RES when compared to the high cost already incurred by them in preparing the initial planning application.

Perhaps it is not so surprising then that the company may feel it has little to lose at this

The worry now is that despite the issue being re-examined by an independent reporter the door has been opened for the Scottish Government to overturn the council's refusal - low carbon economy etc even if the reporter concludes the council's decision was sound. This has happened elsewhere.

However, given council planners produced a well reasoned and damning report a change of decision in favour of the proposal would drive a cart and horse through the council's ability to exercise any form of proper planning control in future applications.

Such a precedent, if established, would create a planning free-for-all in this locality.

It is equally important, at this critical time, that locals seek assurance from their MSPs that they will strongly support the refusal and make the politicians in Edinburgh fully aware of this.

Concerned at attack on traditional sporting estates

Sir,

The Scottish Countryside Alliance is saddened and somewhat concerned by the way in which the Scottish government and in particular Paul Wheelhouse, minister for environment and climate change, has used a BBC documentary to attack the traditional sporting estates model.

It is further concerned by the minister's pre-emption of the government's response in relation to the anticipated full report - this Spring - from the Land Reform Review Group. Speaking in 'BBC Scotland Investigates: The Men Who Own Scotland' Paul Wheelhouse MSP said the Scottish Parliament was 'on a journey' towards radical reform.

He said: 'I doubt anyone would design a system where you ended up with only 432 people owning half the private land.....I wouldn't design a system where you ended up with such a concentration of wealth and ownership in such a small group.

The independent Public and Corporate Economic Consultants (PACEC) study Scotland reported that generated £240 million pounds (GVA) from shooting and shooting related activities in 2004/5 and further reported that the sector supported 11,000 jobs.

PACEC has commissioned to repeat the study in 2014 with significant indications of growth on the previous study.

I am unaware of many sectors in the UK, never mind Scotland, that can report growth in the wake of the country's greatest post war economic crisis; this growth can, in part, be accounted for by the sustained investment of those who own land and create employment.

To break up the sporting estates would only serve to reduce localised employment opportunities and the knock on economic downturn it will surly lead too.

Vikings to raid Loch Fyne villages as first Nordic festival gets underway

Magnus Barefot's 1093 portage of a Viking longship re-enacted

A NEW festival which celebrates Tarbert's Viking past will take place in June as a five-day long extravaganza is planned on land and sea.

The Loch Fyne Viking Festival will see Nordic events held in villages around Loch Fyne before a grand finale of the re-enactment of the 1093 Magnus Barfot longship portage between Tarbert's west and east lochs.

The first part of mainland Scotland invaded by Vikings, Tarbert will be transformed into a Viking Village on June 25 when it welcomes a host of Vikings from Norway and Scotland, as well as archers from Northern Ireland.

The visitors will help Tarbert Vikings to invade their neighbouring villages on the Loch Fyne coast.

Preparations for a mass raid of Cairndow, Inveraray and Ardrishaig are already underway as the organisers of the festival have started building their own Nordic longship.

It will be used to raid Fyne Ales brewery and kidnap a dignitary from Inveraray, while each of the villages invaded will be tasked with creating their own homage to the Vikings of 1093.

Great spectacle

The men behind the festival - Hans Kok, Phil Robertson, Mike Harty, Jim Paterson and Andy Peden - are hoping the event, which will run alongside Tarbert Traditional Boat Festival, will be a great spectacle for locals and visitors alike. Hans said: 'We expect we will have a group of around 40 volunteer Vikings to row the longship in turns. We also expect that around 15 to 20 boats will accompany the longship up the loch during the raids.

'For the re-enactment of Magnus Barfot's portage of the longship from the West Loch to the East Loch there will be a parade with flags and specially composed music. Volunteers will pull the longship from west to east, first to the Co-op corner where it will be formally named and then launched at the ferry slip.'

Running from June 25 to 30, the Viking Festival will incorporate the third Tarbert Traditional Boat Festival. More than 40 traditional boats from across the UK will berth at Tarbert Harbour where people can view the boats and take part in a number of fun activities.



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Scotland's Global **Empire: a Chronicle** of Great Scots

Including those from Argyll and Bute

HEROES past present from Argyll and Bute are being celebrated in a new book, written by a former journal-

Jock Gallagher was a programme head at the BBC for more than 20 vears before setting up his own production company. He has spent the last five years compiling his chronicle of lesserknown great Scots.

Scotland's Global Empire: a Chronicle of Great Scots catalogues nearly one thousand individuals - with many Argyll folk among them. These include Victoria Cross winners, physicians and an ultrasound pioneer. Below are details of just a few of those selected:

Carmichael, Archie from Appin, was univer-

sally known as 'kindhearted Carmichael' because of a generous trait that was so strong it led him to being locked up in his own jail for 20 months for refusing to help loan sharks.

After emigrating to South Carolina, he was elected sheriff for his first four-year term in the sheriff's duty to help 1841 at a time when the United States were suffering a savage economic depression.

Debt was widespread and all too many people, unable to raise money through the banks, resorted to borrowing from loan sharks.

Sheriff Carmichael was deeply concerned that his local community would be overwhelmed by the financial catastrophe. He point blank refused to execute recovery orders and nor would he allow the repossession of homesteads.

Unfortunately, money men made their money talk. They claimed the law was on their side, that borrowing arrangements had been entered into voluntarily and that it was

MOSSGROVE

them.

The magistrates agreed and when he still refused to comply, Carmichael was sent to jail - his own - for 20 months.

He completed his sentence and then his term of office. The system didn't allow him to seek re-election until four years later but when he did, his badge was overwhelmingly restored.

Lieutenant Colonel John McNeill, from Colonsay, had served in the Bengal Infantry but had transferred to the Royal Sussex Regiment to serve in the Waikato-Hauhau campaign during the Maori War in New Zealand.

He won his VC on 30 March 1864 after returning to battle to rescue a comrade while being fired upon. He was later promoted to major general, knighted and served as equerry to Queen Victoria for 27 years. He died at St James's Palace in 1904. His VC is privately owned.

Lorne Campbell, of Airds, took a commission with the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders while he was still at Oxford University.

At the outbreak of World War II he went to France, where his bravery won him the DSO in 1940. It was in the attack on Wadi Akarit (Tunisia) that he won the VC on 6 April 1943.

The citation reads: 'The battalion commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Campbell had to break through an enemy minefield and antitank ditch in order to form a bridgehead.

'The battalion formed up in darkness and then attacked at an angle. This difficult operation was successfully completed and at least 600 prisoners taken'.

A Scottish physician

who linked health to the environment was Dr Lionel Chalmers, born in Campbeltown, 1715-1777. He practised in Charleston, South Carolina. for more than 40 years and he fought the ignorance and fears of his patients as relentlessly as he fought disease.

He had taken his medical degrees in Edinburgh before emigrating in 1735. In Charleston, he combined general practice with extensive research.

When he died, they named a street after him but he would almost certainly have been more appreciative of the tribute paid by the town mayor: 'He left behind him the name of a skilful, humane physician.'

Brigadier Colin Gubbins, from Mull, was a veteran of the Great War (World War I), in which he had won the Military Cross, and had served as an intelligence officer with William Ironside in Russia and in the Anglo-Irish war.

With his experience and insights into the nature of guerrilla warfare, he was the perfect choice for director of operations and training to help nationals in oppressed countries - including France - free themselves.

Colin Gubbins sent more than 470 agents, including 39 women, into France. They are said to have had an average survival time of just three months. Many of the 200 who never returned were said to have been executed on the direct orders of Hitler.

After the war Brigadier Gubbins was knighted and published Resistance Movements in the War (1948)

Taken from Campbeltown to America by his parents when he was a lively five-yearold, Hugh Brackenridge, 1748-1816, grew up to be a classic frontier citizen in the tough environs of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, he was an educational pioneer and founded an academy that later became Pittsburgh University.

He was also an army chaplain, a Supreme Court judge, politician, journalist and writer. Despite an early background of self-education, he was head of a free school when he was

Accolades don't come much grander than Outstanding Young Person of the World in 2005, the title accorded Magnus Macfarlane Barrow, born Dalmally 1968, for his work in helping to feed the world's hungry children through his charity, Mary's Meals.

The award came from the global network Junior Chamber International and Magnus is one of only a small group of Britons to receive it.

achievement he was also named the Sunday Mail's Unsung Hero of 2006, Rotary Club International twice gave him its top honour, the Paul Harris Award, he was named CNN's Hero of 2010, and he was awarded an OBE in the 2011 New Year Honours.

His story begins at the height of the Balkan conflict in 1992. Moved by the plight of ordinary people, Magnus (then 25) and his brother Fergus organised a local collection of blankets and food in Argyll, packed everything into an old Jeep and drove it to Bosnia.

When they got home, they discovered a shed on the family fish farm had been pressed into service to store more and more donations. Magnus decided to take a gap year so he could deliver the gifts.

But they just kept coming so he abandoned his plans to join the family business and instead created the charity, then called Scottish International Relief.

His next expedition took him - in the footsteps of David Livingstone - to Blantyre in Malawi, where he was so distressed by the impact of hunger and poverty on the country's children that he decided to sharpen his focus.

One child told him what he hoped for in life was 'to have enough to eat and to go to school one day'. He immediately set up a temporary feeding station and was soon serving 300 meals a day.

That was 2002. By 2012 the charity, now known as Mary's Meals, was providing more than 650,000 school meals a day in Africa, Asia, Latin America, the Caribbean and Eastern Europe.

Fyne Reverend says farewell after five years

'It has been truly inspirational to live in an area that is so scenic and beautiful'

A REVEREND who captures the beauty of Loch Fyne through his camera lens will deliver his final service on Sunday at Inveraray Parish Church.

Reverend Louis Bezuidenhout, who is from South Africa, has served the congregation for the past five years and has become a popular character within the commu-

Along with serving the congregation, which includes Cumlodden, Lochfyneside and Lochgair churches, the minister spends much of his spare time armed with his camera, photographing the area.

He said: 'I am going to miss the scenery and lovely view over the loch every day. I usually try to take a shot at sunrise. I really enjoy painting as well. It has been truly inspirational to live in an area that is so scenic and beautiful.'

Moving to the country in 1999, Rev Bezuidenhout had his first taste of life in Argyll when he served in Campbeltown, before moving to Dumfries. It was in 2009 that he chose to move back to the area, with his wife Elsie, to fill the vacancy at Inveraray Parish Church.

The couple set up home in the Manse, which over looks Loch Fyne.

He said: 'It is amazing to look out the window and wake up every morning here. I would often drive through here en route from Campbeltown and be amazed by the scenery.'

He has become known throughout the area for his love of photography and often shares his passion with locals at talks or events. But, it is not just the scenery Rev Bezuidenhout has come to love. I have come to appreciate the musical talents of the local adults and children. We have got a great choir at Cumlodden,' he said. 'At Inveraray Highland Games I was convenor for the pipe band, which I really enjoyed and have done every year since I came here.

His next home will be in Moray, where he will serve the four small villages of Alvas and Burghead, linked with Findhorn and Kinloss.

While he is looking forward to the challenge that lies ahead he said he would miss the people on West Loch Fyne, who have become his friends and an inspiration. I think my highlight of being here is probably the fact it is a very small group of people we are working with - particularly the elderly and most senior members,' he said.

'It is amazing to see what elderly people can still do. They are perhaps elderly by years, but are young at heart. I have made very good friends here and we would love to come back to this area again.'

This Sunday will see Rev Bezuidenhout deliver his last service and it will include the rededication of Inveraray Parish Church.

Rev Bezuidenhout often gets up early to

capture the sun rising on Loch Fyne.

It comes after work, costing £300,000, to make the building wind and water tight were completed in December.

The project to restore the building was launched one year after Rev Bezuidenhout arrived and saw the community rally together to raise £20,000 for the project.

The completion of the church and the service, he said, marks the perfect end to his time in Inveraray.

'It is a sense of relief to see it completed and to see the church looking like this is great. Cumlodden, which also had work done to it by the congregation, and Inveraray are both beautiful. It was a small group of committed people who helped get the project going,' he said.

'Many people raised funds and I'm so very grateful to everybody. We did gets grants, but it would not have been possible without the cooperation of the entire community.'

The service will also provide an opportunity for friends and colleagues to say their final goodbyes.

Niall Iain MacLean, who has been session clerk at the church for ten years, said Rev Bezuidenhout will be greatly missed.

'For me personally it has been a delightful experience to work along with him and I am going to miss him greatly, Mr MacLean said. 'No one knows the amount of work he has done to help preserve the church for another 50 years.'

The successor to the parish is still unknown, but minister Robin Mackenzie from Strachur Parish Church will act as interim. Everyone is invited to attend the service on Sunday that will begin at 11.30am and will be followed by a buffet in the church

Argyll and Bute Council to review pitch hire charges

Mid Argyll clubs pay double the fee paid in Helensburgh

and 3G sports pitches throughout Argyll are being reconsidered by the local authority after it was revealed Mid Argyll sports clubs are paying double the fees charged in Helensburgh.

Despite having only a second generation (2G) surface, clubs in Lochgilphead are charged £46.10 - more than their Helensburgh neighbours who play on a better sur-

a 3G pitch in Helensburgh is £23 per hour and at the Aqualibrium in Campbeltown £47.90 per hour.

In Oban the all-weather pitch is £56.25 per hour including changing facilities.

Meanwhile as Lochgilphead maintains its fight to have a 3G pitch installed at the joint campus, Red Star pays £67.90 for senior match-

CHARGES for 2G face. The cost of hiring es at Ropework Park, including changing facilities, and £33.90 for each match played by the junior teams.

> Argyll and Bute Council now says it will review the charges for the 2G and 3G pitches but claims fees across the county are below the Scottish average.

> Dougie Moore, chairman of Red Star Football Club, has joined his counterparts at Oban

Athletic and Oban Saints in calling for pitch hire prices to be brought in line with those at Helensburgh.

He said: 'All of the Argyll pitches should be the same price throughout and not varying as they currently are. Helensburgh are paying a smaller fee for a 3G pitch whilst all Mid Argyll clubs, including ourselves, the soccer centre, athletics, shinty and other users of the 2G, are paying more for using an inferior surface. We would most certainly welcome a review as to the costing as this is the biggest drain on any sports club's funds.'

A spokesman for Argyll and Bute Council said: 'Currently there is no common charging policy in the council's fees and charges schedule for the six all-weather pitches in the county.

'The current charging arrangements have developed historically on a case-by-case basis related to local circumstances - the basis on which each individual facility was developed and the charging arrangements which were in operation at the time the pitch opened. 'The community letting processes and charges are currently under re-
