ROAD safety in Argyll is threatened under council savings plans, an expert has claimed.

Facing a funding gap of £8.5 million in the next year, councillors tabled a series of potential policy savings in October. One of the measures is to axe the Road Safety Unit to save £84,000.

The unit is run by one full-time and one termtime officer, providing services including road safety awareness courses in primary and secondary schools, as

A spokesperson for Argyll and Bute Council responded: 'All the budget proposals are in line with our statutory requirements. Year-onyear cuts to our funding mean that, like all councils, we must make changes to how we work.'

Mr Olivarius has received support from one of Argyll's bestknown educators and from a Lochgilphead parent council.

Festive drink drivers caught in Mid Argyll

THREE drivers were Year's Day. Officers in seven per cent were charged and reported to the procurator fiscal for drink driving in Mid Argyll over the festive period.

On Saturday December 9 at 1.07am in Inveraray, a 43-year-old woman was arrested for being drunk while supervising a learner driver.

At 2am on Wednesday December 27 on Union Street, Lochgilphead, a vehicle was stopped and an 18-year-old man arrested and charged with drink driving.

A 56-year-old man was also arrested and charged for drink driving after being reported by witnesses on the Garval Road in Tarbert at 4am on New

the Highlands and Islands Division stopped a woman driver three times in eight days and found her to be over the limit on each occasion. She has been given an interim disqualification pending a court appearance.

The figures come as Police Scotland expressed dismay following the nation-wide results of a four-week drink and drug driving crackdown.

The campaign saw 15,771 drivers stopped during the 2017/18 festive period, with 567 (one in 28) detected for drink or drug driving. This is compared to one in 30 during the same period last year. Of the 567 detected,

fewer drivers caught driving while still intoxicated 'the morning after' but there remains a hard-core of drivers who continue to risk their lives and the lives of others by drink/drug driving.

Car crash fine for Lochgilphead man

LOCHGILPHE-AD man who crashed into another motorist was fined at Campbeltown's JP court.

George Kerr, 43, from 8 Dun Mor Avenue, Lochgilphead, pleaded guilty by letter to a charge of driving without due care and attention on the A83, near Tarbert, on August 18 last year.

Kerr struck a grass verge and rock face before re-entering the

road and colliding with an oncoming vehicle, causing 'extensive damage' to both vehicles and injury to the occupants.

All were taken to Lochgilphead Hospital and the road was blocked for more than two hours.

JP Margaret McDowall sentenced Kerr, who had no previous convictions, to a £200 fine and three penalty points.

FIRE crews from Tarbert and Lochgilphead were still on the scene as darkness fell after a Tarbert fishing boat caught fire.

The fire on the Stella Maris, a prawn creeler, began on the morn-

ing of Sunday January 14 as she was tied up at Tarbert fish quay, with flames visible coming from the wheelhouse. Reports

A spokeswoman for the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service said:

'We were alerted at 12.08pm on Sunday, January 14 to reports of a fire on a boat in Tarhert

'Operations control immediately mobilised three fire appliances to the incident in Harbour Street involving a fishing vessel with no cargo or passengers.

'Firefighters extinguished the small fire in the engine compartment and left the scene after ensuring the area was made safe. Prevent

bert, Lochgilphead and Campbeltown attended, with a main priority to prevent the flames spreading to nearby vessels in the busy Loch Fyne fishing port. There were no reports

of injuries. The fire and rescue spokeswoman concluded: 'The fire was extinguished at 12.57pm and the last appliance left the scene at 3.30pm.'

Murdo MacLeod - a tribute August 2, 1947 - November 29, 2017

MID ARGYLL lost years, but a national time, young Murdo one of the region's true characters with the sudden passing of Murdo MacLeod.

Murdo was a man full of enthusiasm and passion who lived life at 100 miles per hour - on land and at sea.

He is best known for being a founder, with his identical twin brother Kenny, of M&K MacLeod in Lochgilphead more than 40 years ago, and the family has strong Mid Argyll roots.

Murdo and Kenny were born in Glasgow in August 1947 at a time when the family was living at Tiroran on the Isle of Mull.

The family moved from Mull to Lochgilphead where the boys attended school. On leaving school they trained as joiners with D & J Carmichael Ltd of Lochgilphead and were often sent on jobs on islands, for example Mull and Tiree.

Strike

The bright lights of London, however, beckoned and the brothers started working for Laing Construction in the late 1960s. London was to be their home for the next five

construction industry strike in 1972 meant that work in London became scarce and the boys headed home to Lochgilphead, where they soon negotiated their first contract, building Lochgair Parish Church Hall.

The construction partnership of M&K MacLeod was incorporated in 1975. Murdo and Kenny had experienced the use of timber frame construction while working down south and were certain that use of that method was ideal for the construction of houses in the west coast of Scot-

Timber frame construction remains one of the company's specialities to this day. The original company has, of course, grown and has its subsidiary companies MacLeod Construction Ltd and MacLeod (Riverside)

land.

Ltd.

The history of MacLeods' use of timber frame construction does go back to 1976 when they built their first bungalow using this method at Tullochgorm, near Minard. At around the same

was becoming close to Jane MacNeill, whom he had first met when she was working behind a Lochgilphead bar as a student. They married in 1976 and the Tullochgorm house would be their first as a

married couple. In 1982 Murdo and Kenny negotiated the purchase of Achnaba and Castleton estates from their father's former employer. Sir John Thomson. Murdo and Jane moved there with daughter Mairi in December 1982. The company has

been based at Kilmory Industrial Estate for 39 years and is now the largest private employer in the region. Over the years the company grew, taking on projects across Argyll and the islands and building housing developments, schools, hospitals, ferry terminals, factories and retail premises. Murdo was very

proud to have been appointed one of the youngest presidents of the Mid Argyll Rotary Club in 1989. He enjoyed the friendship and ethos of Rotary. One of Murdo's passions was encouraging young people throughout Argyll and the islands, and he became chair of the Prince's Scottish Youth Business Trust for Argyll the Islands. He was immense-

ly proud at being awarded, in 2010, The Queen's Award for Enterprise Promotion for playing an outstanding role in promoting enterprise skills and attitudes. His visit to Buckingham Palace to be presented to HM The Queen as a result of the award was a highlight of his career. Great pride

Above all, however, Murdo was a family man. Daughters Mairi, Jennifer, Susan and Alison were always a source of great pride for Murdo and Jane, and he was a dad who encouraged - and was never shy of telling others how well the girls were doing in their lives and careers.

He simply adored his three grandchildren, Ailis, Donald and James. It is a great regret that he did not live to meet his second granddaughter Ceit Mairi, born on January 5, 2018.

Ask Murdo's family, however, what the love of his life was and the reply would come back quickly - the sea, fishing and boats, particularly fast boats.

Murdo loved life on the sea and over the years regular visits were made by boat to Northern Ireland, Islay, Iona, Coll, Tiree, Barra. Harris, the Small Isles and the Treshnish Isles. Particular favourites were visits to Iona Abbey and the Puffins on Lunga.

Murdo had many great friends and particularly enjoyed taking them on trips on his boats. He loved his Redbay RIBs, built in Northern Ireland by

his good friend Tom McLaughlin. A highlight on the sea for Murdo was spotting killer whales at the entrance to Arinagour in Coll. A photograph he took of the whales took pride of place in his office.

Another highlight for visitors to Mid Argyll was when Murdo took them out on the RIB to see a dolphin which was living close to a marker buoy off Achnaba.

From his experience of working on the Isle of Tiree as an apprentice joiner Murdo had a yearn to return to the island. He and Jane visited in 2000 and decided to build a home there. Murdo became a familiar sight, cycling around Tiree in his hi-vis jacket. He and Jane made many firm friends on Tiree and became very much part of the island community.

Murdo's love of islands led him to build another house for the family at Kilnaughton on Islay and, again, he enjoyed regular visits to that island.

Murdo loved music and was a great sup-

porter of young musicians and bands. He attended the first and each subsequent Tiree Music Festival making friends, enjoying music and supporting the event organisers. Enjoyed

Angus dedicated a poem to Murdo - Run The Race - the final stanza of which captures the essence of that force of nature that was Murdo MacLeod:

So follow dreams and see the world, and grab life by the throat Don't live by dull convention or your life

will miss the boat. Live for love and friendships' glow and chase ambition's taste We only get one shot

at this – don't let it go to waste.

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Editorial Preparing for the final cut

Remember the gammon slicers that used to sit on the counter in grocery shops?

Over the next few weeks, councillors will be meeting in proverbial smokefilled rooms to decide what should make the final list of budget cuts.

There are plenty of people who don't want to see the Road Safety Unit abolished and still others who object to the closure of most of our public toilets.

This year's round of cuts follows a decade of annual gammon slicing. The meat, however, is getting scarce so every new cut has a proportionately greater impact on staff and the public.

It will come down to the full council in February, when we boldly predict that the administration's budget plans will be rubber-stamped.

But if past form is anything to go by, there will be a pre-prepared rabbit or two to pull out of the hat on the day.

Who knows, the Road Safety Unit might be that very rabbit, chosen to be spared the chop.

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Don't endanger road safety Sir.

I was shocked to learn that Argyll and Bute Council is to consider disbanding its Road Safety Unit as part of budget savings for 2018-2019.

The unit formerly employed three officers, but as part of a savings exercise some years ago has already been reduced to one full-time and one term-time officer.

The proposal is to remove this service completely and the council justifies this by stating that 'road safety information will be available through other organisations'. This suggests to me that they do not understand the complexity of how education and training is delivered.

The proposal also does not say which other organisation has the ability and skills to adequately replace council's current input. Having read Police Scotland and the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service local plans I can find no hint that they are ready to accept responsibility.

I believe the current unit plays an extremely active role in promoting road safety education for all road users across Argyll and Bute, and in particular our schools - today's children are tomorrow's drivers.

Though one death on our roads is one too many, casualty numbers have been steadily declining since 1970s. Indeed, recent reports show that fatal casualties have been reduced to less than one third of their peak in 1969. This shows that current methods are working, and I cannot believe Argyll and Bute Council is willing to put this 'good news' trend at risk.

The council also has a responsibility to play a major role in road casualty reduction as contained in numerous publications, includ-

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ing Scotland's Road Safety Framework to 2020; Ro-SPA National Road Safe-Committee 'Making Road Safety Count'; and the Road Traffic Act 1988 (Section 39)

Whilst I appreciate councillors will have a difficult time deciding on where savings are to be made, I suggest that the small Road Safety Unit should be retained, and the option be removed from the proposed cuts.

Scenic but dangerous A83 Sir.

I used to drive up to Kintyre from the south throughout the 1960s and 1970s for holidays with my parents. Although the Loch Lomond road was more tortuous then, I have no recollection of concern regarding the state of the road, its potential impact on our Sunbeam Rapier (my parent's pride and joy) or, indeed, our safety.

Now, in the 21st century, my first advice for friends visiting me in Tarbert is to take great care on the journev here. As covered in the editorial in the January 5th edition of the Argyllshire Advertiser, the A83 achieved seriously dangerous conditions over the Christmas and New Year period.

For drivers new to the road, it was an anxiety-filled journey and pretty lethal in the dark - at a time of year when there is considerably more night than day

From various parts of the globe, including countries with more extreme conditions and far less wealth than ours, visitors always ask the same question: Why is there no drainage along the road, particularly where vegetation and trees have been removed from adjacent slopes? This surely would help to avoid the

serious deterioration of the surface?

While we spend on trying to attract new residents, businesses and visitors to the area, we ignore the basic access infrastructure at our peril. A scenic journey it might be, but looking at the view is low on anyone's priority while trying to avoid ruts at the side, potholes all over - and very often deep surface water.

Quite apart from the dangers posed by the current approach, the lack of long term strategy resulting in ongoing patchwork solutions surely cannot sit comfortably with government, council or providers?

Public toilets vital for tourism Sir.

Argyll and Bute Council, in its annual exercise of making what it calls its policy savings, lists 32 options to save in excess of £1.8 million.

I was a member of the council for 22 years, and it was always the tactic of the administration to nominate 'unthinkable' options and then withdraw them days before the budget meeting in response to public outrage.

On reviewing the current proposals one which is unthinkable. unacceptable and which would devastate the tourist industry in Argyll and Bute is the proposal to close 36 of the 57 public toilets.



Together with trained community teams, they aim to locate around 2,000 of the prehistoric carvings known in Scotland, and also look for undiscovered rock art. Inveraray History





Speak to your friends, relatives, colleagues and look in local press. These are generally trusted sources for recommendations.

See what The Care Inspectorate, independent regulators of care services in Scotland, says about local facilities. Their website www. careinspectorate.com allows you to search all the services in a town or postcode area. You'll find:

- Service and provider details who, what and where.
- Conditions of Registration opening times and maximum number of children cared for.
- Quality Grades see how a service is performing. Care Inspectors during unannounced visits look at four themes, care and support, environment, staffing, leadership and management.

- Inspections full inspection reports are available.
- Complaints / Enforcements

Armed with the above information, shortlist. You should be offered an information pack that conditions some or all of the following:

- The aim of the nursery
- Background on the nursery
- **Opening times**
- Numbers of children cared for
- Inspection grades
- How they will involve you and your child in the service
- Information on Pre-Birth to Three / Curriculum for Excellence (Scottish Government policy)
- A typical day at the nursery
- Fees and payment terms

You will want to visit possible nurseries. Do not be afraid to take a list of questions on your visit. Similar to viewing a house, you should get a feel about the nursery as soon as you walk in.

Things to consider:

Is the entrance safe and secure?

- Is the entrance area welcoming, with displays of children's work, parent notice boards and staff photographs.
- Are you asked to sign in? The member of staff who shows you around should be knowledgeable and put you at ease.

As part of your visit, you should expect:

- To view all playrooms, regardless of the age of your child.
- To be welcomed by all staff as you enter playrooms and a nice touch is when staff speak to your child, showing their genuine interest.
- Playrooms to be calm, but not quiet - children should be engaged in a variety of learning opportunities including imaginative play, arts and crafts and physical play.
- To view evidence of children's involvement such as art work and photographs.
- The nursery and all resources to be visibly clean.

A LOVE for Scotland's great, rugged grandeur has set a Lochgilphead photographer on the road to success.

He closed with a subtle plug. This autumn a new, as-yet-unnamed, wildlife series BBC will be aired featuring family groups of animals across many different species. John himself filmed a family
