Staff anger over plans to close Aros building

NHS STAFF have slammed plans by health bosses to close Mid Argyll Hospital's Aros building in an attempt to save £150,000.

The plans were laid out during a Health and Social Care Partnership (HSCP) meeting at Argyll and Bute Hospital on Wednesday January 24.

News of the closure comes as the HSCP confirmed a £10.1 million funding shortfall for the year 2018/19. The Argyllshire Ad-

vertiser was approached by disgruntled staff members who attacked the decision, saying it would ruin the identity of the NHS and was not cost-

effective. It is also understood plans to relocate employees to Argyll and

Bosses claim shutdown would save £150,000

will go ahead despite there being no space for 22 of the 83 staff who work in Aros.

One staff member, who wished to remain anonymous, said: 'The HSCP's Integrated Joint Board (IJB) paper refers to 22 members of staff who do not have planned future office space.

'This represents 27 per cent of the total number of staff and realistic costs have not vet been identified for them.

'Without a solution accommodating for the remaining 22 staff, empty property rates relief cannot be applied for and the build-

Bute Council offices ing will continue to attract a rates charge of £40,000 per annum, as well as light and power costs.'

The staff member also commented: 'The NHS identity will be lost when corporate departments move to council premises that are not exclusively for council social care.'

Councillor Dougie Philand echoed staff concerns, saying: 'It is deeply concerning that 22 members of staff have an uncertain future regarding where they are going to be based.

'There must be clear communication to ensure the concerns of staff and the possible implications for the wider community are addressed.'

In a report in November 2017 to the HSCP strategic management team, NHS Highland financial adviser George Morrison said nothing would be saved by closing the building and the cost of relocating staff would be at least £79,000.

Mr Morrison recommended that 'given there is no financial case to close Aros, it would be sensible to invest modestly in the building to enable its continued use in the short term'.

Despite his recommendation, the decision to close Aros was taken by the IJB three weeks later, on November 29.

A spokesperson for the HSCP said: 'This decision will provide an opportunity for support service staff, currently based in the building, to be colocated with colleagues in a number of existing premises in Lochgilphead, and will also allow the HSCP to stop paying for a building which is no longer fit for purpose.

'Senior managers within the HSCP are currently working up the plan to take this forward within a suitable timeframe and will continue to engage with staff to ensure they are kept fully informed.'

HSCP chief officer Christina West attempted to reassure employees, saying they would not be relocated until all plans were complete.

However, IT employees hit back with concerns saying they had never seen 'a project like this completed within the desired timeframe'.

Planners oppose wind farm but communities back development

COUNCILLORS urged to oppose a South Knapdale wind farm with turbines 'almost as tall as the Blackpool Tower' have voted to see the site for themselves.

EDF Energy Renewables (EDF ER) has applied to build Airigh Wind Farm, composed of 14 wind turbines up to 145m tall, in a 'bowl-like' area 8.4km south west of Tarbert.

Argyll and Bute Council has been relegated to the role of consultee, since applications to build onshore power stations generating more than 50MW require the consent of the Scottish Government.

Planning officers are recommending councillors on the Planning,

Protective Services and Licensing committee object to the proposal due to its 'unacceptable, adverse and cumulative' visual impact on Knapdale's landscape, viewed from West Kintyre, Islay, Jura and Gigha. A report presented before the committee last week stated: 'If granted, the development may influence public attitudes to a point where tourists might dissuaded become from visiting due to the proliferation of wind

Tarbert and Skipness Community Trust and Ardrishaig Development Trust have signed a community ownership deal with EDF ER, which would bring in £5,000 per MW per annum, possibly totalling up to £8.82m

She explained: 'The Marine Accident Investigation Branch (MAIB) has a tender out for sonar work to survey the wreck of the Nancy Glen and we hope this will happen quickly.

'The Ministry of Defence has been co-operative and we have already had reasonable quotes from various contractors to do the work.

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Pothole plague prompts record burst tyre callouts

THE potholed roads of **Colin Cameron** Argyll are damaging the vehicles using them – but at least there is hope for Strone Point as plans for repairs are revealed.

So bad is the A83 trunk road that on a single day last week WD Semples garage in Inveraray attended 14 separate vehicles with tyres damaged as a result of hitting potholes.

Garage foreman John Cameron told the Advertiser: 'We cover a 20-mile radius around Inveraray doing work for the AA and RAC and last Tuesday we were called out to 14

cars on the A83 where the tyre walls had been ripped hitting holes in the road. We also had a couple of buckled alloy wheels. That was exceptional, but we're guaranteed two or three call-outs for burst tyres every

day. Trunk road management firm BEAR Scotland is to undertake urgent repairs and resurfacing after additional funds were allocated by Transport Scotland. The firm blames 'ac-

deterioration caused by recent winter weather conditions, where the freeze and thaw cycle has weakened the carriageway' for the crumbling A83. One of the worst stretches is between the Strone Point roadworks and Garron Bridge. Under a revised winter action plan, BEAR Scotland is to resurface the Strone Point section overnight on Sunday February 25 and Monday February 26.

But the A83 is not the only road in Argyll to have pothole problems. The council-managed

B8024 Kilberry road is treacherous in many places, as is the B8000 Kilfinan road on the other side of Loch Fyne. One Kilfinan man, travelling from Inveraray, is reported to have decided to use the Tarbert-Portavadie ferry to avoid using the worst stretches of the road.

Argyll and Bute Council's policy lead for roads Roddy Mc-Cuish said: 'Our teams are working hard to carry out necessary repairs as quickly as possible as part of our ongoing maintenance programme.'

Strone Point overnight road closures for four nights

DRIVERS will face lengthy diversions as the A83 at Strone Point near Inveraray is closed overnight for four nights from Monday February 5.

This is the first of three phases of road closures needed during a £1.6 million, 28week project to realign the road.

The closure, between 9pm and 5am from Monday February 5 for four nights, is needed to allow the use of a long-reach excavator to access higher areas of the slope.

Road users will be diverted via the A819, A85 and the A82.

The next phase of closures is expected to be in the last week of February.



The eventful history of Cairnbaan camp

CAIRNBAAN camp was a fixture in the village for around 50 years.

This postcard shows the camp, perhaps from 1938, and is owned by Archie McAllister, of Lochgilphead.

Archie said: 'I can't be certain of the year but my dad, Archie senior, had it for years.'

Camps of this kind were built by the Ministry of Labour as 'instructional training centres' or labour camps in the 15 years leading up to the Second World War in 1939. After the outbreak of war, many were used as prisoner of war camps, as Cairnbaan was. The Cairnbaan camp

was later used as the Forestry Commission base for the region.

The houses on the site were demolished in the early 1970s and the area is now surrounded by Sitka spruce planted by workers based at the camp.

Forestry Commission Scotland still has a depot in Cairnbaan and new houses have been built in the area since the old camp was demolished.



Free cyber security workshops coming soon


AS THE digital world grows, so too does its impact on business.

As a result, the need for online security becomes an even greater priority for every organisation, large and small. It is a common misconception that some businesses are too small to be attacked.

A 2017 UK government survey found that more than a third of firms with between two and nine employees had experienced a cyber security breach or attack.

In 2015 a Scottish hairdressing business was hacked, resulting in a loss of all their appointment data.

Business Gateway can also offer advice to those not able to come along to a workshop. It might sound obvious, but making sure that all of your software is up to date is vital because updates include the latest security patches from the developer.

Changing your passwords regularly is also important. Instead of using a simple word or number sequence you should create a passphrase by joining three or four unrelated words to form a long single word. You should also include some numbers too to make it harder to guess. Another option is to use password manager software which creates passwords for you and adds another layer of security.

Being aware of the signs of phishing emails is crucial. If the sender's email address looks odd, the content is full of spelling mis-

takes, or it is very impersonal, then chances are it could be from a suspicious source. Another trick scammers use to try and make their emails look credible is by using the logos of well-known brands.

If an email asks you to click on a link to provide your bank details or other personal information then your alarm bells should be ringing. Securing your customers' data is essential. You should take the time to review individual areas of your business that are customer facing. Are your point of sale stations secure? Are you encrypting customer data? If you take online

payments, is payment card data secure?

New regulations on data protection will come into force on May 25, and you should be aware of how they will impact your business. The new General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) raises the standards of how data is obtained and how it is stored so if you haven't already looked into this, you should start now.

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Farming on the edge but what are the advantages?

'Perhaps we need to sort out the supply chain'

IT WAS a question that echoed the thoughts of every farmer and crofter in the room.

er.co.uk

Argyll is often perceived to have many disadvantages compared to other parts of Scotland and the UK, but what are our farming advantages and how do we make the most of them?

The panellists at an NFU Scotland 'question time' during last month's Argyll and the Islands regional AGM in Tarbert came from a range of different backgrounds.

But the answers they came up with boiled down to three main themes: collaboration, marketing and the environment.

First to tackle the question – posed by regional NFUS chairman John Dickson – was retail market consultant Marion MacCormick, originally from Oban. The former Aldi fresh meat marketeer told the farmers present: 'I am no farming expert but what I do know about is taking product to market.

'There is an interest in Scottish food, and in the provenance of Argyll food and the story you have to tell.' Marion continued:

'Perhaps we need to sort out the supply chain where there are complaints that money is not reaching primary producers. 'There are opportu-

nities, and if self-interest could be put to one side and the story was told better, we could do a good job of marketing Scottish lamb.'

Next to offer his thoughts was NFUS president Andrew Mc-Cornick.

'We need to be supplying the market with what it wants, not simply producing a commodity and hoping someone will buy it,' he said.

"We also need to get the supply chain working, maybe through some form of collaboration."

He stressed Argyll's environmental advantages, telling members: 'You guys are environmentalists. We need to sell that, and what we are doing for climate change' Self-employed farming consultant Alison Milne, from Fife, focused on the big picture. She talked about the value of community and sense of place.

'At the moment, we are valued based on our economic output, but if you take into account our environmental and social output, we are hugely beneficial to the rest of the Scottish economy.'

John Sleigh of *Farmers' Journal Scotland*, commented: 'Farmers around here produce food where nothing else could be produced. This should be uppermost in folks' minds when they are buying food and want to save the planet.'

He stressed the need to achieve a premium for this through effective marketing. 'We need to tell peo-

we need to tell people, for example, how much carbon is sequestered by your hill lamb in relation to lamb imported from New Zealand. When I pick up my pack of lamb I want to see saturated fat and salt levels but also carbon rating. You guys, with your lovely grass and lack of inputs, are top of the tree when it comes to saving the planet.

'You probably won't get more from the market by telling folk you deserve it. You're probably going to do something for it, which will be saving the planet.

'You're just going to have to get better at telling folk how it happens.'

By Eve Maxwell CALUM Huggan captivated the audience with his marimba playing in Ardrishaig Public Hall.

The afternoon of Saturday January 20 started on a lively note with a piece by the name of Libertango by composer Astor Piazzolla. The music was a frenzy of Argentine sounds that whipped the audience into a whirlwind, and was followed by variations on Dowland's Lachrimae Pavanna - originally a work for lute.

The marimba imitated the sound of a Renaissance lute and Calum's playing was greeted with murmurs of approval from the audience members.

Just before the interval we were left with a piece of music written for marimbist Momoko Kamiya by Takatsugu Muramatsu, its title Land. This piece was my personal favourite and Calum told us that it reminded him of the Isle of Skye, a place he calls home, and the undulating sound of the exotic marimba seemed to convey the impression of Scottish hills.

Impromptu

As we all sat down after the interval again we were given an impromptu pop quiz which was comedic but informative, and in Calum's words the audience received 'top marks'.

He then performed



Europe's cuddly bears

WITH their distinctive black and white furry coats, giant pandas are adorable.

No wonder the World Wildlife Fund adopted them as its symbol. Giant pandas belong to the bear family (Ursidae), but while all other bears are carnivores, pandas eat virtually nothing but bamboo. This diet restricts them to the high forests of central China, where bamboo is abundant, and means that globally they are the rarest and most vulnerable bear species. So how and where did this extraordinary bear evolve?

Fossils eight million years old from China suggest that pandas have lived there since their evolutionary split from other bears, and estimates suggest that the modern giant pan-

das we know and love evolved in China about two million years ago. Yet radiocarbon dating of recent fossil finds indicates a geographically much wider evolutionary history.

In 2012, teeth from a giant panda ancestor dating from 11.6 million years ago were uncovered in Spain, and now scientists have found teeth from another early giant panda that lived in the region of modern-day Hungary some 10 million years ago. From the shape and wear patterns of the teeth, scientists established that these ancient bears were herbivores, just like modern-day pandas.

Since the European fossils pre-date the Chinese ones by two to three million years, they cast doubt on

the second and third movements of Caritas, a piece by Solemn and Majestic by M Burritt, the second movement of which was sweeping and swelling with emotional sounds while the third movement came straight out of a music box.

The second last piece was E Sejourne's Nan*cy*, a sombre and sweet piece of music that stayed so quiet that the audience was almost afraid to breathe.

The afternoon was finished with Dr Gradus ad Parnassum by C Debussy and the music was arranged for marimba by Calum Huggan himself.

The piece comes from a collection of six playful piano min-



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Construction industry unites to reduce unnecessary costs caused by disputes

Six leading institutions, and two of the UK's biggest employers, have launched the Conflict Avoidance Pledge, aiming to put an end to the number of disputes in construction and engineering.

The pledge, created by the Conflict Avoidance Coalition Steering Group - who work to help the industry reduce the costs of conflict, and ensure maior infrastructure and property developments are delivered on time and budget - is a voluntary commitment self-assessment open to any organisation or firm regardless of size or location.

The pledge

The pledge is the focal point of a wider campaign, set out by the steering group to drive behaviour change in the way relationships and disputes are managed throughout the construction and engineering sector.

The ambitions of the steering group are to reduce financial and other costs associated with disputes. This involves promoting cooperation between contracting parties; and helping people and organisations to understand and use conflict management measures, which will ensure projects are delivered on time and on budget.

Over 50 industry bodies have signed the pledge, with a key ambition of the steering group to encourage more organisations to join the coalition.

Benefits

Moving forward, the steering group is developing guidance and toolkits which will inform organisations about the value of conflict avoidance and early intervention techniques, and how to access and use them. These toolkits will be available to all signatories of the Conflict Avoidance Pledge.





He still enchants us with his airborne elegance and then sits comfortably at the top of the tree and watches.

Egrets are not common in Scotland and are usually southern winter visitors.

How fortunate we are in this beautiful part of the world to have such a variety of nature around us.

Argyll is a nature lovers' paradise and is enjoyed by many photographers and artists.

We were in Glasgow last weekend and enjoyed a lovely time at the theatre, catching up with friends and family, and eating out.

We stayed in a city centre hotel which was very handy and most comfortable.




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New sponsor unveiled for Balliemore Cup
