THE BOSS OF Scottish Canals has launched a scathing attack on what he called the 'negative attitude' and 'closed mindset' of Ardrishaig community council.

The blistering remarks were made in a bracing face-to-face exchange between the community council and Scottish Canals chairman Andrew Thin

Mr Thin was defending Scottish Canals record over a planned £1 million development of Ardrishaig and Crinan as the 'sailor's gateway to Scotland'.

At the meeting on Tuesday night, community councillors heard that Scottish Canals was no longer in a position to undertake the development.

However. Andrew Thin went on to issue a stinging rebuke to the community council, saying it would need

He said he would only be able to attract investment to the area if the community council entered into the discussions with an 'open mind'.

He stated on numerous occasions that Scottish Canals would be happy to consider any development as long as it also came with a 'pot of money'.

Grilling NHS Highland directors, Holyrood's public audit committee claimed health board chairman Gary Coults, chief executive Elaine Mead, finance director Nick Kenton and internal auditor Chris Brown gave 'fudgy' answers when responding to questions.

The NHS Highland team members said they were not complacent in managing the £750 million budget

and that the government bail-out was an exception. The committee heard

there was no 'plan B' if the government had refused additional funds. Chief executive

Elaine Mead admitted that the £2.5 million shortfall would have led to the cancellation of operations.

WHEN the big boss comes from the city to talk to a community described as 'bursting' to get involved it is not the best tact to enter into battle.

But that's what happened at Ardrishaig this week when the head of Scottish Canals met members of the village community council.

Bluntness can often be misconstrued as rudeness and it jars against the progress being made in empowering local communities.

Local communities can change things – look at the long list of various projects and ideas that exist in Mid Argyll. Projects such as the community gathering, MAMA Festival, football teams, chamber of commerce, Lochgilphead Phoenix Project and the Dochas centre. All initiated by the community - interested individuals who have taken on ideas and delivered.

Why on earth would anyone want to stop or limit willing volunteers working on a major project? Berating a group of volunteers to change their tone and mindset in order to move on in their work was probably not the best piece of community empowerment seen in the west. When this comes from someone, a leading figure from a national organisation, on a first meeting, when he has no prior communication with the group, it is, quite simply, bizarre.

People who live in this area should be allowed to take responsibility. The Crinan canal has been in the area for 200 years and the people who live around it and see it every day will be the ones who can make it work.

Community council members want to engage. For the past six years they have been trying to do something about the state of their village.

A series of meetings and consultations has led to nothing. How many times do people complain that folks just don't want to get involved or be part of a community? It seems counter intuitive to antagonise the very people who want to work with any organisation, especially when trying to get the best from them.

Castle Toward closing date not set for 'backwater' comments

'Since the community buy-out was first proposed the council has looked hard for ways to say yes'

A FINAL date to sell Castle Toward in Cowal to the community or ary 31 for the commuremarket it has not been set, says Argyll and Bute council.

Despite negotiations between the local authority and South Cowal Community Decevlopment Company (SC-CDC) agreement cannot be reached on a price for the building.

Campaigners claim the council is not listening to them but the council said at its full council meeting last week the group could have as long as it wants 'within reason' to come up with a bid.

Argyll and Bute MSP Michael Russell has met with Alex Neil cabinet secre-MSP tary for communities, who has since written to the council asking it

to extend the right-tobuy deadline of Janunity group to purchase the former outdoor education building - which was closed in 2010 - and estate.

Mr Russell said: 'I met with Alex Neil to discuss the Castle Toward buyout after having a detailed conversation last week about the same issue with the deputy first minister John

Swinney. 'In addition Mr Neil is contacting Highlands and Islands Enterprise to ask if there is any more that it can do to help.'

Mr Russell said he was to work with local government Minister Marco Biagi to devise amendments to the Community Empowerment Bill which would specifically assist community or-

The Scottish government will decide later this year whether to reintroduce beavers to Scotland, after receiving the results of a number of studies, including the five-year Scottish Beaver trial in Knapdale, Argyll.

The report was produced by the Beaver Salmonid Working Group (BSWG), which is made up of fish biology specialists, fishery, wildlife and river management representatives. The report was prepared for the National Species Reintroduction Forum (NSRF).

although further research was required, any successful reintroduction would depend on a management plan.

It said beavers may affect salmon and trout positively by, for example, increasing the number of invertebrates available for fish to feed on, as well as increasing the variety of habitat for fish, including areas for rearing, over wintering and avoiding fast flows. However, negative impacts may include beaver dams sometimes limiting salmon and trout moving

along waterways and the loss of

valuable spawning habitat.

and advice, said: 'We're grateful to the BSWG for this comprehensive and useful report, and we'll examine their recommendations carefully.

BSWG chair, Roger Wheater, added: 'Our report has indicated that if beavers are to be reintroduced, clear and unequivocal management plans are needed.

'Without such plans, any possible benefits to salmonids from beavers may not be realised. Further research and monitoring of wild beavers will be essential as an aid to further planned releases and their management.'



Hebridean sightings soar for harbour porpoises but plunge for basking sharks

HARBOUR porpoise sity officer at Hebridesightings off Scotland's west coast increased by 25 per cent in 2014 compared to the previous year while sightings of basking sharks unexpectedly fell by 33 per western seas - and allow cent, during marine research expeditions carried out by Hebridean Whale and Dolphin Trust.

The charity's research also revealed dramatic evidence of a shark attack on a member of an endangered group of killer whales thought to be the UK's only resident population of orca.

The latest studies were carried out in a research season lasting from May to October last year, and form part of the trust's unique long-term monitoring of whales, dolphins and porpoises collectively known as cetaceans - in the Hebrides. The surveys also collect data on basking sharks

an Whale and Dolphin Trust, said: 'Our findings add to knowledge about cetacean distribution, abundance and habitat use in Scotland's us to make informed recommendations to protect these remarkable species.

'This pioneering research is vital for effectively conserving the world-class biodiversity of these waters – and for securing the long-term future of spectacular cetaceans and iconic basking sharks.³

Porpoises

The trust's teams of marine scientists and volunteers encountered 574 groups of harbour porpoises during 2014 – a 25 per cent increase in the rate of sightings compared to 2013.

Reasons for this increased sighting rate of up to eight groups per 100 kilometres surveyed

cive weather and calm seas, making the unobtrusive porpoise easier to detect.

Hebridean Whale and Dolphin Trust has previously discovered that the Hebrides hosts one of Europe's highest densities of the harbour porpoise, the UK's smallest cetacean - but Scotland still has no protected area for this species as required under European Union directives.

Basking shark sightings fell by 33 per cent from the previous year to 16 encounters showing a trend of decreasing sightings of the world's second biggest fish in the area over recent years.

This does not necessarily indicate a reduction in population size – as possible explanations include a shift further offshore in the distribution of plankton, the sharks' favourite food. The distribution of

water will also dictate where basking sharks are feeding - which means they may still be present, but not feeding at the surface.

Notable highlights during 2014 included two separate encounters with what is believed to be the UK's only known resident population of killer whales - five males and four females known as the West Coast Community. This small, isolated population of orca has never produced offspring since studies began, raising fears that it faces imminent extinction. Evidence of drama emerged when one of the group's males - known as John Coe – was observed with a large area of his tail fluke missing. Consultations with experts sugof its head - a stark reminder of people's impact on the marine environment. The crew was unable to disentangle the whale.

Cetacean entanglement in fishing gear and litter can cause mobility problems, injury and even slow and agonising death. Other human activities causing increasing stress on cetaceans and basking sharks include fisheries bycatch, climate change, pollution, underwater noise and habitat damage.

Silurian - previously used in the filming of the BBC's The Blue Planet series - covered more than 4,500 nautical miles during 2014, equivalent to crossing the North Atlantic three times. It surveyed to the Saint Kilda archipelago - the remotest inhabited part of the British Isles - twice, rounded the Mull of Kintyre to the south and reached Cape Wrath, mainland Britain's most north westerly point.

In total, the surveys recorded more than 1,400 encounters with cetaceans and basking sharks, and recorded almost 600 hours of underwater acoustic detections of cetaceans.

Surveying

Good weather conditions for surveying allowed twice as many photo identification opportunities than in 2013. This technique allows individual cetaceans or basking sharks to be identified by their distinctive markings, often shedding new light on population sizes and social dynamics, and whether individuals in-

teract with other populations. The latest results are currently being analysed.

The annual surveys depend on paying volunteers. In 2014, 65 volunteers clocked up 760 survey hours - working with scientists on visual surveys and acoustic monitoring with underwater microphones or hvdrophones, and identifying individual cetaceans through photography.

Western Scotland's seas are one of Europe's most important habitats for cetaceans and one of the UK's most biologically productive areas. So far 24 of the world's 83 cetacean species have been recorded in the region, many being national and international conservation priority species.

Another outstanding close encounter featured minke whales riding in the bow-wave of the trust's research yacht Silurian. This was unexpected as minkes are usually elusive and shy of boats.

In July, an individual minke approached Silurian with what appeared to be blue plastic strapping wrapped round and
