Police probe hoax 999 call

Baby Corrin meets 'miracle dad'

EXACTLY four weeks after being plunged 50 metres underwater and spending one week in intensive care, Tarbert fisherman Sean Taylor and his partner Natasha MacNaughton have been blessed with a baby girl.

Born on February 3, 12 days overdue, Corrin Taylor-MacNaughton met her 'miracle' dad at 8.51pm, weighing seven pounds, seven ounces. Although Natasha thought the baby would come early Corrin held on until her

dad was fit before entering the world at the Royal Alexandria Hospital in Paisley on her grandmother MacNaughton's birthday.

'I thought she'd be early and people thought the shock of the accident would have brought on the labour but the way she held on until all the trauma was over; it's just a miracle.'

Speaking of the arrival of Corrin, Sean said: 'It's great and I am just so grateful to Mark

Extra £3m for roads

Council receives boost to repair crumbling carriageways

ARGYLL'S crumbling roads network has received an extra £3million.

The welcome cash injection, approved by the council at last week's budget meeting, should please Mid Argyll drivers who contacted the *Advertiser* expressing displeasure at the state of the area's roads.

After the harshest winter in more than 100 years, highways workers have been busy since October - their earliest start date ever - to treat roads.

Last year £4.2 million was spent on Argyll's roads. The next financial year's capital budget will be £7.1 million.

The financial boost will not only secure in-house employment but will make a significant difference to main routes and rural roads, according to the council's executive director of development and infrastructure, Sandy Mactaggart.

Mr Mactaggart said: 'The

spend last year was recognised as making a visible impact upon areas where the works were carried out.'

He continued: 'Alongside day-to-day maintenance of roads, we will be able to make permanent repairs to our high-speed network to ensure our roads network is safe.'

'Through careful planning, and in consultation with councillors through local committees, we will be able to prioritise our programme of works to make the biggest impact we can with our budget.'

The council has come under fire in recent weeks from Mid Argyll drivers, who are angry at the condition of the area's roads.

Council budget decisions made At a glance

ARGYLL and Bute Council has cut £55 million from its spending in one of its nastiest budget meetings ever.

The decision will see the loss of 494 posts, cuts in funding to homeless and recycling services and a rise in service charges as the cash strapped council tries to balance its books.

'I've been at hostile meetings before but the atmosphere was terrible.

Within Argyll and Bute Council the atmosphere is not healthy; it is way too political,' said Councillor Donald Kelly of the Argyll First members.

Amendments were put forward but these fell and none of the opposition councillors voted for the budget.

'And there is a disproportionate amount of cuts in the Mid Argyll, Kintyre and Islay area; we're suffering

more than others,' he added. The budget was, he believes, a worse case scenario.

'We still don't know what final amount of money Argyll and Bute has. We have still not yet had the full and final settlement from the Scottish Government or potential extra cash from CoSLa.'

Council Leader Dick Walsh said:

'Our budget is about so much more than the way in which the council spends its money. It is more about our people, their services and how any change impacts on their quality of life. 'Argyll and Bute Council, with no fault on its part, has a double whammy inflicted upon it through what has been referred to by civil servants as 'unintended consequences'.

THERE has been a mixed reaction to the budget in Mid Argyll.

Councillors voted to half funding for swimming lessons, with Mid Argyll Community Swimming Pool losing out on £8,000 for the year ahead.

But the pool's business development manager Eilidh Bartlet is keen to quash rumours that the cut in funding

would close the pool. She said: 'Rumours are circulating that the pool may have to close. This is not the case, although serious financial restructuring will have to be made to protect the current level of service. The pool remains saddened the council

has taken the decision to cut its budget, when it provides such a vital lifeline to the future well-being and safety of the area's children.'

Meanwhile community councillors in Lochgilphead and Tarbert are thanking Argyll and Bute Councillors

for their hard work in ensuring their libraries remain open.

Argyll and Bute councillors voted against the proposed closure of both libraries, which would have saved £33,300 a year. Kintyre and the Islands councillor Anne Horn broke the good news to members

of Tarbert and Skipness Community Council. She said: 'It's very good news.'

Jenny Carlile, chair of Tarbert Community Council, said: 'Thank you to everyone who worked so hard to ensure we kept our library.'

Robert Miller, vice convenor of Lochgilphead Community Council, said: 'I think all in all this is very good news.'

□ Council tax remains unchanged; Band D properties pay £1,178.

□ Rises across the board for fees and charges for council services by four per cent; the equivalent of 6.5 per cent where VAT is included.

□ Cut backs in travel, subsistence and the hiring of venues for meetings by council employees.

□ Councillors to cut back on travel and venue hire.

□ Use of consultants and advertising will be slashed.

□ Council hospitality will be cut.

□ Drop in wages for cleaners, caterers and janitors as they are moved from year-round to term-time only contracts.

□ All school dinners will go up by 15 pence a day.

□ Funds cut by half for swimming lessons and transport to sports activities.

□ Libraries in Tarbert, Cardross, Roseneath and Lochgilphead are saved but the library van in Lorn is to go.

□ Speech and language therapy funds to be halved.

□ Adult literacy and numeracy service has been saved.

□ Citizens' Advice Bureau's £60,000 grant stays.

□ Music tuition is safe, no cuts to be made.

□ School attendance officers stay.

□ Public loos: the 11 planned closures will not take place.

Continued from page one. and Daz, my skipper and crewmate, for what they did that day as I would not have been here to meet Corrin otherwise.'

He added: 'We all believe that it was people's prayers that made things turn out so well so we want to thank everyone again. It is amazing that people all over the world were thinking of us and had us in their prayers.'

Matthew Ramsay, Auxiliary Superintendent of the Fisherman's Association, provided support to Sean's family and a heavily pregnant Natasha when he was in hospital.

Meeting Corrin on Wednesday he said: 'It was the mission chaplain that called to tell me of Sean's accident and it looked like it was going to be a counselling job but it's turned out to be a very happy occasion.'

Looking to the future Sean, who returned to working full time on the Blue Angel fishing boat on Monday, says his biggest worry now will be 'juggling sleepless nights with long days working on the boat'.

Crinan resident, Tim Headley, contacted the *Advertiser*, concerned at the amount of time holes were being left unfilled.

Mr Headley said: 'The Crinan road is full of potholes. They're not being filled quickly enough and when they are it's a hurried job; tar is just being thrown into water-logged holes. The job needs to be done right in the first place.'

Ardfern resident, Lizzie MacVean, buckled her wheel going through a pothole on her way to work in Crinan.

Damaged

She said: 'It's really rough going. The wheel rim is now damaged so that's a new alloy and tyre. I'm now left with paperwork to see if I can make a claim against the council.'

A spokeswoman for Argyll and Bute Council said people could make a claim but 'it has to be proven that the council has been negligent, i.e. a claim will only be upheld if the council did not adhere to timescales set out in the Asset Management Plan, particularly with respect to inspection and reaction times'.

New weapon in fight to beat potholes

THERE could soon be a new weapon in the fight to beat potholes: a mobile phone application.

Mid Argyll Kintyre and Islands Area Committee heard from Julian Green, technical officer with the council, who explained the local authority was watching with interest plans by another local authority in Scotland to develop the mobile phone application that would enable anyone reporting a pothole or fault to give the exact location and send a photograph. 'People call us and say, for example, the Kilberry road is in a mess, but we need them to be more specific,' he said.

Search for missing woman

POLICE officers in Lochgilphead launched a search operation after a woman was reported missing from Argyll and Bute Hospital.

Hospital staff reported the 60-year-old patient missing at 11am on Saturday morning but the woman returned to the hospital a few hours later.

Sailor removed from harbour

POLICE officers were called to help Tarbert Harbour Authority remove a man and his yacht from the harbour on Monday.

The man, who had his boat docked in the harbour for the last two months, was refusing to leave when police officers attended. The man, who is not from Argyll, was asked to leave the harbour for anti-social behaviour.

AN ARDRISHAIG man has been arrested for an alleged breach of the peace after police officers were called to a disturbance in Knapdale Terrace in the village.

The man, aged 22, was found shouting and swearing when police attended the scene at 10pm on Friday.

'Crash' drives home safety message

THE CONSEQUENCES of losing concentration whilst driving will be on show in Mid Argyll as Strathclyde Fire and Rescue stage a realistic car crash.

A team of firefighters will be at Lochgilphead Joint Campus next Friday (February 25) to show how the emergency services respond to

a car crash. The real time scenario shows the emergency services working together to assess the situation, arrest the driver of one car, cut out the trapped person and remove the fatality from the wreckage. The event aims to make people stop and think about their driving, hopefully reducing the

amount of collisions and fatalities on Argyll and Bute's roads. Strathclyde Fire and Rescue's educational team will also be at the event doing short presentations on road safety and answering questions. The crash scenario is the sixth staged road traffic collision carried out in Argyll and Bute.

Electric van to come to Lochgilphead

AN ELECTRIC van will stop in Lochgilphead on Tuesday (February 22) as part of a two-day roadshow being run by ALIenergy.

Here We Are set to exhibit in Glasgow

AN EXHIBITION depicting the village of Cairndow over the years is to be displayed in the Kelvingrove Art Gallery and Museum.

Our Houses: Their Stories is a biography of the 107 houses of Cairndow and was created by Here We Are.

Here We Are's resource centre sits at the head of Loch Fyne. It is run by the community and is a development trust and social enterprise.

The exhibition starts tomorrow, Saturday, and will run in the Kelvingrove Gallery in Glasgow until April 2.

Christina Noble, director at Here We Are, said: 'We hope the Our Houses: Their Stories project will be a model for other villages in Scotland. While the work has been time-consuming and sometimes laborious, it is clear that as the bits and pieces come

together, suddenly there is a floodlight of excitement and something significant and alive emerges.'

Over the years, Here We Are has amassed a photo gallery of people who lived in Cairndow's houses. Out of this came the idea for a major two-year project combining oral, visual, manuscript and survey sources, Our Houses: Their Stories, which received a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund.

Wonderful

Colin McLean, Head of the Heritage Lottery Fund in Scotland, said: 'Cairndow has a wonderful resource which not only safeguards the personal histories of the houses which make up the village but also provides a platform for learning about the influences which have shaped the community over time.'

Fears for future of Mid Argyll choir

Publicised

The choir publicised the need for a new music instructor at the start of the year, following

the retirement of conductor Fiona Munro. Mrs Ferguson said: 'We're very disappointed that no-one has come forward since we made our appeal public in January.'

'There's a few young girls interested in joining the choir but we can't take anyone else on until we know the future of the group is secure.'

She added: 'Without a conductor this choir wouldn't exist.'

Coisir Og Dhail Riata is

made up of S1-6 girls and has won a cache of trophies since its early beginnings in 2000.

Highest

At last year's National Mod in Caithness the choir took home the highest aggregate in music and they consistently gain very high marks in all competitions.

This year the group will not attend the National Mod, due to take place in Stornoway, because they have not been able to begin rehearsals.

'It's not essential that a music tutor has Gaelic,' explained Mrs Ferguson. 'That might put people off thinking they need to speak the language. We have a Gaelic tutor, Christine Johnson who will continue in her role,' she added.



Housing boss hits back

ARGYLL Community Housing's Chief Executive has responded to comments made by some Ardrishaig community councillors over the need for more affordable housing in the village.

Alastair MacGregor, chief executive of ACHA, said it was 'with more than a little disappointment' he felt the need to respond to comments made by unnamed community councillors' in last week's *Argyllshire Advertiser*.

The paper reported on the submission of a planning application which could see up to 50 new homes, including affordable flats, built on land above Kilduskland Road. Community councillors questioned the need for more affordable housing in the village as well as raising concerns over the planning application, submitted by Lochgilphead firm MacLeod Construction Ltd.

Speaking of the remarks, Mr MacGregor, said: 'The comment that 'affordable housing brings with it ASBOs' is an inaccurate

generalisation, which is not borne out by fact. The association currently has two ASBOs applying to our 5,100 tenancies, none in Ardrishaig. I think any objective reader would hardly categorise that as an ASBO problem in affordable housing in Argyll.'

Answering whether there was a need for affordable housing in Ardrishaig, Mr MacGregor said there are currently 268 people waiting for a house in the village.

Long-standing community councillor Ian Macintyre contacted the *Advertiser* to stress the need for affordable housing in Tarbert.

Mr Macintyre, who has long campaigned for more affordable homes in the village, said: 'Bring the houses to Tarbert.'

'There are dozens of young families looking for homes - we're talking about the future sustainability of the village.'

While there will always be a place for community councils to offer representative opinion on matters of community interest such as planning, there is no justification in any shape or form for general unwarranted attacks on residents of affordable housing.

Finally could I thank those members of the community who have been in touch with the Association to disassociate themselves from the Community Councillors' remarks.

(NSSE with Developers Scheme) 2011-12. On January 19, the Scottish Government launched a call for bids for NSSE with Developers Scheme for 2011/12.

Many people will have heard of Rural Home Ownership Grants (RHOGs). These are grants that help towards the costs of acquiring, building or renovating a home for people in rural areas who could not otherwise afford to buy. Further informa-

tion is available in a brochure.

Some parts of rural Scotland have limited opportunities for local people to buy or build their own homes. This can be due to the higher building costs in rural areas; the lack of suitable land for building; existing housing being in the wrong place or high property prices. ples or singles. The Open Market Shared Equity scheme allows people on low to moderate incomes to buy homes that are for sale on the open market. The scheme has been helping to support the housing market during the difficult economic climate. The scheme is currently only accepting application forms from social renters,

people in the armed forces and veterans who have left the armed forces within the past year, and widows, widowers and other partners of service personnel.

REMEMBER, when you buy a house, you don't just buy a house! You have to buy all kinds of services. These include solicitor's fees, arrange-

ment fees for your mortgage, valuation and survey; Local Authority searches; moving costs; insurance and stamp duty. But in last year's budget, the government said that if your property costs under £250,000, you complete before March 25, 2012 and match the government's definition of a first-time buyer you will not have to pay any stamp duty.



to represent your fellow farmers and I am deeply honoured.'

Allan Bowie and John Picken, both from Fife, were elected vice presidents at the union's AGM, held on Tuesday.

The men were appointed their roles by members of NFU Scotland's council, made up of representatives of each of the union's 71 branches.

Cash boost for farm to plate project

PRIMARY School children across Scotland are to learn about the connection between food and farming after the Scottish Government pledged £40,000 to the farm to plate project.

Launched by the Royal Highland Education Trust (RHET), the project will feature school visits to ten specially developed food and farming events.



INVERARAY

History society meeting

INVERARAY and District Local History Society returned to its usual meeting place in the Nicoll Hall on February 1, after the frozen pipe problem had been resolved.

A small but appreciative audience gathered to hear a talk by the group's treasurer, Colin Stevenson on *The Highland Tours of Boswell and Johnson*.

Samuel Johnson, always known as Dr Johnson and famed for his English dictionary, had a considerable dislike for Scotland and Scots, but nonetheless a fascination for the Highlands. To facilitate a visit, he enlisted his younger friend and admirer, the lawyer heir to the Ayrshire estate of Auchinleck, James Boswell.

Using extracts from the journals of both travellers, Colin described how in the second half of 1773 they went up the east coast, across to the west, and via Skye and Mull south into Argyll, with a stop at Inveraray.

Boswell had offended the Duchess of Argyll by his participation in the 'Douglas Cause', a protracted legal battle involving her family, but the Duke was very welcoming to the pair, having them to dinner and providing a decent horse for the remainder of the journey.

The two books provide different, but equally informative accounts of the lives of people at the time, still affected by the '45. The vote of thanks was moved by Jack Dunnigan.

Rowing interest sought

A FORMER international rower hopes to raise the profile of the sport in Argyll by forming a new club in the area.

Elaine Morrison, who com-

peted for Scotland and won British Championship medals, is now a qualified coach.
