

Project tackles impact of excessive drinking

A SURVEY asking Mid the organisation behind Argyll people about their experiences with alcohol has this week been published as part of a project that aims to identify alcohol-related harm in the area.

The pioneering project, which tasks communities with fighting the negative impact alcohol has on their area, is a part of the Community Action Lochgilphead Ardrishaig (CALA) programme.

The survey, which is to be completed anonymously, asks people about their drinking habits, what harm alcohol creates in their community and the places alcohol is sold.

Available on Argyll and Bute Council's website, the survey addresses violence caused by alcohol, the cost to the NHS of treating people with alcohol-related illnesses and the impact alcohol has on family life.

Explaining the survey is open to people over 18, Caroline Church, national communities project officer, with Alcohol Focus Scotland,

the project, said: 'This is not targeted at specific groups, not people who abuse alcohol or those considered to be alcoholics, or young people but the whole population; evidence suggests that we are all drinking too much so this survey and project is applicable

Concerns

Explaining the aim of CALA is to get members of the public to lead alcohol-related projects in their area, Caroline said the results of the survey would be analysed and handed back to the community to identify priority concerns.

'It is at this stage we will be tasking locals to lead the project and come up with solutions to these alcohol-related problems that they have highlighted,' Caroline added.

Reassuring locals Lochgilphead and Ardrishaig are not 'any worse than any other place in the county' Caroline said the communities had been picked for the pilot because the population of the area fitted the criteria of the semi-rural communi-

The programme, which allows drug users to exchange used or 'dirty' needles for clean needles, will be delivered by Lloyds Pharmacy on Argyll Street on behalf of the local health authority.

The needle exchange, which will offer drug users information and advice about injecting drugs, is to be implemented as Scotland sees a rise in blood borne infections and viruses such as hepatitis C.

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Hospital to get new cancer treatment unit

A NEW unit dedicated to delivering treatments for cancer patients is to be built within Mid Argyll Community Hospital.

The unit, part funded by charitable donations from Mid Argyll organisations, will create a comfortable space for local people to receive treatments including chemotherapy.

A space within Glenaray Ward in the hospital has been identified to house the new unit and plans are well underway for the refurbishment work to start soon.

Dr Rebecca Helliwell said the new unit would be a comfortable haven within the hospital, away from hustle, bustle and noise of a busy integrated care centre.

Explaining cancer patients are currently treated in close proximity to patients with acute illnesses, Dr Helliwell said the unit would also minimise the risk of infection for cancer patients, who often have a weak immune system.

Highlighting the role of locals in funding the new unit, Dr Helliwell said the money had helped the hospital secure additional grants.

'We continue to be very appreciative of the enthusiastic public support and fundraising from the public. To date a fantastic sum has been raised by the local community and donated,' Dr Helliwell said.

The new unit is another coup for the Lochgilphead hospital which last year was granted permission to deliver chemotherapy treatments.

Whilst the hospital is still waiting for its first referral from the Beatson Oncology Centre in Glasgow, staff at the hospital remain hopeful that a referral

Dr Helliwell said: 'We have developed our service in collaboration with our consultant colleagues in the Beatson Oncology Centre and are continuing to work with them to encourage use of our service, although it has been rather disappointing to wait so long for our first referral.'

But explaining cancer patients are still receive a range of therapies at the Mid Argyll hospital, Dr Helliwell said: 'Each Thursday we deliver a number of cancer supportive treatments to patients from Mid Argyll, medications prescribed by the consultant oncologists for continued cancer treatment.'

It is hoped the new unit, which is also funded by Macmillan Cancer Support, will be up and running in the near

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Knapdale project under threat

Calls to abandon beaver trial

CALLS to abandon the mediately. Knapdale Beaver Trial were made last week after the Scottish Government said it would monitor escaped beavers along the River Tay.

The government announcement, made last Friday, comes after beavers were found wreaking havoc along the River Tay in Fife, after being released by, or having escaped from private owners.

The decision to monitor the activities of the River Tay beavers came on the same day as the Knapdale Beaver Trial held a stakeholder meeting, raising questions about the need for the local project.

At the meeting, held to update locals on the progress of the trial, local businesswoman Jane Allan said the trial should be stopped im-

'Beavers have already been introduced to Scotland and this Knapdale trial is a complete waste of time and money,' Mrs Allan said. 'All this trial shows is that beavers chop down trees and eat vegetation; we knew all that already.'

But scientists conducting the Knapdale trial say their research is completely different to that about to get under way on the River Tay.

Monitors

Simon Jones, project manager of the Scottish Beaver Trial, said the Knapdale trial monitors beavers in a much more controlled environment and will give a clear indication of the impact they have on their surroundings and their breeding habits.

'The Tay beaver watch has no starting information whereas in Knapdale there was many years of preparation before the beavers were released and they are in controlled conditions,' Mr Jones said.

The Scottish Government had originally planned to trap the Tay beavers, which were being held in Scotland illegally by private individuals. But the decision was taken last Friday to suspend trapping until 2015, coinciding with the end of the Knapdale trial.

The Scottish Beaver Trial is a joint venture between Royal Zoological Society of Scotland, Scottish Wildlife Trust and Forestry Commission of Scotland.

Beavers were previously native to Scotland but were hunted to extinction 400 years ago for their fur and scent glands.

Communities step closer to shore control

COASTAL communities should be given greater control over their local foreshore and seabed, the Scottish Affairs committee has said.

The committee, which has been reviewing the Crown Estate's management of marine resources, said the estate should hand over more control of marine assets to local authorities and community landowners.

The recommendation is one of many made in the review that was highly critical of the Crown Estate.

Chair of the committee Ian Davidson MP said: 'We visited various communities in Argyll and the Western Isles and took evidence from every interested party we could find.

'The point is to conserve these assets and maximise the benefits to the island and coastal communities most closely involved with them. We are convinced the only way this can be done is by devolving as much of the responsibility - and benefit - down to the level of those local communities as possible.'

The recommendation was welcomed by MP for Argyll and Bute Alan Reid who sits on the committee.

The family made the gruesome find while fishing on the southern bank of the loch, directly opposite the picnic tables.

However, tolerating and studying the unlicensed beavers on the Tay until the end of the official Scottish Beaver Trial in Argyll will enable the Government to make a more informed decision on the future of all beavers in Scotland.

On March 1 the UK coalition government cut fuel duty on islands by 5p a litre.

The government is determined that this fuel duty cut will be passed on to motorists and not go into the pockets of the fuel distribution companies.

If any islander is suspicious that the 5p fuel duty cut is not being passed on to the motorist, please let me know and I will investigate.

The Office of Fair Trading (OFT) has launched an inquiry into high prices in remote areas. If you live in a remote community, the OFT would be extremely interested to hear your views on the issues that are most important to you in relation to the supply of goods and services in your particular locality.

In presenting the UK Budget for 2012 this week, it is highly regrettable that the Chancellor chose to ignore the Scottish Government's plea to release funding for £300 million worth of shovel-ready infrastructure projects here in Scotland.

The Scottish Government's own estimate suggests that this invest-

ment could have supported more than 4,000 jobs across the Scottish economy. The value of construction output from infrastructure projects last year was around £1.3 billion or 12 per cent of total industry output. 'Cold and calculating Gilroy' guilty of Suzanne Pilley's murder

'He transported her to a lonely grave somewhere in Argyll where she is now'

A MAN has been found guilty of killing his former lover, Suzanne Pilley, and using a trip to Lochgilphead to dump her body in Argyll For-

David Gilroy, aged 49, was described as 'cold and calculating' by advocate depute Alex Prentice QC, before an Edinburgh High Court jury took two days to find him guilty by a majority verdict.

He now faces life behind bars and will discover his fate on April 18.

Gilroy was declared a suspect early in the investigation shortly after her disappearance on May 4 2010.

Detectives analysed thousands of hours of CCTV camera footage, villages of Argyll, mobile phone records and e-mails to prove that Gilroy took Suzanne's life.

Lothian and Borders Police found CCTV footage of the journey Gilroy made to Lochgilphead, via Dalmally and Crianlarich, the day after Suzanne went miss-

They found it took Gilroy five hours to travel between the Mid Argyll town and Edinburgh; the journey should usually take three.

Colleagues conducting forensic searches of Suzanne's workplace and the boot of Gilroy's car couldn't find any of Suzanne's DNA in those places.

But a specialist dog trained to smell for decomposing human remains was brought in from West Yorkshire Police and gave 'strong positive indications' a dead body had been stored in the building that housed Infrastructure Managers Limited (IML) - their employers - and Gilroy's car. Officers also examined the man's car and found it had serious suspension damage caused from driving off-road.

Over a three-week period. Mr Prentice outlined his theory about Suzanne's final hours to the jury.

During his closing speech, Mr Prentice told the jury how he thought Gilroy persuaded Suzanne to go IML's basement. Once there, the solicitor advocate said Gilroy killed his former lover and then left her body in a recess area of the basement.

Mr Prentice told the court: 'The Crown case is that Suzanne Pilley met David Gilroy on the morning of Tuesday May 4 2010.

'They went to the basement of the building together quite possibly with the consent of both; that he killed her, he placed her body in the recess, he got his car from his home, brought it to the garage, placed her dead body in the boot, took her home and then the next day transported her to a lonely grave somewhere in Argyll, where she is now.'

The jury agreed with Mr Prentice - and now 'cold calculating' Gilroy faces having to spend the rest of his life be-

'We have been met with nothing but kindness from her many friends during this time of great sorrow.

'We would like to express our gratitude to every police officer involved in the investigation and to Alex Prentice and his team for their efforts in bringing this case to a conclusion today.


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Spring Weddings



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



The best way to ensure this is to have it recorded by a skilful photographer. The photographs will capture in frozen beauty, all the breathtaking formality of the day. Many couples now go for what is known as a reportage wedding video. This is a documentary style recording, including sound, of the wedding day, which can capture all the drama, emotions and amusing incidents. It can encompass the bride's last moments at home as she finishes dressing, the wedding ceremony itself, the arrival at the reception of the bride and all her guests, and then final her departure away on the honeymoon. Surely it would be the perfect memento of a unique occasion!


