and more accessible Harbro store could have on Lochgilphead High Street should be assessed by an independent body, according to a Mid Argyll councillor.

Douglas Philand said he wants to be reassured that the Harbro store. proposed to sit within the grounds of the Clock Lodge, will not result in the closure of shops in the town centre

A planning application has been submitted to Argyll and Bute Council which, if approved, would see Harbro relocate from Kilmory Industrial Estate to a newly built unit within the grounds of the Clock Lodge. The company would in turn refurbish the lodge before handing it over to Lochgilphead Phoenix Project. Philand, the only Mid Argyll councillor that does not sit on Argyll and Bute Council's planning committee, said: supported have Lochgilphead Phoenix Project from day one, particularly their plans to bring the Clock Lodge back into use.

But he added that Lochgilphead businesses really, really were concerned that as a retail Harbro could outlet conceivably sell goods that are already available in the town centre'

'Looking at the list of things they sell - work wear, equine clothing, pet food, health products - a lot of that is already sold in the town,' he said. 'While I strongly support the Clock Lodge

proposal and it would be brilliant to see it developed, it should not be done at the expense of the town centre. There needs to be an independent economic assessment that proves it will not have a harmful impact on the high street.

Harbro says it will not boost its provision of everyday goods such as clothing and pet-food at the larger store but bulk items in high demand by farmers.

Graham Graham Taylor Associates, the company representing Harbro in the planning process, said: 'We have, on behalf of Harbro, submitted all the necessary reports and information to the full satisfaction of the local authority.

Residents have their say

AS HARBRO reassures people that it only plans to increase its bulk feed if it expands, the Argyllshire Advertiser went out and about to ask residents if they still had concerns about the

Hilda MacGonagall, owner of Dalriada DIY and The Pet Shop, said: 'I do not believe that they are making that building five times

bigger and they are not going to increase their stock. They sell a lot of items that are similar to me, which is a concern.

'They will have parking as well, which will take people away from the town.

Archie MacGilp senior, owner of Fyne Tackle: 'It will definitely affect my business as they deal with the same companies that I deal with. It will clash with my businesses.

'They are not going to be spending all that money and not expand their range. I am all for the development of the town, but not at the expense of the high street.

Jamie MacFarlane owner of Willie and Pats: 'I think any competition is healthy.

'There are lots of shops here that sell similar things. Hopefully it will help bring people into the area and have a knock on effect by bringing people into the town.

'If the Clock Lodge is turned into a visitors' attraction then this too might increase footfall in the town.

Danny Litster, owner of Danny's Hardware: 'I don't think it will make a difference. It does not really concern me. We just have to keep doing our own thing.

Aliastair Randoll, 52, from Lochgilphead: 'It can only add something to the town because there is nothing at the moment. People are always afraid of change.

helped hugely by Downton Abbey. Looking at everyone else's numbers, ours were considerably better than most. We were very fortunate to have the series here, it has had a very positive


Inveraray Castle became the fictional Duneagle Castle when the Grantham family travelled north to the home of their cousins. the Marquess and Marchioness of Flintshire.

Athletics club grateful for support

Sir.

Can I thank Peter Laing for his kind words of support in a recent Advertiser.

It is reassuring to know that the local football community support the Mid Argyll Athletic Club's proposal for an all-weather jumps/throws facility at Lochgilphead Joint Campus.

We are still hopeful of achieving this facility, which would be a first for Argyll and is desperately required for our fast growing membership of

young boys and girls.

Sportscotland is supportive of the project and through its Sports Facility Fund is most likely to fund at least 50 percent of the total cost which is just under £50,000. We have scaled down the size of the facility to keep under the £50,000 so that Sportscotland may contribute a larger sum of

We have to fund raise and apply for other grant funding to fill the gap, but recently had a set-back when our application to a local funding source was unsuccessful

We have applied to another local funding organisation for help and also Argyll and Bute Council and hope for some positive response.

We are confident the newly formed Mid Argyll Sports Council will support our project, but my concern is that Argyll and Bute Council and other local funding groups will not provide the level of support required.

In terms of sport development, Argyll and Bute Council currently helps to fund fulltime development officers for three sports: football, shinty, and rugby

Although these sports are open to both sexes and increased efforts are being made to boost female participation, none of these sports come close to matching the positive female participation numbers of athletics.

Our club has more than 120 iunior members and more than 50 percent are girls.

I ask Argyll and Bute Council, and others, to take a hop, step and big leap into the 21st century, supposedly a time of gender equality, and provide the same level of support to truly mixed gender sports as they do to male dominated team sports.

Other groups in Argyll are crying out for facilities for athletics and our club has just recently launched an Argyll-wide petition to present to Argyll and Bute Council, Sportscotland, Scottish Athletics and others to highlight the complete lack of adequate facilities anywhere in Argyll. It also asks for a part time development officer for our sport.

As I stated above the focus has always been on male dominated team sports but what about our young girls? If, like me, you feel the sports that inspire young girls, as well as boys, deserve to be supported equally, please sign our club's petition which our junior

members and parents are cir-

Act now on fuel povety and climate change

The soaring price of energy is affecting everyone and the hardest hit are the poorest who cannot afford to turn on the heating.

If we continue to rely on fossil fuels, bills are likely to rise in the long term as coal, oil and gas become more expensive and renewable technology gets cheaper.

Fossil fuels are also driving climate change and polluting people's land, especially in developing countries.

Yet the big UK banks continue to pour billions of pounds into new coal, oil and gas projects around the world and the UK Government is doing nothing to stop them. Perhaps this is not surprising: research by the World Development Movement shows that a third of ministers in the coalition government have personal links to either the big fossil fuel companies or the finance companies that bankroll them. We need a government that takes both fuel poverty and climate change seriously, not one that puts the profits of big companies before all else. Matthew Burgess, Isle of

Not quite the right time

As the referendum vote draws closer, the arguments of the protagonists seem to grow more strident.

On one hand, in Westminster we have a government, largely devoid of principle, led by the likes of Cameron and Osborne, whose grip on reality is tenuous at the best of times. On the other hand, we have a majority in the Scottish Government with its rose-tinted view of independence and who seem determined to ignore all opinions which do not support that view.

So, what are we to do?

Despite what we are told in 'Scotland's Future', can we really expect Westminster to relinquish the lucrative tax revenues of North Sea oil without penalty? Or remove their military presence from bases such as Faslane and others? How will our currency work? How will we remain in Europe? Will we still receive our pensions? The list of questions goes on.

More pointedly, perhaps, do we want the current establishment in charge if we do become independent, given their

level of competence? Why? Well...transport (A83 and Rest and Be Thankful), education (class sizes, closure of rural schools), justice (corroboration of evidence) health (have you tried to get to see a doctor lately, the methadone clinic).

Make no mistake. The argument for independence is irrefutable. We have given notice to Westminster. We will become independent, but probably not under the present circumstances.

What we are really being asked to do is to sign a blank cheque. As an octogenarian, I would like to see Scotland independent in my lifetime but I would hate to see it go off at half cock, just to ensure a place in history for some members of the Scottish Government.

Abandoned collie becomes a search and rescue dog

'She is a great dog, very soft natured'

A BORDER collie who was abandoned in Lochgilphead by being left tied to the bumper of car has gone on to become an award-winning search and rescue dog.

Heartless owners left Cranna attached to a car in the town's Co-op car park last year and it was not until the driver was pulling away that a passerby spotted her.

Rescued

Handed into Achnabrech Kennels, it was there that she was then rescued by

Ken Weatherstone with Cranna who has become a search and rescue dog after being abandoned Ken Weatherstone, who trains collies for Search and Rescue Dog Association Scotland (SARDA).

Since taking her to his home in Lochgoilhead last June, Ken and his wife Moira, who also volunteers for SARDA, have trained her to become fully qualified rescue dog.

Vigorous

Last week she passed a vigorous test in Glencoe and was awarded the Madras College Trophy for best novice dog.

Cranna will now help search for missing people on mountains all over Scotland.

Ken, a volunteer with the Scottish Mountain Rescue Service for more than 20 years, said: 'Louise [Casey] the kennel owner knew I was looking for a collie to train and after seeing her I took her in.'

Explaining the training process, Ken said: 'What we do is get the dog to recognise the scent of humans and then they are rewarded if they find them.'

Assessment

He added: 'There are three stages to the assessment and then the assessors come together at the end to decide which dog performed the best.

Cranna will live with Ken and Moira and wait to be called for assistance.

'She is a great dog, very soft natured. It is great that a rescue dog has become a rescuer,' Ken said.

Crarae Garden opens its doors for summer

VISITORS to Crarae Garden, near Minard, can set their sights on a pine tree that was once thought to be extinct as the garden opens its doors for summer.

Garden enthusiasts will be able to see the Wollemi Pine tree, which is the latest addition to the National Trust for Scotland garden that opened on Tuesday.

Like the dinosaurs, the pine tree was thought to he extinct and was only seen in 90 million-yearold fossils from the Cretaceous period.

But, in 1994 an Australian wildlife ranger spotted an unusual colony of trees in an unexplored rainforest gorge in the Blue Mountains of New South Wales.

The trees turned out to be Wollemi Pines. There are less than 100 mature Wollemi Pine trees growing in the wild.







IT'S OFFICIAL: Argyll and Bute has suffered its wettest winter since records began more than a century ago.

Figures obtained from the Met Office have shown a downpour in Argyll of 1,062 millimetres over the winter months – 52 per cent more than is expected at this time of year.

In February alone, Bute had rain fall of 259.7 millimetres which is 91 per cent above average for that time of year.

£1 million fund secures future of Ardrishaig Pier as key port for shipping Argyll timber

A TOTAL of £1 million has been made available by Forestry Commission Scotland to ensure the future of Ardrishaig Pier as a strategic port for shipping timber out of Argyll.

The national authority confirmed it has allocated one third of its Strategic Timber Transport Fund to maintaining the Timberlink public service.

It sees timber from Argyll forests shipped from Ardrishaig, Campbeltown and Sandbank to Ayrshire mills, lessening the impact of timber transport on Argyll's roads.

A spokesman for Scottish Canals, which owns Ardrishaig Pier, said: 'It's fantastic news that the Timberlink project has been awarded additional funding.

'The scheme provides a greener alternative to road-based freight and removes more than 8,000 lorry journeys from our roads each year, but, more importantly, it also contributes to the local economy and brings business and jobs to Ardrishaig.

'We look forward to seeing the project continuing to operate from Ardrishaig Pier.'

Kirsty Robb from Argyll Timber Transport, the regional group which represents the haulage industry, said: 'Timberlink is something we have always backed and

it compliments the rest of the [Strategic Timber Transport] Fund, which Argyll has done really well out of.

'It is a costly way of moving timber, that's why it is subsidised to the tune of £1 million,' she added.

Lessen the impact

The remaining £2 million of the Strategic Transport Fund will be dished out to projects that lessen the impact of timber transport on roads and communities.

Scotland's environment minister Paul Wheelhouse said: 'This additional £3m comes at the right time. Scotland is forecast to see an increase in timber production over the next

20 years - from approximately 6.5 million tonnes to potentially over 10m green tonnes per annum, which needs to be transported safely to processing facilities and with minimum environmental impact on local communities.'

Since its establishment in 2006, Timberlink, an inland coastal shipping service, has removed around 70,000 timber lorry journeys from rural communities and busy tourist routes between Argyll and Ayrebirs.

It is fully supported by the timber industry and has contributed significantly to the local economies of the ports and local communities.

The top prize, The Robin Banks Trophy, was aptly awarded to his former club, Benderloch and North Connel Drama Club. It took first place with 'That's Mine, This is Yours' and dedicated the win to Mr Banks, who died on February 2 this year.

Accent Players of Campbeltown lifted The Chalmers of Oban Quaich for second place overall, while the youth section was won by the highly-acclaimed Taynuilt and District Drama Society.

Fyne Homes agreed £400,000 loan to improve housing stock

Dearer fines for litter louts and fly tippers

PEOPLE caught littering the streets of Mid Argyll or fly tipping will face much tougher penalties after changes to the law came into affect on Tuesday.

Under the changes, introduced by the Scottish Government, anyone found littering could face an £80 fine, a hike of £30, while the fine for fly tipping has quadrupled to £200.

Environmental charity Keep Scotland Beautiful has welcomed the harsher punishment but says more bins and recycling facilities must be made available to help tackle the problem.

More control over social care support services

PEOPLE who receive social care to lead a more fulfilling life are being given more control over the support services they receive.

Argyll and Bute Council has said its self directed support (SDS) scheme places decision making into the hands of the individual and their family.

SDS allows people to use the funding available to them to employ a service provider, voluntary care agency or personal assistant to meet their care needs.

Families and individuals under the SDS scheme will be guided through their options by social workers.

This major change to the way social care is delivered in Scotland came into affect on Tuesday, April 1.

Prepare your car for spring:

Seven tips from the Institute of **Advanced Motorists**

Road safety charity the IAM is offering weekly motoring tips to drivers from Britain's top advanced driver, Peter Rodger.

This week we advise drivers on how to prime their cars properly for the warmer weather.

The IAM recommends seven ways to prepare your car:

Now is a good time to give your car a spring clean. Salt is corrosive and will cause rusting if left on the bodywork. If possible take your car to a car wash that specialises in under-car cleaning to get rid of every trace.

The UK pollen season can be pretty miserable for hayfever sufferers, so replacing your car's pollen filter annually is an investment to

consider. Keeping your air-conditioning well maintained will help as well.

Servicing your air-con will also help your car smell better. If it smells stale when you turn the heating on, it could well be a sign that mould is building up in your condenser.

Flies will soon be out in force so be sure to refill your washer fluid. Habitually washing the windscreen and headlamps when you stop for fuel is also important, as windscreen wipers won't get rid of all the fly debris.

Old wiper blades are not only noisy, they can leave marks on the windscreen, so remember to replace them regularly. Clean them regularly avoid damaging your windscreen.

After a pot-holed winter, checkyour wheel and tyre alignment. Misaligned tyres wear out more quickly.

Anti-freeze contains corrosion inhibitors so you should keep your car topped up all year round - going without could lead to expensive engine damage.

IAM chief examiner Peter Rodger said:

'After a long winter of wear and tear from snow, salt and potholes, your car needs attention. Preparing for the spring and making checks now can save you a lot of money in the long

'Deal with minor problems and repairs as they happen - they can become very expensive if left to build up over time."

Ovstercatchers have two different types of bills: one is sharp and pointed and the other is blunt and rounded.

The ones with the broad bills open molluscs, while the ones with pointed bills dig for worms.

This is learned from the parent birds and is something that will be passed on from generation to generation.

Nature is a wonderful teacher and we can learn so much if we take time to stop and observe.

The fields around us are already sprinkled with lambs and once again we are reminded of new birth.

In this time of Lent we walk in a journey from darkness to light, from despair to hope, from death to life and we rejoice in new birth

For those of us who embrace the Christian tradition, we think of these final days of Jesus' final earthly journey.

We think of death and resurrection and new life, and we rejoice in the promise of life everlasting. Whatever your belief, I hope you will find joy in this season of hope and promise, and find peace.
