Concern expressed over possible extended pub opening times

A GROUP hoping to cut the harmful impact alcohol has on Lochgilphead is calling on Argyll and Bute Licensing Board not to increase opening hours of licensed premises.

Community Action Lochgilphead Ardrishaig (CALA), a pilot scheme that aims to cut alcohol related harm in the community, said it does not believe local residents

would favour 3am licences.

Pointing to a recent survey of 250 adults in the area, CALA said early examination of the results suggested locals would not want pubs open until the early hours of the morning. Caroline Church of

vey that asked people if they felt an extension to opening hours would increase alcohol consumption and early indication is that they believe it would.

The results of the survey are being assessed as the local licensing forum debates extended opening hours, the introduction of curfews and staggering venue closing times across the county.

The forum, which met in Lochgilphead this week, said it would continue to investigate opening hours licensing policy before making a recommendation to Argyll's licensing board the authority that governs the sale of alcohol

in the area.

But reminding people that the local licensing forum has not made any recommendation as yet, Peter Robertson from the licensing board said: 'The forum can make recommendations to the board about the application of licensing policy but the forum has not reached any conclusion on the matter; it is an item for discussion.'

Explaining representatives from CALA attend the local licensing forum alongside councillors, landlords and health officials. Caroline said: 'The results of the survey is the sort of stuff that will be brought to the forum because it is based on local evidence.'

The local licensing forum will meet again on July 18 when licensing policy will be discussed again. The meeting is open to the public.

Businesses lambast ferry fares hike

A PLANNED hike Mid Argyll. in ferry fares for commercial vehicles has been lambasted by Mid Argyll businesses as they respond to the Scottish Government's Ferries Review.

Mid Argyll Chamber of Commerce has described the increased charges as 'catastrophic' and said they will impact on all aspects of trade within

The response comes after the Scottish Government announced it is to drop the Road Equivalent Tariff (RET) and replace it with an enhanced trader discount scheme for commercial vehicles transporting goods to Argyll islands

Outlining its view as part of Argyll and Bute on the Ferries Review, the chamber said: 'Many Mid Argyll businesses work on the islands of Coll, Tiree, Mull, Islay, Jura, Colonsay and Gigha. Increased overheads are damaging to mainland businesses and when it comes to our fragile islands the chamber agrees with the Tiree community, which recently described the increase as catastrophic. Construction, haulage, agriculture, crofting,

fishing, retail and tourist businesses will be affected.'

The Argyll And Bute Council consultation also urges the Scottish Government to implement the proposed Kintyre to Ayrshire ferry and to secure the longterm future of the Jura Passenger Ferry.

The council's executive committee was due to discuss the review yesterday (Thursday) as the Advertiser went to press.

Commenting on the Pilley, you immediately embarked on an elaborate plan to dispose of her body and avoid detection.

'With quite chilling calmness and calculation you set about the task.

'You successfully disposed of the body, apparently somewhere in Argyll; and but for the commendably thorough investigation carried out by Lothian and Borders Police, you might well

have been successful in avoiding detection and prosecution.'

The day after Suzanne went missing Gilroy travelled to Lochgilphead, telling his colleagues he was inspecting the sports pitches at the joint campus.

But as police closely inspected CCTV footage from towns and villages across Argyll they found it took Gilroy two hours longer to get there than the average time; the return journey was even longer.

Police were convinced that he had driven his car off road that day; they found damage to his car and cuts and bruises on his face and hands.

At the hearing on Wednesday Gilroy's defence agent QC Jack Davidson said Gilroy had never been in trouble before and had a commendable career in the Navy.

But Lord Bracadale said the murderer would spend 18 years behind bars before being eligible for parole.




New manager for Mid Argyll swimming pool

Stunning views of Mid Argyll hit the road

STUNNING views of Mid Argyll will be seen across Scotland and Europe in the coming weeks as part of a new marketing tool for the area.

Architect urges Inveraray to go for world status





Who am I voting for?

Always read the instructions for filling in the ballot paper carefully, even if you have voted before. The ballot paper lists the name of each candidate along with their party name, party logo and their address. Rank the candidates in order of preference. Put a 1 next to your first choice candidate, a 2 next to your second choice, a 3 next to your third choice, and so on. You can rank as few or as many candidates as you like. If you make a mistake then you can ask the polling staff to give you another ballot paper.

Who is elected?

To be elected a candidate must reach a set amount of votes known as the quota.

The votes are counted in stages. In the first stage only first preferences are counted. Anyone who reaches the quota is elected. Any votes received over the quota are not needed by the elected candidate and so are transferred to the second preference. If not enough candidates have then reached the quota, the candidate with the lowest number of votes is eliminated and all of their votes are passed to the next preference on the ballot papers.







Those Were The Days

The Argyllshire Advertiser Friday 25 April, 1997

IT WAS a long time coming home for historic artefacts which were returned to Kilmartin last Tuesday after an absence of more than 100 years.

In preparation for the formal opening of Kilmartin House next Saturday, items from the British Museum were returned to Argyll. Pots, jewellery and decorations were excavated from the Kilmartin area in 1864 by Canon Greenwell. They were then dispersed between museums in Edinburgh and London. With museum registration and loan agreements with the British Museum and the National Museums of Scotland in place, Kilmartin House is now entitled to display the artefacts. Gill Varndell of the British Museum said she was 'delighted' that the pieces were returning home after such a long time. A pot, just one of the many valuables returned, is around 3000 years old and was excavated from the Glebe Cairn, located just behind Kilmartin House.

MRS FLORENCE Macpherson of Ardrishaig will receive the Royal National Lifeboat Institution's gold badge from His Royal Highness, Prince Michael of Kent KCVO, at the Barbican Centre London on May 15.

Mrs Macpherson was honourary secretary of the Ardrishaig branch from 1971 to 1996 from which date she has acted as souvenir secretary. In 1985 she was awarded the institution's silver badge.

IT MAY have changed completely in the 34 years since he last saw it, but for Lochgilphead's James Johnston, now of Australia, the Argyllshire Advertiser's office still felt like home.

scar on my knee. 'There was also a little shed out the back which

He said: 'Willie Holden had the first TV and there was a Scotland-England match. Almost the whole of Lochgilphead was out in the street watching it.'

While James' accent remains a hybrid of Mid Argyll and Victoria accents, David is all Aussie. He has only fleeting memories of trips to Lochgilphead to visit family.

He said: 'They're giving me the tour. I can just about remember Lochgilphead and coming here when I was younger.

'But we both read the Argyllshire Advertiser and The Oban Times because Kenny sends them over.'

Argyll does take a lot of getting used to though.

'The roads here are crazy,' said David. 'They're so narrow. I don't know how people cope, but the cars are smaller here.

'Also, nobody would travel for 300km to do something for a day in Australia.

'But I'm really enjoying the views and the area.

'It's very old, there are lots of old buildings here where in Australia everything is more modern and there are lots of new suburbs.'

James and David say they hope to see much more of Argyll and Scotland before returning to Australia next month.

My Week with Marilyn, featuring Michelle Williams and Kenneth Branagh, will be screened in the Templar's Hall on Saturday evening.







You too can build

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FOR many, embarking on the first bold steps towards the base rung of the property ladder, building ones own home from scratch is, at least on paper, a tempting prospect.

Those who have already successfully achieved their self-build ambitions will confirm that there is a fine line between completion of a dream – or the arrival of a costly nightmare – but while it may be easy to measure the plus or minus of financial implications, how do you put a figure on the warm glow of self-satisfaction if your dream home becomes reality.

Along with the land, bricks and mortar, you will need large volumes of dedication, commitment



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and patience through- going gets tough.

Remember that undertaking this self-build is to achieve the home of your dreams.

You will need to inspire others to have the level of enthusiasm for your project as you have. Having the right attitude will fundamentally affect your self-build plan in a positive way.

There are many ways in which you will locate your ideal plot of land. Estate agents, advertisements in newspapers and word of mouth are probably the most common.

Land may also become available via auctions or on-line auction sites. These may appear as a cheap option. And they can be. But they come with their own complications.

Plots being auctioned are often the result of bankruptcy or other problems that make a quick sale desirable for the seller. They are traded on a 'sold as seen' basis. It is up to the bidder to ensure that the details being presented are accurate, suitable to the intended purpose and not without 'hidden' dangers.

If possible, visit any site for sale via an auction and make your own assessment – or better still pay an expert to survey the property or plot on your behalf. It may cost a little, but could save you a lot.

Whatever your chosen route to a piece of land, there are four basic areas to consider before embarking on a plot purchase - ground conditions, planning permission, utilities and services, and any legal considerations. Ground conditions Ground conditions are important as it forms the foundations of your dream home. It may be necessary to employ a specialist to ensure that the plot of land is ideally suited for your project. Simple things like a high water table, while not insurmountable, need to be identified, as do more serious issues with potential flooding, industrial or agricultur-

al pollution and, if the site has been subject to infill, what was it in-filled with? Building land may have been built on previously and what lies beneath the surface in terms of drains, pipe work, foundations, etc may have cost implications that are not immediately obvious.

Something as simple as the incline of the proposed plot should also be noted as this may add extensively to the cost of groundwork prior to the first stages of construction.

When viewing a plot, bear in mind that the overall dimensions should not only be capable of containing the house but that planning authorities may want evidence of sufficient space for parking, garages, or turning vehicles and other amenities in relation to the size of said home.

It is your responsibility to ensure that the dimensions of the land for sale is as stated.

It would also be advisable at this stage to come back from the site and, if possible, view it from a distance.

Planning

Planning is often the biggest single obstacle that a self-builder has to negotiate.

Learn from other people's errors and experiences, and seek help from experts who do these often complex communications with local authorities on a daily basis.

Plots with outline planning permission already granted will cost in the region of 500 per cent more suggests open green field sites, they will most likely have strict restrictions on sizes and styles of house building.

Utilities and services All plots will require utilities and services at some stage.

Plots adjacent to other houses or existing buildings are often easier to get through the planning maze simply because water and power supplies may already be on-hand.

Rural and isolated locations are a very different proposal, with the cost of installing utilities becoming a major cost factor in negotiating the original purchase price of the land.

Legal considerations Before agreeing to buy building land ask your solicitor to a pre-purchase check for any title issues, the legality of the boundaries, rights of access through, or indeed, on and off the site – there is little point in buying a site that you cannot then gain entry to. This is particularly relevant if the plot is in a rural or remote location where access is via neighbouring land. Old or verbal agreements between previous landowners/ friends/ neighbours mean nothing and must not be regarded as automatically transferable.

This is also true of shared access, which can sometimes be a very grey area that needs to be clearly defined in writing and map before money changes hands.

Shared access normally also means shared liability in relation to maintenance costs and shared liability for incidents or accidents that happen on that piece of shared land. Sometimes, in order to get planning permission, you will be asked to sign a legal obligation, also known as a planning agreement and in Scotland commonly called a Section 50 Agreement. This can restrict how land is used or make the applicant bear

before building work can go ahead. You will also have to

find out if there are any agreements relating to the plot that may have already been signed. As the purchaser, you are legally bound by any agreement that comes with the purchase. It's up to you to find it if it exists.

Also, there may be verbal agreements made with the vendor with regard to building or reinstating walls, fences, drains or even to the extent of getting the vendor's permission before extending, altering or even selling your property – these should be discussed at length with a solicitor before entered into.

Building your own house can be one of the most stressful times of your life – but it can also be the most rewarding. Don't enter into it lightly – it may be one of the largest purchases you are ever likely to make and worth every penny.

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
