James Semple, 37, has a degenerative eye condition and faces losing his sight entirely before he reaches the age of 40.

Glasgow man James who prefers his racing name of Jay Cruz - entered last week's successful Inveraray Jail Break, featuring a race up and down the Dun na Cuaiche landmark. Family commitments meant he was unable to make it, but now organisers have laid on a special second running this weekend for Jay, along with anyone else who fancies a crack at the hill.

Jay, a former mar-

tial arts instructor, was diagnosed with choroideremia in 2013. The condition affects the blood vessels surrounding the retina and can lead to.

He began running shortly before his diagnosis and has run every year, despite failing eyesight.

Paralympics in Tokyo. Jay, who always runs wearing a kilt and led by a guide, told the *Advertiser*: 'The Jail Break people have been so lovely. This will be my 95th run in a kilt covering 5k, 10k and half marathons, and I am really excited about coming to Inveraray because it is beautiful. This is a great opportunity for me.'

If it is a fast time you are expecting from this remarkable man, it might be time to revise your expectations because Jay will take on his first marathon on Sunday - the day after running the Jail Break.

An excited Jay continued: 'I've got the chance to meet Zola

Budd and Liz McColgan before the Stirling marathon on Sunday. What an honour to get to speak to these great runners.'

There is a serious side to Jay's running programme as he fights blindness.

He believes his only hope of saving some of his vision is gene therapy, but he needs to raise £20,000 to pay for it.

Jay explained: 'My hope is that gene therapy can save the little vision I have at the moment. If I can preserve the wee bit of eyesight I've got left it means I could see my four-year-old son.' The hope

is that Jay will not be alone in his efforts when he sets off from Inveraray Jail at 11am on Saturday May 20.

Inveraray Jail organisers issued an open invitation on social media, saying: 'Anyone local-ish fancy another crack at the big hill on Saturday?

'We have a special guest runner who couldn't make it on Sunday so we invited him along this weekend meeting at 11. It will be slow, as he has a marathon the next day, but it would be great to get some support for this man who has an interesting sto-





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
Ford artist finds sweet spot with new collection





TRENDING SPA **TREATMENTS**

Most everyone has experienced a manicure or massage, but what about some of the more interesting spa treatments that are available? Let's deconstruct some of the hot trends in spa therapies.

RASUL

Rasul thermal mud treatment is a traditional cleansing treatment that is traditional in Arabia, combining the health enhancing properties of heat, steam and mud for a relaxing and skin conditioning treatment in a magical and sensory private enviroment, complete with twinkling lights and fragrant vapours. In a Rasul treatment, Detoxifying Body & Muscle Essential Oil Clay Lotions are applied to specific areas of the body, then you relax with a combination of steam and cool showers.

Reiki is a form of non-intrusive energy healing originating in Japan in the early 1900s in which naturally occurring electromagnetic energy is channelled by an 'attuned' practitioner. Once associated with the incense soaked realm of new age hippies, Reiki is rapidly infiltrating the mainstream. Like acupuncture and reflexology before it, doctors are now recommending Reiki as a viable healing method, and today it's practiced through the world by

REFLEXOLOGY

Reflexology is a type of 'zone therapy' which involves applying pressure to certain points on the hands, feet and ears. Doing this is believed to encourage the body's natural healing process in corresponding areas. It can also be used for stress relief and to improve overall well-being. The therapy is based on the principal that certain points on the feet, hands and ears (known as reflexes) are linked to other areas of the body. For example, the tips of the toes correspond with the head and the heel is associated with the lower back and intestines.

CUPPING

Cupping is a lesser-known treatment that comes from Asian medicine, one that can provide an especially pleasant experience. Cupping is the term applied to a technique that uses small glass cups or bamboo jars as suction devices that are placed on the skin. Once the suction has occurred (with the use of heat), the cups can be gently moved across the skin (often

The suction in the cups causes the skin and superficial muscle layer to be lightly drawn into the cup. Cupping is much like the inverse of massage - rather than applying pressure to muscles, it uses gentle pressure to pull them upward.

ION CLEANSE

An ion cleanse is meant to be a detoxification system to reduce the symptoms of unavoidable 'toxic overload' through a series of detox sessions. Simply relax with your feet in water for about 30 minutes. The procedure is painless and comfortable. The therapist uses a basin containing sea salt dissolved in purified water and then place an electrical unit, called an array, in the water. The array generates alternating positive and negative ions around the feet. The ions enter the body through your feet and begin neutralizing the toxins. Why the feet? Apparently, the largest pores in your body are located in your feet, allowing for the greatest release of toxins in the shortest

Rose quartz facial massage therapy is a treatment for mind, body and soul. SALT CAVES

The curative effects of the salt cave are believed to lie in the anti-bacterial, anti-microbial, and anti-inflammatory properties of Himalayan crystal salt. Himalayan Crystal Salt is more than mere salt: it is the energy of the primal sea, the Earth, the Sun, and the stars. Once sought by emperors, kings, and sultans, natural crystal salt is believed to be a panacea and it has been known and used as a holistic remedy for centuries. Halotherapy ('halos' in Greek means salt) is a completely natural treatment with no side effects. It takes place in a dry, sterile, and hermetic environment that recreates a natural microclimate identical to ancient salt caves and salt mines. The salt aerosol consists of tiny and dry salt particles which are ground in a special salt generator. CRYOTHERAPY

Cold air therapy takes place in a whole-body chamber, which has dry fresh, oxygenated air — due to the lack of moisture (humidity) or wind chill, and is not painful like an ice bath or immersion. During the treatment, your skin temperature will decrease between 30-45 degrees over 2.5 to 3.5 minutes inside the chamber. You will immediately warm after exiting the chamber, with full range of motion in your muscles and joints, unlike water or ice treatments, where the joints remain stiff for hours. Even if you don't like being cold, this process will rejuvenate your body, skin and mind, and you will leave feeling warmer than when you arrived.

BEER BATH

Beer has always been the secret to shiny tresses, but in Germany they are taking it to the next level with a beer bath. Besides being bubbly, warm and portable, this whirlpool like treatment is meant to soothe and cleanse the skin with B vitamins, biotin and protein compounds.





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


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Success for first Lochgilphead art graduates




