# **Asbestos scare in Tarbert**

had to evacuate her flat for a week after an asbestos scare that in the end turned out to be a false alarm.

Like other Argyll Community Housing Association (ACHA) tenants of the block on Kingsway, Marion Campbell was getting her kitchen rewired last Tuesday morning. On removing floorboards the contractor found what he thought might be asbestos.

Marion had to leave the flat immediately, carrying no possessions except the clothes she had on her back.

After a week staying

A TARBERT woman with her niece, she heard late this Tuesday that the asbestos results had come back negative and

she could get back in. Speaking to the *Argyllshire Advertiser* after she heard the news, she said: 'I've been quite happy where I was. Don't get me wrong though, I'm looking forward to getting back into my own house.

'They took the right precautions and I'm glad the results were negative.

'I've lived there for 12 years and I'd never heard anything about asbestos before. ACHA did their best in this situation; they gave me

some compensation to buy clothes, as I just had to go out in the ones I was wearing. They also offered to pay for B and B but I said I was staying with family.'

Medication Another concern

for Marion was the medication she requires for bronchitis, a lung disease associated with asbestos exposure.

She said: 'I had my jacket with my ventolin inhaler in the pocket but everything else was in the house. Luckily I was able to contact the health centre about getting more medication.' Explaining the need

for Marion to move out, and rewiring in the other Kingsway flats to be abandoned, ACHA chief executive Alastair Mac-Gregor said: 'During site investigation information was obtained which indicated asbestos may have been used in building materials in the original construction. In one property our tenant moved out to allow the tests to be completed.

'The association has received confirmation that the asbestos tests proved negative and we plan to start work again on the Kingsway heating and rewire project as soon as possible.'





# 'A great victory' for caravan parks petitioners

### '20 per cent tax would have been disastrous'

PETITIONERS fighting to secure the economic future of caravan parks celebrated 'a great victory' this week.

The UK government backed down on a 20 per cent tax on static caravan sales after receiving a petition signed by thousands of people, including hundreds across Argyll and Bute.

In a major u-turn the tax was slashed to five per cent and delayed from this October to next April - a move welcomed by local industry figures who had said a 20 per cent levy could have had a damning impact on Argyll's tourism trade.

'There have been massive savings in unemployment.; It's probably one of the biggest wins the industry has won against the government.'

Explaining why a 20 per cent tax would have been disastrous for the industry, Mr McCulloch said: 'We have to purchase the holiday homes from the factory and pay in advance; we all have sale yards where we can sell them alongside a site, it is a whole package that we create.

'The other important thing is parks have a site rental charge per annum, the government already takes VAT from this and the reality of it is a caravan park will

AN ATTEMPT to oust a caravan couple who have 'squatted' in a town centre car park in Lochgilphead for two and a half years has been blocked by the regional council.

The move has infuriated locals who say Mr and Mrs George Zetland-Wilkinson, are monopolising much needed car parking space - as well as presenting a threat to hygiene.

Matters came to a head when after long and complicated legal procedures, the district council served Mr and Mrs Zetland-Wilkinson with an enforcement notice aimed at ensuring their removal.

Members were shocked when the regional council which owns the car park, lodged an appeal against the notice claiming that, with no restrictions in force, the parking of caravans or mobile homes is not prohibited at Lorne Street.

Under the notice the region would have been required to remove the Zetland-Wilkinson's caravan.

RESURFACING of the road between Ardrishaig and Lochgilphead brought a mixed blessing for local residents last weekend.

Although the road was badly in need of repair, the apparently excessive amount of loose chips used to repair it gave pedestrians a tricky job when trying to walk along that stretch of road.

The work was started on Friday, and Mr Hugh O'Neill of Ardrishaig told the Advertiser that when walking home on Monday, the pavement was still very difficult to negotiate because of loose chips thrown up by cars.

THE PINK shorts were wonderful, and the whole reason why Emma wanted to come to church.

This may seem a strange theology, but how good that a youngster wants to come to church whatever the reason.

There are many reasons why people come to church and many reasons why they do not.

Some folk come to church because they hunger for answers; some come because they like the friendship they find there; some come because they have always done so; some come because they want to grow closer to God.

Some folk don't come to church because they have no need of God; some don't come because they cannot believe in God; some don't come because they find the church irrelevant; some don't come because an experience has made them lose faith.

God's love is unconditional and all are welcomed; whether we come with faith or doubt; whether we come often or seldom; whether we come singing or sighing; whether we come in youth or in old age – all are welcome. God's love is unconditional. Sometimes the church doesn't convince people of this unconditional love, and so some turn their backs on God as well as the church. People feel they don't fit in if they're not wearing the right clothes or saying the right words, or if they don't know what to do at the right time. They feel there is a pattern to follow and are embarrassed if they are unfamiliar with the procedure. This worry can distract them from God. This is why I love Emma's shorts. # Sharing resources is the best way to oppose unpopular turbines

SHARING resources and expertise is the best way for north Kintyre to oppose unpopular wind turbines.

That was the conclusion of a special meeting organised by people concerned about the number of proposed wind energy projects between Tarbert and Campbeltown.

At the meeting, held in Glenbarr Village Hall last week, Argyll residents agreed to work together to create strong, evidence-based objections to a series of wind turbines planned on their doorstep.

Mark Lodge, head of ing: 'Working togethplanning and development at Argyll and Bute Council urged people to look at the planning criteria for wind projects when noting their con-

#### cerns. Useful

'Rather than just say there are too many, it's going to be really useful if you say there are too many because,' Mr Lodge told the meeting. The meeting saw Muasdale man Robin Nolan elected chair of a new wind energy opposition group.

He told the meet-

Five different wind farm or turbine proposals were up for discussion; at Auchadaduie, Blary Hill, and Creggans - all near Glenbarr; North Beachmore near Muasdale; and Loch Freasdail, where 11 100metre high turbines are proposed.

As well as being at different stages, each of these proposals is of different size and scope.

### Survival lesson

### HIE hits back at claims

HIGHLANDS and Islands Enterprise (HIE) has hit back at claims by a consultant that it will not be able to maintain current levels of support to businesses in the Highlands and Islands.

# Securing the future of dairy farming in Kintyre

Tarbert Farm has had to extend its storage and cooling tank as the milk tanker now visits the INSTALLING a more efficient milking parlour has allowed a Gigha farm, just off the Kintyre peninsula, to secure its future and to help ensure milk still comes from the island for the foreseeable.

Over the last year Tarbert Farm, owned by the Rennie family has undergone some important changes which will benefit it and the island.

They bought and installed a second hand parlour, helping to cut their milking time of their 65 dairy cows.

The Rennie family moved to Gigha and took over Tarbert Farm in 1968.

Emma Dennis, née Rennie, took over in 2002 and now with brother Mark, runs the farm at the island's north end.

Last year they got rid of their sheep to allow them to rear more dairy cattle to increase their milking.

'We need to keep the amount of milk coming from the island up, so we decided to get rid of the sheep and bring in more cattle,' said Emma.

'We used to just have summer calving, but our aim is to now calve all year round.'

The 5-a-side Fullwood parlour, allows them to monitor how much milk each cow is producing, effectively lowering costs as they are using less cake to feed the beasts.

'Using this new system means we don't use as much cake, as it's an automatic feeder,' explained Emma who took over running the farm from her father in 2002. 'We can see exactly how much milk each cow is producing so can feed them according to that.

'Before the milk went into a centralised tank

so we couldn't see how much there was from each individual cow.' It took the family

around nine months to install the parlour, using just half of the parlour to milk during that time, using a bio with a pipeline to the tank.

With the milk tanker now only coming every second day to the island to collect milk from the three farms, Tarbert Farm has had to also extend its storage and cooling tank.

We have had to accommodate the cut First Milk made. It was getting too expensive to bring the tanker over every day,'Emma told The Courier.

She said the tanker collects 1,600 litres every second day from them.

'As long as we produce one million litres a year First Milk is quite happy with that,' she said.

#### Plans are being finalised for revamped creamery

WORK is on going to progress and finalise plans for the redevelopment and investment in Campbeltown Creamery, Kintyre.

First Milk, which owns the creamery, is liaising with the local farming community to create a brand new cheese-making facility at its current site of Witchburn Road, Campbeltown.

Once complete the revamped creamery will secure the future of 38 dairy farms and 100 jobs on the peninsula.

Over the last few years, First Milk had progressed plans to sell its existing Campbeltown site to Tesco and backed by grant funding from the Scottish Government, relocate to a new location in the town.

However, it was revealed in January, Tesco now indicated it no longer wished to purchase the site in order to build a larger store in the town; as a result the creamery will remain at its current location.

The new factory will allow for increased production and provide processing efficiencies, which cannot be achieved at the current plant.

The new facility will be funded by two sources: up to £2 million from the Scottish Government and funds from First Milk, the UK's leading dairy farmer co-operative.

A First Milk spokesman said: 'Whilst we are not in a position to share any finalised plans at this time, the shape and direction of our plans are focused on creating a modernised creamery that can service the current and future growth of our brands, and business.'

ONE OF Europe's rarest species of geese, which winters on Scotland's west coast, will receive special protection in an international agreement signed last week in France.

Greenland white-fronted geese breed in west Greenland and migrate through Iceland to Ireland, and northern and western Britain. Half of the entire population winters in Scotland and half of those migrate to the Isle of Islay.

The draw to Scotland's west coast, and Islay in particular, is thought to be the peat bog habitat, where the birds prefer to roost

Total numbers fell from a peak of 35,600 in 1999 to just 22,600 in 2010 and the species has been 'Red-Listed' under international conservation criteria, and is a priority for action in the UK.

The goose was subject of an African-Eurasian Waterbird Agreement (AEWA), which brings together representatives of 67 governments and many other interested organisations every three years to discuss conservation needs of migratory waterbirds.
