Colour, fun and schoo orious food at Tarbert **Seafood Festival** Pier future in spotlight as timber operations shift

THE FUTURE of Ardrishaig Pier is under review as timber hauliers shift operations to Ardcastle.

Following the collapse of a section of the pier last month, the owners, Scottish Canals, will assess the future of harbour facilities in Ardrishaig while thousands of tonnes of timber are being shipped to Ardcastle, eight miles up Loch Fyne.

A spokesperson for Scottish Canals said: 'Our engineers are working up options in respect of the repair and potential improvements to the area of failure and the wider pier infrastructure and services.

The overall harbour facilities at Ardrishaig, which are used by a number of different organisations, will also be under consideration.

spokesperson The continued: 'We are also liaising with Associated British Ports, Argyll Timber Transport Group and the wider timber industry to fully understand the potential future demand for pier and harbour facilities at Ardrishaig. This information will be of significant value in influencing the scope of works, and associated costs.'

Scottish Canals, a public body also responsible for managing the adjacent Crinan Canal, said that it knows how important the pier is to the timber industry and is working to provide a solution as soon as possible. All timber haulage activity at Ardrishaig has now been transferred to a ship-

ping facility at Ardcastle, operated by private haulage company JST Services.

Neil Stoddart, general manager at JST, said: 'We have moved our port handling machine from Ardrishaig to the "in forest" timber shipping facility that we had been constructing at Ardcastle, Lochgair. Construction and development of this facility was to complement Ardrishaig, but has now proved to be a vital part of maintaining the timber supply chain.'

The floating pier at Ardcastle cost JST £500,000 to develop and is used solely for moving timber in and out of the area. Asked whether this is

a long-term fix for Argyll timber haulage, Neil commented: 'It's **Continued on page** two.

Jobs boost at new tidal park

A TIDAL energy development off the south-west coast of Islay has been granted planning consent, promising to create up to 32 new jobs.

The DP Marine Energy Limited development, called the West Islay Tidal Energy Park, will consist of 30 tidal energy turbines located approximately six kilometres off the south-west coast of Islay.

Scottish Minister for Business, Innovation and Energy, Paul Wheelhouse, confirmed that consent had been granted for the offshore development, saying: 'Marine renewable technologies offer huge potential to the Scottish economy and to rural communities. The West Islay Tidal Energy Park builds upon this, helping us to generate more clean, green electricity in Scotland and to meet our climate change obligations.'

DP Marine Energy claims that the tidal park will have a generating capacity of up to 30 megawatts, enough to power around 18,000 homes.

Leader of Argyll and Bute Council Aileen Morton commented: 'We aim to be at the heart of renewable energy development in Scotland by taking full advantage of the Argyll and Bute's unique and significant mix of renewable resources.

'The granting of planning consent for the West Islay Tidal Energy Park is welcome news and we hope it will contribute to the growth of the local economy."

'The association also carries out a number of fire safety-related tasks. All of our prop-

fires have the chimneys swept twice a year, the flues are inspected and any defective ones are replaced.

'In the association's 11 sheltered housing complexes, where we have over 200 tenants, there are weekly fire alarm tests and there is fire safety equipment throughout the buildings. All of ACHA's 5,100 homes have a smoke alarm fitted within them.'

Mr MacGregor added that fly-tipped material, which may constitute a fire hazard, is regularly removed from ACHA properties. He continued: 'The

thermal efficiency of erties with solid fuel association has a good working partnership with the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service and it provides fire safety talks to tenants as and when required.'

Separately, Argyll and Bute Council offered its own reassurance to the public.

A spokesperson said: 'There are very few council buildings in Argyll and Bute with cladding and all our properties are subject of regular formalised inspections.

'There are no plans to review their construction. However, we will comply with any directives arising from the London tragedy.'



ARDRISHAIG Pier has been serving the people of Argyll since Victorian times.

The pier's most recent incarnation has seen it used as one of a number of ports to transport timber felled from the Argyll hills by sea. It is operated by Scottish Canals, a public body, largely as an industrial site.

After the recent pier collapse, Scottish Canals is looking at all the options available for the pier. This might be an ideal opportunity to broaden the pier's appeal beyond the purely industrial and tie it better to the village.

Timber transport by sea is important, but there is a commercial operator just down the road that seems well set up to cope with demand, so perhaps the pressure is off the industrial aspect of Ardrishaig Pier.

Any improvement plans for the old pier might tie in with proposals to redevelop the former Gleaner site and the surrounding canal buildings. It's a while away but this could be a blessing in disguise.

Aimed at sharing and reviving traditional culture, last month's expedition involved 39 people from the language school of excellence in Te Awamutu, near Hamilton on New Zealand's North Island.

Speaking after a trip to Dunadd hill fort, Maori language expert Paraone Gloyne said: 'That was the first spiritual custom that we've participated in during the time of our journey. It was there that we finally felt the spirit of the Scottish people.



'Our feet were washed inside a bowl carved from the sacred slab rocks on the hill outcrop. It was their act of honouring us as visitors. After that our feet were placed in a sacred footprint.'

The New Zealand group also visited Ireland and Wales as part of researching indigenous language strategies within Great Britain.

Pupils walk the walk in royal burgh play

MONTHS of research and rehearsals culminated in two days of walking theatre for Inveraray Primary School pupils last week.

Children took to streets of Inveraray to act out scenes and songs that celebrate the Inveraray 'new' town and tell the fascinating story of how the royal burgh came to be.

A Town We Made, written by Walking Theatre Company co-founder Sadie Dixon-Spain, takes the form of a short walk around the town with the children acting out scenes based on historical events at certain significant spots.

With a damp but captive audience in tow, the play finished at the primary school where parents and siblings joined the cast for a ceilidh in the main hall.

'There was so much information that the real challenge was creating a script for so many voices. We had 18 children and three adults all with speaking parts so it's been a bit epic.'

The project, supported by the Inveraray CARS regeneration project, set out to engage children in the history and regeneration of the town through a series of events and productions.

CARS project officer Feargal De Buiteleir attended the Friday evening performance, commenting: 'It's been a very successful project. The children go home excited and tell their parents and grandparents about it and get them all talking about it. You want to have event that keep kids interested and not too boring.

'A big thanks to the Walking Theatre Company, Historic Environment Scotland and the primary school for making it happen.'

An exhibition of the pupils' work was also on display in the school hall and a specially made display detailing the town's history featured silhouettes of the pupils which will likely make a reappearance at future Inveraray events.



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

A damsel, but not one in distress

READER Robert Kilgour was quick off the mark with his phone camera when he spotted a beautiful example of wildlife near Lochgilphead.

While walking his springer spaniel, Bonnie, in the fields next to Kilmory Castle Estate over the past few weeks, Robert has often spotted mercuri-

al damselflies floating on the breeze. After some strictly amateur online detective work, the Advertiser believes the species snapped by Robert is a male azure damselfly – though there are a number of species with a similar appearance.

According to the wildlifetrusts.org website, the azure dam-

selfly is a 'small blue damselfly which is very common around most water bodies and can also be found away from breeding sites in grassland and woodland. It is on the wing from the end of May through to August'.

They describe its UK range 'widespread, but absent from northern Scotland'.

UK AUTOMOTIVE CALLS FOR 'BUSINESS AS USUAL' INTERIM ARRANGEMENTS TO AVOID THE CLIFF EDGE



- UK GOVERNMENT must secure interim arrangements to safeguard future of UK motor industry and avoid a cliff edge.
- Industry body believes a final agreement on a new relationship with the EU that benefits the UK automotive industry will not be achieved by March 2019.
- UK must maintain single market and customs union membership until a final agreement on a new relationship with the EU has been agreed and implemented.

Tuesday June 20: The UK automotive industry has today called on the government to seek an interim arrangement with the EU that would maintain membership of the single market and customs union until a final agreement on a new relationship EU is negotiated and implemented.

The sector accepts that the UK will leave the EU and fully supports a bespoke and comprehensive agreement on a new relationship with the EU. However, a final agreement would be hugely complex and it does not believe such a comprehensive agreement can be reached by March 2019 – just over 20 months away. Without agreed interim arrangements, businesses would be faced with the 'cliff edge' and forced to trade under the World Trade Organisation rules – the worst foreseeable outcome for the sector, its employees and the British economy.

Speaking today as the sector announced its annual performance figures, the Society of Motor Manufacturers and Traders (SMMT) said it was time to be pragmatic about what can be achieved in the time available and what the consequences would be if the UK left without a deal. The UK and EU automotive sectors are highly integrated and any new relationship will need to address tariff and non-tariff barriers, regulatory and labour issues, all of which will take time to negotiate.

Mike Hawes, SMMT chief executive, said: 'We accept that we are leaving the European Union and we share the desire for that departure to be a success. But our biggest fear is that, in two years, we fall off a cliff edge – no deal, outside the single market and customs union, and trading on inferior WTO terms. This would undermine our competitiveness and our ability to attract the investment that is critical to future growth.

'That's why we have to be honest with ourselves. If the UK cannot secure – and implement – a bespoke and comprehensive new relationship with the EU in two years, we need a back-up plan. Having looked at all the alternatives, we need government to seek an interim arrangement whereby we stay within the single market and customs union until that new relationship is implemented.'

The UK automotive industry has always maintained the importance of the EU to its prosperity. The EU is by far the UK's biggest automotive export market, taking over half our finished vehicles, four times as many as our next biggest market. The sector already exports to more than 160 different global markets and has a consistent approach to free trade. It needs that trade to be tariff-free, as frictionless as possible to support the 'just in time' manufacturing process and with consistent regulation.

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


