

Not so easy to get around town

In a special report for the Argyllshire Advertiser, 90-yearold Lochgilphead man Hector Walker helps us to highlight how difficult it is for people using motorised scooters, wheelchairs and prams to get around the town.

HECTOR, a scooter user himself, enjoys going for a run around the town where he can meet up with old friends and speak to people as they go by.

However, he is increasingly angry at the state of Lochgilphead pavements and the fact that very few of them are suitable for him to travel along in a scooter.

He said: 'There are some very bad pavements. Most

have lowered entrances for garages and driveways but very few are lowered at the ends to allow someone like myself to travel all the way along them.'

Dangerous

Because of this Hector is in many of the streets, which is dangerous both for him and for other vehicles. The busy Union Street is one of the worst. 'This street is very bad. None of the pavements are lowered at the end. They

road.'

Union Street is almost a single lane because there are cars parked on both sides of the road.

Hector says he doesn't like holding up traffic but he has no other option if he wants to travel on that street.

At the end of this street is forced to travel on the road another bad entrance, this time at the Lochgilphead Community Centre.

'I come here two or three times a week to the Stroke Club, the Antiquarian Society or the Scrabble Club. There is no lowered kerb at all have very high kerbs so the entrance so I have to park

I am forced to travel on the my scooter in the car park and walk down the ramp at the side.' He is forced to leave his scooter unattended and uncovered in the car park. If the kerb were lowered at the front entrance he would be able to drive right up to the front door. Hector says he is very grateful to Argyll and Bute Council for lowering the kerbs at the top of Manse Brae.

He said: 'It's a great help because it means I can now go all the way to the hospital without having to leave the pavement. It's much safer for me and car drivers.'

However, many more pavement corners have to be lowered for him to be able to get out and about in the town more safely.

A spokeswoman from Argyll and Bute Council said: 'We carried out considerable improvements in Campbeltown, Ardrishaig and Lochgilphead last year. Further drop kerbs will be put in this year as part of a rolling programme, particularly for Union Street and Manse Brae at the Community Centre and library.

'It is likely that this work will commence in late September.'
