PLANS to transform Kilmory Home Farm into a 'community hub' could be revived this week as a Lochgilphead resident urges local people to support the project.

Colin Campbell is calling for volunteers to form a new Kilmory Home Farm Project group after the previous committee dissolved last year.

Mr Campbell, who previously chaired Kilmory Home Farm steering group, said he remained hopeful the land and its buildings could be developed into a recreational hub for Lochgilphead.

Call to improve network of paths in the 'lost village'

'It feels like Kilmichael has been forgotten about'

A YOUNG mother, who referred to Kilmichael as 'the lost village that Argyll and Bute Council forgot about', is calling on the local authority to improve the network of paths in the area.

Leigh Phillips from Kilmichael is urging the council to build a path between Bridgend and Kilmichael and a path to connect the village with Lochgilphead.

Concerned

Speaking to the *Advertiser* on Monday, Leigh said she was concerned about the lack of a safe route to the village primary as well as walking routes and facilities for leisure pursuits.

'The main problem in Kilmichael is the shortage of footpaths and it is especially bad on the road between Kilmichael and Bridgend,' Leigh said.

'There are large vehicles driving along the road and I have to push a pram down the road and the kids have to walk to school along the road.'

Argyll and Bute Council said it has attempted to provide a safe route to school in the area but it was proving difficult.

A spokeswoman for the council said: 'The proposal for a route between Bridgend and Kilmichael Glassary has been discussed a number of times, and designs put forward for a remote or roadside path, however there have been land issues on all the options we have investigated.' Explaining she was also frustrated at the lack of leisure walks for local families and young people, Leigh said: 'In Ardrishaig and Tarbert they have put paths in for people to go walking but it feels like Kilmichael has been forgotten about.

Initiatives

'They are doing all these health initiatives and I would be more than happy to walk to Lochgilphead but there's no path to do it.'

The spokeswoman for the council said its access team had identified a route could be built connecting Bridgend with Lochgilphead but added 'there are no current plans or funding to construct a path.'

'We want to make sure we have the most up to date information, both from customers and suppliers, to inform final decisions on rollout.'



Council committed to 'Gilp regeneration

ARGYLL and Bute Council has said it remains committed to a regeneration plan for Lochgilphead after the town was omitted from a plan to secure funding from Historic Scotland.

Lochgilphead was on a shortlist that council officers identified as eligible for a Community Action Regeneration Scheme (CARS) grant but was not selected to be part of the scheme.

The council's bid to CARS will focus solely

on Inveraray. A spokeswoman for the council said: 'The council fully recognises the need to invest in the historic fabric of Lochgilphead and currently is in the process of preparing a built heritage

EU - in or out referendum

Many areas of our lives are now decided in Europe. A group of MPs is looking at whether powers can be taken back to our elected representatives.

A growing number of people want an EU in or out referendum; a common complaint being that nobody under 55 has had a proper chance to vote on this important issue.

Where do the facts lie? Our legal research shows that once powers have been transferred to the EU, they cannot be given back to national level.

Nor is it possible to renegotiate an 'EU Lite' type of membership, as staying in involves a commitment to more not less Europe. Former Eurocrat Peter Mandelson got it right when he warned that the EU some people seek (trade only or looser ties) is not on offer.

So the choice seems to be in or out, with no half-measures.

At least if we ceased to be part of the EU, it would legally be committed to working for free trade and good neighbourly relations with us.

We need a full and honest debate on what either choice would mean.

Councillors want to meet Minister about future

COUNCILLORS Mid Argyll and Kintyre have called for an urgent meeting with Scottish Transport Minister Keith Brown.

Semple, lead John councillor for infrastructure, has written to the minister requesting a meeting, following the most recent landslide at the Rest and Be Thank-

In particular the meeting will focus on growth of the renewable energy, tourism, and the marine science and aquaculture sectors associated with the Lorn Arc (A85), connectivity issues including the A82 and the Kintyre Renewable Hub (A83).

Launching the 2012 Craignish Arts Festival, the relay will see the oldest residents on the peninsula start and finish the relay, which begins at 4pm at Craignish Point and finishes at Craignish Village Hall.

It is hoped locals and visitors alike will turn out to cheer on and run alongside the Craignish torchbearers.

Argylls for Olympic duties

SOLDIERS from the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders have been drafted in to provide security at the Olympic Games in London.

Up to 200 men from the unit will perform security-related tasks during the worldwide event, which has its opening ceremony next Friday.

The posting comes following the UK government's decision to downgrade the Argylls to a ceremonial company as part of defence spending cuts.

New book took inspiration from Kintyre landslide

THE SPATE of landslides along the A83, cutting off towns and villages in Mid Argyll from the rest of the country, has proved to be the inspiration behind a new book.

The Silver Bough, by Lisa Tuttle from Torinturk, may be a fantasy novel about a village isolated from the rest of the world, but it's connections to Argyll and its residents' dependence on one trunk road is evident.


Campbeltown

Based in Appleton, *The* Silver Bough tells the story of a village cut off after a landslide blocks the only road in and out of the village.

Loosely based on Campbeltown, Appleton, like its Kintyre counterpart, is situated on the tip of a long, thin peninsula with only one main road leading out of town.

Explaining the inspiration for the book was a landslide on the A83 near Tarbert, Lisa said: 'It just struck me that there is only one road in and out, and there had been the suggestion that the landslide might take a few weeks to clear.'

Although the A83 was not closed for that long, Lisa thought about how badly the area might have been affected had

the route been cut off for weeks on end, and the idea for her latest book was born.

Raises awareness

The book, was released in Scotland earlier this month, has already sparked a lot of interest because of the links with the Rest and Be Thankful landslides.

Councillor Dougie Philand, who launched a petition to tackle the

problems on the A83 alongside his Argyll First counterparts, welcomed the publication of The Silver Bough.

'This is obviously a fantasy book but it does touch on a real life issue,' Mr Philand said. 'It's good to see someone writing about it from a different perspective because it raises awareness of the overall issue and the situation.'





- Confirm all the wedding clothes are ready.
- Visit hairdresser, taking headdress and plan the style for the bride for the day.
- Organise wedding make-up. Practise it at least three times.
- Try on dress complete with all accessories including underwear
- Arrange full rehearsal of wedding ceremony.
- Time journey to place of wedding from home, and from thence to the reception venue.
- Arrange for changing facilities for going on honeymoon. Organise luggage for the trin.
- Make final check on reception, cake, photographer, transport.
- Arrange stag and hen nights, preferably not the night before!

FARMERS, crofters and land managers are being urged to complete the survey recently sent out by the Scottish Agricultural College (SAC) on behalf of the Argyll and Isles Agricultural Forum the regional partnership, set up to raise awareness of their concerns.

The aim is to identify the level of confidence of agricultural businesses in the area and learn more about their future

Excellent response

The survey was issued last month and the response has been excellent to date, but there are many more opinions out there.

Development Manag-

er for the Forum, Fergus Younger said: 'We want to catch as many different views as possible and gain a better understanding of farmers and crofters future intentions. Only then can this information be used with any authority by the forum, or when lobbying Government to develop initiatives that benefit the area.'

Organisations on the Argyll and the Islands Agricultural Forum include farming, crofting and landowners bodies like NFUS, SCF and Scottish Land and Estates. There are conservation groups like RSPB Scotland, as well as local authorities, development agencies and

advisers, such as SAC and SAOS, who encourage co operation. The last survey was completed nine years ago and much has happened since then.

One of the main local consultants involved in producing this report, SAC's Oban-based Niall Campbell said: 'This is an appropriate time to be seeking an update on producers' thoughts and aspirations due to the period that has lapsed since the last report and the changes since then.

'We now face even more change with subsidy reform, strengthening Sterling, rising inflation and transport costs, so it is even more important to understand
