The public's direct link to decision-makers will not be abolished, according to health

People across Argyll and Bute will notice changes to health and social care services as cuts are made to deal with a black hole of at least £20 million in the next three financial

But the group set up to allow residents to directly influence health and social care policy, Mid Argyll Health and Care Forum (HCF), has fears over its very existence.

At its August meeting, where new chairwoman Barabel McKay was elected unopposed, HCF members voiced anger and frustration that a number of the group's recent meetings had been cancelled by Argyll and Bute Health and Social Care Partnership (HSCP) - with some HCF members not informed of these cancellations.

Barabel McKay said: 'I don't see how anyone has the right to cancel our meetings. Is this not a democracy?' Fred Bruce, convenor of West Loch Fyne Community Council, voiced fears the HSCP may abolish local HCFs and move to wider geographic areas, such as Mid Argyll, Kintyre and the Islands or even the whole of Argyll and Bute, meaning the public's input would be 'easier to control'.

Mrs McKay added: 'We need to raise our profile and I think we should do everything we can to publicise what the HCF does.'

In a statement, Argyll and Bute HSCP said that 'effective public engagement and feedback' was essential to the delivery of its services.

The statement continued: 'We have recently reviewed and refreshed our public

engagement framework. with public representatives, staff and the Scottish Health Council with the aim to strengthen and improve the planning of public involvement and this was approved by the Integration Joint Board in May this year.

'The health and care forums are an essential element in this engagement with local communities and are run and chaired by members of the local community.

'We have no plans to abolish HCFs but we do regularly review with HCF members how they are functioning to understand how we can best support, nurture and strengthen their role in expressing their needs and experiences of health and social care services.

We are the champions

Two pipe bands with Mid Argyll roots were crowned champions in their respective grades at the weekend. Inveraray and District retained their champion of champions title at Grade 1, while Mid Argyll Pipe Band, packed with local young players, won the same title in Grade 4B. Crash scene aimed at making drivers think

Argyll and Bute Youth Services and emergency services will be driving home the consequences of speeding and lack of concentration at Lochgilphead Joint Campus next week.

They will stage a real-time crash from the moment emergency services respond to a call from a driver of a car which has just been in a collision. The scenario unfolds and people can see how their local emergency

services arrive at different times to the scene. Working together, the emergency services assess the situation, detain the driver from one car, cut out a trapped person using hydraulic cutting gear and finally remove a 'body' from the wreckage.

The aim is to make young people think hard about their driving, which will hopefully reduce the possibility of future collisions and fatalities on Argyll and Bute's roads.

Most collisions are due to driver error with failing to look, careless driving, sudden braking and speeding the most common factors.

Almost a quarter of all serious road collisions in Argyll and Bute in the past three years have occurred on the A83 between Furnace and the Rest and be Thankful, many involving young drivers.

The public event is on Tuesday August 28 at 7pm in the joint campus grounds.

Three men and a woman, aged between 49 and 69, were stopped for speeding on the A83 at Lochgilphead on Sunday August 19. They were issued with £100 fixed penalty tickets and three penalty points.

Excessive noise

A 29-year-old man played loud music and behaved in an abusive manner at 11pm on Sunday August 19, in Union Street, Lochgilphead. The man was arrested, charged and a report will be submitted to the procurator fiscal. A TV and speakers were seized.

Fence damaged

A wooden fence was damaged at Inveraray Primary School sometime between 5pm on Friday August 17 and 8am on Monday August 20. Police are investigating the incident.

Fixed penalty

A 36-year-old man was issued with a £40 fixed penalty for urinating in Poltalloch Street, Lochgilphead, at 1am on Saturday August 18. Police are appealing for witnesses or anyone with any information to contact them on 101 or anonymously through Crimestoppers on 0800 555111.

Police warning over iTunes scam

Police have been made aware some members of the public have recently been victims of an iTunes gift card scam.

There are various methods of scamming people, but one elderly Oban woman recently believed she was in an online relationship for several months with a man who was abroad. Once he had her trust, the man said he needed her to buy him iTunes gift cards and vouchers and send him the codes from the cards.

An alert shop assistant was suspicious about the high value of the gift cards purchased and contacted police. The woman has been scammed of several hundred pounds

but she is now aware it was a scam so will not lose any more money.

Another variation of the same scam is where victims receive telephone calls or emails informing them they have a HMRC tax bill that requires to be paid urgently.

The person who claims to be from HMRC explains that to collect the money, the victim is required to buy iTunes or other gift card/vouchers totalling several hundred pounds and then pass the voucher code number to the caller via email or telephone.

Sergeant Iain MacNicol of Lochgilphead Police Station said: 'I would urge people not

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to trust anyone who asks you to buy an iTunes gift card/voucher for them or to pass them the number from a card/voucher.

"This is highly likely to be a scam and it is important to know these iTunes gift cards/ vouchers can only be used to purchase goods from Apple.

'Please do not be duped into giving out reference numbers of gift cards or vouchers that you buy.

'HMRC would never require any payment by means of iTunes or any other gift cards. If you receive a call or email making such demands, hang up or ignore the email and contact the police for advice.'

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Double Champion of Champions titles for Mid Argyll bands

Mid Argyll can boast two leading global pipe bands after Saturday's world championships in Glasgow.

Inveraray and District Pipe Band were looking to retain their Grade 1 title on Glasgow Green but in the end came second behind a superb performance by Northern Ireland's Field Marshal Montgomery. Consistency, however, paid off for Inveraray as they were crowned Grade 1 Champion of Champions across all five major competitions during 2018 – for the third year running.

In Grade 4B, a young Mid Argyll Pipe Band kept up the momentum started in May when they won the British title. Led by Pipe Major Craig Lang, they performed tremendously well all season. A fourth place finish in the world championships ensured Mid Argyll Pipe Band won the Grade 4 Champion of Champions title for 2018.

Early excitement for the Mid Argyll drum corps as they were awarded the drumming Champion of Champions crown turned to disappointment by the beginning of this week when the Royal Scottish Pipe Band Association amended the result.

The Mid Argyll drummers were tied on points with Lower Clyde Pipes and Drums across the season but the fact Lower Clyde got a better result on the day put them just ahead, leading to confusion.

Craig Lang said: 'It's been a historic season for the band, being crowned British champions in May, then going on to win Champion of Champions on Saturday – an unbelievable achievement for such a young group.

'Myself and lead drummer Graeme McMillan are immensely proud of every member. The work they have put in over the past year has been admirable and we hope we have given Mid Argyll a band to be proud of.'

Pipe Major Stuart Liddell of Inveraray and District was pleased with his band's result, commenting: 'It has been another fantastic season for the band – having been second in four of the five championships, winning the Europeans in Forres and securing the

'The competition this year has been of a very high level and has been interesting to see four different bands lift titles – Scottish Power (British), St Lawrence O'Toole from Ireland (UK and Scottish), ourselves (European) and Field Marshall Montgomery who have just been crowned the world champions for the 12th time under Pipe Major Richard Parkes, equalling the

record set by the legendary Pipe Major Ian McLellan of Strathclyde Police.

'It is great to be included among these great bands and the consistency is reflective of all the hard work that goes into it.'

Elsewhere, in Novice A, Oban High School came second behind Dollar Academy.

Kintyre Schools came an excellent fifth in a Novice B competition featuring 19 bands from across the globe

Building starts on vital Cairndow childcare centre

Work has started on new £2 million family and early years centre at the head of Loch Fyne.

After years of planning,

consulting, fundraising and hoping, the beginning of building work was marked with a ceremonial sod-cutting on the site at Clachan, Cairndow.

The project has been led

by the charity Cairndow Community Childcare, and the new building will enable the charity to relocate from Cairndow Village Hall to the purpose-built centre.

Following a public tendering process, building contractor Emtec Property Services has been appointed alongside MAST architects and other local partners, including Cowal Design and Taynuilt-based Gregor Cameron Consultancy Ltd.

The project is being funded by the Big Lottery, the Scottish Government Regeneration Capital Fund, alongside the Robertson Trust, the Ardkinglas Estate, Loch Fyne Oysters Ltd, Cairndow Childcare and the Cairndow community's own fundraising efforts.

There will be a separate community services room as well as a childcare centre, offering a space for visiting

healthcare practitioners for example, without overlapping with the facilities offered at Cairndow Village Hall.


Children and staff from Cairndow Childcare gathered at the site – on a former conifer plantation at the mouth of Glen Fyne – on Thursday August 16 to break the ground at the site.

Cairndow Community Childcare chairwoman Alison Hutchins said: 'This is just amazing.

'It has been a long time coming and there has been a lot of work over seven years between the initial conception and developing the project.

"The real heavy work in terms of the application process has happened over the past five years. And here we are today."

Economic development and population growth is a key

priority for Argyll. The new facility will be part of the process of halting and reversing population decline.

The centre will play an important role in enabling parents to return to the workplace, run their own businesses or pursue careers in the area.

Ms Hutchins commented:

'If you have the services and the infrastructure, there's no doubt people will come, and there are jobs about.

'And, speaking personally, I wouldn't be working in this area without reliable childcare.'

Construction of the centre is expected to be complete by next autumn.

Council urges fly-tipping to be reported

Fly-tipped rubbish in a lay-by near Cairndow was removed by Argyll and Bute Council on Tuesday following last week's report in the Argyllshire Advertiser.

A council spokesperson said: 'We are committed to ensuring public spaces in Argyll and Bute are maintained to a high standard and ask that any fly-tipping is reported to us.

'The fixed penalty notice for fly-tipping is £200. If it is not paid, prosecution could result in a fine of up to £40,000. We all have to play a part in keeping our communities free of rubbish by using the many waste and recycling centres we have in Argyll and Bute.'

The fridge freezer and

baby's cot lifted by the local authority were in a lay-by beside the A83 trunk road at Drishaig, a couple of miles on the Inveraray side of Loch Fyne Oysters.

BEAR Scotland, responsible for trunk road management in the region, commented: 'We carry out weekly patrols on the trunk road network to report any defects or issues on the routes and, as part of this, our teams record any incidences of excessive litter or fly-tipping which is then passed on to the local authority for removal.

It serves to highlight the

problem of rubbish left around the roads of the region.

Debbie Donald, convener of Cairndow Community Council, said: 'We have lots of rubbish along the roadside and there has been tipping in lay-bys.

'We also have a problem with litter from cars – people just not thinking about the environment, or who will have to clean it up.'

Fish farm expansion

Sir,

The decision of Argyll and Bute Council to allow expansion of Poll na Gille and BDNC Loch Shuna is reprehensible.

These sites have been named as being the first and third worst respectively of all the salmon farms in Scotland on an index of welfare and health measures, including premature death rates, sea lice numbers, escapes, breaches of biomass limits and seal shooting (Sunday Herald, August 5, 2018). Despite the above, there was a decision made by Argyll and Bute planning department that Environmental Impact Assessments were not required for the expansion of either of these fish farms.

The Environment, Climate Change and Land Reform committee report on the environmental impacts of salmon farming stated, in a letter dated March 5, 2018, to the Rural Economy and Connectivity committee that: 'The committee is supportive of aquaculture, but further development and expansion must be on the basis of a precautionary approach and must be based on resolving the environmental problems. The status quo is not an option.'

It is apparent that Argyll and Bute Council does not intend to adopt the precautionary approach recommended, but continues to agree to unsustainable expansion, even at locations which are in breach of the current standards required.


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

West Virginia, USA. The event is being hosted by the Boy Scouts of America, Scouts Canada and the Scout Association of Mexico. Some 17,000 Scouts from across the globe will attend. This is a once in a lifetime opportunity to build relationships, explore other cultures and go on life-changing adventures.

Six of the team - Andrew Smart, James Urquhart, Barrie, Liberty Hampton, Cameron Garrett and Anna Turner - have secured places in the West Region 2019 expedition to Malaysia. The objective of this expedition is to make real

change to communities. The team will be installing clean water, building a play park and working in a rainforest eco-village. The team will get the chance to enjoy the heritage and culture of the country. The young people are involved in the planning of both expeditions. In addition, these young people from the 19th Argyll have committed to raising £10,000 - 30 per cent of the gross cost of their adventures - during 2018/19. To date £2,000 has been raised or committed with members of the team also securing part-time employment to boost funds.


The process will also ensure



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

A small fishing village with a population of fewer than 200 people, Tayvallich is nestled cosily in a small bay on the shores of Loch Sween. The village marks an ideal place to experience truly stunning Scottish artwork, with seven of Argyll's top artists living in the area.

Painters Caroline Hunter, Libby Anderson, Caroline Plummer, Susan Berry, Jane Smith, Lottie Goodlet (23) and sculptor Melanie Chmielewska will all be available to meet at their studios around Tayvallich during the Open Studio event, giving a fascinating insight into the lives and practices of rural Scottish artists.

With displays ranging from watercolours of swirling sea shores to intricately detailed stone carvings, the local talent is as diverse as it is impressive.

The Tayvallich Inn marks the obvious starting point of any tour of the studios. Situated right by the entrance to the village, it will also showcase art from all seven local artists, as well as work from a number of guest artists.

Not far from the Tayvallich Inn is painter Caroline Hunter's (4) studio. After growing up in Orkney, Caroline began painting in 1994. She won the James Torrance Prize from the Royal Glasgow Institute of the Fine Arts in 1999, just before moving to Argyll, and

she has become well known for her seascapes and sill life paintings.

A few hundred metres further inland sits the home and studio of Libby Anderson(25). A graduate of the Glasgow School of Art, portraiture has always been Libby's first love. She pursued her passion by painting passengers' portraits on cruise ships all around South America and the Caribbean. She has settled in Tavvallich, where she considers the surrounding landscape and islands a 'constant source of inspiration'.



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

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THREE TOP TIPS TO SPOT **ONLINE USED** CAR SCAMS

'The sheer volume of online scams is off the chart this summer

Mycarcheck.com has warned of a marked increase in online used vehicle scams and highlighted three telltale signs of a con:

1. Is the vehicle being offered for substantially less than other similar models?

2. Does the number ring out or go to voicemail, prompting you to 'email the seller'? 3. Are you then offered a vehicle that is abroad but can be 'shipped to you'?

Mark Bailey, head of CDL Vehicle Information Systems, which owns mycarcheck.com, said: 'The sheer volume of online scams is off the chart this summer, with seasonal favourites like convertibles, camper vans and motor homes being

targeted. The staff at our Glasgow call centre speak to used car buyers every day, often when they're about to transfer money, so we have our finger very much on the pulse when it comes to the latest scams. From early this year we saw a significant rise in fraudulent online adverts. but from May onwards it really ramped up, not only for the usual cars, vans and bikes, but for plant and agricultural vehicles, every sector you can think of.

'Sophisticated con artists, often operating in organised criminal gangs, can create scam adverts very quickly and on an industrial scale, even setting up whole fake dealer websites. At first glance, they look realistic; they cut and paste wording from genuine adverts and

add features like make and model searches to appear more convincing.

'If you encounter any of the above, and certainly all three in order, it should serve as a red flag that you are being

lined up. The best advice remains: if in doubt, walk away." With information from the police, DVLA, insurers and finance houses, mycarcheck. com holds comprehensive data on every vehicle on UK roads – things that buyers should be aware of before making an offer.

DRIVER ADVICE: VEHICLE MAINTENANCE

Proper vehicle maintenance is essential to keep yourself and others safe on the road. Many people have been killed in crashes caused by vehicle defects, with hundreds seriously injured. If you drive, you are operating a fast-moving piece of heavy machinery that needs to be kept in the safest possible condition.

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Good maintenance can save you money as well as avoiding breakdowns or potentially devastating crashes. Badly-inflated tyres can mean you use more petrol, while putting off minor repairs can make them far more costly in the long-run.

You should carry out regular 'walk-round' checks of your vehicle, once a week and before any long journeys, which need only take a few minutes. The main things you should look

- tyre tread wear. Look out for tread wear indicator bars on tyres – small bumps in the main grooves which indicate the minimum tread. Change your tyres well before your tread gets to the legal minimum (1.6mm in the UK). Brake recommends replacing at 3mm, as tyres can be dangerous in wet conditions with less than this. If you drive with tyres worn down to below the legal limit, you could face three penalty points and a £2,500 fine, or it could cause a
- tyre pressure. Buy a hand-held tyre pressure gauge and check the pressure weekly, when the tyres are cold. The correct pressure will be written in your vehicle's handbook.
- general tyre condition. Check for cracks, bulges or bubbles on the sides of your tyres. These are signs that the tyre is damaged and at risk of blowing out.

If you see any of these, get the tyre checked by a professional, and replaced if


- lights are working. Check lights are clean and bulbs aren't blown (reflect against a wall, or ask a friend to help).
- oil water and fluids. Check oil and water levels, and other fluids such as power steering, windscreen washer and brake fluid, are well above minimum levels.
- wiper blades. Check they are in full working order and replace if worn.

- wheel fixings. Check wheels and wheel fixings for defects, including loose nuts.
- If you drive a commercial or specialist vehicle, there may be additional checks you should make. Check with your employer or consult your handbook.

Setting off and while on your journey, look out for:

- problems with, or noises from, your brakes. Brakes usually make a noise when worn, but if you notice any problem with them, get them checked immediately by a professional mechanic. It's a good idea to test brakes weekly and at the start of long journeys, following your walk-round checks, by applying them gently while driving very slowly on a flat, empty stretch;
- warning lights on your dashboard;
- excess noise or smoke from the exhaust;
- · smoke from under the bonnet;
- · fluid leaking from under the vehicle;
- · smell of hot electrics, fuel or a burning
- · unusual sounds from the engine;
- · a pulling sensation from the steering.

If you have any suspicion at all there's a problem with your vehicle, take it to a garage immediately - putting it off could cost you cash, result in a breakdown or, worse, lead to a serious crash.

And for the hardier souls the tug-of-war will test the strength and determination.


Ford Fun Day will be held between noon and 4pm. To round off the day, there

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Ground source heat pumps

Ground source heat pumps (GSHPs) use pipes which are buried in the garden to extract heat from the ground. This heat can then be used to heat radiators, underfloor or warm air heating systems and hot water in your home.

A ground source heat pump circulates a mixture of water and antifreeze around a loop of pipe, called a ground loop, which is buried in your garden. Heat from the ground is absorbed into the fluid and then passes through a heat exchanger into the heat pump. The ground stays at a fairly constant temperature under the surface, so the heat pump can be used throughout the year.

The length of the ground loop depends on the size of your home and the amount of heat you need. Longer loops can draw more heat from the ground, but need more space to be buried in. If space is limited, a vertical borehole can be drilled instead.

The benefits of ground source heat pumps

• Could lower your fuel bills,

especially if you replace conventional electric heating

- Could provide you with income through the government's Renewable Heat Incentive (RHI)
- Could lower home carbon emissions, depending on which fuel you are replacing
- No fuel deliveries needed
- Can heat your home as well as your water
- Minimal maintenance required

Unlike gas and oil boilers, heat pumps deliver heat at lower temperatures over much longer periods. During the winter they may need to be on constantly to heat your home efficiently. You will also notice that radiators won't feel as hot to the touch as they might do when you are using a gas or oil boiler.

Air source heat pumps are usually easier to install than ground source as they don't need any trenches or drilling, but they are often less efficient than ground source heat pumps. Water source heat pumps can be used to provide heating in homes near to

rivers, streams and lakes.

How do ground source heat pumps work?

Heat from the ground is absorbed at low temperatures into a fluid inside a loop of pipe (a ground loop) buried underground. The fluid then passes through a compressor that raises it to a higher temperature, which can then heat water for the heating and hot water circuits of the house. The cooled ground-loop fluid passes back into the ground where it absorbs further energy from the ground in a continuous process as long as heating is required.

Normally the loop is laid flat or coiled in trenches about two metres deep, but if there is not enough space in your garden you can install a vertical loop down into the ground to a depth of up to 100 metres for a typical domestic home. Heat pumps have some impact on the environment as they need electricity to run, but the heat they extract from the ground, the air, or water is constantly being renewed naturally.

Is a ground source heat pump suitable for me?

To tell if an air source heat pump is right for you, there are a few key questions to consider:

- Is your garden suitable for a ground loop? It doesn't have to be particularly big, but the ground needs to be suitable for digging a trench or a borehole and accessible to digging machinery.
- Is your home well insulated? Since ground source heat pumps work best when


producing heat at a lower temperature than traditional boilers, it's essential that your home is well insulated and draught-proofed for the heating system to be effective.

- What fuel will you be replacing? The system will pay for itself much more quickly if it's replacing an electricity or coal heating system. Heat pumps may not be the best option for homes using mains gas.
- What type of heating system will you use? Ground source heat pumps can perform better with underfloor heating systems or warm air heating than

with radiator-based systems because of the lower water temperatures required.

• Is the system intended for a new development? Combining the installation with other building work can reduce the cost of installing the system.



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

SCF urges revision of payments regime

The Scottish Crofting Federation (SCF) has emphasised in its response to the government's Stability and Simplicity consultation that change is urgently needed in the agricultural and rural development payments regime to get a fair deal for crofters.

'Certainty is more important than stability,' said Russell Smith, chairman of the SCF.

'Why emphasise stability when we can take the opportunity to improve the system? Many of the issues raised in this consultation are relevant whether there is a transition period or not, but are imperative due to the uncertainties about the UK withdrawal.

'The opportunity to consider how agriculture and rural development are currently supported in Scotland and how they will be in future is a very useful exercise. It is an opportunity to rebalance how the system works for public good, to target resources to where they most benefit sustainable food production, environmental

maintenance and the wellbeing of rural communities.'

Mr Smith added: 'The current system urgently needs revision. It was announced only this week that the New Entrants Capital Grants Scheme has been extremely successful – yet is to be discontinued.

'New entrants are the lifeblood of crofting and farming, and we want to see the reinstatement of a Crofting New Entrants Scheme, a workable arrangement to tackle land abandonment by getting unused crofts working again under new entrants.

The Less Favoured Area Support Scheme has also been used to pay higher rates to farmers on better quality land within the designated areas.

'This is clearly not the intention of the scheme, but, despite having been criticised by bodies such as the European Commission, this mechanism has continued and will continue, in the name of stability.'

Unions issue warning over no deal Brexit

Livestock representatives from NFU Scotland, the Ulster Farmers' Union and NFU Cymru say the prospect of the UK leaving the EU with no trade deal would have serious implications for the beef and sheep sectors.

The comments were made following a recent meeting in Belfast. NFU Scotland livestock committee vice-chairman Jimmy Ireland said: 'A no deal Brexit could have unthinkable consequences on Scottish farms and crofts.

'The UK currently exports more than £380 million of lamb and sheep meat, with the vast majority being exported to European markets.

'Any imposition of barriers to trade as a result of Brexit will impact thousands of sheep and cattle farming businesses across Scotland.

'We also need to see the UK government secure future protection of our food names, such as Scotch Beef PGI and Scotch Lamb PGI.

'These names are synonymous with quality and we need to see them protected from imitation, both in the United Kingdom and the European Union.

'Future support for the food and farming sector must deliver on-farm profitability that ensures there is a critical mass of cattle and sheep to drive productivity across the supply chain.'

Wyn Evans, chairman of the NFU Cymru livestock board, added: 'The government in its trade talks with the EU must ensure we have measures in place that continue to allow tariff-free and unfettered access to export markets in Europe. This is vital to maintaining the already tight margins in this sector.'

The UK unions are committed to working together to highlight this to decision makers over the summer and autumn as the UK enters a critical period in the Brexit negotiations.

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

Thought for the Week with Marilyn Shedden

I am reading again one of my favourite books called Mister God, This Is Anna. It is set in the 1930s in the east end of London.

It is a delightful book and probably the best book on theology you will find, and it is by a four-year-old.

The story is about a wonderful relationship between a little girl, who had run away from an abusive home life, and Fynn, a 19-year-old student who takes her into his heart and home.

Anna's favourite topic of conversation is about Mister God, and she has a very special relationship with him. Fynn is amazed at her knowledge and spirituality, and he delights in her mischievous sense of fun.

After many conversations, Fynn says this: 'Anna had distilled centuries of learning into one sentence, "And God said love me, love them, and love it, and don't forget to love yourself."

'The whole business of adults going to church filled Anna with suspicion. The idea of collective worship went against her sense of private conversations with Mister God.

'As for going to church to meet Mister God, that was preposterous. After all, if Mister God wasn't everywhere, he wasn't anywhere. For her, churchgoing and "Mister God" talks had no necessary connection.

'For her, the whole thing was transparently simple. You went to church to get the message when you were very little. Once you had got it, you went out and did something about it.

The book draws us in to Anna's innate love of God, and is such a refreshing reminder of God's relationship with children.

No wonder Jesus said about children: 'Of such is the Kingdom of Heaven.'
