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# 'No impact' on Argyll as recycling firm fails

Argyll and Bute Council has played down the implications for recycling services after one of its main contractors called in the administrators.

Greenlight Environmental issued redundancy notices to 109 employees after efforts to find a buyer failed.

based The company, Alexandria, West Dunbartonshire, carried out a number of services under contract to Argyll and Bute Council. These included glass collection from commercial premises in Argyll and Bute, domestic glass collection and collection of co-mingled recycled material from council depots in Helensburgh and Lomond.

Paul Dounis and Steven Ross of RSM Restructuring Advisory LLP were appointed joint administrators of Greenlight Environmental Limited on August 31.

### 'We can confirm we already have alternative plans in place'

The appointment followed efforts to find a buyer to safe-guard the employment of staff and allow for the on-going fulfilment of contracts.

Several interested parties came forward, with advanced negotiations taking place with one potential buyer.

The offer was, however, later withdrawn and the company placed into administration, resulting in the closure of the business and redundancy of all employees.

Paul Dounis, joint administrator, said: 'It is with profound regret that a purchaser was unable to be found which resulted in Greenlight Environmental Limited entering administration and the immediate redundancy of all staff.

'We are working with local and national organisations including West Dunbartonshire Council, Partnership Action for Continuing Employment, the Job Centre and the Redundancy Payments Service to support the affected employees at this difficult time.'

An Argyll and Bute Council spokesperson said: 'In light of the news about Greenlight, we can confirm we already have alternative plans in place and we do not anticipate there will be any impact on our refuse collection service anywhere in Argyll and Bute.'

The Argyllshire Advertiser approached several licensed premises in Lochgilphead and Tarbert to assess the impact of the collapse on glass recycling services.

None of the businesses were aware of Greenlight's demise and one licensee said: 'We get a glass uplift once a fortnight and it's due shortly. We'll see what happens.'

# Lochgilphead fine dodger pays up after cash seized

Fine dodgers have been warned to pay up or find their cash seized after an Argyll driver had his wages frozen when he failed to pay.

The Lochgilphead man owed £150 for a road traffic offence and after he ignored warning letters, fines enforcement officers secured an earnings arrestment order and the outstanding amount was taken from his wages.

He was among a number of fine dodgers who settled their balances after receiving a nasty surprise when their bank accounts or earnings were seized.

Freezing bank accounts or arresting wages are among a number of measures available to the Scottish Courts and Tribunals Service for recovering unpaid fines. Other enforcement measures include clamping vehicles, taking money directly from benefits and even arresting non-payers travelling through ports and airports.

Mid Argyll Health and Care Forum (HCF) is looking for a vice-chairperson after the previous incumbent Barabel McKay was elected into the chair.

At the HCF meeting on Tuesday August 14, members agreed to start the formal election process to fill this important position.

Members of the forum contribute to and influence the work of Argyll and Bute Health and Social Care Partnership (HSCP), particularly in representing the views of the general public and the people who use health and social care services.

As vice chairperson, the successful candidate will have an important role to play in shaping the future of services in the local area.

To be eligible for election you must be a member of the Argyll and Bute HCF living in or having a substantial interest in the Mid Argyll locality.

You are invited to register an interest or self-nominate by Monday September 17.

Anyone who is not a member but interested in either position may join the HCF at the same time as self nominating.

Members who are employed by either NHS Highland, Argyll and Bute Council or the third sector are not eligible due to potential conflict of interest.

Appointment will be either two or three years and candidates can be re-elected up to a maximum of six years.

Ballot papers will be sent to members on Monday October 1 and this will close at noon on Monday October 29.

The results, overseen by an independent person, will be published on the Health and Social Care Partnership's web page on Tuesday October 30.

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

# Banks, broadband, Brexit an

Secretary of State Scotland was in Lochgilphead for talks with Argyll and Bute Council over proposals for a Rural Growth Deal - as reported in last week's edition.

While David Mundell MP was at the council's Kilmory headquarters on August 28, the Argyllshire Advertiser took the opportunity to quiz him on a number of local matters.

Here are his answers.



Would the UK government fund tunnels and bridges to better connect Argyll and Bute?

AA: According to the Argyll and Bute Economic Forum. one of the factors inhibiting economic growth in the region is connectivity - both broadband and mobile. What are your views on improving these?

DM: 'Obviously these are vitally important for rural areas. What Argyll and Bute Council wants to do as part of the Rural Growth Deal is to have the highest possible broadband speeds.

'You are not going to get people to live in or visit rural areas if they don't get the level of connectivity they are accustomed to. It is right at the centre of the consideration in this deal and I am very supportive of it.'

AA: Another potential obstacle to economic development in Argyll and Bute is transport links, given the region's unique geography. Would you support the development of fixed links such as tunnels and bridges for this

DM: 'These are much more a matter for the Scottish

Government, as roads and transport are devolved, but it's self-evident that to get products such as seafood to market quickly you need to have those transport links.

'I'm sure the council will be pitching to the Scottish Government to have those transport links improved. I also think it is worth looking at how other island commu-

nities deal with these sort of problems.'

**AA:** Would Westminster support such projects financially after Brexit?

**DM:** 'Up until the point we've formally left the EU, all funding arrangements are guaranteed. Beyond that we will be looking to put in place the 'Shared Prosperity Fund', which will be the equivalent of EU structural and other funding.

'We will shortly be consulting on the form the Shared Prosperity Fund should take.'

AA: RBS has threatened to close its Inveraray branch, having already closed branches in dozens of other towns including Campbeltown and Rothesay since the turn of the year. What are your thoughts on this, from a UK government perspective?

DM: 'The first thing to say is that it isn't possible, contrary to what some people have suggested, for the government to tell RBS what to do. While the government is a shareholder, it is not running RBS.

'My own view is that the approach of RBS over these branch closures demonstrates that they do not place any importance on serving rural Scotland. I have encouraged

people to play a full part in the consultations over threatened branches.

'I do think we have to be very alive to the wider issues about people being able to get access to cash in rural areas. That's something the government is very cogniscant of.

'RBS have demonstrated no commitment to rural areas and that is very disappointing.'

**AA:** Is Scotland ready for Brexit?

**DM:** 'I hope so. What we're trying to do in relation to Brexit is get the best possible deal, and I still believe it's possible to get a deal.

'I want to see everyone rallying around the prime minister and her proposal, which meets the needs of Scotland by continuing to have close trading links with the EU whilst ensuring that we do, in fact, leave in accordance with people's wishes.

'It will ensure that we leave the Common Fisheries Policy and Common Agricultural Policy - but have that trading relationship with the EU.'

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

### Jobs, bribes and renewable energy

Sir,

Mr Hamilton's and S White's letters in the August 31 edition of the Argyllshire Advertiser cannot go unremarked upon.

What we have never lacked in Argyll is an endless supply of armchair experts, often blowing in from the urban south, seldom requiring a local job to support a growing family, and quick to criticise others over matters they generally know very little about.

The businesses which have long battled to provide local economic opportunity to young families in our most fragile rural communities have grown used to these slings and arrows. Kelp has been sustainably harvested for generations in Argyll and talk of fish farms despoiling the sea is rank nonsense.

Today around 600 people in Argyll depend on aquaculture for their livelihood. To criticise our council for rightly having a keen interest in local employment is baffling, particularly in a rural county where our working-age population continues to decline sharply through lack of job opportunity.

S White's rant on renewable energy is both ill-informed and silent on any constructive alternative route to reduce the carbon emissions that are likely driving climate change. As we contemplated the wisdom of S White's views last Friday morning, around £1.5m of locally manufactured wind towers were being loaded aboard in Campbeltown Harbour, destined for

the Netherlands. Argyll's and much of greater Glasgow's kettles were certainly being boiled by the wind and hydro power being generated in Argyll, and hundreds of local people were going to work and earning their living derived from the renewable energy businesses of Argyll.

For local people who have supported renewable energy developments that have brought real economic benefits far beyond the obvious community funds, the suggestion that they have been 'bribed' is patronising and absurd.

It is self-evident that we are economically dependent on what we can produce from the limited options available to us in remote rural areas. Argyll's natural resources favour aquaculture and renewable energy, for which global demand continues to grow. For our part, we hope our councillors and business enterprises will continue their laudable efforts to grow these industries, and the associated economic activity that helps provide the secure employment and opportunity for our local community and also funds a big slice of Argyll's non-domestic rates.

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

### Scottish Sea Life Sanctuary set to close

The Scottish Sealife Sanctuary in Barcaldine, near Oban, will close its doors on October 31 unless a buyer is found.

The much-loved Obanbased attraction, which opened in 1979, will be open to the public until Wednesday October 31 to care for creatures and welcome guests.

Work is starting to transfer the creatures in the care of the sanctuary to other centres in the UK with the help of vets, marine biologists and logistics experts to ensure the well-being of all the animals.

# Readers respond to family appeal

The search for information on the Mid Argyll Dargie family has yielded a wealth of information.

As reported in the August 31 edition of the Argyllshire Advertiser, a family from New Zealand has been looking to re-connect with long-lost family in Scotland.

Thomas Hamilton Dargie, a farm worker at Barsloisnach on Poltalloch Estate, emigrated to New Zealand in the 1920s or '30s. After he moved to the Land of the Long White Cloud he never reconnected with any of his family.

His son Grant, leading the search, said: 'In 1977, I did a similar search but lost contact

with the family over time. We wanted to try to connect with any possible relatives who may still reside in that area.

'We are keen to know of any possible kin who may still interested in connecting in with New Zealand or Australian family. I am hoping the Argyllshire Advertiser may help us connect with anyone who may know.'

Grant's youngest brother, another Thomas Hamilton Dargie, was in Adrishaig a few weeks back searching for any family connections.

Last week's appeal prompted a number of readers to get in touch.

One lady contacted the

paper to say she is the current resident at Barsloisnach. She said: 'The worker mentioned was employed by the Malcolms of Duntrune Castle and the cottage was tied. About three years ago I came across relatives of this person, purely by chance, and we talked about the links to where I live. He was a consultant cardiologist, Professor Henry Dargie.'

A reader from Lochgilphead, Helen Shaw, called to say she is a niece of Thomas Dargie, or 'Uncle Tam'. She recalled that two Dargie sisters married two Paterson brothers, with her own mother being Helen Dargie.

### Islay Book Festival


Islay Book Festival celebrates its 11th festival on September 27-30 in its most ambitious festival to date.

## Scary mutants

The multi-million dollar international trade in exotic pets has long been a bugbear of mine.

Not only does it promote wild animals as (eminently unsuitable) fashion accessories, but it also allows potentially dangerous microbes to jump to, and cause epidemics in, other species including humans.

What's more, even if they don't mutate as occurred in the case outlined here, if released into the wild either by design or mistake these foreigners can cause havoc to local ecosystems.

In a letter to the scientific journal Nature in 2003, a group of German scientists began 'it has been rumoured that an unidentified crayfish...of marbled appearance and uncertain geographical origin that was introduced into the German aquarium trade in the mid 1990s, is

tion that might out-compete native crayfish'.

Now, 23 years later, this all-female crayfish has escaped into the wild. Identified as a descendent of the fresh water slough crayfish from Florida, it is now called the marbled crayfish or Marmokrebs. So far it has invaded the waterways of at least nine European countries as well as Japan and Madagascar. Unravelling its

origin reveals that a unique macro-mutation must have occurred in a single slough crayfish egg; probably caused by heat or cold shock whilst in transit from Florida to Germany for the pet market.

The resulting female hatchling possessed three sets of chromosomes per cell (triploidy) and the ability to produce clones of itself without a mate and at very high frequency.

Because of its warm climate and abundant freshwater habitats, Madagascar has seen the most rapid colonisation with Marmokrebs. Millions of the animals have invaded the country's lakes, rice paddies and swamps and are threatening its seven endemic crayfish species.

It is only a matter of time before this scenario is repeated in other locations, destroying valuable ecosystems and eliminating indigenous species.

### Seven projects given Kintyre wind farm cash

SSE wind farm funds delivered more than £25,000 in support for community projects in Kintyre during 2017/18, a new report has shown.



### Seal of Sir John Campbell of Cawdor discovered on Islay

A piece of Scotland's clan history, that has remained hidden for more than 400 years, has been discovered on Islay. An excavation at Dunyvaig Castle on Islay has uncovered the seal of Sir John Campbell of Cawdor.

The artefact dates back to the 1600s when the Campbell and MacDonald clans were locked in a bitter feud over Scotland's islands.

Zoë Wiacek, from the University of Reading, discovered the seal on a hidden clay floor at the historic site.

She said: 'I removed a piece of rubble and it was just sitting there on the ground. I immediately knew it was an important find, but had no idea what it was.

'I am so proud to have found something so important for the project and for Islay.

Kilmartin Museum archaeologist Roddy Regan said: 'Seals are extremely rare finds. This discovery conjures up an image of a Campbell garrison fleeing from the castle when under attack, dropping and losing one of their most precious items, or maybe the seal had once been hidden within a wall niche and long forgotten.'

Once used to sign and seal charters and legal documents, the seal is a circular disc of lead which carries the inscription IOANNIS CAMPBELL DE CALDER

It carries the Cawdor coat of arms with a galley ship and a stag and is dated 1593.



Latest commercial property market report shows changing picture

The latest analysis of commercial property sales across Scotland by the Scottish Property Federation (SPF) reflects a shift in fortunes for the nation's major cities over the three months from April to June 2018.

For the second successive quarter, activity in Aberdeen exceeded that in both Edinburgh and Glasgow. Total sales values in the Granite City was £123m and while this figure is 26 per cent less than the total from the previous quarter, it is 68 per cent greater than Q2 2017.

By comparison, in Edinburgh and Glasgow sales activity was 'subdued'. The total value sales in the Scottish capital in Q2 2018 was £122m. This is 19 per cent down on the previous quarter and is also 46 per cent down on Q2 2017. There were 110 commercial property sales in Edinburgh during this time.

In Glasgow, there were 129 commercial sales, totalling £104m. The value of commercial sales in Glasgow rose eight per cent compared to Q1 2018, but was down 42 per cent

on the same quarter in 2017.

Nationally, total sales values were down 29 per cent on Q1 at £684m (13 per cent down on the previous year), although the number of transactions rose from 1,006 in Q1 to 1,095 in Q2 (a rise of nine per cent). It is the first fall in total sales values since Q3 2017 and one of the main contributing factors is that there were a lower number of high value sales.

The figures were collated using data from Registers of Scotland.

David Melhuish, direc-

tor of Scottish Property Federation, said: 'Our analysis of Q2 commercial sales figures shows an interesting picture emerging in the cities. Aberdeen continued to have marginally higher sales than both Edinburgh and Glasgow especially note-worthy as Aberdeen had under half the number of sales than the other two. Looking at the bigger picture, across Scotland the recent data suggests that the commercial property sales market has been quieter than we have been used to in the past few years.

'That said, investment remains strong in Scottish real estate, with industry data experts CoStar reporting £584m invested into the sector in Q2. This brings the total investment for 2018 so far to £1.4bn,

up on the same period in both 2017 and 2016.

'Overall, it was a mixed quarter for Scottish commercial property sales, with Aberdeen again showing signs of recovery, but subdued elsewhere.'
