Urgent appeal for volunteers to revive popular event next year

A NEW band of volunteers is being sought to revive the Lochgilphead Lantern Parade as 2014 will be the first year the event has not been held for two almost decades.

The parade, which sees hundreds of people march down Argyll Street with handmade lanterns on bonfire night, was cancelled after residents failed to volunteer to run it.

Only two people turned out to a public meeting earlier this year, which aimed to find a replacement for Lanterns@10 committee members who, for personal reasons, had stepped down.

Now the Heart of Argyll Tourism Alliance (HOATA) and Artmap Argyll are calling on lorevive the much-loved festival in 2015.

'The previous committee ran it for 10 to 12 years and felt it was time to hand it over to someone else. What we need to do now is identify that someone else,' said Carron Tobin of HOATA.

'It needs new members with the energy and desire to chase some funding.

'If the community came together and worked to make it happen it stands a good chance of coming back next year.'

Figures for the 2012 Lantern Parade show 3,000 people turned out to watch the spectacle and fireworks, while an additional 200 people took part in the parade and lantern making workshops.

A WOMAN whose toddler was treated for a brain tumour at Yorkhill Children's Hospital will join her friends in 'giving something back' to those who helped to save her child's life.

Natalie Armour's son Harris Law was diagnosed with a benign brain tumour in July. Harris was admitted to the Glasgow hospital within days, where he had a shunt installed, which drains fluid from around the tumour into his stomach.

Just two months on, the 18-month-old is well and at home in Ardrishaig with his mum, dad, Johnny Law, and older sister Katie-Anne.

Now Natalie and a

group of women from October 4, by Mid Ar-Mid Argyll are to complete a sponsored cycle and host a charity disco to raise cash for the hospital.

Family friend Kirsteen Houston is one of around 20 women volunteering to get on her bike.

She said: 'A lot of women in the area and their families - too many to mention - have had dealings with Yorkhill over the years and so as a group of friends want to give something back.

'We will be cycling 24 miles from Ardrishaig along the Crinan Canal and around the surrounding villages.'

Summit rescheduled as population predictions revealed by council

Number of people living in Argyll expected to drop by 13.5 per cent

Council's controversial population summit has been rescheduled for October, as councillors learn Argyll's populace is expected to drop by more than 11,000 in the next 23 years.

The local authority has confirmed the summit, previously cancelled in May this year, has been rescheduled for October 29, when Scottish finance minister John Swinney will deliver a keynote speech.

Now dubbed the Economic Summit, the Bute.'

ARGYLL and Bute event will bring together representatives from local and national government, as well as the business, public and voluntary sectors to find ways of boosting the population and in turn the economy.

Retain

A spokesman for Argyll and Bute Council said: 'We need to retain as many of our talented young people as possible, as well as creating an economic environment which will attract expertise to Argyll and

News of the summit has been welcomed by politicians who were outraged when the earlier summit was cancelled.

Michael Russell, MSP for Argyll and Bute, said: 'I'm glad a date has been assigned but it's almost a year later than was promised and the council's own community planning partnership last week saw future disastrous projections on population for Argyll and Bute.

'One population report showed Argyll would have the second largest loss of population of any area in Scotland going forward to 2037."

He added: 'I'm very concerned about what is a palpable lack of urgency in the council; it needs to be addressed urgently by the council, delaying by a year shows no sign of that.'

Population projections predict the number of working age people in Argyll will drop by 22 per cent by 2037, while the number of people aged 75 and above will increase by 73 per cent.

A spokeswoman for Transport Scotland said: 'We have asked our operating company, BEAR Scotland, to investigate if there is Giant Hogweed within the trunk road boundary near the Kilmory shore line. If there is any found it will be added to our weed control programme and will be treated accordingly.



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Rural disconnect

IT IS unfortunate that Vodafone is asking rural communities to practically 'compete' for an adequate phone signal.

The telecommunications giant is asking communities to 'apply' for good mobile phone reception, stating it would give the opportunity to places where there is currently poor mobile

By recognising the signal is poor in remote and rural areas, Vodafone has publicly confirmed its service in Argyll is greatly inferior than in other areas, such as Glasgow and Edinburgh.

Perhaps, if the company recognises its shortcomings in providing a service to rural communities, it should offer a reduced rate to customers whose phone signal is often cut off for days and, on one instance, was lost for a solid month in Tarbert.

Instead of asking communities to apply to its Sure Signal programme, Vodafone should, in partnership with other operators and government, be looking to develop a comprehensive programme for rolling out improvements across all of rural Scotland.

NHS not meeting waiting time targets

Sir,

As a coalition of independent and third sector children and young people's service providers we are alarmed by the waiting time figures published by the Information Services Division of National Services Scotland, part of NHS Scotland (August 27).

From April to June 2014, the figures indicate that the majority of health boards are currently failing to meet a 26-week waiting time target for treatment from specialist child and adolescent mental health service, CAMHS.

The waiting time target was introduced in March 2013, and health boards are at risk of missing the Scottish Government target of an 18week waiting time, which will start in December 2014.

NHS Scotland provides mental health services for children and young people with a wide range of mental health conditions including; attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD), anxiety, depression and early onset psychosis.

Our members deal with vulnerable children and young people, many of whom require these services.

We are concerned with the figures and number of vacant posts.

Particularly outwith the central belt, for invaluable services such as educational psychologists and child and adolescent psychiatrists.

According to the CAMHS, only five out of the 14 health boards have achieved this 26-week waiting time target 2013.

And only four out of the 14 health boards currently achieve an 18-week target which comes into force in December 2014.

We are at a crisis point. which is why we are renewing our call to the Scottish Government for greater support for failing health boards.

We want them to provide incentives to aid recruitment specialisms educational psychology and child and adolescent psychiatry, ensuring that the most vulnerable young people in our society get the support they deserve.

Freasdail wind farm to be built next year

Argyll and Bute Council will not appeal Scottish Government's decision

CONSTRUCTION of a cil said: 'Decisions by controversial wind farm south of Tarbert is to begin next year, as Argyll and Bute Council confirms it will not appeal the Scottish Government's decision to give the development the goahead.

The local authority had last year turned down the RES application to erect 11 100-metre high turbines on land near Whitehouse.

But RES took the decision to the Scottish Government which appointed an independent reporter, who, in April, rejected the council's view that Freasdail wind farm would 'overwhelm and dominate' a highly sensitive landscape.

It was the first wind farm planning judgement in Argyll to be overturned by the Scottish Government.

A spokeswoman for Argyll and Bute Counthe reporter would only be challenged if there were clear procedural or administrative issues. There is therefore no opportunity here to challenge the reporter's planning judgement.

Significant cost

'In any case, such a course of action carries a significant cost to the public purse and the likely outcome must be carefully considered against this.'

Meanwhile RES has confirmed it will continue to engage with the local community through the established community liaison group.

A spokeswoman for the energy firm said: 'RES anticipates starting construction in late 2015, and is working on the detail of the construction programme, which will be shared with the community in due course.

'No contracts have been awarded for Freasdail Wind Farm and RES is planning to hold an event later this year, at which local businesses and contractors will be able to meet RES to find out about opportunities available during construction.'





Ardchonnel Wind Farm appeal lodged

AN APPEAL against a decision to site a wind farm on 'sensitive tourist land' has been lodged with the Scottish Government.

The application for Ardchonnel wind farm was turned down by local councillors earlier this year, but Kilchrenan and Dalavich communidismayed to hear it was now gong before ministers.

The development is for 15 turbines on land owned by Conservative shadow environment spokesman Jamie McGrigor MSP.

Developer RWE Innology UK said: 'After re-considering all the relevant information, we remain convinced that Ardchonnel is a viable proposal.

Proposed

It is located in Argyll and Bute Council's proposed area of search for wind turbines and sits ty councillors have been on a site which has no landscape or indeed any other statutory designa-

'In addition, the nearest settlement with visibility of the Ardchonnel turbines would be approximately three kilometres from the site.

'The proposal has had no statutory objections and has the support of both Glenorchy and Innishail and Inveraray community councils.

'It also has strong support from the community and local businesses, as demonstrated by letters of local support which were sent to Argyll and Bute Council prior to the hearing.

But protesters say it would devastate the landscape, ruin tourism and that no consideration was being given to the wider issues of the 'true' requirements of energy needs.

New £1.2m recycling landfill at Lingerton

People in Argyll and Bute are recycling more and more

CHIEFS from the company that disposes waste in Argyll have flown into Lochgilphead to talk about a new £1.2million recycling landfill, as they report an increase in recycling in the area.

Bosses at Shanks Plc travelled to Lingerton Dump, just outside Kilmory, last week to see the mass cell, which can house tonnes of reusable waste.

The visit coincided with an open evening at the site when the public was invited to learn more about how waste is processed locally and what they can do to help the environment.

Mike Turner, a Shanks Plc director, said: 'The new landfill cell that we are about to open cost £1.2m to build and will be made up of re-useable waste, but there is constant investment into these facilities.

'We held the open night so as to give the public more insight into what we are doing here. For them to know where their general household waste is going when it leaves with the bin men will help them to make decisions in what they throw out.'

Since Shanks took responsibility for waste management in 2007 recycling has increased by more than 10 per cent in Argyll and Bute.

we started out here recycling was below 40 per cent and now it is sitting above 50 per cent... and

the amount of waste going to landfill is continuing to decline. And the people here can help us with that.'

At the open night last Monday, staff took turns in presenting to people, encouraging them to recycle more and offering guided tours of the site.

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

Now in its fourth year,





Lochgilphead High School pupils 'inspired' by 'I am Me' show

Workshop looks at effects of and coping with disabilities hate crime

PUPILS were 'inspired' by a stage show that was performed at their school as part of a campaign against disability hate crime.

More than 300 high school pupils from Lochgilphead watched the emotive, 40-minute play, 'I am Me', in silence as PACE Theatre Group told the story of a boy named Charlie who battles with autism, learning difficulties and bullying.

The play, which has

already showcased in schools throughout Renfrewshire, incorporates the daily struggles of a person with a disability and the peer pressure on those committing hate crime.

Nicola Ellis, is a senior pupil at the school. She said: 'It was inspiring and an accurate representation of what goes on.

'It reminded me that people with disabilities should not be treat with disrespect.' Mid Argyll Youth Development Services (MAYDs), run by Fiona Kalache in Lochgilphead, secured funding for the show to launch in Argyll and Bute after being approached by Trish Collins, police officer for safer communities in the area.

Trish also delivered a strong message to pupils after the play, where she reiterated a zero tolerance approach, and warned youngsters to be wary of offensive language. She said: 'You must change the way that people think and change what is acceptable in our communities.

'The police staff can't change it, only you can. Be aware of your language you are the future. If you know people who are using it and you don't tell them to stop it, then you are supporting it.'

More than 30 pupils volunteered to take part in a discussion workshop afterwards with the actors and Trish. They discussed how to cope when faced with disability hate crime and how to report it.

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
