CONTROVERSIAL and unpopular plans by a Scottish public body to redraw council boundaries have prompted a significant reaction from Argyll and Bute residents.

Figures released by the Local Government Boundary Commission for Scotland reveal a public consultation attracted four times the level of responses from this region, compared to the rest of Scotland.

The proposed new boundaries would move Ardrishaig, Tayvallich and the rest of Knapdale into Kintyre, while lumping Lochgilphead in with Dalmally and Bridge of Orchy in a new Mid Argyll ward. Other changes include the abolition of the Cowal ward and the forcing together of areas as dispersed as vil- the Scottish ministers lages near Helensburgh

'Knowing how communities in South Oban, Bute and Cowal feel, this exceptional response comes as no surprise to me.'

Councillor MacMillan added: 'At present the proposals are not at all satisfactory for Mid Argyll. I hope the commission responds to what the people are saying.

Canal chiefs come to Cairnbaan

CANAL users had the opportunity to meet officials from Scottish Canals as the organisation held its latest customer forum last Saturday.

Local manager Joe Murphy outlined recent works around the Crinan Canal, including canal and towpath maintenance and improvement, improved signage, a lighthouse upgrade and the installation of traffic calming at towpaths.

Looking ahead, Mr Murphy told the audience of around 30 people at the Cairnbaan Hotel that more towpath improvements were planned, along with vegetation control, lock upgrades and the replacement of Bellanoch jetty with a wharf.

Spotlight on the future of wave power

SCHOOL children are being asked to imagine the future of renewable energy in Scotland.

The Junior Saltire Awards is asking children in both primary and secondary schools across the country to design, build and test a wave energy convector which can harness wave power to make electricity. Those coming up with the best ideas will be invited to put their designs to the test at the University of Edinburgh's FloWave Ocean Energy Research Facility-the world's most sophisticated ocean simulator which can recreate multi-directional waves and fast tidal flows.

The competition is open to three age groups: P5-P7, S1-S3 and S4-S6. Teams of four in each age group have until December 18 to register.

Teams have until the end of February to complete a design brief and until the end of April to provide evidence of their finished model.

More support for local businesses bidding for council contracts

ARGYLL and Bute Council is aiming to get more local businesses to bid for its contracts.


A recent policy and resources committee meeting agreed to expand the programme of support offered to local businesses bidding for council contracts.

There will be quarterly procurement surgeries held around Argyll including Lochgilphead, Helensburgh and Dunoon.

Council leader Dick Walsh said: 'There is an impression across the

country that public sector contracts can only be won by big, national companies which employ their own procurement experts to fill in the forms, but that simply isn't true. We awarded over a third of contracts to local companies last year; well above the national average of around one-fifth.'

He added: 'We would encourage any local businesses interested in securing public sector contracts to get in touch with our procurement team, join the programme and book a place at one of the upcoming surgeries.'

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Time to get your Santa Charity air ambulance takes deliver of new life-saving helicopter

ARGYLL is set to benefit from enhanced air ambulance coverage as the country's only charity-funded service unveils its new life-saving helicopter.

After two years of nationwide operations, Scotland's Charity Air Ambulance (SCAA) has upgraded to a larger, faster and more powerful EC135 T2i. Its arrival heralds the retiral of the last Bolkow 105 air ambulance in the UK, which launched SCAA's service in 2013 and has deployed to emergencies in Argyll on many occasions.

The new EC135 is expected to be fully operational at SCAA later this month, with crew training now in its final stages.

Scotland's health minister, Shona Robison MSP, said: 'Within little more than two years, Scotland's Charity Air Ambulance has become an integral part of our vital emergency services, responding to over 850 call outs from the Highlands and Islands to the Borders and providing an invaluable service to the people of

Scotland. This new helicopter will mean that the Charity Air Ambulance can now fly further and faster than ever before. This will help the air ambulance provide an even better service to the people of Scotland who will need it most.' The helicopter upgrade

was made possible by a £3.3 million allocation from LIBOR funds announced earlier this vear.

SCAA chairman, John Bullough, said the funding had provided an invaluable springboard for the latest phase in the charity's development. 'There is no doubt

will increase the speed, range, endurance and payload SCAA is able to offer, and will be able to fly at night and in cloud. The new model also has a larger cabin which means a family member or a physician could fly with the patient.

'We believe that the cumulative effect of these and other improvements could increase our capability by up to 50 per cent, which is potentially 50 per cent more lives saved,' added Mr Bullough.

SCAA is supported solely by the public, trusts, companies and foundations, who raise the required funds to keep the popular charity in the air.

Improvement in ACHA's latest landlord report

ARGYLL Community Housing Association (ACHA) has released its 2014/15 landlord report, which shows improvement in some areas.

Tenant satisfaction when moving into a new home has gone up from 71 per cent to 78 per cent, but is still well below the Scottish average of 86 per cent.

One area in which ACHA is above the Scottish average is tenant satisfaction with repairs, which are at 97 per cent compared with the Scottish average of 89 per cent.

There is a difference in demand for housing in different areas of Argyll and Bute, which impacts on how long it takes for houses to be re-let. The majority of homes that are difficult to let are in Bute and Kintyre.

Rather than travelling ten miles to Strachur or eight to Inveraray for postal services, Cairn- ence already', said Hel-



Coffee morning, sale of work and play day

The win means the red and blacks jump a point clear of Kingussie, who were playing their last league game of the season. The defeat leaves the Badenoch side to take on Kilmallie in a play-off to see who will be in shinty's top flight next season.

Camanachd, still without the injured Keith MacMillan and top scorer Andrew 'Papa' MacCuish made light of this and recorded a fine win, although not playing as well as they have done in recent weeks.

Stadium Mossifield passed an early morning pitch inspection after the heavy overnight rain and with the overhead conditions fair the stage was set for this important fixture.

In front of a large crowd,

Kingussie controlled much of the first half.

The home team persisted in playing through the middle, which was easily dealt with by Kingussie's experienced defenders James Hutchison and Lee Bain, and with John Gibson controlling the vital midfield area it was no surprise when Ryan Borthwick opened the scoring for the visitors.

The Oban side were lacking fluency in their play and Kingussie fully merited their half time lead.

It was a dejected Kingussie team that trudged off Mossfield at the end of the 90 minutes, but at least they still have their future in their own hands, with the play-off game against Kilmallie scheduled to take place on November 28.

It has been a remarkable turnaround for Camanachd, who for long periods of the season looked certain to be relegated. The Oban side travel to
