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Top down' attitude wrong, forum tells health bosses

They face a financial cliff-edge, yet health bosses are failing to listen to the very people using their services.

That was the accusation made as Mid Argyll Health and Care Forum met to hear all about plans for a new health and social care strategic plan.

Argyll and Bute Health and Social Care Partnership (HSCP), an amalgamation of council and health board resources, is in the process of developing its second (2019-2022) three-year strategic plan.

Faced with a spending shortfall of £5.2 million this financial year and the prospect of this growing by £1 million in the next year, the situation is described by the HSCP as 'challenging'.

Reviewing each part of its services – from care homes to hospital services, a series of broad service changes are proposed, with these due to go out to public consultation shortly.

The top-down process of public engagement, though, does not meet with the approval of Mid Argyll Health and Care Forum.

Chairwoman Barabel MacKay said: 'We want to be involved. People should be looked on as a resource.

We have the "lived" experience.' She acknowledged that it was not always easy to speak up, adding: 'Members of this forum are motivated, but what about less able and older folk?

'I'm past worrying about asking daft questions, but people can be intimidated when health professionals are round the table. But people need to be asked, not dictated to in a top-down way.'

Presenting the plan for 'stakeholder engagement' ahead of the new strategic plan was Jay Wilkinson of the HSCP, who explained: 'The intention is not just to base the consultation in groups like this, and we intend to take this to communities.

'At the moment we are only looking at high level changes, not specifics.'

Councillor Anne Horn said: 'I was a member of the shadow board when the HSCP was set up, and things have not moved forward. We keep asking the same questions. It worries me – and who is driving this process?'

Emphasising that any criticism is not aimed at HSCP front line staff, Barabel MacKay said of the decision makers: 'It's not just about listening, it is about hearing what people are saying and having the humility to realise you need help.'

Resilience fund cash windfall for Cairndow

Communities across Argyll and Bute are benefiting from funding to help them become more resilient and prepare for winter storms.

The SSEN Resilient Communities Fund is awarding £33,576 to four groups for projects that help protect the welfare of those most vulnerable, enhance community facilities or improve communication during an emergency weather event.

In this latest round, Cairndow Community Council has been awarded £3,000 to build a community resilience plan and purchase equipment; Kames District Recreation Club has received £1,890 to install an electrical connection to the community hall's supply for a generator to partially heat and light the building in an emergency; Argyll FM has received £25,000 to widen its broadcast reach to south Kintyre and Southend; and the Isle of Bute Resilience Team was given £3,686 to purchase equipment to implement a resilience plan. Samantha O'Connor,

customer relationship manager for SSEN's South Caledonia region, said: 'I am delighted that we are able to support such a diverse range of community resilience projects across Argyll and Bute through our Resilient Communities Fund this year.

'While we work hard throughout the year to ensure that we are prepared for adverse weather conditions, this fund enables us to empower our customers and communities to prepare and strengthen their resilience too.'

A83 landslide measures to be reviewed at the Rest

Landslip 'mitigation' measures at the Rest and Be Thankful on the A83 are to be reviewed following the major landslip in October, in a bid to further improve the resilience of the vital route in Argyll.

And Scottish the Government revealed this week that Argyll and Bute was to be prioritised within the second Strategic Transport Projects Review, which will set out Transport Scotland's investment priorities for the future.

Speaking ahead of the the A83 Taskforce meeting at the Inveraray Inn on November 15, Cabinet Secretary for Transport, Infrastructure and Connectivity Michael Matheson said: 'I am very aware of the importance of the A83 to this region. We have invested £69.8m in its maintenance since 2007, including £11m in landslip mitigation measures and improvements to the Old Military Road diversion route.

'However, with the recent landslip still fresh in the memory, I've asked Transport Scotland officials to review



mitigation measures, with a view to further improving the resilience of the road, and report back to me in early

'Argyll and Bute will also be prioritised in the second Strategic Transport Projects Review, meaning recommendations for the region can be among the first reported. It will consider the transport needs and priorities for the whole area.

'In the meantime, the

ongoing and, with the existing landslide measures, they have already prevented the road from being closed for at least 40 days. We are also working closely with Forestry Commission Scotland to reintroduce vegetation on the hillside to help reduce the risk of landslips.

'All of these measures reflect the Scottish Government's commitment to keeping Argyll and Bute open for business.

Rest irony

On the way to the meeting about the Rest in Tarbet last Friday, it was noticeable that there was activity around the landslide netting.

Debris from a relatively minor slip the night before was being cleared.

And it will keep happening until a better engineering solution is found.

Negative Rest rhetoric

In response to Councillor Reid's letter regarding the Rest and Be Thankful, in which he asserts that the measures the Scottish Government has carried out have failed their first test, he completely misses the point.

Let me once again remind him of the highly commendable work being carried out by Transport Scotland, BEAR Scotland and GeoRope which have resulted in the Rest remaining open during 23 out of 24 incidents in the past three years. If he won't take my word for it, I'd be more than happy to provide him with the contact names of those team members to whom I have already spoken.

Indeed, I had a further site visit to speak with the teams at the Rest on Friday November 9. prior to the A83 Taskforce meeting scheduled for November 15. This was also on the same day that I attended a highly encouraging gathering of various stakeholders, comprising (cross-party) Argyll and Bute MSP, MP, councillors, businesses and local individuals where we discussed the immediate and wider impact of A83 closures in light of the most recent incident, current mitigation measures, and hopes and potential strategies for more permanent solutions.

I would strongly suggest to Councillor Reid - before he embarks on any further baseless criticism - that he might like to make the effort to avail himself of some factual evidence by having at least one face-to-face discussion with teams at the Rest. Perhaps he might also like to attend future stakeholder meetings where he is cordially invited to get positively involved rather than resorting to mere negative rhetoric.

It would certainly be enlightening to hear of his previous involvement with issues affecting the Rest and Be Thankful during his 14 years as an MP.

Mid Argyll reflects – a century on from Armistice

Steady rainfall did nothing to prevent the people of Mid Argyll - of all ages - from turning out in silent tribute.

On the 100th anniversary of the signing of the Armistice which brought to an end the Great War of 1914-18, they gathered to remember not only the fallen in wars, but also those who have sacrificed in so many different ways to this day.

There were prayers for peace, healing and accord among nations.

A large number of people gathered at Lochgilphead war memorial to pay their respects. Reverend Hilda Smith opened by reading the names of those lost in conflict.

It was a moving tribute, all the more sombre in the grey

dampness. But there was hope, too, amid quiet reflection, with a prayer for peace and reconciliation.

Parade commander for the occasion was ex Sapper Joe Geekie, vice chairman of Lochgilphead Armed Forces Day. Mid Argyll Pipe Band led the march, with Pipe Major Craig Lang playing the moving pipe air Flowers o' the Forest. Before that, 17-yearold trumpet player Jessica Tanner expertly played The Last Post.

A stunning display of poppies around the parish church took centre stage in Inveraray, while a special peal rang out in tribute from the Bell Tower.

A procession led by Inveraray and District Pipe Band marched down the main street to the town's striking war memorial. Reverend

Roderick Campbell spoke of the many devastating losses of The Great War.

'To have fought for four years in the mud and the hell and the evil of trenches is something far beyond our comprehension and so we remember,' he said.

'Our coming together is representative of all those who have lost of their own kind, their own kith and their own kin.'

Children Primary School recited the names of those lost as the wreaths were laid.

Tarbert folk turned out in numbers to the village war memorial, which had received a recent spruce up courtesy of Tarbert firefighters.

The scenes were repeated across the region as people gathered in remembrance.



Glashan log boat launches Lochgair Long Memories

A historic log boat would have been lost forever but for the prompt action of a Lochgair forestry worker who was also a member of his local archaeological society.

He shovelled mud over this ancient artefact to prevent it disintegrating in the hot spring of 1960. This triggered the history-changing dig on the Loch Glashan Crannog. The boat – estimated to date from around the 2nd to 4th century AD – and its associated finds, are currently the centre of the Scotland's Early Peoples exhibit in Kelvingrove Art Gallery and Museum in Glasgow.

The story of this dig and the importance of the Loch Glashan settlements will be brought to life in Lochgair at the second Long Memories exhibition, to be held over four days later this month.

Also featuring will be the 217-year wait for the building of the Lochgair church, along with the story of the brave fishermen who built it out of rubble from the hillside.

With the help of volunteers from the Friends of the Argyll Papers at Inveraray Castle, a petition was found that showed that as long ago as 1650 there had been a request to split the parish of Glassary, which extended at that time from Loch Awe to Loch Fyne, into three new parishes, one of which would have been Lochgair with its own church. This never happened.

The work on the rescue of the historic Asknish House also looks like attracting a lot of interest.

'We are really pleased that once again villagers have responded with photographs to liven up the telling of the story of Lochgair,' said Marion Lacey of the Lochgair Association and one of the exhibition organisers. The Long Memories exhibition will be in Lochgair Village Hall from 2pm to 5pm from Saturday November 24 to Tuesday November 27.

CalMac encourages new awareness of wildlife

Over the summer volunteers on CalMac ferries spotted more than 500 marine mammals across the west coast as part of the company's Marine Awareness Programme.

The programme involved 14 conservation bodies which partnered with CalMac to gather vital scientific data and educate passengers about the environment they are travelling in

A team of more than 60 wildlife enthusiasts compiled the survey results that tracked different species on different routes as part of the programme.

The information is compiled for UK whale and dolphin conservation charity ORCA. Marine bird surveys co-ordinated by the Joint Nature Conservation Committee are due to start in early 2019.

The survey was supervised by resident ORCA Wildlife Officer Andy Gilbert, taken on to increase understanding of the wealth of biodiversity that exists in CalMac's area of operations.

'Our Marine Awareness Programme focuses on increasing awareness of wildlife in our network by gathering scientific data, facilitating conservation and engaging with the public, Andy has been central to this over the past few months,' said CalMac's environmental manager Klare Chamberlain.

As well as training survey volunteers Andy has engaged with more 2,200 people on board during 45 trips, explaining about nature on the islands and demonstrating techniques to find wildlife.





Margaret's artistic quest for Scottish labyrinths

There is a labyrinth renaissance happening around the world today. People often ask what the difference is between a labyrinth and a maze. A maze is a puzzle intended to amuse and confuse - a labyrinth has one single,

visible path leading to the centre and out again. They are patterns with a purpose. Walking a labyrinth gives people a chance to take time out from their busy lives and they are fun to walk with friends and family or quietly alone.


And Marina's latest innovative idea is a Christmas present wrapping service.



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Report reveals what makes top performers stand out

A new report has revealed eight key factors that are the hallmarks of high performing farm businesses.

The report, by Quality Meat Scotland (QMS), the Agriculture and Horticulture Development Board (AHDB) and Hybu Cig Cymru – Meat Promotion Wales (HCC) – entitled 'The characteristics of high performing beef and

sheep farms in Great Britain' – presents new analysis of the Farm Business Survey, breaking down the variations between the best performing farms and other farm businesses.

AHDB Strategic Insight Manager Sarah Baker said: 'When we modelled potential Brexit scenarios, we found that the top 25 per cent of farmers could turn a profit no matter what policy decisions are made.

'This raised many questions, the most fundamental of which was what are the top-performing farms doing differently?

'This research decisively answers that question and more, empirically and statistically demonstrating the links between certain practices and high performance.'

Based on all the available evidence, the project concluded that eight key factors differentiate the top-performing farms. They are:

- Minimise overhead costs
 Have a clear business
- strategy
 Set goals and budgets
 Compare yourself and
- gather information

 Know what the market is and deliver for it
- Focus on detail
 Have a mindset for change and innovation
- Remain disciplined and stick to your strategy 'During this period of

During this period of considerable uncertainty that Brexit has triggered, this report highlights how important it is for farmers to have a clear vison for their businesses,' said Stuart Ashworth, director of economics services with QMS.



What are the top-performing farms doing differently?

He added: 'It also highlights the importance of farmers adopting the mindset and commitment to continually focus on details within their control as well as looking for and adopting the science and innovation that drives marginal gains to deliver a top 25 per cent performance.'

The report, written by Anderson's, focuses on LFA grazing livestock farms in Scotland, England and Wales mapping out key areas such as farm size, fixed and variable costs and outputs.

It found that the difference

in farm business income between the top performing 25 per cent of farms and the lowest performing 25 per cent is about £40,000 per year in Wales, £50,000 per year in England and £60,000 in Scotland.

The analysis also revealed that the top performers have higher costs than the bottom quartile, however, that additional spend is worthwhile as they produce considerably more than the bottom performers.

For example, in Wales while the top performers' costs were

a third higher they produce more than double the output of their lower performing peers.

This work was financed from the £2 million fund of AHDB red meat levies ring-fenced for collaborative projects which is managed by the three GB meat levy bodies – AHDB, HCC and QMS.

The fund is an interim arrangement while a long-term solution is sought on the issue of levies being collected at point of slaughter in England, for animals which have been reared in Scotland or Wales.
