Driver 'tried to push mother from moving car'

A LOCHGILPHEAD man has denied attempting to push a mother of six from his moving car during an argument. Graeme Robert McLennan, aged 39, of 19 Duntrune Place, Kilmory, pleaded not guilty at Oban Sheriff Court to a charge that, on the Salen to Craignure road on Mull, on January 31 2007, he assaulted his former partner while driving his 4x4 vehicle towards Craignure. It's alleged that McLennan unfastened the 44-year-old's seatbelt, opened the front passenger door and pushed her in an attempt to force her from his Vauxhall Frontera. Three of her children – then aged one, four and 15 – were in the back seat.

On the first day of the

trial, the mother and daughter, now aged 18, gave evidence via video-link; their addresses were withheld.

The woman said she had been in a four-year relationship with McLennan and was living with him and three of her children in Salen.

On the day of the incident she decided her 15-year-old daughter should stay in Oban for a few days with a friend.

She had already left to get the bus when McLennan arrived home early.

An argument arose, McLennan put the younger children in his car, with the complainer following. He picked up the girl from a phone box and drove to Craignure ferry terminal.

The woman said: 'Graeme was shouting

at all of us and he was arguing. He opened the door, released my seat-belt and tried to push me out while the vehicle was actually going. 'He said he was going to kill me.'

She only managed to remain in the car because she held on to the seat and tried to pull her door shut with her left hand. The 15-year-old, who was sitting in the middle rear passenger seat, leaned forward and hit McLennan on the shoulder to stop him.

'Then he drove across to the other side of the road saying that if he couldn't get rid of me, he'd get rid of all of us.'

At the ferry terminal the complainer and her children got out; McLennan threw their bags out and drove off.

Rain, wind, snow and frost hit Mid Argyll

MID ARGYLL was on the receiving end of all sorts of weather last week with rain, wind, snow and frost hitting many areas.

Most people awoke to a crisp, frosty morning last Monday with flutters of snow reaching higher areas.

But as the week progressed the weather took a turn for the worst with rain and high winds battering most of the area by the end of the week.

By Thursday, a mixture of rain, strong winds and a high tide, resulted in many main roads being severely affected by flooding.

The A83 at 'Ara

Bridge in Inveraray was 'passable with care' as the high tide flooded parts of the road.

And in Tarbert, sections of the A83 were completely waterlogged, with police closing the road briefly at Harbour Street. The B8024 Kilberry road also had to be closed as four trees came down, blocking the road.

Lochgilhead's Front Green was, at one stage of the day, submerged as the tide rose up reaching properties on Paltalloch Street.


Argyll and Bute Council's roads and amenity services team issued hundreds of sandbags to businesses

and homeowners across the area.

Last Friday (November 12) council workers were swift to clear up the tidal debris from coastal roads across the area.

Councillor Duncan MacIntyre, Argyll and Bute's spokesperson for Transportation and Infrastructure, said: 'We did have some warning of likely problems, and had taken all preventative measures we could within the time we had.'

'Despite the sterling efforts of our teams across the region, some locations nevertheless suffered flooding and other damage.'

Police arrived, but she told neither about the incident. Asked why, she said: 'Because I was scared and I wanted to get off the island and make sure the children were safe. 'Graeme also had it drilled into me that nobody would ever believe anything I would say.' She eventually went to police in December 2009, shortly after the relationship broke down. Her daughter told the court: 'He pushed her leg and she went out a wee bit. 'I just remember hitting him in the arm and shoulder and telling him to stop. It scared me ... I thought she was going to fall out of the car.' Defence agent Mark Moir cross examined the daughter over the statement she gave to police last December, and said she had made parts up to help her mum. The girl denied this.

Asked why she didn't tell the police at Craignure, the daughter said: 'I can't remember.' The trial continues.

A FORMER Lochgilphead High School pupil has picked up a top health heroes award for her work in improving health amongst 'hard to reach' groups of society.

Ann Macleod, daughter of Ian and Sheila MacLeod of Poltalloch Street, Lochgilphead attended the Scottish Health Awards hosted by BBC newsreader, Jackie Bird, at the Corn Exchange, Edinburgh last Thursday (November 11).

Ann, a project officer,

scooped the Health and Life Improvement category along with her colleagues from the 'Up for It? Project'.

Also in attendance was Deputy First Minister Nicola Sturgeon and Minister for Health and Sport Shona Robison. Ann explained: 'Up for It?' is a health improvement programme which targets areas of high social deprivation in South Lanarkshire working on improving health via physical activity, weight manage-

ment, stop smoking, counselling and support services. The project is in its tenth year has been recognised for innovative approaches to engaging 'hard to reach' groups of people in preventative health care, empowering them to take their own responsibility for their actions and ultimately improve their quality of life.'

She added: 'The award is a tremendous boost to an organisation funded by NHS Lanarkshire, South Lanarkshire Council and the Scottish Government in the current challenging financial climate.'

Schools' fate to be decided in chambers

Meeting won't be switched to bigger venue

NEXT week's full council meeting, which could see the fate of 26 Argyll schools decided, will be held in the council chambers despite reservations over the size of the venue.

Following the council's executive meeting earlier this month where proposals to reduce the number of primary schools from 80 to 54 were heard, political group Argyll First requested that a larger room be used for next Thursday's meeting.

Dougie Philand, leader of Argyll First, said: 'We requested a different venue to meet for the forthcoming full council meeting regarding the consultation process for school closures. This is in recognition of all the parents and children who never got in at the last meeting and in anticipation there may be more at the next

meeting.' Although alternative venues have been looked at, the council say that 'after consideration' the meeting will take place in the council chamber.

A spokeswoman for Argyll and Bute Council said: 'An examination of possible alternatives showed only one suitable venue with a significantly larger capacity - Lochgilphead Joint Campus. However, the use of this would have meant taking one of the campus's main facilities, the sports hall, out of commission for a day during term time causing significant disruption to the running of the school and to

the pupils.' Councillor Philand, leader of Argyll First, said: 'We believe that as this is an important decision about the school estate, parents and children should be allowed access to their elected representatives to witness their decisions.'

He added: 'Provost William Petrie has guaranteed to me that more seats will be put in the chamber to accommodate people as safely as possible.'

Having had more time to consider the proposals on the future of the school estate, councillors will now make a decision on whether the plans should go out to consultation.

Fight the fakes this Christmas

THAT Rolex you bought granddad for Christmas for a fiver is not going to be a real one, you know, and it's not just a dud, it's something very nasty.

Serious organised crime groups use the trade in fake goods to generate profit and to fund other forms of serious organised crime, including drug dealing, human trafficking and firearms.

The trade in fake goods involves passing off sub-standard goods, including clothing, handbags, perfume and electronic goods, as the real thing or pirating copyright materials such as films or music.

Counterfeiters and copyright crooks are being targeted by Crimestoppers and Trading Standards in a national campaign seeking the Scottish public's help to tackle the trade in fake goods; Argyll and Bute Council's trading standards team is taking part.

The Scotland Crimestoppers campaign urges

people to call anonymously with information on those who are involved in the production and sale of fake goods.

The month-long campaign began on Monday. In a recent survey conducted by Scotland Crimestoppers, 30 per cent of people questioned said they didn't know that buying fake goods might fund serious organised crime.

Fake goods

Ninety one per cent said they wouldn't buy a fake item if they knew it would fund criminals or criminal activity but 18 per cent of those questioned admitted that they had bought fake goods in the past.

Networking site deemed a success by drivers

A TRIAL, which used a social networking site to update drivers on road closures, has been deemed a success.

Scotland TranServ, the operating company responsible for the management and maintenance of the trunk road network in northwest Scotland, has recently been using Twitter to provide live feeds to motorists on the progress of roadworks.

A trial Twitter page, www.twitter.com/A83_Inveraray, was set up and kept Mid Argyll drivers abreast of news on the roadworks, which involved overnight road closures, on the A83 between Inveraray and Cairndow.

During the trial the road was opened early every night and everyone following the Twitter page was made aware of this in real time.

Delighted

Contract director at Scotland TranServ, Norrie Westbrook, said: 'We are delighted that initial indications show that the trial was successful. Our teams performed

fantastically well to end the overnight closures two nights ahead of schedule and we would like to thank people for their patience.'

He added: 'We are carrying out a full evaluation of the trial and considering how best to use Twitter and other social media to keep the public fully informed about our works in future.'

Mid Argyll Hospital could be scrapped

THE MID ARGYLL Hospital in Lochgilphead could make way for a bright new building with the help of private funding.

And although the new hospital would be privately owned, NHS patient treatment care would be retained.

Argyll and Bute NHS Trust is to employ a projects officer to examine the options open to the trust with the help of Scottish Office funding.

Part of the £80,000 windfall will be used towards assessing the possibility of replacing the present hospital, which has been branded 'tired' by trust bosses and to determine what type of facility is needed and where it would be based.

Last year, £100,000 was spent re-roofing the Mid Argyll Hospital, reshaping the accident and emergency department and installing a new consultation room.

Big splash on the way

THE COUNTDOWN has begun for the opening of Mid Argyll's long awaited swimming pool.

The 14-year-old project is nearing completion with the construction phase almost finalised and a manager secured.

It is hoped 10,000 local people from a wide rural catchment area will make use the £800,000 pool.

Around 600 secondary school pupils, and children from the area's 18 primary schools will now be able to include regular swimming lessons into their school curriculum.

True cost of closing schools

Sir,
The true reasons for school closures are exposed as staffing costs with any savings on building and property costs clearly outstripped by the cost of transporting the children by bus

to Lochgilphead School. This means a reduction in teachers and increase in class sizes.

Should both schools close then Lochgilphead Primary will lose their multi use room currently used for structured play and expressive arts etc as it becomes a classroom in an attempt to absorb the increasing school roll.

Of the 10 classrooms the figures show that four will have the maximum number of pupils either set by the Scottish Government or following agreement with Argyll and Bute Council with another class being above this agreed limit.

The 120 houses currently under construction at the old Mid Argyll Hospital/High School site, Badden and Fernoch have not been included in the predicted figures for the school roll or for that matter have any planned future housing developments in the area.

A 20 per cent drop in primary aged children is predicted by the Council whilst evidence from General Register Office for Scotland shows that it will actually increase in the years ahead.

The Council assures us however that despite all of this the school will be at 70 per cent occupancy which would allow for another 99 children (10 per classroom). This calculation is flawed and affects every school involved in the process.

Evidence shows that smaller class sizes have educational benefits for children and this is reflected in inspection reports for many rural schools.

To close both schools would be to the educational detriment of every pupil in Glassary, Minard and Lochgilphead schools and children in the years ahead.

WITH no electricity bills and a farm of near 4,000 acres being powered by a single turbine, Mary and Joe Turner of Kildalloig are looking to bigger options for the future.

Last year the Turners, who have sheep and cattle on their west coast hill farm, along with a number of holiday cottages, commissioned a 20kw turbine on their land near to Campbeltown in Kintyre.

Reducing the costs of power to the farm business, and providing an income to sustain the business were just some of the reasons Mary and Joe considered such an unusual project.

Kildalloig Westwind 20 was erected and put into commission last June and with an annual power output of 40,000kwh per annum, and with the Turner's annual electricity consumption equalling this, they effectively have no electricity bills.

The farm is situated in a remote location so it is not connected to the grid. A wood burner heats their water and the house, and the wind turbine now provides the electricity for the lighting and some heating.

It will take 12 years for the Turners to pay back the turbine, which cost a total of £72,000 to erect, however they did receive a 50 per cent grant from SRDP Rural Priorities.

The turbine was purchased from Segen, the farmer's renewable energy company. Two of the Turner's farm workers and two of Segen's workers installed the turbine.

They did come up against some barriers when considering a larger turbine, hence why they settled for a 20kw.

This included the grid connection and possible planning permission as an area of panoramic quality.

Before any turbine is considered there are factors that have to be taken into account and researched; in this case the farm is near to the flight paths for Campbeltown Airport. There is also the perennial question of wildlife and golden eagles have begun nesting in the area but by choosing the site of the turbine carefully these problems have been overcome.

'When considering the erection of a turbine, access is one thing to take into consideration, for Kildalloig the existing farm road was OK for less than a 50kw turbine,' said Mary.

'It is not just the wind turbine itself, but also the other parts that come with it. A concrete foundation had to be installed for the wind turbine and a winchline, this cost £11,000.

'Trenches for power cables and transformers and inverters had to be made, a cost of approximately £3,000, which the farm has six of.

'We also had to consider where the control box, inverters and dump loads were going to be housed. Further electrical work was needed at the point of use which can also add to costs.'

Mary explained that the size selection was of paramount importance, in open space, a windy lo-

cation with no obstacles, 'the higher the better'.

'We chose a site which was conveniently at the top of a farm road and from where there is an unobstructed view across the Atlantic,' said Mary.

Planning permission was granted by Argyll and Bute Council who were helpful and with no objections and a letter of support from Scottish Natural Heritage, Mary and Joe went ahead with their project.

They required no other planning permissions, as they owned all the land involved.

ISLE OF GIGHA COMMUNITY WIND FARM

Gigha Renewable Energy Limited, a trading subsidiary of the Isle of Gigha Heritage Trust, established the UK's first grid-connected local community-owned wind farm in December 2004. All the electricity being produced by this landmark project is consumed locally and is sold to a national supplier to generate an annual net income to the community of around £90,000. Community members were consulted at each stage through a series of meetings held throughout the development of the project. The Gigha community has named the turbines 'Creideas, Dòchas and Carthanna', the Gaelic names for 'Faith, Hope and Charity' and collectively call them 'The Dancing Ladies'. The financial model for the project was based around a combination of grant funding, loan funding and equity, including an £80,000 shareholding through HIE.

'Don't give up too easily' is the advice to anyone looking to erect a wind turbine from project officer of Gigha Heritage Trust's wind farm.

In 2004 a community buy-out of the Island of Gigha, Kintyre took place, and since then has gone from strength to strength.

It saw the island's population more than double and with the help of a wind farm the community is now set to benefit for many years to come, both financially and environmentally.

Known locally as The Dancing Ladies or Creideas, Dòchas is Carthannas, Gaelic for Faith, Hope and Charity, the wind farm has three turbines each able to produce 225kw.

This project was the first ever-Scottish community owned windfarm which was grid connected.

The community reaps the benefits of the turbines, with the profits from the energy company which sells the electricity, going straight back into the island's development.

The amount of profit the island receives depends on how much wind blows each year, and the administration and maintenance fees.

The three-v27 turbines bought second-hand from Cumbria Vestas, were erected and commissioned in 2005.

Project officer for Gigha Heritage Trust, which manages the project on behalf of the community, Remi Wassermann explained that there is enough energy, at 2gigawatt, to power 450 homes per year.

Mr Wassermann said: 'It is hard work, and it will take time, just don't give up too easily.'

The future is looking even brighter for the small wind farm, on the south of the island, as Mr Wassermann is currently developing plans for a fourth turbine.

'This one will be brand new and will last hopefully more than 20 years. This will provide more benefits to the community.'

He said that those looking to take forward a wind turbine development should speak to organisations like Energy Saving Scotland.

'It is important to consider wind speed assessments and wildlife conservations.

'The wind farm allows for the long term sustainability for the benefits of the community.'

Ten minutes into the second half Lochgilphead took the lead once more. Aaron Moore's corner from the right


was met superbly by Coll McCallum and his headed goal was no more than his team's play had deserved.
