Tarbert tree

TARBERT OFFERING BRANDED A 'DISGRACE'

AFTER a public outcry a Christmas tree described as a 'disgrace' by Dookers has been removed by council staff.

The tree had sat proudly, at a slight angle, in Tarbert's harbour area for three days before it was inspected by officers and Argyll and Bute Council agreed to change it.

Described on social media as 'an insult', 'scabby' and like a 'match', a campaign to have the tree replaced quickly mounted.

It is understood that more than 100 people made complaints to the local authority and councillors about the

The 12-foot-tall tree became a source of shame and anger for residents, who pointed out huge chunks missing a replacement was due from either side of it, mas lights on.

Contacting the Advertiser, residents said other towns, such as Inveraray and Lochgilphead, always had better trees than Tarbert.

On All Things Tarbert Facebook page reader Jane Knowles said: 'Well, trees must be hard to get round Tarbert...it's not like we're surrounded by forests full of lovely trees!

Gail MacDonald added, 'As per usual Tarbert gets the worst tree' and Heather Bellshaw said, 'send it back'.

Karlina Hamlin said: 'Visitors were just looking at it and shaking their heads. It's an embarrassment.'

The council confirmed it had been 'logging calls' about the unfortunate tree.

man explained: 'The council spends around £100,000 a year providing our communities with Christmas lights and trees. This tree is smaller than some of the trees in our other towns because of the limitations of the site - it is quite small and exposed.

'The supports for a larger tree would encroach on the car parking spaces on one side and the footpath on the other, and the tree itself would be at risk of blowing down in the event of severe weather.

'Public safety is our primary consideration when selecting and siting Christmas trees.'

casualty of First Minister Nicola Sturgeon's first cabinet reshuffle, Argyll and Bute MSP Michael Russell insists he stood down from the role as education secretary.

Mr Russell pointed to the demands of a cabinet role alongside serving a constituency as 'huge and varied' as Argyll and Bute in explaining his decision to leave the government post.

He is succeeded by Angela Constance MSP. A member of former First Minister Alex Salmond's cabinet for seven-and-a-half years - five as education secretary - Mr Russell and justice secretary Kenny MacAskill were notable absentees from the new first minister's top team.

Mr Russell said: 'My five years as education secretary was a learning experience in every way but I recently decided that whilst I fully

GAELIC medium education could launched in Mid Argyll, Argyll and Bute Council has confirmed.

The local authority this week said a consultation on the provision of Gaelic education in Mid Argyll would get underway within weeks, assessing the demand and viability of the service in the area.

To date Gaelic medium education has only been available at the Oban Primary Campus and Sandbank Primary School, near Dunoon.

A spokeswoman for Argyll and Bute Council said: 'Argyll and Bute Council met with parents representing Little Gaelic Voices after they requested that Gaelic education should be considered for the Mid Argyll area.

'Prior to any decision being made, a consultation will be carried out to determine interest and viability. This is be-

ing planned for early in it easier to learn lan-2015. The results of the consultation will then be analysed to establish the viability and feasibility of such a development in the Mid Argyll area.'

The consultation comes just months after playgroup little Gaelic Voices was established by Janet McGavin, with the support of friends.

Janet, mother of two girls aged one and three, is desperate to send her children to a Gaelic-speaking school.

Janet said: 'We are aware of the benefits of bilingualism and we want that for our children and we have been trying to get that message across to others.'

Janet said research has shown that children find guages simultaneously, while gaining a better education overall.

Explaining Scotland is 'falling behind' other European countries where children often learn as many as three languages, Janet added: 'There's the Gaelic option but that depends on where you live and it's fragmented and it seems really unfortunate that everyone doesn't have access to it.

'I think we will find that Europeans will have an advantage because they do speak three languages and there's a growing economy. If your children can speak a different language, the opportunities will be much better for them.'

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
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£23 million road improvement plans almost complete

THIS month marks the end of a three-year, £23 million project to improve the road network in Argyll and Bute.

The work, carried out in 360 miles of road which is equivalent to 25 per cent of the roads network, has involved Argyll and Bute Council carrying out a mix of resurfacing, patching and surface dressing.

This has seen a marked improvement in the overall network, with 90 per cent of the county's strategic A roads now regarded as being in a good or fair condition.

This programme is now substantially complete, with the rest of the work expected to finish before Christmas.

This programme, set out in the council's 2012 budget, is set to continue into a fourth year with around £5 million of works, by the end of which around 45 per cent of A roads will have been upgraded.

Support for armed forces employees

A PROJECT to support veterans and people in the armed forces is underway in Argyll.

It is the latest project to be announced by Argyll Bute Citizens Advice Bureau (CAB) after it secured funding earlier this month.

The Armed Services Advice Project (ASAP) provides support and financial advice to armed forces personnel and their families.

Gillian McInnes, manager at Lochgilphead CAB, said: 'We recognised there was a requirement for such a service in the area, what with the naval base in Helensburgh and with so many people here connected to those who are serving in the armed

forces, or have done. For people who have served in the armed forces there are other issues that can come with their jobs, including deep-rooted emotional problems and although we can't help with that aspect, we are here to point people in the right direction.'

It is estimated there are more than 7,500 people within Argyll and Bute linked to the armed services.

Primarily funded by Poppy Scotland, ASAP will run until 2016.

It was launched as the CAB celebrated its 75th anniversary, after it was set up to help communities through the depression that followed the Second World War.



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Council staff stress hits new high

HIGH levels of stress may cause a staffing 'catastrophe' in Argyll's local authority, a list MSP has said.

Responses to both and morale stress surveys released last week saw almost a quarter of council staff unhappy at work.

Argyll and Bute Council says it wants to improve training and communication for staff with their increased work load in light of staff redundancies imposed by central government cutbacks.

But Mike MacKenzie, SNP MSP for the Highlands and Islands, said he was aware of highly skilled and effective workers in various council departments felt under constant pressure because of the swingebacks to essential frontline services.

Mr MacKenzie said: 'Ordinary members of staff on the front line have to take the brunt of the complaints from members of the public.

'Anyone can see why that would cause stress in the workplace. If something is not done support workers,

who feel unable to cope ing, far-reaching cut- the result will be catastrophic.'

> MP for Argyll and Bute Alan Reid came to the defence of the council and praised it for carrying out the survey in the first place.

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Council right to switch Christmas tree

CHRISTMAS is the one time of year when communities come together to celebrate the season.

The central point of the town's celebrations are the decorations.

Things such as lights and Christmas trees can, as many from Tarbert quite rightly state, attract people to come to the town.

We only need to look towards the largest stores in the country to see how much is invested in Christmas.

The penguin versus the Christmas Day football match between British and German soldiers seems to be the order of the day of this year's adverts - costing somewhere in the region of £10million between those two alone.

People want the town's decorations to be the centre point of their celebrations. So why would a tree that is described as a 'match', 'scabby' or even 'disgraceful' be looked upon as acceptable for Tarbert.

The people from the village themselves already feel as though they are bottom of the pile - claiming trees in Inveraray and Lochgilphead are better.

So quite rightly the council has listened to the voice of the people and taken the tree

Perhaps next year the community themselves should be allowed to chose the tree and the council might kindly deliver it to them to decorate.

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Argyll wants solutions not mitigation measures

Keith Brown's letter gives the daily cost of operating the A83 diversion route on the Old Military Road (OMR) as £8,500 per day.

Could he confirm this is the total cost including 20 plus personnel, hiring eight vehicles and payments to the farmer to activate the diversion route. He also states that it would cost £105-120M to build a flow over canopy stretching 1.2km.

The design in the Jacob's report is of an overly complicated one with new much larger culverts, diagonal piling and having to extend the A83 outwards. All the major slides over the last seven years (those over 50 tonnes) have occurred down five gullies on the top 400m section of The Rest.

My solution is to cut into the hillside 15m (there is a 40m section already dug) use the exposed rock face as the inner wall, anchor the roadside wall into the new rock base and form an open sided outer wall.

The sections at the gullies will be closed at the outer edge with greatly reinforced roofs at these problem spots. The other concrete roof sections could be pre-cast off site. The existing culverts merely cut deeper into the hillside.

This design would be at least a 1/10th of the quoted figure being a quarter of the length, a simple safe design and would permanently protect this vulnerable section of The Rest.

I have had dismissive replies for the last 18 months from Transport Scotland about my suggestion that it is unaffordable, lead to road closures during construction and huge safety issues.

I would hope that we have the engineering capability to design and build a much shorter, simpler design satisfying all the safety issues which can be successfully achieved in the Alps and The Pyrennes. This would allow 24 hour use of this vital road. It could be activated within 30 mins and would allow unhindered, uninterrupted clearance work to proceed.

I might add this is the very section where the A83 is at is closest to the OMR which was closed, due to landslides and flooding on several days during the last incident.

All we ask is a permanent answer to keep Argyll's M8 open. Mitigation measures lessen but will never solve this long running saga.

Beaver trial

I read with interest your report on the economic impacts of the Scottish Beaver Trial.

In regard to the £2 million project cost it's worth noting that over two-thirds of this was met by business sponsorship, grant funding, subscriptions and individual donations. There was no direct government funding of the trial.

The report goes on to emphasise that should the beavers stay, and be more widely reintroduced to Argyll, project costs will fall significantly. In the medium term this will result in benefits outweighing costs in terms of sustaining visitor numbers, education and volunteering opportunities.

A wider reintroduction would also be likely to encourage businesses to have greater confidence in investing in facilities and marketing, thus resulting in more visitors being drawn to the area. With innovative and creative management, Knapdale would be able to retain the allure of being the original official release site.

In regard to the factfile, readers might like to know that the dam has created over 13,000m2 of freshwater habitat, this being one of the six priority habitats under the UK Biodiversity Action Plan. Some of the plants 'lost', ie trees, went on to provide both food and shelter for a wide variety of species including fungi, invertebrates and woodpeckers. Also the trees gnawed or felled by the beavers were all species that regenerate as a result of this coppicing and create layers within riparian woodland, attracting a greater range of species.

Having recently started a bed and breakfast business, I've been impressed by the level of interest shown in the trial by visitors, both those who knew about it in advance and others who learnt of its existence once in the area. As with all tourist experiences, the more business owners can inform and enthuse visitors in regard to the beavers and the area's many other attractions the longer these visitors are likely to stay and the more likely they are to return.





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Farming union representatives who met to discuss the UK's dairy crisis.

UK farming unions meet over dairy crisis

NFU Scotland met with ing, it was agreed that representatives from the rest of the UK's farming unions at Ingliston on Monday to tackle the crisis in the dairy sector.

Hosted by NFU Scotland, its dairy team was joined by representatives from NFU England and Wales, NFU Cymru, Ulster Farmers Union and staff from the unions' Brussels office.

There was recognition that while there may be no quick fix to the problems faced across the UK dairy industry, activity at a national, UK and European level can make a difference and drive stability and confidence.

Following the meet-

at UK union level, work will be done to: *Ensure any price cuts are proportionate, that when the market turns farmers quickly see the benefits:

*Encourage Europe and the UK to increase promotional activity to promote exports and generate import substitution;

*Re-assess the EU intervention price to ensure it is an effective safety net and not simply a crash mat;

*Develop financial management and insurance 'tools';

*Lobby for tax incentives to accommodate the volatile nature of farming; and,

*Wherever possible and sensible, efforts will be increased to work collaboratively together.

Gary Mitchell, NFU Scotland milk committee chairman who organised the meeting said: 'Although the markets continue to react to the global supply and demand imbalance, we will continue to ensure price cuts imposed on farmers are proportionate and properly explained by all milk purchasers.

Imperative

'It remains imperative that the dairy supply chain shares the responsibility and consequence of weak markets and works to limit any long-term damage to our dairy sector.

'The lack of transparency in the liquid sector needs to be addressed, as does the seemingly slow response of retailers to wholesale and farmgate cuts. While the retail price of cheese and butter on shop shelves has risen year on year, wholesale prices for these staple products have crashed by 30 to 40 percent. Growing retailer margins at a time of farmgate cuts is an issue the unions will challenge.

'The issue of volatile markets must be addressed and the European Union has tools at its disposal.

'Promotion of dairy products is also key. UK ministers must tackle a dairy balance of trade deficit of £1.357 billion. Of the 732,000 tonnes of cheese we use, 432,000 is imported. In terms of butter, of the 205,000 tonnes we eat, 105,000 tonnes is imported.'

*First Milk, which produces Mull of Kintyre cheese, this week announced it will be cutting price for its manufacturing pool by 1.1 p per litre and for its liquid pool by 1p litre from January. That is on the back of cuts in recent months because of decline in global demand for dairy products.





Ten tips for a cosy home

1. Use tin foil. One way to prevent unnecessary heat loss from radiators, particularly on those attached to external walls, is to use heat reflective aluminium foil behind the radiator.

2. Thick curtains are one of the main ways to protect a house from losing heat through the windows. Close curtains as soon as dusk falls will maximise a house's potential to retain heat.

3. It's important to try to use

as much natural - and free heat as possible, so let in the sunlight.

4. Stop heat being lost up the chimney. It's now fairly common to have fireplaces that are merely decorative. If a fireplace is not being used consider a chimney balloon.

5. Draught excluders are one lesson people can learn from previous generations. The stuffing can be almost anything from rice and lentils to gravel.


6. Clear radiators. Try and avoid placing large pieces of furniture in front of them. 7. Putting a shelf above the radiator, especially for high ceilings, this can also help channel the warmth.

8. Cover bare floorboards. Floors account for as much as 10 per cent of heat loss if they're not insulated.

9. Insulating the whole house professionally. People on certain benefits or

those who privately rent a home, may be eligible for help with energy-saving home improvements under the Energy Companies Obligation (ECO) - a government energy efficiency programme.

10. Setting timers on heating is important. If it's very cold, the timer should be set to switch the heating on earlier, rather than turning the thermostat up to warm the house rapidly.







Keep safe when running on hills and mountains

THE POPULARITY of fell and mountain running has led to fears for runners' safety in the harsh conditions of the Highland's winter mountains.

A push for runners to take sensible measures is being highlighted by the Mountaineering Council of Scotland (MCS).

Heather Morning, of MCS, said: 'Fell running can take people into some unforgiving terrain and weather conditions and they really do need to be properly prepared for their own safety. Hypothermia is a real danger for those too lightly clad to withstand a change in the weather or inactivity brought about by injury or getting lost or benighted.

'Weather conditions and visibility can change quickly, so check the forecast and plan your clothing and kit for the worst case of having to sit and wait if injured.

'Plan your route in advance and let someone know where and how long you will be. Give

extra consideration to water crossings, ascents and descents if very wet, icy or snowy.

'Know how to navigate in reduced visibil-

'Carry a map of your intended route area, including escape routes, a compass, whistle, a lightweight bivi bag and basic first aid kit. If on a long run – ie over two hours – have a strategy for fluid and energy replacement.

'Equipment needs to be adapted for each and every run. Take waterproof top and trousers (windproof on dry days), a hat and gloves with you.

'Wear or carry extra warm top and bottom layers in winter and cold or wet summer days.

'In winter months a torch with a good running beam is an essential addition. Also consider spikes or running crampons that are compatible with your shoes. Some people advocate a larger pair of shoes for thicker socks and warmer feet.'

Susie drives on with race spot and new job

IN WHAT could be a watershed week for Argyll racing driver Susie Wolff, she has been named as the first female driver to compete in the Race of Champions and Williams Martini Racing's F1 test driver for 2015.

Susie, nee Stoddart, from Oban will make motorsport history later this month when she becomes the first female to compete in the traditional endof-season Race of Champions, which features drivers and riders from all forms of motorsport, both four wheels and two, racing in a number of different vehicles.

She will join forces with fellow Scot and former DTM teammate David Coulthard for the Nations Cup part of the competition that takes place at the Bushy Park Circuit in Barbados on December 13-14.

'Any driver would love to be invited to do the Race of Champions,' she said. 'It's an event I've always looked closely at and always

dreamed of being part of, so I'm proud to have been chosen.

'But the biggest thing is the fact I'm just so looking forward to racing again.
