These acts of kindness, Christian says, have restored his faith in humanity.

The 39-year-old began his challenge on August 8, 2012 after hitting rock bottom. Having lost his business and being forced to sell his belongings, the soldier, inspired by brave veterans and TV show Coast, embarked on his walk.

Awareness

He has since raised awareness of homelessness with MPs and has raised in excess of £134,000 for Help for Heroes, for which the charity presented him with the exceptional fundraiser award.

Christian is continuing his journey along the Kintyre Peninsula and locals are urged to continue offering hot food, drinks and shelter.

Christian added: 'Argyll is beautiful and the people are really nice. Alan, who I never knew, he has pulled out all the stops to see me right on my journey.'

Tarbert man guilty of seven charges of sexually assaulting two girls

has been found guilty of seven charges of sexually assaulting two girls, aged 15 and 16, including while giving them private driving lessons.

HGV lorry driver Alexander Martin, 59, of 33 Eastfield, Tarbert, denied the seven charges over a period between April 2010 and August one of the girls at an

man 2013 when he appeared address in Tarbert. at Campbeltown Sheriff Court on Tuesday.

The charges included touching one girl's breasts and making sexual comments to her and touching both girls on the thighs and bottoms.

During the trial, the court heard how Martin used to 'pretend tickle'

Giving evidence, the girl said: 'It ended up he was getting really weird and going near my breasts and lower areas and it wasn't nice.

'He said on one of the occasions it was to measure my breasts. It began when I started maturing and getting older.'

The girl, now 18, said

Martin gave her several driving lessons before she turned 17 on private and unclassified roads. While teaching her, the girl explained he would 'massage the bottom of my leg because he said I felt tense and after a while he kept getting closer and closer to my upper thigh.'

The other girl, now 16, said the lorry driver used to take her out on driving lessons when she was 15. She said they went out in his truck and his car and while he was in the driver's seat told her to sit between his legs to do the steering, before putting his hand between her inner thighs.

Martin's defence agent, Lewis Kennedy QC, suggested the accused had put his hand on the first girl's leg while she was driving to help her learn clutch control, and simply pushed down on her knee, adding: 'There is not any kind of sexual motivation on the part of Mr Martin.' He told the court the two girls were colluding and lying, adding: 'It does seem remarkable that both complainers were, for such a long period of time, quite content to be in Mr Martin's company.'

But Sheriff Ruth Anderson QC said she found both girls credible and reliable.

Martin was found guilty on all seven charges and sentence has been deferred until January 16 for background reports.

Bags carry new booze warning

A PLAN to stamp out buying alcohol for underage drinkers has been launched.

Community Action Lochgilphead Ardrishaig (CALA) is to provide alcohol retailers with carrier bags emblazoned with a warning against purchasing drink for youngsters.

The bags, which remind people they could face a £5,000 fine or three months in jail for providing young people with drink, will be used

each time a person buys alcohol from a shop in Lochgilphead and Ardrishaig.

The initiative comes just two weeks after NHS Highland revealed the number of 16 to 19 year olds admitted to hospital for the effects of alcohol or drugs in Argyll and Bute is double the national average. John Woods from CALA, which funded the bag project, said: 'We are really trying to combat agent purchase

which has been highlighted in two surveys we did as an issue.

'The figures show that adults are buying kids alcohol at times, although they are aware that it's wrong. What we are trying to highlight is the consequences of their actions. What could happen is that person being fined or put in prison.'

The project is supported by local retailers, Argyll and Bute Council and Police Scotland.

More than £1m to improve Arkland and Reliefland

Repair cash for Inveraray buildings is confirmed

MORE than £1 million will be spent repairing the Arkland and Reliefland buildings in Inveraray, Argyll and Bute Council has confirmed.

The two buildings, which consist of flats, are to be at the heart of a project to conserve the built heritage of Inveraray via the Conservation Area Regeneration Scheme (CARS).

Historic Scotland awarded the royal burgh £970,000 in CARS funding, more than £500,000 of which will be assigned to the Arkland and Reliefland repairs. The remaining cost will be covered by Argyll Community Housing Association, which owns some of the flats, and private home owners.

Investment

The investment in Reliefland will slash the £25,000 bill each of the private owners faced to repair the exterior of the listed building.

The Inveraray conservation project is a £2 million scheme

which will see essential repairs also carried out to Temperance Hotel, Chamberlain's House and the Town House.

Argyll and Bute Council, which has contributed £350,000 to the project, will appoint a project officer to manage the scheme in February, while there will be a formal launch in March or April.

Additional funds will also be made available to individual home and shop owners via the small repairs grant scheme

FCS to blame for power cuts

Sir,

The first major power cut of the season has just been sorted and many grateful thanks to Scottish and Southern Energy (SSE) for their sterling efforts.

But how much easier for everyone if they did not happen at all.

There is little one can do about adverse weather conditions, but there is something that can be done for one of the regular causes of power cuts - trees falling on the electricity lines.

The inappropriately named Forestry Commission Scotland (FCS) is of course the culprit yet again. Why this organisation is allowed to plunge communities into darkness with impunity is a mystery.

I understand there is a man in a suit in Edinburgh who, armed with an ordnance survey map and the I-Spy book of trees - who might have seen a forest from a train - gets to make the decisions concerning forestry matters in West Argyll.

The value of the tree, at a generous guess is £1.50, the cost to the community is incalculable.

The power failure that took out Crinan and Tayvallich and other parts was caused by a single tree, and right next door to it is another the same size, and another, in fact at least 20 trees all in a row, just awaiting their turn to fall.

One could write to one's parliamentary representatives, but my experience of them has been they are too busy being self important and, unless there is a photo opportunity, are unlikely to do anything.

But somewhere there has to be someone to insist that part of the £20,000,000 subsidy that FC receives is spent on competence training.

litigious In a more environment communities would be suing FCS for pecuniary loss, reckless endangerment, and anything else that occurs to a good lawyer. I do hope SSE will be billing FCS.

We have one speciality of the NHS stating, quite rightly, that their client group should not be travelling large distances and should have services provided locally and we have another willing to inflict long journeys on pregnant women.

The Scottish Government has decreed it wants rural areas to increase in population and be viable and yet this lack of foresight is the exact opposite to what is required, discouraging families with children. Has joined up thinking and forward planning gone out of fashion?

Working to save post offices

I see there has been a reference in regional media that the way to keep post offices open is to make letters between Scotland and England subject to international postal rates.

This is obvious nonsense. The previous Labour Government spent years preparing Royal Mail for privatisation, then stepped back at the last minute because, after the 2008 crash, they didn't think they would get a good price for it.

Labour had set up a mail market in this country in which Royal Mail was finding it difficult to compete with private mail companies. The coalition Government has levelled the playing field by giving the regulator powers to impose a financial levy on private mail companies and use the proceeds to help pay Royal Mail for delivering to every house in the country.

When the coalition Government put forward their Postal Services Bill, which included the privatisation of Royal Mail, I supported it for several reasons.

The legal guarantee that Royal Mail must deliver to every home and business and collect from every post box six days a week. The levy on private mail companies.

The need for investment in Royal Mail which the private sector can give, but a cash

strapped Government can't. The support of the National Federation of Subpostmasters who wrote to me saying, 'we are backing the Postal Services Bill'.

I can assure your readers that I would not do anything to put post offices at risk and am pleased to have helped save Campbeltown's Carradale East Post Office from closure.

Rob, who is famed for his mirrored sculptures, will accompany students and SNH photographer Lorne Gill on their field trip to Taynish Natural Nature Reserve.


Rob said: 'I have miniature figures and we will

He added: 'Taynish is a lovely spot so I am hoping we may be able to put some of my installations along the beach.'



Rob Mulholland has agreed to display his work at Taynish reserve next year and work with the Snapberry Project.





Even think twice about driving the next day

PEOPLE celebrating the there is a traffic accident festive season at parties or family gatherings should think twice about driving the next day, a Mid Argyll alcohol counsellor has warned.

Peter Garrett, who manages Ardrishaig-based Encompass, which helps people with alcohol and substance abuse problems, said that although people may feel fine to drive, legally they may be over the limit.

The message comes as Police Scotland launches its Don't risk it. Don't Drink and Drive Christmas campaign.

Peter said: 'Feeling fine is very different to being legally able to drive.

'If people have to drive the next day my personal advice would be not to drink at all. People should remember if

they are automatically breath tested.'

Police Scotland has warned drivers about the consequences of being found driving over the legal limit, which includes automatic loss of licence and a criminal record for a minimum of 20 years.

Stark warning

Mid Argyll Chief Inspector Marlene Baillie issued a stark warning as police officers crack down on drink driving.

She said: 'Officers in Mid Argyll are already out and about and will be taking proactive measures to reduce the risk to our community from anybody risking lives by drink driving.

'It is your responsibility to ensure you are fit to drive. If unsure, don't risk it.'






