# Shoppers shown how resuscitation can save a life

Customers at the Co-operative store in Brodick were how the community defibrilgiven a demonstration in simple cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) last weekend.

The Scottish Ambulance Service set up a stand in the store where the technicians showed the techniques of CPR to shoppers which can help save a life.

They also demonstrated lators, of which there are now 13 on the island, talk the user through the use of the equipment, although basic CPR knowledge is useful.

A series of free courses as part of the Heartstart initiate to teach CPR are to be held on the island in May and June and forms are now available. Lamlash-based Shirley Anderson of the Scottish Ambulance Service said: 'We are showing the basic techniques of CPR to raise awareness of how the public can help.'



# Should we be 'proactive, not reactive' with potholes?

The island has been transformed into a construction site. The String Road, the Boguille, Lamlash hill - all these roads have been dug up as maintenance takes place, and Johnny Kelso and his team have been seen out and about filling in potholes all over the island.

There is an old saying that wherever the Queen goes there is an overwhelming smell of fresh paint.

And it does seem coincidental that all of the island's potholes are being filled in the week before John Swinney MSP and the First Minister Alex Salmond come to Arran. Mr Swinney will be here on Sunday night to take part in

a Scottish independence referendum debate. Mr Salmond will have the pleasure of attending a dinner

at the Isle of Arran Distillery on Monday night.

When these two gentlemen arrive on Arran and enjoy their smooth ride around the island there will be an overwhelming smell of fresh tar.

Arran has long suffered from terrible road conditions.

The potholes and appalling state of the carriageways have been putting off visitors for years and locals are forced to pay out again and again for repairs to vehicles.

Scottish councils are now spending more than £1,600 a day on compensation for drivers whose cars have been damaged by potholes.

In total, £584,745 was paid out last year to drivers, with the five-year total now passing £2.7m.

The String Road is now closed for 10 weeks while 800m of the carriageway at Glenloig is repaired.

The road is opened at three different points during the day but the times are not really appropriate for those trying to get to and from work on the east coast.

But the undeniable truth is that Arran's roads desperately need to be maintained. They have been neglected and left to crumble for too long. For years residents have campaigned for more to be done. The southenders blockaded the road at Levencorrach 10 years ago after the road was left to disintegrate.

Ian Small from Brodick has now been campaigning for years to see proper investment in the island's infrastructure.

So, frustrating as it is to see the road closed, and as disruptive as it is to communities, the island cannot say no to investment in the roads.

When it comes to potholes we must be proactive, not reactive!



# **Arran better** tackle natura Anniversary of snow storm

The whole of Arran breathed a huge sigh of re- checked in the months which followed the snow lief last weekend when the first anniversary of 'Snowmaggedon' passed with little more than a whimper.

A bright sunny day with only some heavy showers replaced the unrepentant snow of a year ago.

However, a year on, the island is better prepared than ever for any repeat of the once in a generation snow or any other natural disaster.

During the snow, power to the whole island was severed and thick snow cut off much of the north and west of the island for days leaving whole communities stranded and livestock dead.

Such was the extent of the crisis, caused by the unprecedented collapse of two major pylons on Kintyre, it stretched emergency services to the limit and only the spirit of the island's communities saw everyone get through it.

Afterwards there was praise for energy supplier Scottish and Southern Energy (SSE) which

and tidying up work carried out.

But Neil Wilson, operations manager of SSE Power Distribution, responsible for Arran, said: 'The network on Arran is as robust as it can be. Last year's snow storms were totally unprecedented. It was the first time for all of us and if it happened again we would know exactly what to do, but the operation would not necessarily be any quicker.'

Arran is set to benefit from the £200 million sub-sea link from Kintyre to Hunterston being built in Crossaig forest which will see two sub-sea cable circuits from this new substation laid round the north coast of Arran by October 2015.

In the event of any major power failure on Ar-







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at the height of the crisis had 250 engineers and linesmen working day and night to restore power and shipped 50 huge generators to the island to supply back-up power.

It took a week to get everyone reconnected to the grid. The total bill for the storm which also hit Kintyre was £12 million - with payments still being made.

The emergency services and the island volunteers came in for high praise and the Arran Resilience group came into its own, later winning a coveted national award.

In the aftermath of the snow SSE found that more than 100 power supply poles had been damaged, around half of them snapped in two, which had to be replaced.

ran electricity could be fed on to the island from the new cables from Kintyre, which as Mr Wilson said, will be easier than shipping generators to the island.

Arran Resilience co-ordinator Dr David Hogg said the snow was the first real test of the resilience group set up in 2010. He said the award was a great honour but he was keen to play down their role during the snow storms.

He said: 'Arran Resilience did not sort the snow. It was a small cog which was able to help get the emergency teams around the table within hours of the snow starting. No-one knew then the severity of what was to come.

'We had two or three hours to do what we could to the best of our ability before help could arrive from the mainland and one of our priorities was



to mitigate a lot of feeling of isolation.' He says that in the year that has followed resilience has become the 'buzz word'.

'There is a lot of government talk about community resilience, even personal resilience, but our group is predominantly focused on facilitation training opportunities for emergency teams on the island.'


The group meets once every two months and holds two major exercises a year. Exercise Dauntless had been planned for the day of the snow and the latest, Endeavour, was held on the day of the anniversary (see page 12).

Dr Hogg, a GP who has been on the island for three and a half years, said: 'We are dependent on voluntary support. We only exist by people buying into the concept and the community support we have is unparalleled.

<sup>1</sup> 'We have no bank account and no committee. We are a co-operative team getting out what everyone puts in. There is no ownership but a group of teams which see the benefit in a joint endeavour. I kind of like it that way. Personally my job as a GP involves the immediate medical care in the event of an emergency. As a result of group working I have a much better awareness of how I can find relevant support.

# Keep a check on your council tax

Arran residents can now keep up to date with their council tax by going online.

The service allows people to access their council tax account 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Once registered with North Ayrshire Council, anyone can access a whole host of information including: council tax details, records of individual payments, yearly summary statement, details of tax band and information on what to do if anyone has difficulty paying.

cabinet member for finance and corporate support, said: 'It's so much easier to keep on top of bills like this if you have all the information in one place.

'Online access allows people to see at a glance how much they are due and how much they have paid as well as explaining what they should do if experiencing difficulty with payments.'

Emergency services across the island took part in an emergency exercise at the weekend.

A fatal crash involving a bus and a car was the chosen scenario for what happened on the minor Rodden road between Shiskine and Torbeg on Sunday.

Exercise Endeavour was coordinated by Arran Resilience as part of the ongoing initiative to get emergency teams across the island working together.

The event was held in real time with the crash being reported at 10am.

Police were first to arrive followed quickly by the retained firemen from Blackwaterfoot. They were confronted by a fatality in the car, along with a badly injured driver and an

injured child. The 20 bus passengers had a wide range of injures with two 'unresponsive', others with serious injuries and

the rest walking wounded. Sgt Allen Dodds of Police Scotland took command and as the exercise progressed emergency services arrived from all over the island.

#### Raced

First responders and full time ambulance crews raced to the scene along with RNLI, HM Coastguard, the Arran Mountain Rescue team and a second fire crew from Brodick.

All played their role in helping to rescue the injured from the bus and an emergency casualty station was set up where the wounded were assessed by doctors and NHS staff.

The severity of some of the injured meant that the decision was made to call in the search and rescue helicopter from HMS Gannet, which was on Arran on its own exercise, and four of the most serious were loaded on to the helicopter with three other injured - but the exercise ended before it took off.

Observers from the mainland from the police, fire and NHS all kept a close eye on proceedings.

Arran's senior NHS manager Alan Stout said: 'The emergency services had to deal with an ever- changing situation as the emergency progressed.

'It was a worthwhile exercise in the development of a co-ordinated island plan.'

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# **Healthy roots** key to plant protection

A plan to protect Scotland's rural economy is being developed.

The Scottish Plant Health Strategy will set out measures to safeguard agriculture, horticulture, forestry and the wider environment, all found on Arran, from pests and diseases.

The strategy will raise awareness of plant health and also clarify roles and responsibilities amongst Scottish agencies, industry organisations and the wider public to tackle pests and diseases as well as identify key priorities for Scottish plant health.

Environment and climate change minister Paul Wheelhouse said: 'Plant health is the root of Scotland's thriving natural environment and booming rural economy.

'However, the number of plant health threats is rising, and the spread of these has been exacerbated by aspects of globalisation and climate change.

'The development of a Scottish Plant Health Strategy in response is essential, and this will be hugely beneficial to tackling the challenges. It will also make clear that no single measure in isolation can rule out the threat of pests and diseases.'

# **Death on Arran's Shores**

walked the shores counting and identifying dead birds around the weekend of 22/23 February.

Last February, around 650 volunteers walked 2,120 kilometres of beaches around the UK and found a total of 375 dead seabirds.

This works out at around 0.18 dead seabirds per kilometre, the fourth lowest figure since 1991. The UK figure in the last 20 odd years has ranged from 0.14 to 3.80. Arran matched this figure last year with 0.15 dead bodies per kilometre. By contrast this year on Arran the figure was more than 20 times larger.


The Arran volunteers walked almost 70 kilometres of beaches and found a total of 281 dead seabirds.


This works out at more than four dead seabirds per kilometre. By far the largest group were Razorbill, being 80 percent of the bodies found. The next two largest groups were Guillemot at eight percent and gulls at seven percent.

Many of the Razorbills were young inexperienced birds. These birds seemed to have died of exhaustion or starvation as a result of days of gale-force winds, which made it impossible for them to fish.

Four of the Razorbills had a ring on their leg. The data has been sent off to Euring and hopefully background information including where these birds were ringed will be provided.

Fascinating bat talk for friends

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The Friends of Brodick Castle had a change of speaker this month and were delighted to welcome Corinna Goeckeritz, a castle ranger, at short notice. She gave an entertaining, illustrated talk on Creatures of the Night at Brodick Castle. Not what may at first be thought, but bats.

She is the island's only bat woman, being licensed to handle them and was keen to dispel the myths surrounding them by testing the audience's knowledge. They do not bite and suck blood, they make a small puncture and lap the blood - but only in South America so no fear on Arran then.

They range in size from a two-metre wingspan to smaller than a pound coin - but the six species identified on Arran are all smaller than a mouse. They can get into the smallest space and roost or breed but their droppings are dry and do not cause damage. They don't gnaw at wood but use existing tiny holes to nest in. The babies are called pups. Best of all, one small bat will eat 1,000 midges in a night.




