# Magnum money clawed back for road repairs

## £1 million will help sort winter damage

A sum of money earmarked by North Ayrshire Council for the replacement of the Magnum Centre in Irvine has been clawed back for urgent road repairs.

Last month it was proposed to move £1 million from the 'roads pressures budget' of £1.4million to help towards the cost of replacing the Magnum leisure centre

At a meeting of the executive of NAC on Tuesday, it was decided that only £400,000 should go to the Magnum, the additional £1 million will go towards roads funding for this year to put right the damage caused by what the council has called 'the worst winter in 20 years'.

This means that £2.8 million will be spent on the 630 miles of road for which the council is responsible.

Councillor Margie Currie said that this money is not enough to address all the faults on Arran's roads but it is a start. 'Arran will receive a proportion of this £1 million to be spent on the roads. This funding will be for pothole repairs and patching work which will considerably help the state of the roads but it is not the answer to the bigger problems.'

Tom Orr, corporate director of property services, told the executive that reducing spending on roads 'leaves a greater proportion of the network open to further attack and effectively stores up problems for future years'.

Councillor David O'Neill, council leader, said: 'The weather conditions this winter included rapid freeze/thaw cycles, which meant our salting and snow clearing teams had to revisit areas, sometimes on the same night, to keep our roads safe.

'Salt usage more than doubled and in general we have spent more than 80 per cent more on winter emergencies.

Arran's MSP Kenneth Gibson said he had been following this issue with interest. 'This year, Holyrood provided NAC with a 5.1 per cent increase in revenue spend, money to freeze the council tax and a 3.5 per cent increase in capital funding, on top of a 30 per cent increase last year.

#### **Priorities**

'Under the SNP/Local Government Concordat, NAC has freedom to spend according to its own priorities. However, councillors decided to spend £25 million on a new Magnum Centre in Irvine, partly funded by £1 million cut in this year's road budget. It is therefore unseemly, I believe, for councillors, who did not try to amend the budget on February 12 to prioritise Arran's roads, to then complain about the lack of resources for island roads.'

Ian Small, local pothole campaigner, said: 'It is good news that this money has been diverted back to the roads but it is clearly not going to be enough. I hope the repairs are done properly.'

## Potholes wreck Willie's

Arran's potholed roads wrecked another car last week.

Lamlash taxi driver Wille McDonald was travelling along the Corrie shore when he hit a pothole in the road. He thought it had done some damage but a few minutes later he was driving carefully down to Cordon.

Willie said: 'I hit a big hole in the road and the front end collapsed. The main spring snapped and the shock absorber was shot.

'It's cost me another £250 and I'll be putting a bill into North Ayrshire Council. I broke a front spring on the opposite side a fortnight ago. If I don't get any joy I'll put it into the hands of my lawyer.

'My accountant told me that vehicle repairs on my two cars ran up to £5,000 last year and that is out of proportion for anywhere else in Ayrshire.'

Brodick mechanic Craig Galloway said: 'Willie's car is not old and doesn't have a big mileage. I'm quite happy to do normal motor servicing but I'm spending too much time picking up the pieces from road-damaged cars.

'I've driven all over Scotland and no other roads are as bad as ours.'

Whiting Bay taxi driver Ian McCallum told the Banner: 'The roads on Arran are hellish. Bush repairs are a constant expense for me. It would be interesting to find out how many springs are broken here in a month.

Willie added: 'I regularly do a run around the Northend and it is like riding the rapids. These roads need some serious attention.'

## Lone walker rescued in the Goatfell mist

A lone walker had to be rescued by the local mountain rescue team on Friday night after becoming lost in mist near to the summit of

The man who was holidaying in Blackwaterfoot was able to lead the team to his position by taking photos on his mobile phone.

#### **Identified**

These were sent to the leader of the Arran Mountain Rescue Team who identified the man to be west of Goatfell on the Rosa slabs.

According to an AMRT spokesman this is a very dangerous area to be if you are not familiar with it and it can become treacherous in bad weather conditions.

Team member, Neil Hamilton-Bulger said: 'This is yet another example of walkers misnavigating off Goatfell summit where it is flat and the path is not marked. The gentleman was located in the same area as the body of a woman who fell to her death just over a year ago, who had also lost her way in the mist.'

On Friday night the team of 15 members split into two and approached the slabs from the summit of Goatfell and Glen Rosa. The man was located and returned to the team base by 10pm.'

#### Locate

As well as using mobile phone pictures to locate the man, the team used two land rovers, an agrocat and a new search management system for this callout.

Neil added: 'All of this new technology would be nothing without the tireless efforts, skills and bravery of team members who are able to locate a person in such a dangerous area.'

## 'Exceptional minister and hero' dies

fatal road accident at Merkland shore last year has died.

Rev Leith Fisher was 67 years old and described as one of the ablest Church of Scotland ministers of his generation.

A van travelling north driven by an Arran man was in collision with two cyclists travelling south on Saturday August 30. The 59-year-old woman, Elspeth Kelman, was pronounced dead at the scene and Rev Fisher was taken by air ambulance to the Southern General Hospital in Glasgow with serious head and leg injuries.

> Leith Fisher was known as a fine preacher and exceptional parish minister and worked in Govan, Calton and Falkirk before moving to Wellington Church in 1990.

#### **Astute**

A fellow member of the Iona Community of which Rev Fisher was a member said: 'Leith was a fit and active man, a songwriter and astute parish minister. As a minister he cycled between duties and still played squash.

'I knew him well in Falkirk and Glasgow. Despite not seeing him for some time I am

lived well into his 90s as did his mother. He was in hospital for several months after the road traffic accident and it is a shame that he probably never fully recovered from his severe and life-threatening injuries.'

Iain Todd of Brodick is a trainee reader with Rev Angus Adamson.

He said: 'I knew Leith for 50 years and for a long time as the minister at Wellington Church in Glasgow. He was a great exponent of justice and peace and had hoped to do a lot more writing in retirement.'

At his funeral on March 21 David Lunan, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, described Leith Fisher as his hero.

## In hind sight, Neil's a hero

### Corrie man's two-mile paddle to save wild animal

An Arran man commandeered an old kayak and paddled two miles out to sea to save a startled young deer from drowning.

Neil Bulger from Corrie rescued the deer on Sunday morning after it had entered the water, opposite Sannox Bay Hotel, to escape a dog that had chased it all the way from Corrie to Sannox along the road.

#### Panicked

David Kelso from Sannox witnessed the whole thing. 'When the hind reached the hotel it panicked and headed for the shoreline, waded in and began to swim straight out towards Millport,' said David.

When it showed no sign of Bulger - who was visiting his heading back to dry land, Neil parents at Rigside - frantically

looked for a boat and the only one available was an old kayak lying in our garden.

'Neil carried it down to the jetty, stripped to his underpants and set off in pursuit. He deliberately gave it a wide berth in an effort not to startle it further and by the time he was parallel with it, they were at least a mile from the shore.'

#### Turn about

Neil paddled round from an easterly direction and managed to persuade it to turn about and head back for Arran.

Neil said: 'I had to try to and separate the dog and the hind which were both swimming across the bay.

'The dog turned back and by the time I got to the deer it was about two miles offshore.

'It took a lot of corralling to get it to turn back - it was extremely determined to get to the mainland.

'When I eventually got it to go back towards the shore, I didn't know if it would make it because it was shaking badly and starting to struggle to stay afloat. Neil managed to get it back to shore about 30 minutes later but on seeing all the people it headed for the sea again.

'I managed to coral it back to the shore again and it eventually headed for the hills,' said

## Budget has little effect on domestic purse strings

As Alistair Darling made his 2009 Budget announcement on Wednesday it was clear that he knew this was one that will define generations to come.

Some have said it was an unconvincing speech made by someone who did not believe his own forecasts and was simply trying to persuade us that he can get the country out of this economic quagmire.

The chancellor spent the first half hour of his speech telling us why this is a global problem and that the UK is in fact in a better position than many other developed countries.

He clearly wanted to reassure us that he was looking to invest to grow out of the recession rather than looking to reduce spending and reduce the borrowing requirements.

He announced an extension to the scheme that allows loss-making businesses to reclaim tax on previous earnings, which means that more that 100,000 businesses in the UK will have their losses wiped out.

With one in three small firms in rural areas concerned about their financial prospects over the next six months, the government had to take action to keep the heart of the village community alive.

The Federation of Small Businesses is concerned that too many rural businesses were thriving before the recession, but that more and more of them are going bust.

Over the course of the last six months, Arran felt this all too strongly when it was feared that Arran Aromatics would be forced into administration.

The island based toiletries manufacturer, that employs more than 100 people, was given just 14 days to pay a huge tax bill, or face liquidation or administration.

At the time, Arran's MSP Kenneth Gibson criticised the British government for not doing enough to safeguard the future of firms that had been booming just six months before.

It is a relief that the flexibility in making tax payments, of which many Scottish small firms have already taken advantage, is to continue.

The extension of the scheme to allow loss-making companies to reclaim taxes already paid on profits in the past three years could be worth £4,000 each year to these firms.

However, the fuel duty rise will make it particularly hard for rural and other essential business road users to keep moving during the downturn.

The reduction in mortgage rates and general falling prices, according to the chancellor, is leaving us all with a higher disposable income, which should lead to increased spending to stimulate the economy.

But the truth of the matter is that the above measures will have little effect on domestic purse strings. We will all have to keep on budgeting.

On February 12 a meeting of the executive of NAC expressed concern that the severe winter conditions were having a detrimental effect on road surfaces and sought a report from the Corporate Director, Property Services.

Many salient points are made which clearly indicate the executive is aware and acknowledges the general state of North Ayrshire roads.

The report says: 'The majority of the local roads network has evolved over the years and are not constructed to any recognised design standards. There has been increased media interest in road conditions. This, allied to the information issued by the Warrant Direct Insurance Company, has further fuelled the public perception of the deterioration due to winter.'

Ian Small's campaign has been successful and has helped raise the issue to executive level, this despite particular opposition from local sources.

Here we have a local department that seemingly remains aloof and whose only response to a serious complaint is to rip down notices it obviously finds embarrassing. No positive response or acknowledgment of the complaint has yet been published by the department on Arran. The report clearly details the scale of the situation and lists the implications.

North Ayrshire's carriageway infrastructure totals 1,014 kms and Arran's is perhaps 140 kms, it is therefore more important than ever that Arran's submission continues to be loud and insistent.

In the meanwhile, Arran's motorists will continue to buy new springs, tyres and bushes.



One race of wheatear stays in the north and west of the UK, including Arran, to breed. The other race just passes through during an amazing transatlantic migration.

All wheatears spend the winter in tropical Africa, then head north in spring. Our race arrives in the UK during March. Males are first to arrive. Look out for them around the coast at this time. On Arran some move inland while others breed on the coast.

By late April, the female has usually laid four to seven eggs in a rough nest, often in directly from Greenland to a hole in a stone wall or rock crevice.

The young are independent

after about 30 days. Some parents then raise a second brood.

The other race, known as the Greenland wheatear, arrives in late April.

It is in a hurry to reach its breeding sites on the other side of the Atlantic, so doesn't stay for long. It heads northwest across the sea, via Iceland, until it reaches the Arctic tundra of Greenland and northern Canada. By June, it has started to breed there.

By August, most of our breeding wheatears are heading back south. But Greenland wheatears only leave their breeding grounds in August, so reach us in September - and sometimes even in October. Some bypass the UK entirely.

They use strong winds to make a 30-hour, non-stop flight of 2,400 km (1,500 miles). southern Europe. .

Many make a refueling stopover in North Africa. Greenland wheatears, which fly furthest, put on more fat before leaving and spend longer at stopovers.

Wheatears spend winter in a broad belt across central Africa from Senegal to Kenya.



#### **Edwina for Arran**

Edwina Currie, one of Britain's most outspoken political personalities, may be on her way to Arran.

Out of the limelight for just a couple of months, the infamous ex junior health minister - feared by egg producers and respected by those who believe the truth must come first – could be relaunching her public career on Arran this May.

Details have yet to be finalised but it is likely Mrs Currie will spend some time in the west of Scotland helping push the final weeks of the campaign for European candidate Stephen Robin.

It is expected that she will only spend one day on Arran and the suggestion is that she may open a new food factory while on the island.

Mrs Currie shot to fame due to her outspokenness as junior health minister but was forced to resign after the row she precipitated over salmonella in egg production last autumn.

#### £2 a gallon

While motorists on the mainland complain about the price of petrol creeping closer to the dreaded £2 mark, Arran's drivers have been paying £2.06 a gallon since last Monday.
