6,000 football fans could flock to island for month-long party

Scotland's Tartan Army could soon be on the march to Arran if plans to bring nearly 6,000 football fans to the island next summer get the go Scottish football fans together to watch ahead.

Strathclyde Police told The Banner that they have been approached by a member of the Tartan Army about the possibility of bringing thousands of fans to the island during the football world cup next summer if Scotland fails to qualify for the competition.

Between June 11 and July 11 the Army and their families and friends could be descending on the island to make up for some of the heartache of missing out on another major tournament.

The Tartan Army became notorious in the 1970s for their hooliganism after they invaded the Wembley pitch and destroyed the goal post after the England v Scotland match in 1977.

But since then, the Tartan Army has won awards from UEFA for their friendly nature and charity work.

The incident was among a wide range of traffic offences last weekend.

Policel sergeant Bob Mackay said: 'We had Strathclyde road policing officers on the island, so the manpower was available. They stopped just about every vehicle coming off the ferry at 9.25pm to enforce a driver safety initiative.

'Some people may have complained, but it is not about persecution, it's about safety.'

The traffic officers issued a total of 29 tickets to motorists over the weekend.

Sgt Mackay said: 'Although the initiative was supported by the majority of drivers who were stopped, it is disappointing that on a weekend when there were two serious road crashes within hours of each other you come across a plethora of offences from speeding to overloading of passengers and to a man shaving while driving.

'The complacent behaviour displayed by these drivers towards their own safety and that of other road users is unacceptable.'

The traffic offences included 15 of not wearing seat belts, eight of speeding, three of using mobile phones and three of the dangerous carriage of passengers. A number of tickets were also issued for various vehicle defects.

A man from the Ayrshire and Arran region has been confirmed as the fourth case of the contagious swine flu in Scotland this week.

This latest Scottish case of the virus, officially known as the H1N1 virus, is unconnected to three other cases, which were all linked.

It is believed that the man caught the infection after travelling on a flight from Texas to Birmingham.

Dr Carol Davidson, director of public health at NHS Ayrshire and Arran said: 'We would advise anyone who has flu-like symptoms and has recently returned from anywhere in Mexico or the affected areas of the United States, or has symptoms and has been in close contact with someone else with symptoms who has just returned from these areas to contact their GP or NHS 24 for further advice.'

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

Around 85,000 people in the UK have MS and in Scotland it is estimated that there are 10,500 people with MS – more people per capita than anywhere else in the world. MS is the result of damage to myelin - a protective sheath surrounding nerve fibres of the central nervous system.

When myelin is damaged, this interferes with messages between the brain and other parts of the body.





On a recent visit to Arran I could not but help admire the beautiful gardens in Whiting Bay, Lamlash and Brodick.

The show of colours from the rhododendrons and magnolias was lovely and only adds to the beauty of the island, but one plant for me did stick out and that was Berberis Darwinii.

This is an evergreen shrub with arching branches from which it's vibrant orange scented flowers hang, and stood out a mile at the back of shrubberies or in hedges.

It flowers from April to May and then you are left with bluish-coloured berries. This plant is also good for attracting bees and birds to the garden. Conditions on Arran appear to suit it and it does not suffer from salt burn.

It can be propagated from seed when ripe and sown in boxes in a cold frame and should germinate in late winter or early spring.

Cuttings of semi ripe wood can be taken in July to August again in containers in a cold Regular Arran visitor Bob McCaw of Glasgow is a keen gardener and writes in appreciation of *fellow gardeners* on the island

frame and heel root cuttings of mature wood from this year's growth in October.

No keen gardener ever admits to gardening being drudgery, but they will agree that it demands time, energy, patience and skill.

Now that seeds have been sown for summer bedding in the protection of a greenhouse and have been picked off and boxed, it is time to harden them off. If this process is not done correctly or rushed, a lot of hard work, time and effort can be lost.

It is best if plants are put in a cold frame that is left open during the day, if the weather is suitable and closed at night. If there is any sign of frost cover with fleece as well. During this

process you will generally see the leaves change from a soft green to a darker green, this is the natural waxes that coat the leaves, which change and thicken to help reduce water loss

Bedding plants such as non stop begonias and impatiens walleriana should not be planted out till the chance of frost has passed.

A good rule of thumb is when you see the local council gardeners planting out it is usually safe for you to do so, usually around the last week in May or first week in June.

Just now is also a good time to make up your hanging baskets. Plant them up with Surfinas and trailing Fuchsia, a non stop Begonia or upright Fuchsia for the centre, and grow them on in your greenhouse.

They should have filled out and be covering the basket by the time they are ready to go out at the end of May. Remember to dead head all the spent flowers as this will prolong the flowering period. BM

On Thursday 4 June voters in Ayrshire will have their say on who represents them in the European Parliament.

What happens in the European Parliament affects our lives more than we realise. For instance, did you know that the European Parliament can approve, amend or reject new European laws in a range of areas, such as flexible working hours; food packaging and the environment?

But many Ayrshire residents could be missing out on their right to vote without even knowing it.



Scottish Mountain Rescue member welcomed to Arran

Arran Mountain Rescue Team welcomed a member of the Mountain Rescue Committee of Scotland to their new base at Cladach recently.

James Coles is the radio officer for the MRCS, the governing body of mountain rescue in Scotland, and is heading the new digital mapping and search management computer system.

While here he reviewed the team's radio set up at the base that will soon be upgraded to a brand new system that will link the new base to every part of the island.

He also introduced five team members to 'Mountain Map', the new digital mapping and search management system that was used to great affect in a callout on Goatfell last week. James is also a member of Moffat MRT and is a fellow search and rescue dog handler like Neil Bulger from Corrie.

James is a regular visitor to Arran and was seen at Brodick highland games in 2007 with search dog Corrie - a collie that was donated to James and the Search and Rescue Dog Association by Blue Peter.

Bird Notes - Common Birds?

In a previous installment of dance for all bird species breedthe Bird Notes, a Bird Atlas for 2007 to 2011, which is being organized by the British Trust for Ornithology, was mentioned.

This national bird atlas will allow changes to be assessed in bird distributions since previous breeding national atlases in 1970 and 1990, and since the last winter atlas of the early 1980s.

Since work started on the atlas in November 2007, volunteers on Arran have made timed visits to selected areas called tetrads and have recorded their sightings.

In addition many people have contributed by sharing their bird sightings with me and these have been entered by me as roving records into Bird Atlas.

To my knowledge there has never been a local bird atlas for Arran.

The Arran Natural History Society is giving serious consideration to producing such a document from the national information.

This would contain maps of distribution and relative abun-

ing and wintering on Arran. From the information that

Bird Atlas have collated and shared with me for the breeding season in 2008, there is a problem.

It is not with rare or unusual birds but with the records of common birds like blackbird, blue tit, chaffinch and indeed crows.

The breeding records of common birds are sparse.

Take for example blackbird and blue tit, both familiar to everyone and among our most common birds.

Their breeding records on Arran in 2008 are shown on the maps.

The big red dots are confirmed breeding but look at the gaps. I do not think this is due to a lack of birds but to a lack of records of birds.

With the help of everyone who is interested in birds, this problem of shortage of breeding records for common birds on Arran can be easily solved. During this breeding season, please keep an eye out for signs of breeding in all our common birds.


The breeding records of common birds like blackbirds are sparse.

This does not require hunting for nests with possible disturbance of the birds which would be criminal, but looking for signs of breeding.

These signs could include a singing male, a pair in suitable habitat, courtship, nest building, adults carrying food, as well as nests and recently fledged young getting fed.

He took it to the vet, where despite one bullet being in its eye, they were able revive it and now a week later the dog is recovering well.


Mink stink
