Brodick Golf Club celebrates 100 years

'Today is a day for us to remember those who had the presence of mind and foresight to found this club'

The island marked 100 years of playing the beautiful game in the centre of Brodick on Saturday as the village golf club celebrated the course centenary.

In 1913 the club moved from the Mayish to its current site in the centre of the village, although the old holes in the Ormidale Park were removed some years ago.

Exactly 100 years ago on 27 July 1913, the new course was officially opened by the Marquis and Marchioness of Graham and a commemorative plaque was unveiled to mark the occasion by Beth Paterson who grew up on Arran and is now the chairman of the Scottish Ladies Golf Association.

She is also the cousin of the club's present captain Nicol Hume and the daughter of one of Arran's greatest golfers,

# Lifeboat called to rescue power Snow bill hits £15 million

# 'Incredible response of SSE staff in very challenging circumstances'

The cost of the March snow- side of a tower. Problems near Campbeltown to power storms which brought Arran happen when the snow and to a standstill for days and left parts of the island without power for nearly five days is set to hit £15 million for Scottish and Southern Energy.

The collapse of three power towers on Kintyre which severed the electricity line to Arran was a 'freakish' event which demanded unprecedented responses and resources, said Neil Wilson, SSE operations manager for Argyll and West Highland.

He also told how the lines between each towers on Kintyre had up to 20 tons of snow on them which turned to ice.

'That is okay when the weight is balanced on either

Kintyre and Arran but technical difficulties prevented it being used. 'Hopefully, we will find ways around that in years to come.'

Mr Wilson, who since March has been getting feedback from customers and briefing the community council on Arran about SSE's progress and plans, said he had never seen such 'freakish weather' and that alone had caused towers to collapse.

'There is nothing fundamentally wrong with them. They have not been affected anywhere else like this.'

After his presentation, Mr Wilson was given a spontaneous round of applause by community council members who praised the 'incredible response of SSE staff in very challenging circumstances'



# Local letting plan for new St Molios Park homes

Islanders interested renting or buying houses in the new St Molios Park development in Lamlash have until the end of the month to apply.

The first phase of 16 homes, eight for rent and eight for sale, is due for completion at the end of September, as reported in last week's Banner.

The £8.9 million development by Irvine Housing Association will provide 56 affordable homes in Lamlash, which will comprise of 40 properties for social rent and 16 for shared equity sale, is due for completion in summer 2014.

There have been demands that priority for the new homes must be given to islanders and the Association has confirmed it is currently developing a local "letting plan" which will meet the particular needs of Arran as a rural island community.

In a statement the Association said: 'The development of this letting plan will respond to the needs of Arran as highlighted within the recent research that was commissioned by North Ayrshire Council to examine the Housing Needs and Demand of Arran.

'Consultation with statutory partners, Arran's voluntary sector and the community council is ongoing to ensure that IHA allocates the houses in an open, transparent and fair way to those in the greatest

The site was officially launched by Margaret Burgess, Minister for Housing and Welfare last November. This was followed by an open day held in April at The Glenisle, which gave the steady stream of visitors an opportunity to chat with IHA staff, view detailed plans for 56 new homes, obtain information on rents and sale prices, and get application packs for both the 40 rented properties and the 16 shared equity homes for sale.

Anyone interested in either renting or buying should contact the Association by Friday 30 August 2013 to ensure their application can be considered.

# March snowstorms and power cuts to cost around £15 million

It has been revealed this week that the cost of the March snowstorms which blanketed the west of Arran in snow and cut the electricity power for almost a week is going to cost Scottish and Southern Energy (SSE) around £15 million.

It is not hard to comprehend how this sum came about when we remember the hundreds of SSE staff that were seen on the island for weeks afterwards, not just to reconnect the island to the main grid, but repairing poles and wires which had collapsed.

Added to this the cost of putting their staff up in Arran hotels and providing catering vans for people to get a hot meal, the pounds just keep adding up.

And of course the main crisis zone wasn't even on Arran, it was Kintyre where the collapse of three power towers caused the electricity line to the island to be severed.

SSE worked tirelessly along with Arran's emergency services - both full time and volunteer - as well as the social services and they did an amazing job throughout the

In fact I don't think anyone would disagree when I say that it could have been much, much worse.

This was a freak event and there is hopefully very little chance of such a crisis ever hitting the region again but thankfully emergency plans are already being created just in case.

### Arran has some beautiful beaches

Following the article two weeks ago about the sorry state of Brodick beach we received a number of e-mails from people pointing out that this is by far Arran's only beach (even though we made it clear that Brodick is merely the standard bearer for the island's beaches).

But it is true. Arran is not blessed with the long, secluded white sandy beaches of many of Scotland's other islands but we do have a number of stunning shorelines.

Blackwaterfoot beach, Dougarie beach, the Silver Sands at Kildonan, Kilmory shore and even the pebbly beaches of

the northend are all beautiful in their own right. However this should not stop the campaign to restore

Brodick's beach back to its former beauty. It is so sad to see the beach lying empty on sunny days. Something must be done about it before next summer or it

may be too late to make a difference.

# Time for Arran to look at biomass

I am in favour of approval for several clear reasons: surely it is time for Arran to look at ways in which we, as an island, can contribute electricity to the grid in a sustainable way. The wood is reaching maturity and must be cut.

At present we export the secondary wood to the mainland at tax payers' expense... that is you and me and everyone who pays income taxes in Scotland.

At a time of increasing restraint on budgets, this seems crazy to me when it could be utilised here to produce nower.

Recent scare stories about the health of children in the High School etc are a fallacy, since there will be a scrubber in the flue.

This is in direct contrast to all the wood and coal burning stoves in Lamlash, which put out fine particles of wood and coal dust into the atmosphere at 1 1/2 storeys height without any scrubber in the

# Biomass plant a lot of hot air

It is obvious from his latest letter that John Inglis has learned nothing from the very least, the regular harmass of information in the public domain informing us about the particular type of biomass plant that is proposed by NEDL for Arran.

John Inglis' assertions must be challenged. He appears to have been persuaded by answers from NEDL; it is naïve in the extreme to expect the developer to come clean regarding the noise, traffic, emissions.

John Inglis has chosen to minimize these very real problems which would impact on the 'health and well-being and community safety' (Arran Local Plan 2005) of residents and visitors of Arran and the Holy Isle.

He chooses to ignore the impact of this industrial plant on the £40 million+ tourism and food engines of the Arran economy.

It is self-evident that the only Scottish island with an industrial plant would soon lose its appeal as a holiday destination.

There is a lot of potential loss for Arran, but £40 million of income to NEDL in return for producing 0.018 of Scotland's electricity.

The Community Council has posed over 80 questions to NEDL and has so far achieved a slight alteration in plant location, an improvement in the filtration system (but not the best available) and access to heat in the forest. Everything else is hot air.

# Big summer of research for COAST

The waters around Arran are playing host to a variety of exciting research projects this summer, all focusing on how to reinvigorate marine life in the Clyde.

### Measure

The aim is to measure the success of the protection given to Arran's underwater habitats within both the existing No Take Zone (NTZ) in Lamlash Bay and the larger, proposed Marine Protected Area (MPA) across the entirety of the south of the island.

Scientists from the universities of York and Glasgow are examining everything from population increases in protected scallops to the best way to bait an underwater video camera.

# Licenses

Researchers from the University of York led by PhD student Leigh Howarth – have licenses from Marine Scotland to conduct diving and boat surveys to assess the abundance, size and age of four commercially important shellfish species: the king scallop the queen scallop, the common lobster and the brown crab.

# Four-year-study

The final year of a four-year study, Leigh and his team will gauge whether individuals of these species within the Lamlash Bay NTZ are more abundant, larger and older than those found outside the area.

The first of two PhD researchers from the University of Glasgow, Sophie Elliott, is also monitoring those fish species that once supported the Clyde's extensive fishing industry; specifically what type of habitat is favoured by juvenile gadoids such as cod, haddock and whiting.

# **Techniques**

Using stereo-video camera techniques to observe young individuals as they arrive at coastal waters, Sophie will capture images of these animals, allowing for accurate measurement and an insight into how stocks of this vital marine resource can best be safeguarded at this crucial stage in their life cycle.

Finally, Joanne Clarke – also completing a PhD with the University of Glasgow – is trialing different underwater camera techniques to observe which are the most effective in measuring fish population and body sizes.

# Methodology

By considering the role played by camera bait, current movement and other factors, Joanne hopes to develop an effective, nondestructive methodology that will help in compiling baseline data on fish abundance for the proposed South Arran MPA.

Back before the days of Facebook and Twitter people still had the desire to communicate with other like minded individuals.

It led to a form of social media which may have been primitive but had a huge follow-

We are talking Citizens' Band radio, which was simply known as CB, with all of its elaborate codenames, call signs and distinctive lingo, because until 1981 it was illegal in the UK.

On Arran the Sierra Whiskey Radio Group was formed and 30 years ago they even advertised for holidaymakers to get involved.

There were seven groups across the island and they urged visitors to: Give the friendly natives a call on Channel 14'.

Members of the Arran group had some weird and wonderful names, or handles, as

they were known including: Beer Barrel, Papa Rosco, Flying Squirrel, White Stag, Space Invader and Solider Blue to name but a few.

# Illegally

The craze began with a small but growing number of people illegally using American CB radios during the late 1970s and early 1980s, but its prominence grew in Britain partly due to the popularity of novelty songs like CW McCall's 'Convoy' and Laurie Lingo and The Dipsticks' 'Convoy GB' in 1976 both of which were Top 5 hits and the film Convov in 19/8.

By 1980, CB radio had become so popular a pastime that the government was reluctantly forced to make it legal.






