

A very special guest will open the children's fun day being held at the Arran Heritage Museum tomorrow (Sunday). Actress and comedian, Elaine C Smith, will perform the opening ceremony at 1.30pm, the day after her sell-out one woman show at Brodick Hall. The Arran Heritage Museum always has a number of special events days each summer, and by far the most popular is the children's fun day.

This is the one annual island event guaranteed to provide children with an afternoon of fun and games, while being entertained and educated at the same time. The whole afternoon is geared to providing fun, and it's free to children up to the age of 12 if accompanied by an adult.

A variety of traditional games will be on offer and a model train layout will be working. There will be also be storytelling sessions, kids tombola, horse-shoe throwing, demonstrations of spinning and weaving and other types of crafts. Other treats include an ice-your-own cake stand, a chocolate fountain and a burger bar. The Isle of Arran Pipe Band will be in attendance, and other musicians will entertain throughout the afternoon.

There is plenty for the grown ups to do too, with many new and upgraded indoor and outdoor displays to see. Finally, of course, the famed Café Rosaburn will be selling meals, teas and coffee and cakes all afternoon.

The series follows the Elaine around various Scottish holiday destinations with her stand up show. In the lead up to her gig, Elaine gets to know the people who live, work and laugh in each location as well as exploring the local area and it's attractions. On Arran Elaine will be getting a tour of the island from Mogabout Safari tours, and making some soap at Arran Aromatics.

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New facilities needed

Out of the mouth of babes many wise words come, maybe an oft used phase.

But it seems a particularly appropriate one given that it has taken a six year old girl to say what many have thought for years about the Brodick beach toilet block.

Little Millie Dickson says it should be knocked down and a new one built - and we couldn't agree more.

North Ayrshire Council took a different view at the start of the season. They gave the outside a lick of paint - there - job done. Except it's not. It is time to look at the ageing public toilet facilities, not just in Brodick, but across the island as the older facilities in Lamlash and Whiting Bay are just about as bad.

We have sympathy for those who look after these facilities and we have no doubt they do as good a job as they can in the circumstances.

Rightly or wrongly, they are now being used more and more by the increasing number of camper vans coming to the island. But that is a debate for another day.

And is it not ironic that the Victorian toilet block in our neighbouring island of Bute is, in itself, a tourist attraction.

To make the Arran facilities suitable for all, there has to be investment. One of our readers this week suggests that there should be a new facility with showers and baby changing rooms, which in this day and age doesn't seem too much to ask. He also suggests having an attendant, which would probably mean the facilities would have to be paid for. But is a small charge not a lot better than having to put up with the facilities we have today?

There seems to be a misnomer among community groups on the island that the council doesn't own the toilet block. But it confirmed to The Banner this week that it does.

The council also says it will 'examine potential improvement' at the end of the summer.

Which means for the rest of the season, holidaymakers are going to have to put up with the 'smelly and disgusting' facilities which even appalled a six year old.

We hope Millie gets a satisfactory reply from the council and thank her for taking action that may spark renewed debate.



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

High oil prices

A Whiting Bay man who complained about the high price of heating oil has been told it is one of the down sides of living on an island.

Recently James MacGregor of Balnabuaich filled up his oil tank and paid 16.8 pence per litre plus 8 per cent VAT. Soon after that, he spoke to his friend in Kilmarnock who told him he had just refilled his tank and paid only 11.5ppl plus 8 per cent VAT. The Arran price, calculated Mr MacGregor was 46 per cent higher than the mainland price. He took his findings and wrote to Scottish Oils, not really expecting a reply, but was surprised to receive a letter from sales manager, I M Stuart.

He stated: 'Regretfully, one of the costs of living on an island is that all products do cost more than on the mainland. Indeed I am sure that even a loaf of bread which costs 19p here will be double that on Arran. Unfortunately, oil is no exception and there is a high cost of chartering ships and transporting all products to you, and, indeed, to compare prices with the mainland is unrealistic and I would suggest that a fairer comparison would be with the Western Isles where the price today for oil is in the region of 16.00 ppl plus VAT.'

Mr Suart then said that he sympathised with Mr Macgregor but added: 'We are all slaves to economic conditions and regrettably this is the down side of living on an island.'

Given a lift

What a change there is in the Kinloch Hotel. This week sees it near completion after its £450,000 refurbishment. Over the years it has grown and grown and for a long time it was Arran's largest hotel which boasted the only swimming pool on the island. With the new elevator, the palatial suites and a very grand new look, the Kinloch Hotel is set to meet the ever increasing high standards demanded by the hotel world.


