Quick response by council staff prevents damage

Floods held at bay

Fast action by council staff prevented serious flood damage as Arran was battered by more than an inch of rain on Saturday.

A number of homes in Corrie were at risk, as was Whiting Bay Primary School.

Flooding did affect the garages of two residential properties in Whiting Bay.

But as the rain poured relentlessly throughout Saturday – bringing most sport and leisure activities on the island to a halt – prompt action by roads department staff prevented serious damage from occurring.

In Corrie, a burn had burst its banks, causing water to flood into gardens of houses below.

Work by roads department staff Johnny Kelso and Jimmy McMaster to divert the excess water prevented the houses from being affected.

The roads foreman and operative were also on hand in Whiting Bay where heavy runoff from the hills and blocked drains put the primary school at risk from flooding.

'Again action was taken to clear debris and re-direct the flow of water,' North Ayrshire Council's island officer Gus MacLeod told The Arran Banner.

'If that had not been done, there would have been risk of flooding to the school itself.'

Heavy surface water was a problem for motorists on roads around the island. On the Ross Road near Lamlash, a section of the road was destroyed by force of water. It has been coned off pending repair work.

The inch of water that fell in 24 hours in most of West of Scotland was the equivalent to an average total for ten days.

Mr MacLeod said his staff had responded to calls made to the council's property services' hotline

'The flooding was not the worst we have seen on the island, but it was real enough for those whose property was threatened.

'The council has a responsibility to the public to alleviate any danger posed by run-off from roads, but even if we are not directly obliged to help we will do what we can to divert water in the short term.'

In Whiting Bay, overflow from a ditch aggravated by a

blocked culvert had led to two house garages being flooded.

Clearance work by the roads department staff eased the problem.

One householder, who did not want named, said: 'We ended up with three inches of water in our garage, and the roads department staff did a sterling job trying to help.

'They were out there for ages in that rain, and we are grateful for their help.'

Iain Dixon (55), from Norfolk, said the flooding he witnessed in Whiting Bay was the worst he had seen in visiting the island annually for the past

He provided the Banner with pictures of water flooding from

the grounds of the village primary school.

The Shore Road at that point was under four inches of water, as was a waterfront car park.

Leisure events were a washout. Football's Arran cup final between Southend and Shiskine at Whiting Bay was cancelled after more than an hour's deliberation by players over whether the game should go ahead.

Tom Tracey, owner of Arran Adventures, said all his outdoor activities had to be cancelled, including gorge walking — 'the water was too powerful, we have to err on the side of caution' — and a power boat trip around Ailsa Craig — 'high winds and poor visibility'.

He said only a few bikes went out for hire, instead of around 50 on a usual day during a summer weekend.

Man charged with sex offences

A man has been charged with serious sexual offences against young girls on Arran.

David Watson, 47, faces one charge of lewd and libidinous behaviour allegedly committed against one youngster when she was aged between five and 11.

He is further accused of two indecency offences against another girl when she was between nine and 11.

The alleged incidents are said to have happened at three addresses on Arran between 1994 and 1999.

Watson, of Brodick, Arran, denied the offences at Kilmarnock Sheriff Court and was bailed for trial at a later date.

Motorists urged to take care

Visitors to the Arran are being urged by police to take extra care driving on island roads.

The call follows an accident involving tourists on the String Road last Saturday night when a car occupied by two adults and two children ended up in a ditch on extremely wet road conditions. No one was injured.

Sergeant Bob McKay, of Arran Police, said: 'We would ask visitors to bear in mind that they are driving on unfamiliar roads and to take even more care than usual when the weather is bad. There is also the possibility of suddenly coming across slow-moving, agricultural vehicles.'

New and former MSP row over lower ferry fare plan

TWO leading Arran politicians have locked horns over the renewed prospect of much lower ferry fares for travellers to and from the island.

The SNP-led Scottish Executive last week announced that it would be introducing a pilot scheme in the Western Isles where travellers would pay dramatically-reduced charges using a road equivalent tariff (RET) whereby ferry fares are set on the basis of the cost of travelling an equivalent distance by road.

If eventually introduced across the country, it could have a huge positive impact for tourism, economy and attracting people to live in more remote areas.

However, former Labour Arran MSP Allan Wilson last week insisted to The Arran Banner there was no need for a pilot scheme.

Mr Wilson, the Cunninghame North MSP until the election in May, also demanded: 'Why won't the SNP cut ferry fares now by 40 per cent to boost island economies and cut commuting costs for islanders, as Labour proposed, while they undertake their latest study?'

Now, in a letter to the Banner this week, the SNP MSP Ken-

neth Gibson, who ousted his rival by just 48 votes to win a seat which gave overall power to his party, has hit back.

He writes: 'One has to admire the cheek of my predecessor. In last week's paper, he demands that the SNP cut fares now by 40 per cent. Why not 50 per cent or even 60 per cent? And why not for vehicles or island visitors?

'No one was fooled last May when Labour promised, as a back-of-the-envelope, preelection bribe, to reduce fares for islanders as part of a desperate, unsuccessful attempt to hang on to seats with large island electorates. After all, they have been in power at Westminster for ten years and were in Holyrood for eight. They had plenty of time to bring in fare reductions. Instead fares went up year on year, including this one. So why the

'Unlike Labour's proposals, SNP plans for RET will reduce fares to what it would cost to travel the equivalent distance by road. Figures of up to 85 per cent reduction on some routes have been mooted and all travellers and their vehicles will be included.'

This week, Mr Wilson said: 'Far from Labour's proposals being 'back of an envelope' they were in fact costed and ready to implement. They were based on the Air Island Discount Scheme already introduced by Labour and Lib Dems for discounted islander air travel.

'They would cost around £4m in subsidy to the ferry operator and would build on the already very successful free ferry discount scheme for disabled islanders and those over 60.

'It was also Labour's intention to introduce freight discounts of around 20 per cent but to develop a scheme that would ensure the benefits went to island producers and not solely the ferry operators or haulage companies.

'That scheme too has been shelved by the Nationalists. It true therefore to claim that every islander will be paying an SNP surcharge of 40 per cent every time they leave the island.

'Everyone knows that RET would cost hundreds of millions of pounds to implement - money the Nationalists don't have.

'The answer is simple — introduce Labour's 40 per cent discount this year as a first step and if the Nationalists want to introduce RET later let them get on with it.'

The new Kilmory Parish Church graveyard will finally be opened on Sunday after nine years of campaigning for it to be

Kilmory resident Edna Picken was one of the main agitators who had been demanding the council to enlarge the area for

Edna said: 'We started campaigning for the extension about nine years ago when they ran out of room. I got fed up writing to the council and listening to excuses from a certain person on

'I nearly got to the point where I told my family that if anything happened to me they should just bury me at Lenamhor.'

Kilmory community councillor Alistair Yates said the whole affair was uncalled for: 'It took far too long for them to do anything about it. It was a joke.

'The council blamed the church and then the church blamed the council. It all should have been sorted out much sooner.'

A spokesman for North Ayrshire Council cemeteries service said: 'Negotiations for the extension to the cemetery at Kilmory began as the existing cemetery approached capacity in 1997.

'The council were able to approve a decision on the final location for the site just over two years ago.'

As there was very little space left in the existing burial ground one body had to be interred in Lamlash cemetery.

But now an extra piece of land to the right of the church has been designated to be part of the Kilmory cemetery.

Edna said: 'I am so pleased that it has finally come to fruition. People have the right to be buried in their local cemetery and that right was denied to at least one person. It was entirely wrong.'

A public service of dedication of the new burial ground shall take place on Sunday at 4pm.



Thousands of pounds worth of accessories for the new Arran High School were destroyed by fire between Sunday and Monday.

The fittings and fixtures were found damaged inside the building but no damage was done to the new structure.

'The accessories were found smouldering,' said Sergeant Bob McKay, of Arran Police, on Wednesday. 'The fire had burnt itself out by the time it was discovered.

'Fire investigation officers examined the damage yesterday and found no evidence that the fire had been started deliberately.'

Arran tourists may soon arrive by seaplane

Seaplanes could soon be making regular tourist trips to Arran from Glasgow city centre.

In a blaze of publicity this week, Loch Lomond Seaplanes revealed that from next month it will be flying passengers on a nine-seater luxury seaplane from the city to Oban Marina three times a week, seven days a week between February and November.

The scenic 20-minute journey, costing £149 for a return ticket, is the first of its kind in Europe, and the company owner, Captain David West, confirmed this week that he was determined to set up a similar service to Arran as well as the likes of Skye and Mull.

The seaplanes, taking off from the River Clyde, will depart from the Science Centre in Glasgow where a special dock has been created.

A spokeswoman for Loch Lomond Seaplanes said: 'The interest that has been created following the television, radio and newspaper coverage this week has been unbelievable.

'We have had inquiries from all around the world.

'Arran is definitely in our plans, and it is one of the possible routes that we hope to enter into talks about. It is difficult to say when it would happen, but it is unlikely it would be this year.

'A lot will depend on the demand for the service elsewhere, but everything is looking extremely positive judging on the response we are receiving to the publicity about the Oban journeys.

Oban Marina works manager Neil Price said he was hopeful the service would boost tourism.

The craft used by Loch Lomond Seaplanes can land on land as well as water, so if the sea is too choppy the plane will land at Oban Airport.

Stag party sea plunge sparks full scale alert

Police, lifeboat and ambulance all called out to Lamlash

Three foolhardy partygoers to the shore. The third refused who plunged fully clothed into the sea at Lamlash Pier last Saturday sparked a full-scale alert by emergency services.

The coastguard service, police, Arran lifeboat and an ambulance all became involved after the three men were feared to be in difficulty.

It is understood that one young man who was among a stag party celebrations in Lamlash jumped off the pier at around 8.30pm, to be quickly followed by the other two.

However, a witness became concerned for the trio's safety and called the emergency serv-

An Arran lifeboat crew, from the nearby station in Lamlash, was quickly on the scene.

By the time it arrived, two of the men had made it back assistance, but according to lifeboat spokesman Alan Little, a member of the crew jumped into the water and accompanied him back to the shore.

There, he was found to be suffering from the early stages of hypothermia and was attended to by a waiting ambulance

Mr Little added: 'It might have seemed a good idea at the time amid the fun and the frolics of the stag party, but this little venture could so easily have ended in tragedy.

'The sea can still be very cold at this time of the year, and alcohol, as well as impairing your judgement, will make your body temperature drop even quicker.'

Sergeant Bob McKay, of Arran Police, said: 'Once out of the water the young men were warned about the dangers and consequences surrounding their actions.'

A passer-by, who did not want named, told The Arran Banner: 'It is a bit thoughtless when

people get up to high jinks like this. As well as putting their own lives at risk they are also putting unnecessary demands on the emergency services.'

It is believed that the three young men involved were from the mainland.





So, we are going to have a 'national conversation' about independence Again our first minister has shown his sure footedness in striking the right note. Without a clear majority to carry through his promise, he could have been tempted to drop the idea now he is in power. Yet he has found a middle way, delaying, yet bringing everyone on board.

Or perhaps just using another word for consultation. We on Arran know all about consultation. It has taken place, or didn't according to your view, in every large project over recent years; water, sewerage, high school. Those organisations behoven to consult with the lieges will tend to become adept at bypassing consultation if possible; those against any proposal will claim loudly and bitterly, however many public meetings and opportunities to inspect plans are offered, that there has been no consultation; and the vast majority will take no part and accept, perhaps with a mild grumble, whatever befalls them.

Who is to take part in this national conversation? Will it be the pub bores? Will it be at public meetings attended only by the usual suspects? Will it be confined to elected representatives who have already shown they have an axe to grind by thinking that they might speak for the rest of us?

I hardly see myself being involved in this conversation. Yet one does have some feelings about it, mixed with a kind of hopelessness that we shall probably end up with more of the same. Definitely a unionist, voted no-no and was totally against the devolved parliament seeing it as a cynical ploy to increase Labour votes and as an extra and completely unnecessary tier of local government. Yet we cannot turn the clock back.

What's more the Scottish parliament, which has been such an embarrassment to some of us with its self important and inarticulate ministers begins to look interesting now. Is it all down to one man? An anxiety about the SNP had always been the perceived naivity of its adherents and a lack of talent among its leaders. Now they are looking massively talented in comparison with the dullards who preceded them. They also appear to be speaking to the whole country instead of that faction whom their predecessors so assiduously worked at making dependent on them while ignoring those with any inclination to stand on their own feet Then there are the Tories. It looks as if they have been emasculated in Scotland for a long time to come, leaving the choice from what is now. That now is looking more, alert, more flexible, more all embracing than anything we have seen since the parliament came into being.

So what of this conversation? With whom do we converse? Each other those who stoppeth one of three, or do we await with baited breath until we are given the opportunity to vote again? Of course there are all the myriad aspects which matter, the hundreds of things which governmen deals with, to say nothing of how we feel about Scotland. Often proud sometimes ashamed, occasionally embarrassed. As African nations became independent during the sixties it was widely believed that self government was more important than good government. Yet look how t turned out. Despite that, are we prepared to forfeit some support and safety in numbers for the sense of pride in being our own nation? In the end, it comes down to people and what level of trust one feels one car have in them. I seldom find myself in conversation about politics but this new bunch of people are showing distinct signs of a clear break from the past. If Scotland can have more of this, and stay well away from being the one party state it has effectively been, I'm for it. If, as a unionist, have come to think this, others must have too.

I read with interest Scott Mc-Murray's letter regarding the setting up of a youth-led centre in Brodick. Such a place already exists and ran last year form October until June this year. After consultation via a questionnaire circulated to young people attending a youth weekend run by Arran youth Connect, under the auspices of Arran churches Together, a need to establish a youth café was identified in Brodick on a Saturday night from 7pm until 10pm.

The Brodick Church hall was made available and adult volunteers from all of Arran's denominations, along with several young volunteers, agreed to help run and staff the venture.

Funding for equipment was given via St Columba's Church of Scotland, London, to buy necessary equipment and to reinforce the hall to withstand boisterous activities such as indoor football.

The youth café will reopen again for all of high school age on Saturday, September 1, with a barbeque, and run throughout the year, excluding school holidays, every Saturday evening, offering a safe comfortable place for young people to play indoor football, basketball, pool, badminton, darts, table tennis, board games, or just gather to socialise and listen to music over a coffee or soft drinks provided from the popular and well-stocked tuck shop.

On request film nights, talks and other activities such as a visit from a beautician have already been tried, and it is hoped shortly to introduce computer games and equipment.

The members of the church congregations on Arran also share your concern Scott, and we are trying our very best to do something for Arran's teenagers.

orries going too fast

Sir,

My family, including my 15-

month-old granddaughter, have just returned from a very enjoyable week in a lovely cottage in beautiful Glen Rosa.

The one thing we all found very unpleasant was the traffic around Brodick. In order to a walk into Brodick (which we did every day) we had to walk part of the String road and the main road where there are no pavements.

We took our lives in our hands with every journey as cars and lorries gave us no space to escape except ditches.

On our last day there, Friday, August 10, around 2pm, I set off from Glen Rosa with my grand daughter in her buggy.

I met some cyclists (a man and children) and when I joined the String Road they were behind me.

Suddenly I was aware of a lorry coming at quite a speed down the String Road.

Although I was clearly in view, he made no attempt to slow down and he was unable to pull out as a car was coming up.

At the last moment, he braked, skidded and very nearly hit

The man on the bike couldn't believe how close this lorry, heavily laden with gravel, came to hitting us.

When I related this to some people who live on Arran, they suggested that I write to you as they are sick of the island's haulage contractors doing this.

Cheaper ferry fares

One has to admire the cheek of my predecessor as MSP for Cunninghame

North. In last week's paper, in reference to ferries, he demands that the SNP cut fares now by 40 per cent. In fact, the Labour manifesto commits to cutting ferry fares only 'in the third term of the Scottish Parliament'.

Quite a difference! And why 40 per cent? Why not 50 per cent or even 60 per cent? And why not for vehicles or island visitors?

'No one was fooled last May when Labour promised, as a last-minute, back-of-the-envelope, pre-election bribe, to

reduce fares for islanders as part of a desperate, unsuccessful attempt to hang on to seats with large island electorates. After all, they have been on power at Westminster for more than ten years and were in Holyrood for eight. They had plenty of time to bring in fare reductions. Instead, fares went up year on year, including this one. So why the urgency from them now? The new SNP government has not waited eight years to act.

'Unlike Labour's proposals, SNP plans for road equivalent tariff will reduce fares to what it would cost to travel the equivalent distance by road. Figures of up to 85 per cent reduction on some routes have been mooted and all travellers and their vehicles will be included. This will make islands more attractive to visitors, goods and services on the islands cheaper and businesses more competitive.

'A pilot project is being carried out in order to monitor the impact on ferry traffic. Based on that, the Scottish government, in partnership with Cal Mac, will look at the ramifications of implementation throughout Scotland in terms of the need for additional ferries, crossing capacity

And infrastructure. That, we believe, is the most sensible long-term approach to ensure long-term sustainability and greater prosperity for our island communities, including Arran.'

Ex MSP's brass neck

In your lead article of last

week you report Allan Wilson, former MSP of this parish, feels that ferry fares should be cut. I surely cannot be alone in thinking that he has a wee bit of a brass neck. Is this really the same Allan Wilson who was a minister in the last two Scottish Executives which ran majority administrations throughout the past eight years and whose party has had uninterrupted power in Westminster since 1977? In all that time nary a ferry cut was to be had. However, we did have a good **Sannox**.

number of increases.

Now Allan asks why won't a minority administration which has been in office for less than 100 days cut ferry fares by 40 per cent now. I must say Allan, you have succeeded in elevating irony to an art form.

What Mr Wilson is referring to is the belated Labour manifesto commitment at the last election. It was for a cut in passenger fares only. Also the passenger in question had to be an island resident. What was the qualification for island residency? It didn't say. If it was the same qualification as for senior ferry cards, it would include second home owners but not Arran students living on the mainland during term time. There was no costed commitment for commercial or care fares. There was no fare cut for tourist or those travelling to the island on business. How these omissions would 'boost island economies' only Mr Wilson can answer.

Compare this belated commitment with the holy grail of RET. It does exactly what it says on the tin. It means the fare for all passengers, cars, or commercial vehicles would be the same cost as travelling a corresponding distance on the public road. Passenger fares would be the same as a corresponding bus fare and vehicles would be charged their relevant road cost per mile.

Allan Wilson says 'we already know all we need to know about RET'. Do we? Has there been a full-scale trial implementing RET anywhere in Scotland? No. So clearly we do not know all there is need to know, such as the traffic and infrastructure implications. This will involve big decisions requiring a high degree of political will to implement.

For the first time in my life, I believe that political will now exists. The implementation of RET throughout Scotland would, for the first time, put island communities on a level playing field with our mainland counterparts. I look forward to the day when the term 'carriage included (UK mainland only)' is consigned to history.
