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Community saddened by the demolition of historic building

'Lochranza is the jewel in Arran's crown and one of the gems has been stolen from before our very eyes'

The demolition of an historic building in the centre of Lochranza has caused indignation and fury amongst the close-knit village community.

In mid June, Fernside - a 130-year-old cottage - was knocked down by the new owner, a Mr Nick Bailey of Horsesham.

Neighbouring property owners, one of whom is a 95-yearold woman, received no prior notification of the demolition before it went ahead.

Low-level street lighting urged for new housing

Over 50 local residents turned out last Thursday night for a public meeting about streetlights.

The venue was Shiskine village hall and the area in question was a future development of approximately 50 houses in Blackwaterfoot.

And the almost unanimous view was that low-level lighting would ensure safety but not cause excessive light pollution.

Councillor Margie Currie opened by saying: 'I have been invited by Shiskine Valley Trust to chair the meeting and am not here to represent the Council.'

She also pointed out that NAC intends to review its policy towards lighting; the current standards were adopted in 2006.

Robert Waine presented a paper drawn up by himself and Neil Arthur. He pointed out: 'This development has already been agreed. As a community we have to decide what we feel about the impact of streetlighting and how it fits into the rural environment of Blackwaterfoot and Shiskine.'

After considerable discussion, the meeting considered four options to suggest to the council. Nobody voted for the two options of lighting similar that currently in the village or lighting with timing and dimming.

Help to clear up fly tipping

Fly tipping is anti-social behaviour.

That is the message from North Ayrshire Council. When charges were introduced last year for special uplift of household items on Arran and across North Ayrshire, there were fears that it could lead to an increase in illegal fly tipping by irresponsible residents.

Now a new fund offering grants of between £500 and £10,000 has been launched to help local communities tackle fly tipping by providing them with cash to remove dumped waste and take steps to prevent future problems.

This is open to community groups, landowners and land managers who experience persistent problems of fly tipping.

Councillor Tom Barr, NAC portfolio holder for the environment, said: 'There is no doubt that fly tipping is a problem which the whole of Scotland faces, and North Ayrshire is no different.

'We already see local groups working with the support of the Council to clean up their communities. Any assistance that these groups and landowners can get has to be welcomed.'





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Arran's buildings must be kept safe

This week a rare house designed by the architect of Guildford cathedral has featured in the news because its future is under threat.

It is endangered because the rules on VAT make it more profitable for the owners to replace it with a new building

Buttinghill in West Sussex, was built by Sir Edward Maufe in 1933, while he was working at Guildford.

Replacing the house with a new one will be expensive but it will still be cheaper than a renovation, as VAT could add as much as £100,000 to the final cost.

You might wonder why on earth we're talking about a house in West Sussex but it's because the scandal of VAT is affecting properties on Arran too.

VAT is chargeable on house restoration, but not on new houses.

So restoring Buttinghill will put around £90,000 into the Chancellor's pocket, eliminating much of the possible profit on the operation. By contrast, a new house attracts no tax.

It is easy to see then why the new owner of Fernside in Lochranza demolished a perfectly sound, albeit old, house in favour of a new build. But this does not make the loss of the building any easier to bear.

Fernside was situated at the heart of one of the island's most picturesque villages. It was built as part of a row of houses in the 1870s that have since then provided a home for the village grocers shop, the Co-operative, the Bank of Scotland and of course the Free Church.

By removing Fernside the owners have left a gaping big hole in the centre of the village and angered the small community who live there.

There have been other notable demolitions that have left island residents reeling. The Whitehouse Hotel in Lamlash and the Rock Hotel in Blackwaterfoot were both bulldozed over 20 years ago and nothing put in their place. And the Breadalbane Hotel in Kildonan was flattened three years ago to make way for houses, which have yet to be built.

Tax relief in its present form arguably encourages works to be carried out in a less sensitive manner, which is slightly perverse in view of the government's public commitment to preserving our national heritage.

Nationwide planning regulations also mean that it can take up to four years for some people to get permission for small changes to a property while an historic building can be demolished overnight. Many things beyond our control are changing on Arran so let's do what we can to save the island's heritage from destruction.



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

A Helping Hand: Business Mentoring Scotland

Lorna Mercer, from the Ayrshire Chamber of Commerce's Business Mentoring Scotland scheme, on how their services could help more island businesses.

'Business Mentoring Scotland' was launched on Arran in 2010, and since then we've managed to match 15 companies with a business mentor, meeting monthly to discuss business strategies and plans for growth.

Jane Mack of the The Arran Team, Property Management Specialists based, would recommend the mentoring project saying "I found the business mentoring programme to be very useful as it has enabled me to understand my costs better, plan more efficiently and has resulted in an increase in my portfolio of clients. Once the website was up and running all I had to do was complete a form and send a copy of my paid invoice from Cams to Derek and in less than two weeks I had some much appreciated funding towards the cost. Owning two holiday lets I learnt that I could put so much more against my tax bill than I had been doing over past few years. So you're never too old to learn and it's worth asking. 




