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New lease of life for youth hostel

A planning application has been made to convert a former youth hostel in Whiting Bay to housing

The former Easidale Youth Hostel has lay empty for more than four years since it was closed as accommodation for the Arran Outdoor Centre when the new purpose-built building was opened at Clauchlands.

Built as a private house it was bought and run by the Scottish Youth Hostel since after the Second World War, but that closed seven or eight years ago.

Now Bay Developments has submitted a planning application to North Ayrshire Council to convert the existing building into three flats and a semi-detached house with parking in the grounds which extend to the Glenashdale Falls path.

Development Planning Services (Roads) have no objections to the proposals the existing access will be used for the three flats and house.

The application form states that eight parking spaces are available for these proposed dwellings, however at present only six parking spaces are indicated on the plan. Roads say they require eight parking spaces for the proposals.

The application will be considered under delegated powers.

Lamlash dentist's extension work nears completion

Work to extend the Lamlash Dental Surgery at Arran War Memorial Hospital is almost finished.

The 'Bungalow' which is in the grounds of the hospital in Lamlash is being refurbished and extended.

Work began before the summer and the building has been closed to the public since then with all patients being transferred to the Brodick surgery for the duration of the construction.

Dr Alison Graham, medical director for NHS Ayrshire and Arran, said: 'Work is now nearing completion on the new dental facility in Lamlash, with the final testing of all supplies and equipment scheduled over the next few weeks.

'The facility will re-open at the beginning of September and will offer improved treatment and decontamination facilities for the local population.'

She added: 'Once the surgery is open, we are planning to hold an open day for members of the public. Details will be publicised nearer the time.

'We apologise for any inconvenience these refurbishments may have caused.'

Grateful thanks are due to the collectors and to CalMac for allowing the collection.


Lost ring

A former sailor who survived the sinking of the HMS Dasher during World War Two has finally received a special medal 68 years after the war ended.

Veteran Frederic Nunn, 90, from Carlisle, earned the Arctic Star for his part in the Arctic Convoys.

Mr Nunn began his service in 1940 at the age of 18, and eventually left the navy in

But the most dramatic moment of the war for Mr Nunn was when he was on the HMS Dasher, which exploded off the coast of Arran in March

Mr Nunn said: 'I was lucky, very lucky.

'It went down in a few minutes but there was nothing about it on the news.

'I got off it and left and swam with a couple of fellows. We were taken to Lamlash on the Isle of Arran and kept there for a couple of days, then got onto a prison ship in Greenock.'

Tree planting will change the face of Glen Rickard

'People will start noticing the difference in the landscape'

The entire landscape between Brodick and Lamlash is to change dramatically over the next 15 and more

Gone will be the corridor of trees which line much of the main road south of Brodick through Glen Rickard to be replaced by a mix of traditional broadleaves first grown on Arran in 1750.

Native species

The long term planting plan will also see more native species of trees planted on the island including Sitka and Norway Spruce, Lodgepole and Scots Pine, Larch, Birch, Oak and Ash to name just some of them.

The plan is to open up the road and improve the outlook across Clauchland Hill returning the views not seem since the early 1960s.

'Glen Rickard is an important view from the boat,' said Arran's Head Forester Andy Walker. 'The glen also gives many their first impression of the island and we are attempting to open up all these views again.'

As well as from the main road the plan will open up views from the many paths which criss-cross the hills, including Clauchland Hill, with the planting of Scots Pine and Norway Spruce.

But it will take a long time. The

process began 10 years ago and a programme of felling, which has already started, has been programmed right through to 2048.

'People will start noticing the difference in the landscape now and by 2030 the most of the changes will be seen, but the work will continue until

Total amount

And while there will be a far greater amount of broadleaves particularly around the main road they will only be around half of the total amount of trees planted.


While to the west the strict boundary which exists between forest and moorland is to be softened by a woodland fringe.

'This is a zone where we will plant a variety of trees making the transition from conifers to moorland in a more gradual way.

Community council chairman John Inglis said: 'Arran forest will be completely different when the Glen Rickard planting is complete and it will be a much more attractive place than it is now.

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

Population woes

It will not be a huge surprise to many of us that the population of Arran has decreased in the past 10 years.

But it is however slightly worrying because we know Scotland's population as a whole has been rising over the years (at the end of June last year, it stood at 5,313,600 - the highest it has ever been).

There has been much in the news this week welcoming an increase in population figures for Scotland's other islands.

Most of the increase is concentrated on the four biggest islands, but the population has declined on many of the smaller ones, something that the newspapers have failed to investigate fully.

Perhaps this is proof that there are still a number of factors that make it difficult for families to make a life on the Scottish islands - factors that could exert considerable downward pressure on populations in the future.

For Arran there has long been a number of factors that have made the island a haven for those seeking a retirement home but rather less convivial for working

The first is house prices, which continue to pose a problem for young people in particular.

For at least two generations, many young people have been forced to move away from Arran either to find work or because they cannot afford a house.

Ironically, this was partly caused by a rise in population for many years as wealthy incomers with money to spend on houses moved to the island.

The second factor is the cost of living.

Ferry travel remains expensive and as we know fuel prices are a constant problem for those of us living here.

Much of the recent population growth on the other islands is concentrated among the over-75s while the most recent census shows a nine per-cent drop in the 30-44 group in rural areas.

To redress this, Scotland needs to attract more young people of working age in years to come.

Councillor John Bruce is right, a ferry service for the 21st century may be the only solution to this on Arran as presently it is almost impossible to commute to the mainland on a daily basis.

Population decreases are not always a bad thing but if it means those of retirement age far outweigh younger people, the future of Arran could be a bleak one.

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

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New lettings initiative for St Molios Park homes



A new lettings initiative is to be used for the first time to allocate new affordable homes on Arran.

Ahead of allocating the first phase of the £8.9 million St Molios Park development in Lamlash, Irvine Housing Association commissioned research to identify how the housing needs on the island differ from those on the mainland, in order to ensure that the houses would be allocated to those most in need.

This research has resulted in the development of a Rural Lettings Initiative for Arran which will allow IHA to assess applications in a fair, transparent and consistent way.

A total of 56 homes are being built, 40 for social rent and 16 for shared equity in the biggest affordable development on the island in a number of years. The first phase will see eight houses released for rent and eight for sale.

Director of Operations,
Nicola Thom, recently met
with community representatives on Arran and gave
assurances that properties
will be allocated in a way
that recognises the particular needs of the island.
And following consultation
with North Ayrshire Council,
Arran Community Council
and the Arran Community
Voluntary Service, the lettings initiative approved last
week.

The new lettings initiative meets all regulatory and legislative requirements and award priority to applicants with a housing need. The properties on Arran will be allocated through the North Ayrshire Housing Register (NAHR) using the new lettings initiative. Therefore people interested in the homes must apply to NAHR. All applicants interested in the first eight properties which will be ready next month should contact IHA directly on 0845 112 6600 to request an application form which should be completed and returned to us before 30 August.

An information leaflet about the 'Rural Lettings Initiative' and a summary of the North Ayrshire Common Allocation Policy can be found at www.irvineha.co.uk under 'Rent a Home'.

The eight shared equity homes have been built under the New Supply Shared Equity (NSSE) scheme from the Scottish Government, designed to help people on moderate incomes to buy a home of their own. Under the scheme the shared equity buyer will own their property outright, but only needs to fund between 60% and 80% of the price. The Scottish Government hold the remainder through a shared equity agreement, with no rent to pay on the remaining share.

After two years the owner can increase their share

of the property if they wish and can afford to do so.

As NSSE is aimed at moderate income house-holds, buyers need to be assessed by Irvine to see whether or not they qualify. Interested buyers first need to submit an applica-

tion to our Home Ownership team. Buyers need to show that they cannot buy a house suitable for their needs without help from the scheme. The amount that buyers contribute must be the maximum mortgage they can reasonably obtain. 
