German biker loses GPS device but still manages to find Brodick

A MOTORCYCLIST and his sidecar passenger went back to a paper map after losing their Global Positioning System (GPS) device.

Michael Kutzera and his girlfriend, Laura, asked for the Banner's help to find the missing global positioning system (GPS) which somehow dropped out of the sidecar between Lochranza and Brodick. Up till then, the loaned 21st century GPS, allied to a Russian Cossack motorbike, originally designed more than 70 years ago, had helped the couple navigate their three wheeled chariot from Hamburg.

Mr Kutzera said: 'The grey Tom Tom may have dropped out near Brodick filling station, but we cannot find it despite motoring between Lochranza and Brodick twice. I am convinced it was not stolen. It has a unique screensaver picture of a Caribbean beach.

His Cossack motorcycle, copied from a BMW pre-Second World War design, has a reputation for extreme ruggedness and was once common in the former Soviet Union, but is now a diehard collector's item.





Arran's sporting week

AS Arran's cold summer marred by frequent rain comes to a close, sultry warm weather, last weekend, heralded some wonderful sporting performances.

Arran is a golfer's paradise with seven world class courses.

At Corrie, established 123 years ago under the island's magnificent granite peaks, Ewan McKinnon achieved a feat, he may never equal, with two holes in one in a

Mr McKinnon is the best golfer of his generation on the island but, as deputy leader of the mountain rescue team, he will be very pleased. It was good weather on Saturday, and his round was not interrupted by a call

He will surely know that golf is not the 'ruination of a good walk.'

Sadly, the same cannot be said for mountain rescue, it is a tough voluntary job carried out, often in terrible conditions and frequently with a tragedy at the end.

Mr McKinnon is the epitome of an amateur sportsman enjoying the game for its own sake and, at other times, risking his life to save others.

On Monday evening, four teams of footballers entertained large numbers of spectators on the east and west sides of Arran.

Brodick and Southend's league decider was an epic adventure with both teams equally matched and unable to break through in the 90 minutes.

Despite dire predictions of many, that as the game was the Arran equivalent of an Old Firm tie, neither team would have a full complement at the end, there were no red cards.

Southend's supporters were ecstatic towards the end of extra time as their team scored, but it was not to be as Brodick triumphed.

Everyone agreed it was a great match and, in the tradition of amateur sport, it was free to watch. Much better than a night in watching some over-paid, so called, professionals on television.






Price of safety

Councillor Fergus Clarkson gave a warning at Tuesday's Community Council meeting that alterations to the ferry to meet new safety standards would mean big changes for the travelling public. We outlined the likely changes which would be required to MV Caledonian Isles several weeks ago that covered the bow doors and possibly the bulkheads on the car deck.

'Only CalMac's newest vessel, MV Isle of Lewis, met all of the newest regulations,' said Mr Clarkson 'but MV Caledonian Isles, even though only two years-old, would require modification.'

Mr Clarkson, a master mariner himself, said: 'The bulkheads which would require fitting would affect the carrying capacity of the ship and increase turnaround time.

The MV Caledonian Isles has done a good job this year but every seafaring person knows that the design is unsafe and that, in making her safer, she would cease to be the all-purpose vessel which was built for Arran's requirements. If the long-term policy was to continue with the same style of ships, they would have to get bigger and they would be unable to berth at Ardrossan.'

Bin bags

Tuesday's Community Council meeting discussed a variety of topics. One, raised by Tom Campbell of Pirnmill, was a complaint that some people had to buy their own bin bags and other people had them supplied free of charge. He explained a scenario where people in Pirnmill had to pay for their bin bags, but the 'people up the hill' had them delivered free of charge. Tom Knox explained that the rule was that they were supplied free to any house more than 40 metres from the pick-up point.

John Simcock asked if there was anything the Community Council could do. Said Tom Campbell, 'Yes I want bin bags supplied.'

TV detector van

Arran can expect a visit from the TV detector van shortly. The van has records of who does not have a TV licence and can tell if a television is inside the house. If the two do not match up, they will knock on the door and discuss the matter further with the householder. Licence evasion can lead to fines of up to £1,000 although they have previously told us that they do their utmost to get people to pay before taking action. According to their figures, there are 15,402 licence evaders in Ayrshire.
