Green light for hotel

Work will soon be beginning at the Douglas Hotel in Brodick.

The building was bought in April 2007 by St Petersburg-based property developer Sean Henry. Following an earlier planning application, revised plans were submitted this year and on September 25 they were passed by North Ayrshire Council.

Mr Henry is originally from Corrie and his sister Elaine Campbell is overseeing the hotel development.

On Wednesday, Elaine said: 'Plans were passed and we are just waiting for a demolition warrant and building warrant. Work will begin before the end of the year. Jimmy Johnston's barber's shop, which will become the hotel kitchen, closed this week and we took over the keys yesterday.'

The red sandstone frontage will be retained and planning conditions deal with the listed nature of the building. The new hotel will have 21 en suite double bedrooms, a whisky bar, a brasserie and limited sports facilities for guests.

Arran beer could soon be bottled at a new £3.9million site near Kilmarnock.

But not at the doomed Diageo Johnnie Walker plant, as has been reported elsewhere.

The whisky bottling plant, which is closing after almost 200 years in the Ayrshire town, could though provide some of the skilled workforce for the new Arran beer bottling operation.

Gerald Michaluk is managing director of Marketing Management Services, the company that bought the Arran Brewery from Richard and Elisabeth Roberts last May.

He told the Banner: 'After Diageo announced the closure we were approached about taking over one of the sites. However, East Ayrshire Council identified a number of other locations and has offered a range of financial support.'

'The site we have selected is 8.45 hectares with plenty of car parking and loading facilities. It has been an industrial site at some time in the past.'

'It is completely vacant now and the council has indicated that a planning application could be fast-tracked. We want to be bottling on the site by the middle of next year.'

Mr Michaluk acknowledged that some of the 700 skilled former Johnnie Walker workers could find employment at his new bottling plant.

Arran beer is brewed at Cladach, taken off the island in 180-barrel tankers, and then

bottled at Dunbar and Hartlepool. The Belhaven plant at Dunbar where all Arran Red Squirrel beer is bottled will be closing down in December and the company may have to find an interim bottler until the Ayrshire plant is up and running.

Gerald Michaluk is confident that the Arran Brewery has a sound future. He said: 'We have capacity at Cladach to increase volume substantially. We are getting Red Squirrel bottles into ASDA stores in January. It could create nine more jobs on Arran.'

'Our new Ayrshire bottling plant will be a 25,000 square foot unit and would create up to 50 jobs. Most importantly, we are now into our third month of profit.'

The Arran Brewery opened to full production in February 2000 and has received many awards for the quality of Arran Blonde and Arran Ale.

Timber fund takes pressure off the road

Forestry Commission Scotland has confirmed that Arran is to receive a massive £1million boost to its roads budget to upgrade the roads for large volumes of timber haulage.

North Ayrshire Council and the Ayrshire Timber Group have been successful with a bid for a £1million grant from the Scottish Government's Strategic Timber Transport Fund.

Improve

This money will be used to improve sections of road on the island used by timber lorries.

A North Ayrshire Council spokesman said: 'This meets almost half the cost of improving sections of the String, Machrie Moor, C147 South Kilpatrick and cemetery roads on Arran. The rest of the money comes from the council's budget and other sources.'

'NAC's Infrastructure and Design Services will carry out the design, construction and supervision of the work. It will involve carriageway reconstruction and reinforcement including drainage and verge improvements.'

Impact

Welcoming the latest projects, Scottish environment minister, Roseanna Cunningham, said: 'By its very nature, transportation of timber can impact on the rural road network and on communities.'

'The Strategic Timber Transport Fund is investing millions, both in alternatives and improvements to the rural road network, that will remove thousands of lorry loads of timber from public roads, bringing community and environmental benefits to rural Scotland.'

Hunterston plans halted

Plans to build a coal-fired power station just 25 miles from the coast of Arran could still go ahead despite a decision by one of the main backers to pull out.

Danish energy firm Dong said it would now act as a design partner for the station at Hunterston, next to British Energy's nuclear plant.

Its partner in Ayrshire Power Limited, UK firm Peel Energy, said it remained committed to the project.

Peel said plans would go before the Scottish government later this year.

Kenneth Gibson Arran's MSP said: 'For months now, as constituents will know, I have doubted the viability or requirement for a coal-fired power station at Hunterston but I am surprised that Dong has pulled out of this project prior even to Ayrshire Power Limited (APL) in whom it had a half share applying for planning permission.'

'It seems that Dong now realises that such a project is fraught with environmental, technical and financial difficulties and may never be either financially viable nor will its

electricity be required.'

Dong's decision to withdraw financial backing from the project has been welcomed by environmental groups.

Against

Lucy Wallace, Arran's RSPB information officer, has been campaigning locally against the proposed plans at Hunterston.

She said: 'I wonder how many Arran residents are fully aware of the proposed development of a coal fired power station across the water at Hunterston?'

'I for one am extremely wor-

rried about the implications for increasing Scotland's greenhouse gas emissions, as well as the local environmental damage that this development will cause.'

If the planned facility at Hunterston goes ahead it will be the first conventional station to come on stream in Scotland since 1980.

The plant would have the capacity to power about two million homes and would be dependent mainly on imported coal, which has lower emissions than coal from Scottish fields.

Red Squirrel Ale wins cherished accolade

The celebrated Isle of Arran Brewery at Cladach in Brodick has picked up another award, this time for its Red Squirrel Ale.

Brewer Kevin Dewar travelled to the word-famous department store Fortnum and Masons in London last week to receive the honour from the British Guild of Real Food.

The guild has awarded the Red Squirrel – the brewery's newest product – two gold stars.

'There were only six beers in the whole of Britain given two gold stars,' said Kevin. 'I am thrilled to get this award. It makes it all worthwhile.'

The new drink has been created by the Arran Brewery

to help efforts to protect red squirrels on the island.

Part of the proceeds from sales of the Red Squirrel Ale will be donated to conservation projects designed to help the endangered mammals.

'When Gerald Michaluk (managing director of the brewery) suggested that we make a Red Squirrel Ale I had a brainwave,' said Kevin. 'A few years ago I was discussing the production of a red ale using dark crystal malt with a brewer in Pontefract.'

'The idea of a red ale seemed perfect for the squirrels.'

Kevin describes the beer as a well-balanced, lightly hopped beer, which at only 3.9 per cent is not too strong.

Islanders urged to check for rat invasion

People on Arran are being urged to check the condition of their drains after pest control experts reported a 40 per cent increase in calls to rat infested homes.

Driven out of sewers by summer floods, Scotland's rat population has been moving into homes and gardens across the country in ever increasing numbers.

Food waste

It is estimated that there are now up to 80 million rats in Britain compared to around 45 million a decade ago as a result of a combination of warmer winters and an increase in discarded food waste.

Now, prompted by a surge of call outs to homes to make repairs after pest controllers have flushed the vermin out, one drain

specialists is urging people to check their underground pipework before winter sets in and the homeless rats seek out new, warmer nesting sites.

'Rats can get in through the smallest of holes,' said the expert.

'It doesn't matter whether it's a big house or tiny cottage, rats can get in to properties through broken drains and gaps in and around pipes. Once they are into the foundations they can then run through the entire property by scurrying through the pipe network.

'Once rats get into a property it can be very difficult to get them out.

'The only sure way to prevent a rat infestation is to not let them get into a property in the first place.'

Joy as Tessy is allowed back into the country

A valued worker at Cooriedoon Care Home in Whiting Bay has just returned to the island after being stranded in India for more than a year.

Senior care officer Tessy Jose joined the staff in April 2006 on a student placement. Manager Sandra Butler said: 'We fought for more than two years to get a full work permit for Tessy. Kenneth Gibson

MSP and Katy Clark MP helped in our battle with the authorities. Two weeks after receiving it last July she went home to Kerala for a holiday but couldn't get back into the country. The UK Border Agency doubted whether she was a nurse and the Home Office said she had overstayed her welcome.'

Sandra explained that some

unscrupulous care homes bring qualified staff over from India then employ them as low paid cleaners. Cooriedoon was apparently wrongly tarred with the same brush.

'Tessy was finally allowed to come back to Britain. She's a special nurse and it was such an injustice. We had a party when she got back last week,' said Sandra.

Cooriedoon has a staff of 28 and has employed nurses from abroad for more than six years. They currently have seven from India, two from Hungary, two from Lithuania and one from the Phillipines.

'We took on our first Indian nurse in July 2003 and have never looked back,' said Sandra. 'We can't get Arran people to take these jobs.'

Arran's talent competitions cancelled

Two Arran talent competitions have been called off this week.

Three weeks ago Whiting Bay Hall committee announced their plans for 'Arran's Got Talent' and last week Auchrannie unveiled its own talent competition called the 'A' factor. Now both organi-

sations have postponed the competitions.

The 'Arran's Got Talent' competition has previously been held successfully in Whiting Bay in aid of hall funds.

Andrew McCallum, Whiting Bay Hall committee member, wrote in a letter to The Banner:

'Further to the Auchrannie's advertisement for their 'A' factor contest in last week's edition of the paper I would like, on behalf of Whiting Bay Hall Committee, to inform everyone who has already applied to take part in our own 'Arran's Got Talent' event that we have decided to postpone until the New Year.

'It would seem counterproductive to run two identical competitions side by side.' Now Auchrannie has an-

nounced that they have cancelled their event too. Richard Small, general manager of the Auchrannie Resort, said: 'I would like to apologise to Whiting Bay Hall Committee as myself and our staff had no idea they were running an 'Arran's Got Talent' charity event.

'Due to this, Auchrannie has decided to cancel their 'A' factor talent competition and wish Whiting Bay Hall committee every success.'

Christmas exhibition for Fairtrade Arran

Fairtrade Arran will be holding a special event in Brodick Hall on Friday November 6.

The island achieved Fairtrade status last year and there are now over 60 outlets and users of Fairtrade products ranging from North Ayrshire Council to Kilmory School and the Ormidale Hotel.

This event will be a cheese and Fairtrade wine and chocolate reception and display of produce available on Arran. Highlight of the evening will be a 78-minute film called 'Black Gold' giving an insight into the world coffee market and the difficulties faced by small producers trying to earn a living from one of the world's most popular commodities.

The Fairtrade system seeks to ensure fairer terms for farmers and workers in developing countries. Local organiser Graham Tinto said: 'Well-known multi-national companies are still exploiting small producers who have difficulty accessing markets and getting a fair price.'

Struggle

The film tells the story of Tadesse Meskela and his struggle to keep his co-operative of 74,000 Ethiopian coffee farmers from western exploitation. Black Gold exposes the truth behind each cappuccino and demands each and every one of us to wake up and smell the coffee. It is described as 'a moving but scandalous story,

Black Gold has extraordinary power'.

Graham Tinto explained: 'Tadesse is seen trying to compete with the big boys to have credibility. The idea of this event is to get Arran folk thinking of Christmas and gift ideas. By getting Fairtrade products you can experience a feelgood factor and spread a little benefit at the same time. 'Local companies Arran Asia, Island Treasure, Burnside Gallery, Arran Active and the Pillar Box are participating in the event which is being jointly organised by Co-operative Community and Fairtrade Arran.'

Co-operative Fairtrade coffee was the first big own

brand to become 100 percent Fairtrade. The Starbucks chain of coffee shops is one of the largest outlets for Fairtrade coffee.

Graham added: 'At the time of a credit crunch we all think that life is hard, but it is the poorest that are hit hardest and the Columbian and Ethiopian farmers are suffering.'

'In any case all contractors or surveyors working for us must have photographic ID, a letter of authorisation and a telephone contact number so that any concerned householder can check their credentials.'

'In addition householders will have received a letter from the council in advance of any visit telling them what we are going to do.'

The wool that has been used has been treated with an ultraviolet dye which, when combined with a specific type of lighting, allows it to glow in the dark.

Marion Davidson, chairman of the Scottish Women's Rural Institutes said: 'We were initially 'stumped' when our 'branches' were approached to knit-one-purl-one for the trees of Scotland. But we soon twigged that this was the perfect challenge for our nimble-fingered knitters and more than 70 SWRI members from Shetland to the borders cast on for the campaign.'

The Elm has already become a cheery site to those visiting the capital with the Edinburgh Bus Company already mentioning it to visitors on their regular city tours.

Richard's challenge is to cycle the 700 kilometres from Kolkata to Kalimpong, the base of Dr Grahams Homes, in less than a week.


As part of his fundraising he has organised a charity dinner at Brambles Seafood and Grill restaurant on Friday 6 November.

Island swine flu threat needs to be managed

The Scottish government has finally begun to tackle the swine flu pandemic that is sweeping the country by announcing its vaccination plans.

Wednesday marked the start of the swine flu immunisation programme with priority groups like pregnant women; those with chronic illnesses and NHS staff all being jabbed first.

The aim is to vaccinate 1.3 million people by Christmas – not a hugely ambitious target considering the population of Scotland.

So far Arran has escaped the disturbance of swine flu as no cases have been reported on the island.

However, Arran is a close-knit rural community and if the swine flu epidemic does reach the island, a huge number of islanders could be at risk.

With any contagious disease that is likely to cause dangerous infection, if there is a method of controlling it then it should be delivered. Despite the size of the island and the relatively small population of Arran, the residents live in pretty close proximity to each other. There are also various places that large numbers of people will visit in one day – the Co-op is the obvious example, as well as schools, the ferry terminal and offices.

Once on the island, swine flu, which is highly contagious, would no doubt spread rapidly among our ageing population.

The whole island could come to a standstill if staff in offices, schools, shops and businesses were all struck down with flu-like symptoms at the same time. This may seem unlikely but it could happen. Therefore it is crucial that the vaccination should be offered to as many people on the island as possible.

All those regarded as 'high-risk' should make sure that they go to the doctor and get the vaccine. Last week, figures showed that 64 people were admitted to hospital in Scotland with swine flu complications – the highest weekly total seen during this pandemic.

Vaccine supplies have been distributed around Scotland, with at-risk hospital patients and staff getting the first ones.

The Scottish government has said that 'limited' supplies of the vaccine are being spread across all regions but the number of doses will increase in the coming weeks.

Supplies will first be sent to GPs so that jabs can be given to other priority groups, including pregnant women.

The first people to receive the swine flu inoculation will be people aged six months to 65 years with chronic conditions like heart or lung disease. Everyone who comes into contact with people with compromised immune systems will be vaccinated, as well as people over 65 with health conditions.

Concerns have been expressed about the side effects for the swine flu jab as in some cases they can be similar to those of seasonal influenza vaccines and can include local reactions at the injection site, such as soreness, swelling and redness. Fever, headache, muscle and joint aches can also occur.

However, the British government has still ordered enough vaccines to cover the entire population of the country.

Infuriating broadband service

Sir,
I'd like to add my comments regarding the article

about broadband provision in last week's *Banner*.

I'm one of the fortunate inhabitants of Slidderly who has a broadband service, but in Slidderly we receive 0.5Mbps service – yes, 1/2 a meg!

As BT is the only provider of broadband in Slidderly, not only am I (and all the others on this exchange) receiving a service giving only a fraction of the speed available elsewhere on the island, never mind the rest of the country, we are also paying an exorbitant fee for it.

Having just checked my last bill, I'm paying £40.82 +VAT for my broadband (three months in advance, and this is only for broadband provision and doesn't include any calls, line rental etc.), which at over £15 per month really is adding insult to injury.

When providers such as Virgin can provide faster services in other areas of the island from around £5 per month upwards, it's infuriating to be paying this much for what is not even a second rate service.

It is admittedly better than the £24.99 I was paying per month five years ago when the service was introduced in Slidderly, but is still a lot of money, and it's exasperating that there is no alternative provider here

or in any of the other smaller villages.

I know of people in this area who are desperate to receive broadband but due to the fact that the exchange has no available space, are unable to get it and appear to have no prospect of being able to in the near future.

This is of course also an area where we have no mobile phone reception, so other than dial-up, there is no alternative option for these people.

Like the MPs mentioned in your article, Kenneth Gibson MSP has been working hard to try and get this situation changed, and hopefully something will come of this joint pressure on BT to update the exchanges.

On another tack entirely, I'd just like to add my agreement to Amanda Hunter's letter regarding new housing provision.

I'm not sure why Ian Ferguson thinks that because people are either hard up/have young children/are elderly, that means they want to live on estates close to villages.

I'm now officially 'elderly' but I can't think of anything worse than being forced to live on a housing estate – even one on Arran – because that's the only available option.

Quality of life and having a choice is what matters to many of us, and hopefully HIFAR is going to help to provide that for those of us who don't want to be herded up into estates.

One size most certainly does not fit all.

Lardner tackles islander's concerns at Westminster

While visiting Arran to report back to local members on his visit to the capital, Mr Lardner confirmed that an incoming Conservative government would undergo a full strategic defence review to establish urgent priorities for troops currently in action overseas and to plan for the UK's long-term defence requirements and strategic priorities.

Preservation group keeps Corriecravie siren ringing

An old Arran fire engine has been handed over to the Strathclyde Fire and Rescue Preservation Group.

The purpose built Volkswagen LT50 turbo diesel appliance was taken into service at Corriecravie in May 1994 at a

cost of £40,000 and replaced the old Ford Cortina P100 pick-up. It was the first of its kind on the island and a new fire station was built at Corriecravie to house the vehicle.

Leader Angus Adamson and his team of firefighters had

a vehicle with a 150 gallon water tank and breathing apparatus for the first time.

Jim Miller, a retired fire fighter from Paisley, took the VW appliance along to the Lochgilphead Fire Station open day. He said: 'It was a one-off VW conversion, very unique.'

When the appliance was taken out of service on Arran it was presented to the preservation group which has an impressive collection of machines telling the history of fire fighting from the days of horse drawn steam engines and manual pumps to the present day.



Finlay Murchie's birthday . . .

A CD of traditional music from and inspired by Arran is being recorded in a project directed by Gillian Frame and will feature some of Scotland's best musicians.

Gillian was brought up and educated on Arran and was introduced to traditional Scots and Irish music from an early

age by her musically gifted parents Iain and Maggie.

The recording is the culmination of two years of research into Arran's traditional music, which has uncovered some fascinating material and great music.

Probably the most interesting are some old Gaelic

songs thought to have been lost. The CD's 13 tracks will also include a couple of Scots songs and instrumental music, reflecting the islands rich and diverse musical heritage.

Nearly all the material is previously unrecorded.

One of the songs featured on the album is *Finlay Murchie's Birthday*.

Connection

Local musician Alistair Paul told *The Banner* the story behind the song: '*Finlay Murchie's Birthday* was one of a handful of tunes with an Arran connection written by the renowned piper, Duncan Johnstone.

'Duncan was a frequent visitor to the island in the 1970s when he was friendly with the Andersons of 'The Glen' in Lochranza.

'His best known Arran tune is *Mrs Mary Anderson of Lochranza* which is still heard

occasionally played by his pipe bands.' Alistair Paul said that Finlay Murchie was one of the Arran characters Duncan met at the Anderson's and among his exploits he learnt of Finlay's adventures on the ill fated Hudson Bay Company ship 'The Baychimo' when it became ice bound off the coast of Alaska in 1931.

Along with 16 other crew-members he spent most of the winter on the pack ice in a wooden shelter.

After a particularly bad storm the crew woke up to find they and the ship had parted company.

The ship continued to drift around the Arctic, locked in ice, for almost 40 years and became known as the 'Arctic Ghost Ship'.

Duncan Johnstone used these tales to write the magnificent song *Finlay Murchie's Birthday*.

Ruth stopped at milestone 46 to watch the antics of four rutting stags and about 30 red deer across the hillside.

Husband Alan provided back-up in the car, with spare socks, drinks and food and went beyond the call of duty to check Arran's 57 milestones, measuring and tak-

ing notes for The Milestone Society of Great Britain's database, which now includes records of more than 2,000 stones.

The society is urging local councils to fulfil their statutory obligations to maintain milestones now that the European parliament has agreed to allow Great Britain to retain the use of miles instead of converting to metric measurement.

'He found them all in good order,' said Ruth. 'Apart from milestone 14 which had been decapitated - this will be a job for the future.'
