# Goodbye to the Breadalbane

# Hotel makes way for flats as its contents sell for £5,000

The entire contents of the Breadalbane Hotel in Kildonan were sold at auction for £5000 last Thursday as the owner prepares to redevelop the land.

Around 200 locals attended an auction at the hotel looking to buy a souvenir.

Everything inside the building was for sale including the brass reception bell, all internal doors, bar stools and an antique carved dresser.

Speaking exclusively to The Arran Banner, owner Derek Callaghan explained why he had decided to close the hotel.

He said: 'A five bedroom hotel just isn't feasible any more. We decided that in this village there isn't enough trade to compete with another bigger hotel. Yvonne, the previous owner, asked us to honour the bookings that she already had

in place. We have done that and now it is time to move on.' Since Mr Callaghan bought the Breadalbane in April this year, there has been much discussion about the hotel's future. The owner confirmed that the site would be used to build flats. Plans will be submitted for the redevelopment within the next few weeks,' Mr Callaghan said, 'These will include flats, some of which will be sold on but I will hold on to a number of them for rental purposes.'

The Banner spoke to former owners of the Breadalbane Hotel, Yvonne O'Reagan and John McBride. John said: 'We have not heard what the new owners are planning. When you sell something you can't tell the buyer what to do with it. If they are going to knock it down and build houses it would be a sad day. The bedrooms were completely refurbished only seven years ago and the sun lounge and decking is just a couple of years old. I'm very sad to hear that's what might become of the old place.'

The property extends to the field in front of the hotel and John reckons that a developer could easily build eight houses with an access road and good-sized gardens. The Kildonan Keys development next door to the Breadalbane still has three of the 12 houses unsold.

Rod and Anne Acuna, owners of the only other hotel in the village, the Kildonan Hotel, were at the sale on Thursday. They said: 'Breadalbane closing is not really good news for us. How do you suddenly increase the size of your kitchens, take on new staff and find accommodation for

them?' Many locals left the auction with a bargain purchase. A whole bathroom suite including toilet, shower, sink and tiles sold for just £2.

The low prices were due to the fact that the purchaser had to remove all their goods from the premises by noon the next day. The most expensive item was a Foster Walk-In Chill bought for £560 by another island hotel.

A former Breadalbane regular bought the bar and the Breadalbane Hotel sign for £20.

Mr Callaghan was asked what had happened to the pool table, which was listed in the itinerary. Apparently it was only leased but he said: 'The auctioneers said to put it in the schedule. It always puts another 50 customers on the attendance.

By 11am on the Friday morning the hotel was just a shell with even the carpets removed.

# Islanders reply to Craigforth Report

The response from islanders to the Craigforth Report on the island's housing needs has given Arran Community Council plenty of food for thought.

The community council produced a 16-point summary of the report, commissioned by North Ayrshire Council (NAC), which aims to investigate and document Arran's housing needs.

While most people agree with the findings of the report, island responses have highlighted the need for affordable housing for the old and the young, especially.

One response said: 'As well as considering giving priority to single people and couples employed on the island, this should be extended to people applying for accommodation in the sheltered housing complex.

'At present it seems that people from London, Glasgow etc are considered before local people.'

Another response reads: 'Our young people (and others!) are not looking for 'a view of the sea' which mainland second homers are seeking. These young people are seeking a house and a home. They would be happy to see inland Clachans reopened.'

Other issues raised included the building of houses on unused land and that NAC should explore the possibility of landowners releasing land for housing.

There was also a call for home owners, who rent out back cottages, to let to islanders primarily, rather than holiday makers and seasonal visitors.

'The rent would be set at an affordable level with the remainder of the usual market rate rented income made up by Communities

# Busy week for Lamlash Lifeboat crew

Lamlash Lifeboat was called to an injured walker in the north of the island at 1pm on

Jo Hastings' walking group, the J Walkers, were halfway through their third walk, this time around the Cock of Arran, when Steve Williams slipped and broke his ankle.

Jo and her companions assessed the situation, and decided that without assistance they could not get Steve back to a position where he could receive medical attention. They took the decision to call the Coastguard, and the lifeboat was dispatched immediately to the grid reference that Jo had supplied.

Allan Little from Lamlash Lifeboat Station said: 'We got the call at 1.38pm and upon our arrival two crew members went ashore and quickly strapped Steve's ankle. Another crewmember went ashore and placed him, and the remainder of the party, plus his dog (Vicky), in the boat, and took them to Lochranza.

'At Lochranza Steve was immediately transferred to the waiting ambulance, and taken to the hospital in Lamlash were his ankle was x-raved and placed in a plaster cast.'

The J Walkers were on hand to take Steve, and Vicky back to his home, where he will recover, and get fit and ready to walk again in a few weeks



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

A plastic pellet from a toy gun struck Andrew McGowan in the mouth shattering part of his tooth while holidaying on Arran in August of this year.

His father, Alistair McGowan, said: 'Since the incident here on Arran I have seen these guns being sold in shops all over Glasgow. These are not toys, they can do serious damage to anyone hit by a pellet. I want to see them taken off the shelves.'

The McGowan family are from Clarkston in Glasgow and come to Arran regularly on holiday.

Mr McGowan said: 'These guns are weapons. The pellet completely destroyed his tooth exposing the root. That shows just how powerful these weapons are.

'Andrew was very lucky that he was only struck in the mouth and not the eye. Thankfully we can fix teeth but you can't fix eyes.'

Andrew has had to have extensive reconstruction on his front tooth.

He explained: 'I had to have a veneer fitted in the end. It took four weeks to repair and I had to take a lot of time off school.'

'Every shop that you go into sells these guns,' off the shelves everywhere.'

The father of a nine-year-old boy who lost part Mr McGowan said, 'I asked one shopkeeper to dangerous they can be. He said he would remove them from his shop but he is still selling them. The gun is on sale — complete with ball bearings and goggles — for £14.99 from behind the counter of the Para Para convenience store in Eaglesham Road, Clarkston.

'It has a note on the packaging saying it is 'the best gun for over 18s'. Staff say they check the ID of anyone trying to buy one. The toy gun also comes with a warning: 'Do not shoot at any human or animal.'

But Alistair fears the plastic guns could easily fall into the hands of younger people.

Shezy Majid at Para Para said he understood what Mr McGowan was saying but would continue to sell the toy guns.

Mr Majid said: 'We understand, but it's not illegal for us to sell them. There are a lot of shops in Glasgow that sell them. I do not see why he is specifically picking on us about it. There are no government restrictions. If the government changes the law we would take them off the shelves.'

Mr McGowan added: 'Andrew was very lucky but another child may not be so fortunate. I won't stop protesting about the guns until they are taken

# Anger over £2,000 tool theft

The difficulty of contacting police on Arran was highlighted at a meeting of the island's community council on Tuesday.

Member Neil Arthur was not alone in his criticism of Strathclyde Police's call centre system.

Mr Arthur, who owns Broombrae Grounds and Gardens Ltd, said: 'I had the unfortunate case a week ago when I had £2,000 worth of tools stolen from my yard.

'I reported the theft at 10am with Ayr Police and asked for a constable to contact me but it soon became apparent to me who had stolen the tools. I phoned Lamlash Police Station

but was diverted to Ayr and by 8pm no-one had phoned me. I asked to speak to a high-ranking officer and phoned a sergeant in Saltcoats but the line went dead. I was put through to a sergeant in Ayr and that's when I lost the plot.'

Mr Arthur phoned Ayr Police Station again and spoke to an inspector who apologised and the next morning a local police officer came to see Mr Arthur. But Mr Arthur feels this was too late.

He said: 'Unfortunately, when word got around that the police were involved, the tools were returned and left at the end of my road. The delay is very

disappointing.' Community council chairman Campbell Laing said: 'It's the process that is wrong. Having 30 years' experience in the police I find it unbelievable how calls are dealt with now.'

Arran police constable Michael Clinton, who was in attendance with special constable Andrew Perrie, told the meeting: 'There is a call handling unit to take calls where police officers don't have to attend immediately.

'This frees up the police resources on the street.

'The problem we have in Lamlash is the office is not always manned.'

# Survival of the largest?

# HOWARD DRIVER looks at the trend of business closures on the island

The auction sale at the Breadalbane Hotel last Thursday was the latest sign of a significant trend in the loss of retail provision on Arran.

Breadalbane Hotel in Kildonan is now closed and all the signs are that it will be demolished to make way for a housing development.

Whilst there is an acknowledged lack of affordable housing, particularly for young resident workers, there has been much house building on the island and the population is increasing. At the same time, the tourism business has become the only growth area in the economy.

There are more people living here and more people coming here on holiday, but less places for them to be served.

In the past 20 years at least 13 licensed bars have closed on Arran.

Many smaller food stores have also gone the same way. From Greatorex Stores in Whiting Bay to Ferry Rock Stores in Corrie and from Mother Goose to Lochranza Shop, there are now fewer places to buy groceries or drink.

Among the former licensed bars now closed are the Douglas Hotel, The Islander, the Arran Hotel, the Heathfield Hotel, the Anchor Hotel, Lamlash Hotel, The Moorings, Kiscadale Hotel, Whiting Bay Hotel, Nags Bar, the Rock Hotel, Greannan Hotel and Breadalbane.

The PHT in Lamlash has been shut for months and Lagg public bar has also closed.


Other restaurants no longer in operation are The Pantry in Whiting Bay, Pirate's Cove, Kestrel Indian restaurant, Carraig Mhor in Lamlash, Castlekirk at Lochranza, tearooms at Sandbraes, Lochranza pier and Glenscorrodale, Lilybank Restaurant, Lamlash, Butt Lodge, Lochranza and chip shops in Lamlash and at Brodick Bazaar.

Russell Duncan ran Duncan's Bar successfully at the Kingsley Hotel for many years and was an active member of the Arran Licensed Trade Association. He said: 'It's a huge trend but it's maybe down to market forces. The cost of running a licensed premise has become so high and the successful ones get more income from food than drink.

'There are more rules and regulations too. I could count up to 13 or 14 different officials who could come in at any time and demand that you meet certain regulations. The trade solely on drink has become virtually zero.'

Russell pointed out that this trend was not confined to Arran but in a confined area it is much more noticeable.

It may be a case of survival of the largest or the fittest, but in future all the new householders on Arran may have to drive a little further for their pint of milk or pint of beer.





# Alcohol forum praised by nurse director

Julia Quickfall, nurse director of Queens Nursing Institute Scotland (QNIS) visited Arran last week to see the important work that has been carried out by the Arran Alcohol Forum.

One of QNIS's aims is to finance local initiatives, such as the Arran Alcohol Forum, which fill gaps in the service provision.

Mrs Quickfall said: 'It is important for projects like the forum to receive funding from institutes like us.

'They are providing a vital service on the island that must be recognized.

'Sometimes people forget that Arran is not exempt from problems like underage drinking. The forum has very successfully tacked these problems and highlighted the consequences to their parents.'

### Award

In November 2006 the group won a 'Partnership in Practice' award from the QNIS.

The award was used to further their work on Arran with the production of a 'sleepover information kit', which were distributed to all primary sevens and High School pupils.

The forum was aware of large numbers of pupils at Arran High School having sleepovers with friends during the week.

These were affecting school

attendance, behaviour, attainment and having the necessary equipment for the school day like PE kits.

Isobel MacDonald, public health nurse on Arran said: 'We produced two leaflets with support from the Scottish Co-op Community Group aimed at parents titled 'Do you know where your children are tonight?' and one for young people 'Go on take a drink!' for all teenagers.'

Arran Alcohol Forum was set up in June 2001 to identify if there was a problem of alcohol abuse with young people and

what they could do about it.

Mrs MacDonald added: 'The main issues we had to tackle were the culture of acceptance of heavy drinking on the island by young people, binge drinking, parents unaware of what their children were doing and the lack of youth facilities on the island.'

### Changes

Since 2001 a number of major changes have taken place.

In some of the village halls a system of stamps is being utilised whereby over 18s have black stamps on their hands and are allowed within the r oron

By 2004 the local manager of Stagecoach Buses had joined the forum and was able to provide transport for alcohol free functions.

There has also been a significant increase in the number of underage children caught with alcohol; this has resulted in prosecution of adults buying alcohol for youngsters.

Many of the licensed premises have been visited by the police and have been warned about the risk of losing their license if young people under the age of 18 are being served alcohol.

### ARRAN'S WEEKLY PAPER Saturday 3rd November, 2007

For a long time service on Arran has been excellent. It has that personal factor which makes it a little more agreeable and allows many people to feel a bit special. But there must have been room for improvement because service in all sorts of areas is getting better and better. It must be, since we have so many more people serving us today.

Not long ago when one bought a ticket at the pier there were two gentlemen in a tiny office and precious little room for customers. Now there are about four or five people in a bright new office and further offices behind with more exalted people, beavering away to serve us.

In my work I would visit schools and would find in each classroom a teacher and a class of pupils who were invariably very welcoming. Yet, as the years rolled on I would find not one adult, but two, or sometimes three, in each classroom of pupils, all as welcoming as before.

Occasionally one used to go to the doctor. You'd sit in the waiting room and look around making a mental calculation about who was ahead of you. As the doctor came out and and called next please, you awaited your turn and in you went. There was no sign of anybody else present, except the other patients. Today there are several others in offices to arrange appointments, hand out prescriptions and so on.

My work would also take me to the council offices and there I would chat with the one lady in the office before asking about more serious matters. Now there are many, about four I guess although some are hidden around the corner, and all sit in front of banks of computers.

Likewise at the high school. One would pop in and stick one's head around the head teacher's door. His secretary would often bring us a cup of tea and we could have a pleasant chat. No longer, for even gaining access into schools is a complex matter with spy windows and locked doors and quite possibly special codes. Once inside, the office, like the council offices, there are banks of computers and many ladies beavering away at them. All are helpful of course but also watchful and unlikely to allow one to progress any further without furnishing proof of being there on serious business.

I have little knowledge of the hospital but a friend called recently and told us of a visit when there were so many helpful people although none seemed to know what to do with her. Apparently as she waited a series of different people popped their heads round the door of the waiting room and said they would bring her a form to fill in but it was more than an hour before one of them actually remembered to do so.

Even the ferry service improves. When the *Caledonian Isles* entered service she had a crew of around 24. Now the ship's complement is around 34. I believe that this increase is in large part due to regulations which do not permit anybody to exceed a stated number of working hours, thus making ferry travel safer and more convenient for all of us. However one result, as well as giving us a much better service, is that there is insufficient accommodation on board for all the extra staff, so some have to find bed and breakfast in Ardrossan and then rise early and get back on board before the vessel sails.

There is clearly no doubt about it that in virtually every area of our daily lives, we have more people serving us. And these improvements in long standing services take no account of all the new areas which have been created for people to serve us. It must therefore follow that we are getting better and better service on Arran. Or are we?

## New School, New Rules?

Information has been leaked to High School News which suggests that the transition into the new school building could herald a new era in the way the school is run. As previously reported, the new school looks set to see a continuation of the revived house system,

which has already been started in preparation for the changeover, and a stricter attitude towards uniform.

However, recently, rumours have abounded in the school that the new building may also see a new set of rules enforced. The minutes of a top secret house council meeting, leaked to High School News, confirms that the 'new rules' have already been subjected to discussion and consultation amongst staff and students.

Some of the rules that have been posed include measures such as a ban on chewing gum, which it is hoped will help preserve the pristine condition of the school. However, other rules which have been discussed are far more controversial, involving an absolute ban on mobile phones, personal music players and carbonated drinks within the school. The 'new rules' could be met with some opposition from students who see them as infringing on their personal rights.

Whilst it is clear that the ban on 'fizzy drinks' comes as part of a wider drive towards healthy living, the ban on personal music players has been seen by some as a 'draconian' and unnecessary measure. One senior student said: 'Music can be beneficial to creating a structured learning environment. Since when has listening to Tchaikovsky diminished from my overall learning experience? It's a scientific fact that listening to the Arctic Monkeys can increase concentration levels!'

The proposed ban on mobile phones is said to be to counter the increased use of mobiles in class, particularly the 'bluetooth' facility, which allows instant-messaging style communication, and can be extremely disruptive in class. On the other hand, there is also sometimes a need for students to have their mobiles in school, and it would be a shame if others' misuse of their phones compromised the situation for those who do need them.

Another student commented: 'The present moves towards a stricter uniform, combined with anticipated bans on fizzy drinks, mp3 players, chewing gum and phones would all seem to indicate that the arrival of the new school will bring a much stricter system. Whether this is a good thing, I'm undecided.'

The question still hangs over whether the 'new rules' are necessary, particularly the controversial music player ban, and in fact, whether they will be imposed at all.

# European decisions are closer to home

# MEP Elspeth Attwooll reports on the latest goings on in Brussels

People often believe that what we do in Brussels is somehow remote from life in Scotland.

Yet, when I think that, in the course of just one week in October, we had people out to see us from Shetland Islands Council, Scottish Borders Enterprise, the Europa Institute at Edinburgh University and Inclusion Scotland, all with issues directly affecting their activities here at home, I realise just how far this is from the truth.

For example, representatives

of Inclusion Scotland were there for a rally, along with disabled people from all over Europe, to present a petition with over a million signatures, for new laws to remove the barriers that face them.

It was a really vibrant occasion and I made there, too, some new acquaintances from the Cheshire Homes in Scotland as well as meeting up with a very longstanding one from Guide Dogs for the Blind.

The one sad thing about it all was that by far the lowest percentage of signatures on the petition had come from the UK.

Then, too, there are all the things we have been doing something about in the Strasbourg week just past.

These included postioides

These included pesticides, CO2 emissions from cars, feed and food-stuff prices, energy sources and cluster bombs.

Also, in the course of the month, I have been involved in more discussions on the way forward to prevent the discarding of fish at sea, a conference on aquaculture and meetings with people from the wood panel industry (concerns that too much use of wood as a bio-fuel will leave it in too short supply for their needs) and the NFU.

There has been less time available for travel around Scotland than I would have liked, although they have taken me from a primary school in Penicuik to the launch of an essay competition in Aberdeen.

A constituency week is in the offing, though, with time scheduled in Glasgow, Stirling, Perth and Inverness. The Stirling visit includes a lecture on the new Reform Treaty (replacing the Constitution that never was) and I still have to write it. So, I am much relieved that the report I have been doing on fisheries management is now safely off to the translators.

# Obituary

# Duncan McArthur (1925-2007)

It was with great sadness on Monday, October 15, that we learned of the death of Duncan McArthur.

Duncan was a remarkable man. The son of Jessie Ross and Malcolm McArthur, born in Corrie on the Isle of Arran on March 9, 1925, he was educated in Corrie School, worked with his father at the sawmill and then went to war.

He was at sea initially and during that time he endured being torpedoed twice and shipwrecked once.

His boat went down off Holland and after seven days in an open boat he arrived in Amalaand where the Dutch Resistance then harboured him in a clay pit for seven weeks.

He was then handed on from safe house to safe house and eventually made his way into Spain where he was picked up and taken to the safety of Gibraltar. Thus began a strong association with the Dutch, from whom he received several awards and commendations in later years. He received the honour of Ritter of the Grand East of the Netherlands, the House of Orange, In Dutch circles this is considered as a knighthood.

Queen Beatrix awarded him the Dutch Peace Medal in November 2004, and he was also made freeman of the cities of Middelburg and Arnemuiden.

Duncan then joined the Royal Scots Fusiliers and reached the rank of sergeant major. He served in many places including Italy and the Western Front. He was wounded three times during the war and lived the rest of his life with shrapnel in his body.

Duncan was among the first soldiers that entered Belsen Prison Camp and from what he saw there he developed a deep affinity and association with people of the Jewish faith, an association that was to last the rest of his life.

Duncan was awarded three medals during his time in the services – the Conspicuous Gallantry Medal, the Distinguished Service Cross and the Military Medal.

After his military service, Duncan returned to Arran and started a fishmonger and greengrocer's business. He married Ena in 1951, and a few years later David and Karen were born. Ena and Duncan lived in Greystones in Brodick, a house he built himself.

In 1969, the family moved to Clarkston, where he continued in business with a post office until his retirement 20 years later. Duncan was passionate about everything he became involved

in crook-making, model boats and ponies from which he bred many champions.

Duncan took great pleasure from Andrew and Karen's children, Kirsten and Sarah, and David and Joyce's children, Grant and Gill. He adored being a grandfather and was never happier than when his family were around him. DM

# Link to Argyll mainland changes for winter

Arran lost its regular link to the Argyll mainland last Sunday.

For the next five months the only ferry connection from Lochranza to Kintyre will be once a day. The Caledonian MacBrayne (CalMac) vessel *MV Loch Tarbert* left Lochranza on Sunday afternoon and is not scheduled to return to regular crossings of the Kilbrannan Sound until 20 March 2008.

As in recent years the winter service to and from Lochranza will be undertaken by *MV Isle of Cumbrae*, which normally plies between Tarbert and Portavadie 10 times a day. For the winter months she will divert from her usual run to depart from Tarbert at 12.15pm for the one-and-a-half hour sail to Lochranza, arriving at 1.40 pm and leaving again five minutes later.

This service is only available by making passenger and vehicle reservations in advance with the CalMac office at Kennacraig, telephone number 01880 730253.

Members of the regular Arran

crew will be deployed elsewhere on the ferry network for the winter. Purser John van Bogerijen of Kildonan said: 'It's interesting seeing other places but I prefer to get home every night.' Skipper Gavin Crawford is using the winter period to go to college through CalMac and hopefully gain further nautical qualifications. Seaman Robert Ferguson will be taking up duties with CalMac based in Brodick. Andrew McNiven of Shiskine said that he quite enjoys the opportunity to work on other vessels in the fleet.

People using the winter service to Tarbert are recommended to take a good book and something to drink because facilities on the vessel are limited.



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


