Family's grief as road death accused walks free

The grieving family of a 2008. He has since died of cyclist who died on Arran natural causes. last August spoke of their disappointment after the driver charged with causing her death walked free from court.

Elspeth Kelman, 59, was struck by a van driven by Nick Underdown, 28, who was cleared on a not proven verdict of causing death by careless driving.

Mrs Kelman, a widow, had been on a cycling trip around the island in memory of her late husband, Ronald.

Two of her sons were on the trip with her. The college lecturer's family condemned the verdict and insisted the tragedy could have been avoided.

Frances Downie, Mrs Kelman's sister, said: 'The shocking and violent nature of her death caused horror, anger and agitation.

'We were very disappointed with the jury's verdict and feel that Elspeth's death was a tragedy which could have been avoided.'

Mrs Kelman, a mother-ofthree from Glasgow, was on an annual cycle ride to honour her husband Ronald, who died from cancer in 1994.

Fellow members of the congregation at Wellington Church in the city's West End were with her on the ride.

The church's retired minister,

Mr Underdown had just rounded a bend when his Seat Inca ploughed into the cyclists before plunging down an embankment. Mrs Kelman was pronounced dead at the scene.

The road - part of the Sustrans national cycle network - was slightly damp but light and weather conditions were good, Kilmarnock Sheriff Court heard.

Mr Underdown of Corrie, a former reporter for the Arran Voice newspaper, was offduty at the time. He denied the charge.

PC Euan Thomson, a crash investigator, said the van had mounted the verge then spun onto the opposite carriageway before hitting the cyclists.

The jury later returned a majority verdict of not proven and Mr Underdown was acquitted.

The case was the first in Scotland where a driver stood trial under recent legislation of causing death by careless driving.

Mrs Downie said the loss of her sister should not be in vain and urged motorists to drive more carefully.

She added: 'The consequences of a road death for the bereaved and we believe for the driver are devastating, widespread and long lasting.

Kirsty told The Banner that after enjoying lunch at the Cruise Bar the family were getting ready to leave when they realised Daisy was not there.

'She had clearly decided to get a headstart,' said Kirsty. 'She must have grabbed her shoes and headed straight out the door.

Panic

'After searching inside we realised that she must have escaped and panic set in.'

Kirsty asked various passers by if they had seen her child and a number said she had been wondering across the car park to the Auchrannie Country House Hotel.

'Her route must have taken her through the car park to the hotel and down the driveway and along the road because she was eventually found near the main road,' said Kirsty.

'If it had not been for the quick help given by members of staff and the public the outcome could have been very different and for that I will always be grateful.'

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

Fish farm go ahead

A salmon fish farm in the Kilbrannan Sound could save the village of Carradale from 'dying'.

The Kintyre village of Carradale sits directly opposite the Arran hamlet of Imachar.

For generations there have been close links between the northend of Arran and Carradale, the closest part of mainland Scotland to the island

Community councillor Shelagh Cameron spoke as a consultee at a public hearing last Friday and told the councillors and officials making the decision: 'We in Carradale have witnessed a slow economic decline over the last 15 years. We need to bring employment to the area to revitalise the village, we need jobs to let young people stay in the community. Our village is dying.'

The public hearing was called at a recent Planning, Protective Services and Licensing Committee meeting to allow local residents to have their say; planning officials recommended the application be granted.

Objectors had expressed concern at the effect on marine life and the major impact on the coastline and wild salmon stocks.

The development will create four full-time and two part-time jobs. As well as the 14-cages there will be food storage and a service barge installed on site, serviced at Carradale Harbour.

Last month's talk to the Arran Antiquarians Society was given by David Atchison, who stood in at very short notice for Ken Currie, who was unfortunately unwell.

David told the group of his experiences as a cognitive archaeologist-not one who digs holes but one who is especially interested in pre-history.

David described pre-history as 'everything that happened to humans before Greece and Rome'.

On Earth, life has developed over a period of roughly 400 million years.

We started as cells and very gradually developed into our present form with all the changes the result of 'mistakes' in reproduction.

Archaeologists wanted to know the connection between animals and man - the 'missing link'.

Split

About eight million years ago there was a split between monkeys and humans.

About five million years ago man began to walk upright and scavenge and by three million years ago he started making tools from stones.

Animals also divided into birds and fish but man developed slowly with at least 20 different types of animals before 'modern' homo-sapiens appeared.

It is thought these changes happened at times of climate change.




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Christmas is here already

Tricks are no treat


Sir, I was surprised to find your editorial referring to Hallowe'en as trick-or-treating.

October was mild. While the early part of the month had dry settled days, the latter part of the month was very wet and wild at times.

The September bird notes finished with a request for the last sighting of Swallows departing south and the first sighting of greylag geese arriving from the north.

The latest reports for summer visitors in October were: five juvenile swallows in Kilmory on the 8th and two wheatears in Kildonan on the 11th.

The first report of greylags was seven in Sliddery on the 17th and the first report from the Shiskine Valley was of 'teens' on the 27th.

In October migration continued. Other reports, as well as the greylag geese included: two brent geese briefly off Kildonan shore on 23 September; a grey plover on Blackwaterfoot shore on 6 October (first record since October 2007): 30 skylark on Cleats Shore on the 10th; a goldeneye at Loch na Leirg on the 12th; three rook in the Shiskine Valley on the 14th; and a great skua in Brodick Bay on the 15^{th} .

On the very wild 25th there was a huge movement of seabirds off Pladda including counts of 300 gannets per hour, 900 kittiwakes per hour and

3,000 guillemots per hour.

Also, from the 8th to 28th October there were groups of whooper swans passing through including five in Kilmory on the 8th, four in Blackwaterfoot on the 10th, 40 over Balnacoole on the 23rd, 20 over Sandbraes also on the 23rd and six over Shannochie on the 28th.

With the hedgerows heavy with haws and other berries. the wintering thrushes, the redwings and fieldfares, from the north have plenty to feed on.

There were widespread reports, with the largest mixed groups being two hundred in Lochranza on the 17th, 300 on Lamlash Golf Course on the 23rd, 300 on the Heights on the 26th and 200 in Shiskine on the 31st.

Other sightings included: a snow bunting on Beinn Bhreac on the 5th; 25 Canada geese in Brodick Bay also on the 5th; and a moorhen at Port-na-Lochan on the 6th (first Arran report this year).

Great spotted woodpeckers continue to spread with reports from Lamlash and Lochranza on the 10th and Catacol on the 23rd.

There were also two reports of merlin, one at Drumadoon on the 8th and one at Glenashdale burn mouth on the 25th. This small falcon will feature in a future 'Bird Notes'.

The untended herds of Eriskay ponies and Highland Island's first Indian cattle are multiplying and with nobody there an injured beast is simply left to die.

Three dead Highland cows have been reported this week alone in one small part of the island.

They may have fallen from steep cliffs.

When the island was owned by UFAW the warden, Howard Walker, would visit two or three times a week.

'Last time I was on the island Treasurer retires I saw three dead cows,' said Howard. 'Without someone checking them regularly the animals are dying from injuries and some are starving to death. Something must be done about it.

Mr Finlay Murchie of Lochranza died three weeks ago and left a little joke after his death by having accumulated a 'wake case' under his bed so mourners could celebrate his life rather joyfully.

Then on October 22 Mrs Ann Hutchison, Arran's oldest resident, died in Montrose House.

She would have been 103 at the end of this month.






