Hit hard!

Strong winds and heavy rain coupled with high tides have brought havoc to the island over the past week.

A large sycamore tree crashed through the roof of the Smithy suite at Kilmichael Country House Hotel on Sunday night. Owners Geoffrey Botterill and Antony Butterworth had been out for the evening and when they returned Geoffrey saw the branches protruding over the roof. There was nobody staying in the hotel at the time, but nearby self-catering cottages were occupied. On Monday local contractor Murray Boal lifted the tree off the building.

Joyce Adamson of Whiting Bay phoned the Banner on Wednesday morning to say that a tree had just fallen on her house.

She said: 'I was getting ready to take my dog Beau out for a walk when a heard a cracking noise then the tree hit the side of the house, right over the front door.' Joyce had a lucky escape as the tall eucalyptus in Brodick. had split in two and was resting on the roof. Workmen have since cleared it away.

On Tuesday he confirmed that recent rainfall on Arran has been exceptionally high. In the first week of November he recorded 148.6mm (six inches) compared to 3.3mm over the same week last year. Over the first three weeks of the month the rainfall has been double that of 2008.

Colin said: 'The wettest day in Brodick so far this year was Sunday October 25 with 71.7mm (three inches), while the wettest 2008 day saw just 39mm of rain.'

Police sergeant Bob MacKay said: 'Drivers seem to be coping surprisingly well with the conditions. Nowadays cars are better at handling floods;



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On Thursday golf course manager Keith Aitken said: 'It's a 3.5 metre high tide and there is nowhere for the water to go.

'Most of the course is flooded and all we can do is to stay inside and do equipment maintenance. A lot of other courses are closed as well.'

Order for closure of Middle Road

An order has been lodged by North Ayrshire Council to close Middle Road in Whiting Bay for a new housing development.

The Stopping Up order is open to consultation for 28 days after which time it will be confirmed unless there are any objections.

Details of the location and length of road to be closed can be inspected at the NAC local office in Lamlash.

The closure will involve installing bollards across the road just above the entrance to Heatherhill chalets. It is anticipated that these bollards will have a locking mechanism so that they can be removed for access by emergency ve-

This Stopping Up order is a condition of the granting of planning permission by NAC last June for a 10-house development in the field opposite Heatherhill chalets.

Condtions

Among the other conditions attached to this approval were that there should be a passing place on Middle Road west of the new site entrance and that construction traffic will only have access to the site from the Golf Course Road end of Middle Road.

The development of 10 fourbedroom houses was passed subject to the applicant, Quality Homes Scotland, agreeing to provide money to update play facilities in the area.

Objections to the proposal were lodged by nine residents at the time, mostly on the grounds of increased traffic and that the closure of Middle Road would raise safety questions of access by emergency vehicles.

Rainwater is coming through the ceiling of the entrance lobby, an area that has already been repaired four months ago after buckets were scattered around the lobby to collect water dripping from the roof.

Major work was carried out on the roof in August despite the building being less than two years old. At the time, Jim Leckie, head of educational services for North Ayrshire Council said: 'A decision has been taken to completely replace the main entrance roof and these works are underway.'

Wet patches

No new power station for Local MP welcomes

Hunterston

Last week the UK government announced details of sites around the country which would be suitable for 10 new nuclear power stations but this list did not include Hunterston.

Philip Lardner, Conservative Westminster candidate for North Ayrshire and Arran said: 'This is very disappointing news for the workers at Hunterston B, especially the younger staff because it will now be impossible to build a new station to take over from the B station if it closes in 2016 as currently planned. I met with the Shadow Energy Minister Charles Hendry a couple of weeks ago at Westminster and presented him with figures which highlight the importance of Hunterston to the local economy in North Ayrshire.

Mr Lardner defended the plant recently when stories came out about leaks of nuclear waste into the Clyde.

He said: 'The nuclear waste was actually simple waste water from the employee showers which is routinely flushed away with full permission. Hunterston has a first-rate safety record.'

The nearest proposed new nuclear power station to Arran will be at Braystones on the Solway Firth.

Deer tested for purity

Arran's red deer population has been the subject of a scientific DNA survey to establish its genetic purity.

The study is attempting to monitor the purity of red deer and establish whether they have been affected by hybridisation with non-native species over the last decade. Local estate managers in Arran, Rum, Jura, Islay and the Outer Hebrides have been collecting samples of tongues and ears from cull animals for DNA study.



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Weather has us panicking

We are at the mercy of the elements.

For all the sophisticated technology at our fingertips nowadays, the weather is the one thing we have least influence over and impacts most on our everyday lives.

That fact has been brought home forcefully this week as heavy and sustained rain together with strong winds and high tides have combined to create general disorder throughout the country.

Parts of Cumbria and South-West Scotland have been hardest hit and powerful images of the misery and chaos have been beaming into our homes via television. But having seen the images and feeling sympathy for those washed out of their homes, our thoughts soon return to our own circumstances.

It has been particularly wet and windy on Arran.

That quaint phrase 'adverse weather conditions' coined by Caledonian MacBrayne to describe ferry sailing disruptions was never more true than this week.

Official precipitation figures from the National Trust for Scotland at Brodick Castle reveal that November rainfall was double the normal amount. All that rain has to go somewhere.

A former North Ayrshire Council roads officer was fond of pointing out that every drop of rain that falls on Arran has to at some time find its way over or under the round-island road.

This goes some way to explaining why the roads have been awash this month. When that rain is combined with a high tide, there really is nowhere for the water to drain away. Strong winds contribute to ferry disruptions and structural damage. At least two Arran properties have suffered this week from trees falling on them.

When the ferry does not sail it creates a mood of panic in some people. The 4.40pm sailing from Brodick on Tuesday was mobbed by folk rushing to get off the island because of the bad weather forecast. With no sign of the ferry sailing by midday on Wednesday, there were soon signs of panic buying of sliced bread and rolls.

Lamlash shopkeeper Jimmy Gordon decided that even if the ferry did sail, it would be too late for people to come out and buy daily papers, so he cancelled them. With no ferry, there would be no mainland mail, but the posties still have to deliver local mail.

And of course, there are the lovely blue wheelie bins at the mercy of the wind. On Wednesday dozens of empty wheelie bins were rolling and rattling around roads all over the island, sometimes creating a hazard for traffic and pedestrians.

Being at the mercy of the elements and the disruption it causes can be enough to make some people decide that island life is not for them. But for the majority the uncertainty can be endured with fortitude and might even be stimulating. At least we can be thankful that we are not living in Cockermouth.

Brodick's iconic bathing boxes

Friends sent me the article from The Banner of October 31 and I was intrigued to hear of the revived interest in Brodick's bathing boxes.

I have written a short account of what happened when they became rather a headache to their impoverished owner.

In 1979 the Arran Sea Anthree directors - Allen Edward, Michael Pritchard and my husband Dennis Burgess.

They bought the boatyard at Low Glen Cloy and the existing boat hire business with boats, tractors and tackle shop which was housed in three buildings on the beach.

not more than 12 useable huts were stored off-season up Glen Cloy and put out each

In 1979, Mr Atfield (from Farnham Common, Buckinghamshire) was the only longterm hirer remaining.

He used to take a hut for one month between July and August but I don't know where the family stayed in Brodick.

The huts were a target for overnight campers and were frequently vandalised.

Deckchairs were also hired out. An attempt to interest Cunninghame District Council to take them over came to nothing.

These, like the huts, were costly to replace and repair.

The huts did not stand the rigours of being lifted and transported to Glen Cloy every year and so were abandoned by the early 1980s.

By late 1988, the lack of fish in Brodick Bay and the high capital costs of the business forced ASAC to be sold.

Mr Moss bought it in 1989 and replaced the old white buildings with the existing Boat House.



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

Gardening notes for Christmas

Now that Christmas is almost upon us, we are all racking our brains to think of unique and unusual gifts for our friends and

It maybe necessary to look outside, especially if they are keen gardeners or if they have just bought their first house with a garden. They may require new secateurs, fork, spade, or kneeling pads. Good gloves don't usually go amiss either, or some replacement plants. From now until the end of February bare rooted trees and shrubs are usually available from nurseries.

For the unsure, a gift voucher from the local garden centre may suit them.

If you are going to visit friends and want to take a gift, why not purchase a colourful poinsettia or cyclamen persicum.

Poinsettias are extremely popular and every year thousands are imported from Canada. Their botanical name is euphorbia pulcherrima and their natural habitat is Mexico. The original colour of the top leaves or bracts is flame red, but through cultivation they are available in white and various shades of red and pink.

Clusters

They also have clusters of yellow flowers but they are insignificant. In the wild they can grow to a height of three metres.

Poinsettias like indirect sunlight so keeping them next or near to a window is fine as long as there are no draughts. Watering is done as and when required, but do not let them dry out.

Unfortunately it is best if they are purchased every year, as it is a year-long process usually with poor results, if you try getting them to flower the following year.

Also available at this time of year are lovely flowering cyclamen persicum, a native of Turkey, Israel and some Greek islands.

The marbled dark green foliage grows to a height of 15 cm, and the brightly coloured flowers in individual shades of reds, pinks and white look down upon it. Cyclamen are best watered from the bottom. This prevents water damage to the crown and foliage. Cyclamen can flower for many months if looked after properly, Remember that they do not like full sunlight, and yes they can be kept for the following year.

Once they have finished flowering reduce watering and place the pot on its side to keep it dry. Come May and June pot them up in fresh compost and start watering.
