Arran funeral to be held for crash victim



Tony Collins

The funeral of tragic helicopter crash victim PC Tony Collins is to be held on Arran.

The dad of three, who had close connections to the island, was among the nine people who died when the helicopter crashed into the Clutha Vaults pub in Glasgow last Friday night.

PC Collins, who was 43, served with the Police Scotland helicopter unit and was in the aircraft when it crashed also killing colleague Kirsty Nelis, 36, and the 51-year-old pilot David Traill.

Six people in the pub also lost their lives.

Although he lived on the south side of Glasgow with his wife Lucy and their children, PC Collins was brought up on Arran and his parents, Geoff and Margaret, still live on the island.

His funeral will be held at Lamlash Cemetary on Tuesday 10 December at 11.45am. The service will be conducted by the Rev Angus Adamson and donations, in lieu of flowers, will be made to the Clutha Appeal Fund.

point I had decided to be devil's advocate and take as much detail as I could.

'He stated I must get in touch with the Business Directory in Preston and speak to their collections manager.

'The collections was much more aggressive. He stated I must pay the full amount immediately and I did not, the bailiffs would come to the property. I repeated, I did not owe anything, had received no papers and that I wouldn't pay anything. After a few minutes repeating himself, he started to negotiate a payment of, first half the amount and then £1,000. At that point I put the phone down quite shaken.'

Police Scotland confirmed they had been made aware of the incident.

A spokesperson for North Ayrshire Council said: 'We would always urge businesses to stay alert and take every step they can to reduce the likelihood of being targeted by fraud. This is even more important during the run up to Christmas, when businesses are busier and scams can go undetected more easily.'

New priest has first service at St Margaret's

A Whiting Bay church has a priest in charge at last.

St Margaret's Episcopal Church has for several years been using only lay leaders.

The Rev Simon Mackenzie was licensed by the Bishop of Argyll and the Isles, the Rt Rev Kevin Pearson, at a ceremony in Lochgilphead last month.

Attending on behalf of St Margaret's were Mary and Barry Boughton and John Roberts. Mary was chosen to present him with a bible as one of the representatives offering symbolic gifts at the

Islanders hit by changes to 'signing

Arran residents claiming Jobseekers Allowance have been hit by changes in postal 'signing on' procedures that apply to the island.

Previously their postal form was sent to Saltcoats Jobcentre but the Department for Work and Pensions and now decided that all forms must be sent to Wolverhampton before being redirected to Saltcoats, the effect of which has been delayed benefit payments or missing mail.

Now North Ayrshire and Arran MP Katy Clark is taking up the issue.

'In recent weeks constituents on Arran have contacted me about changes in how they 'sign on' for Jobseekers Allowance. I am taking these issues up with the DWP on behalf of my constituents,' she said.

Ms Clark spoke about taking up the issues when she was the guest speaker at Arran Labour Party's meeting on welfare reform last Satur-

Take care and have a fraud free Christmas

Everyone is gearing up for Christmas. But while most people are thinking about presents and turkey and trimmings, in the shadows lurk those whose minds turn to scams and fraud.

The extremely unpleasant experience of an Arran businesswoman this week shows just how far these scamsters are prepared to go.

This is not just phone fraud but a full blown attempt at

The woman involved is smart and switched on. She quickly smelled a rat, or two, and took decisive action.

But there are many older and more vulnerable people out there who could well have been taken in. These fraudsters are ruthless - and it seems they are still using the same scam they were a year ago. Only the numbers have changed.

They don't care if it is a little old lady saving for Christmas or a business which could be struggling to survive. They just want money, any way they can get it.

What is important is that if any business or individual is approached the authorities must be told.

There is no point turning a blind eye to these scams, even if you don't lose out - because the next person targeted might not be so lucky.

So everyone must be aware, at this busy time, to be extra vigilant on the internet or on the phone not to be caught

Trading standards officials urge business owners to take time to make themselves aware of the types of fraud being carried out every day.

And the website run by the National Fraud Authority www.actionfraud.police.uk - is particularly useful in finding out about, and reporting, fraud and internet crime.

So if you have been scammed, ripped off or conned, or even an attempt has been made to do so, report it to the authorities.

There is no point in pretending it will ever be stamped out. Fraud, by its very nature, goes with the flow. Phone fraud has been about for years, but of course the internet has opened up a whole new world not just for the good, but for the those intent on criminality.

So let's have a happy and fraud-free Christmas by taking a few simple precautions that keep the fraudsters at bay.

Birds in the **Holy Land**

Terry Southall has just returned from a three-week trip to the Holy Land doing conservation work.

The work entails catching and ringing, counting and studying some of the 500 million birds that migrate through the region in a single year.

The trip also included doing talks and presentations to all kinds of groups of people on bird conservation. Here is his report.

A family home was destroyed in Sannox as gale force winds lashed the island overnight.

In a frightening and horrific scenario the roof of the timber home of Jim and Shauna Lees and their family blew off and landed on Sannox beach, then some of the walls collapsed and within a few minutes they had lost their home.

But the community rallied round and within two or three hours Jim's many friends had got as much out of the house as possible, as the house is beyond repair.

Jim said: 'I was lying in bed one minute, next minute I was looking at the stars,' but he added: 'The people of Corrie and Sannox have been superb.'

Flight of fancy

A proposed airstrip for Arran, first mentioned five years ago, moved a step closer this week when the Shiskine Valley Trust lodged a planning application for a site at Drumadoon with the help of a £2,600 grant from Argyll and Islands Enterprise.

This has opened up an old sore between those who want an airstrip at Drumadoon and Isobel and Colin Currie whose view is that the only possible site would be at their farm at Balmichael.

Feeling on the island, apart from the Drumadoon enthusiasts and the Curries, has been lukewarm to hostile. Many people see no need for an airstrip, but Ronnie Mann, who has been in since the start of the airport debate, sees one in operation by 1995.


Other ideas included a new, or a better, play area. Generally, the committee's suggestions met with approval.






