Police files:

Helicopter manhunt

Following a report of a mainland man being missing in the Lamlash area, a police helicopter and local officers were alerted at 11pm on Sunday night 18 December.

The helicopter and officers searched the seafront and back roads of Brodick and Lamlash until the man was located in Brodick at 2am.

The man was taken to hospital for a check-up before being discharged.

Collision with bridge

At 10.40am on Sunday a vehicle hit the Ashdale Bridge at the south end of Whiting Bay and ended up hanging over the

No other vehicles were involved and the male driver was retrieved from the vehicle unhurt. Another vehicle had already been in collision with the bridge earlier in the week.

Seven-and-a-half hour rescue

At 4pm on Saturday 17 December a car left the road and rolled about 30 metres down an embankment at The Gaerry near Dippen.

The driver, a 76-year-old Sliddery woman, was released from the vehicle in a seven-and-a half hour operation involving Clyde Coastguards and local police, ambulance and fire-

The woman was taken to Arran War Memorial Hospital for treatment to injuries sustained in the crash and later transferred to a mainland hospital by helicopter.

The C147 road was closed until 11.30pm. No other vehicle was involved.







Recycling -

Let's get it sorted this Christmas

During the festive season it is important to remember that Christmas is a time when waste in North Ayrshire is at its highest level.

More waste is produced over the festive period - such as wrapping paper, cardboard boxes, Christmas trees, old decorations, bottles and leftover food - and this often means that recycling is forgotten about and waste is simply bundled up into one bag and thrown away.

However, it is easier than ever to make sure that you keep up the good workwhich has enabled North Ayrshire residents to recycle 43.5 percent of our waste. Thank you to all our residents for helping us to achieve this.

- Over 1 billion Christmas cards are sent each year.
- We use around 750 million bottles and glass containers and 500 million drinks cans over the festive period.
- Over 7.5 million real Christmas Trees are bought every year.

The frightening thing is that most of this could end up in our bins in the New Year.

This year we are asking you to think seriously about what you can do to reduce, reuse and recycle your waste not just over the festive period but to make this a choice for life.

- Real Christmas Trees put out at the kerbside week commencing 16 January for 7am on your normal refuse collection day and our operatives will collect.
- Use your blue bins for recycling any paper, or cards that you dispose of over Christmas and the New Year (please do not include foil wrapping paper).
- A lot more glass bottles and jars are used over the Christmas period. Why not recycle at one of the many bottle banks across the Island.

Please place any large items of cardboard beside your blue wheeled bin on the day of collection. As in previous years the Cleansing Services will uplift real Christmas trees for disposal. These should be placed beside the wheeled bin on the day of collection week commencing

- Say no to unwanted carrier bags when shopping try to reuse your old ones;
- Avoid buying goods that have unnecessary packaging or try to buy food and drink packaged in materials that can be recycled;
- Buy drinks like lemonade in large containers, rather than lots of small ones; and
- Avoid using paper plates and cups if you are planning a party.

- Why not make gift tags from your old greetings cards;
- Pass any unwanted gifts to your local charity shop rather than throwing them away; and
- Buy rechargeable batteries instead of disposable ones.

A lot of the waste created during the festive period can be recycled. Wrapping paper (no foil), cardboard boxes, plastic bottles and steel and aluminium cans should be recycled using your

Glass bottles and jars

Glass bottles can be recycled at one of the many bottle banks across the Island.

You don't need to worry about transporting your real Christmas trees to the Transfer Station. Trees can be recycled by placing them at the kerbside beside your bin for 7am during the week beginning 16 January 2012. They will then be taken for composting.

Electrical goods

Many people will have small electrical items such as straighteners, hairdryers and white goods to replace during the festive period. All electrical items can be taken to the Transfer Station.

Food waste

Food is a huge part of the Christmas celebration. However, it is often the case that a lot of good food goes to waste. When you are preparing meals make sure that you aren't making lots more than you expect to serve – although there is always room for some second helpings.

Everyone has experience of turkey sandwiches for days after Christmas, but there are plenty of recipes which can utilise those leftovers in a far more creative way. Pick up some tips at www.lovefoodhatewaste.com.

Councillor Tom Barr, Portfolio Holder for the Environment, said:

"Over the Christmas and New Year period recycling becomes even more important as we produce much more waste at this time of year.

It is customary for children to attend the designated school for the area in which they live, other than in the case of St Matthew's Academy. Admission to St Matthew's Academy is achieved through attendance at one of its associated primary schools

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


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
