
New church repair funds

As part of the recent UK government's autumn statement. £15 million pounds has been made available for the repair of roofs and guttering on vulnerable listed church build-

Katy Clark, MP for North Ayrshire and Arran, is urging local constituents or church groups to apply to the scheme if it is able to provide assistance. Speaking about the fund, Ms Clark said: 'I am aware that the maintenance of churches and other places of worship can be extremely expensive. This UK-wide fund may go some way to helping with vital repairs. This scheme is open to all places of worship – not just churches – and applications can be made for between £10,000 and £100,000. If any constituents are aware of listed buildings that are in need of repairs then the National Heritage Memorial Fund - www. nhmf.org - is administering the scheme and details about the fund are also available on the ChurchCare website www.churchcare.co.uk.'

Sandbags could go under new plan to end eyesore

Eyesore sandbags could be removed under a new plan to save Brodick beach.

The former landfill site behind it would also be cleared and the beach then left to find its own level by natural ero-

Fisherman's Walk would be re-routed away from danger.

However, because the beach is owned by Arran Estates, the council will not fund all the costs of the project and it will be up to the owners and the local community to seek alternative funding.

Local concerns

Last month council representatives met members from the Brodick Improvements Committee, Arran Community Council and Arran Estates to address local concerns about the beach and the erosion which has now damaged the popular Fisherman's Walk.

Other plans put forward include regular re-charging of the beach with imported sand or the installation of groynes or a rock revertment.

Brodick Improvements Committee chairman Harry Davidson said the committee was meeting with community council representatives today (Friday) to discuss the plans.

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

An island hotel is planning to expand.

An application for planning permis-

sion in the name of parent company Arran Hotels Ltd has been approved by North Ayrshire Council with one minor condition in the interests of the conservation area.

Owner Geoffrey Dallamore said the cottage had once been part of the hotel

but had been blocked off in the 1960s. He said that two internal doors were still there behind the existing facade.

The owners hope to have the work carried out over the winter and have the rooms ready in time for the summer season next year.

A new home for the new year

A number of elderly residents of Arran will have a new home for the new year.

Fitting out of the new Montrose House in Brodick is nearing completion and residents will be transferred early next month. It had originally been hoped that the residents could be moved before Christmas after the £5.7 million care home and resource hub was handed over to the North Ayrshire Council in October by the builders.

The new centre will replace the existing Montrose House and Stronach Services. It will provide 30 residential places for vulnerable older people and create a resource centre to support others to remain in their own homes for as long as possible.

A spokesman for North Ayrshire Council said: 'All building work at Montrose House is now complete. Some furnishings are still to be delivered however residents are expected to move in early next month.

'The construction of this multi-million pound modern facility demonstrates our commitment to ensuring our older people receive the best possible care.'

The present Montrose House site is to be sold once the residents have moved.



Ambitious broadband plan welcomed

For most of us, broadband access is now something we take for granted.

WiFi connections are available in our homes, most of Arran's cafes and restaurants, as well as our places of work. For those lucky mainland dwellers, when a wireless connection isn't available, 3G or 4G fills the void.

Sadly 3G still seems beyond the realms of possibility on Arran, and for many areas of the island, internet access is still very difficult, either because they are located in so called 'notspots (speeds of less than 2mb) or with no connection at all.

Two months ago Nicola Sturgeon, then deputy first minister, announced a £2.5m support package to assist digital connectivity across the country's hard-to-reach communities, bringing the total investment in the Community Broadband Scotland (CBS) programme to £7.5 million.

Additionally, in 2013, £264 million investment for high speed broadband was unveiled, with an ambitious goal of connecting 85 per cent of Scottish properties by the end

Despite this, BT estimates five per cent of the population in the most isolated locations will not benefit from any UK or Scottish government scheme to roll-out high-speed broadband from the exchange.

Poor or limited access to the internet has a major impact upon communities and their economies.

The main problem is geographical proximity to exchanges, with bigger distances meaning less chance of a connection (Glenloig, for example, is more than 5km from the Machrie exchange).

There are still thousands of homes and businesses which need support and while the Reach Project did help the homes at Glenloig and others on the island, it was nowhere near close to solving the overall problem.

So it is welcome news that superfast broadband will go live on Arran by 2016.

Now that subsea cable work has been completed, Arran will receive full coverage.

BT is even looking at smaller areas like Glenloig having access to much faster internet towards the middle of 2015

Let's just hope that the residents of Glenloig can at least get their satellite broadband fixed free of charge in the meantime, otherwise they may be offline for quite some time.



New Earl revealed

The name of the new Earl of Arran is out. He has been revealed as John de Bruyne and he paid £410,000 for the title which was sold last week in London.

Mr de Bruyne is a 48-year-old Old Etonian who lives near Cambridge. Earlier this year he sold a medical equipment company for £5.5 million and then purchased Swaine Adeney which makes top of the range umbrellas, gloves and riding whips at its factory in Essex.

Mr de Bruyne has been visiting Arran since childhood and said: 'I simply want my family to enjoy a very romantic place.' He and his wife Tracey have five year old triplets.

Lady Jean Fforde, who sold the title said: 'I was very sorry to have to sell, but I could not have wished for the Earldom to go into a safer pair of hands.'

Submarine found

The wreck of HMS Vandal, a Second World War coastal submarine, was found in the Kilbrannan Sound last week.

The vessel had been launched in Barrow-in-Furness in November 1942 and was sailing with a crew of 37 on board from the shipyard when she was reported missing in mysterious circumstances in the Firth of

Clyde in 1943. She is supposed to have been engaged in deep dive exercises.

It is said a man in Lochranza reported seeing flares off Arran about the time HMS Vandal was lost with all hands.

Community initiative

A new subject is on offer to fifth year pupils at Arran High School. The Community Involvement initiative aims to make the pupils aware of the community and the problems associated with the elderly and the young.

Over the past months pupils have been working at Montrose House and Lamlash Playgroup assisting with everyday tasks. In addition they raised money by making tablet and biscuits which they sold to their fellow pupils.

The Bank of Scotland in Brodick is shortly to be refurbished and enlarged. The manager's house, which adjoins the bank, is now empty and early next year the staff will move in there while the present bank is upgraded.

Once complete the house will be incorporated into the bank's working area. The upstairs will become a flat for temporary bank staff. The manager's home is now in Glencloy and the present front door of the bank will continue to be the one for public use.


