School dinners must stay

Parents and community turn out in force to protest over school meal cuts

WILL parent power and protest at the planned removal of school meals from a number of small, rural primary schools win the day?

It looks as though Argyll and Bute Council did not expect the backlash it has received when it decided in its annual budget that school meals would go from Glenbarr, Skipness and Rhunahaorine and elsewhere across the council.

At the Mid Argyll, Kintyre and Islands Area Committee in Campbeltown on Wednesday and at a public meeting at Tayinloan Village Hall the same night, councillors said the matter would be 'revisited'.

And they also turned to officer bashing, saying that the information on which they had

voted at the council had been incorrect.

'Don't shoot the messenger,' said Councillor Rory Colville in the face of a meeting that began with hostile questioning at Tayinloan; at the committee meeting earlier he said: 'As a councillor I should have investigated this before it was approved.'

'Shambolic' 'Absolutely shambolic,' was how Councillor John McAlpine described the situation.

He added: 'They did this with the respite centre in Lochgilphead, - false information and even lies.'

Councillor Robin Currie said that some of the senior officers 'hadn't got a clue about what was happening on the ground'. At the Tayinloan meeting, chaired

by Kenny McInnes who also chairs the school parent council at Rhunahaorine, Frances McNeill, who works as a dinner lady said that she and others still had not received anything in writing about their jobs; the first they heard of the cuts was in the press.

Councillor Anne Horn said that she had been told that the council

was seeking to identify other ways to save the money rather than cut school meals.

The councillors are to press to get the matter onto the agenda of the next meeting of the executive; but as the matter was approved by the full council it should go before the next full council meeting for any revision or reversal.

They advised the 100

plus parents at Tayinloan to keep on the pressure and to write and email both Argyll and Bute Council and the Scottish parliament.

Jamie McGrigor MSP was also at Wednesday evening's meeting; he said he would be raising the issue next week in the parliament, in his capacity as shadow minister for the community. 'If you are going to

have to make cuts the worse place to cut is at the seed corn of our communities, our children,' he said.

Councillor Rory Colville warned that this could be just the start of threats to smaller rural schools as Argyll and Bute began to look at its school estates strategy later this year.

'You need to be on your guard,' he said.

Help make Kintyre Culture Centre happen

KINTYRE Cultural Forum is putting the finishing touches to the timetable for the public seminar it will host on March 19 at the Victoria Hall Campbeltown. Running from 1.30pm until 7pm the event is to help draw up proposals for a new centre for the town. There has been support for the idea since 2007 and research has shown the need for a venue, which can offer proper

up-to-date performance facilities for drama and music, and for music tuition, rehearsal and training. 'Feedback from the public, local and certain national organisations has been very en-

thusiastic towards the project,' said Iain Johnston who is the development worker for the plans. 'We now need your help to come along to the public seminar to work with architects and a web designer to

build this for the benefit of the community.' The organisers want to thank their supporters The Scottish Arts Council, Leader, The Campbeltown Common Good Fund, The East Kintyre Wind Farm Trust, High-

lands and Islands Enterprise, Campbeltown Area Regeneration Scheme, Skills Development Scotland (Careers Scotland) and funding support has been secured by Fyne Homes and ACHA.

Call off forestry lease sale plans say unions

'Governments proposals command little support and do not stack up'

DELEGATES arriving at the SNP's constituency AGM in Inveraray on Saturday were leafleted by forestry unions.

Roy Laird from the unions said the leaflets were 'well received'.

'I had a talk with Jim Mather MSP and he guaranteed us a public meeting in the near future,' said Mr Laird, 'Though this might be a moot point as the Conservatives have pulled their support.'

'I'd like to thank everyone who supported the local forestry unions; we had a great deal of information and advice from contractors who work in the forestry and also a great deal of backing from the general public.'

Mr Mather told *The*

Courier that the forestry meeting will be called by the new Minister Roseanna Cunningham.

Mr Laird added that the forestry unions had been told to expect 'some kind of announcement from the SNP' within the next week.

On Thursday last week Scottish Conservatives called on Scottish Ministers to ditch their forestry lease sell-off plans from the Climate Change Bill, claiming that the recently published results of the government's own consultations show the plans to be unworkable and potentially damaging to Scotland's forestry sector.

'From the published responses and the evi-

dence taken at committee it is clear that the government's proposals command little support from those involved in the forestry sector and that in practical terms they do not stack up,' said John Scott MSP, the Tory spokesman on forestry.

On Tuesday unions called on new forestry minister, Roseanna Cunningham to end the unpopular proposal.

The Forestry Commission Trades Unions say there has been an overwhelming number of responses to the Forestry Commission consultation objecting to the plans with over 10,000 signatures collected on petitions by the unions and opposition politicians from communities throughout Scotland interested in the future of their forests. Employers have pleaded that their business is not threatened in this way and opposition parties now having a parliament majority against the plans.

'We were overwhelmed with the response we had,' said Robert Westerman from the panel after Saturday's information day held in the foyer of Campbeltown's Co-operative store.

Available

'More than 140 people asked for leaflets on keeping your child safe on the internet,' said

Mr Westerman, 'we have some left and they are available from the town's police station.'

Horror Stories

'This has struck a chord with parents - we heard some horror stories on the day. It really is important that parents know what is going on.'

The top tips for staying safe include remembering that everyone you meet online is a stranger; always use a

nickname and never give out personal details; encourage children to talk to their parents or teachers and ask for help when they're worried about anything they've seen or been sent online.

Never Arrange

Never accept emails or open files from people you do not know and never arrange to meet up alone with someone you make friends with online.

Beach debris makes new Kilmartin exhibition

COLOURFUL everyday objects found washed up on Argyll beaches are the starting point for a new art exhibition.

Kilmartin House Museum is hosting the 'Tidelines' show by Colonsay artist Jane Rose, which opened last weekend and runs until April 19.

Previously concentrating on painting seascapes, Jane said she left paint and brushes

behind when she started to discover interesting objects in the sand and seaweed.

Now beach combing has become something of an obsession and the exhibition is made from objects found on Islay, Gigha, Tiree, Colonsay and Lismore.

Jane said: 'It's interesting because you don't know what you are going to find.'

Another artwork was based on a message

in a bottle, tossed into the water by a child in Newfoundland, Canada, for a school project. Jane said she felt impelled to investigate the stories behind some of her finds.

'It does actually have a message, that this stuff is out there. It is a shame that so much of it ends up polluting the sea. It says something about society and its wastefulness, that so much ends up thrown away.'

Allan introduced the first piper for the evening Stuart McCallum, the founder of Mc-

All the pipers were playing McCallum bagpipes and Willie McCallum's new chanter.

Stuart started with marches, strathspeys and reels and some of the late Gordon Duncan's tunes. Stuart

plays with Strathclyde Police Pipe Band.

Next to follow was Kenny MacLeod who is in partnership with Stuart McCallum, and has a shop in Glasgow, MacLeod Supplies, selling all types of bagpipe supplies.

Kenny was pipe major of the Glasgow Skye Pipe Band, winning many honours in grade one.

Stephen Leisk who just turned 17 took to the floor and played many big marches etc with a great air of authenticity.

He won the overall championship at Strathclyde Police Junior competition last week.

Next up was Brittany's Sylvan Hanlon who plays with the Scottish Power Pipe Band and

is a very accomplished player who has won many prizes at various competitions throughout Scotland. He gave a demonstration of Breton music and was very pleasant to listen to.

Rory Grossart who works in the factory in Kilmarnock and makes all types of reeds for the bagpipe and along with Stuart McCallum they played small pipes and electric pipes. Kenny MacLeod also joined in on the bongos.

Campbeltown's Willie McCallum came on playing traditional marches, strathspeys and reels, then hornpipes and jigs.

Willie who has a long list of wins over the years, including the Glenfiddich World Championship a record

eight times and to add to that last week weekend in New York, at the 'Metro Cup' he won for a second year.

After an interval and the raffle being drawn all the pipers came on and played together including Kenny on the bongos.

Willie McCallum senior made the vote of thanks and presented all the pipers with a specially labelled bottle of Springbank Whisky and to a very able fear-an-tighe Allan Hamilton who kept everybody informed throughout the night. The next recital will be on March 18 in the Masonic Hall when Iain Speirs from Edinburgh who is one of Scotland's best pipers takes to the floor.

Tickets for the Saturday night concert and ceilidh are very limited but may still be available.


Those attending the Friday night only will be treated to a performance by the Ian McKerrall Chanter Group.

Restructuring conifer shelter belts and restoring hedgerows to provide shelter for their low input Welsh mountain sheep, using wood to provide woodchip bedding for animals then composting the bedding to provide a growing medium for the tree nursery.

Guest speaker, Andrew Barbour, is the woodland manager for Atholl Estate and Ar-

on the estate, which has included milling and kiln drying.

High Cattadale bullocks sell to £900 at Stirling

UNITED Auctions sold 758 store cattle and 1,329 store hogs and grit ewes at Stirling last Wednesday.

Heifers averaged 165.1p per kilo (-2.34p) and sold to 213.2p per kg for a 258kgs Belgian Blue cross from Auldhall and £880 for a 571kgs Charolais cross from Victoria.

Texel hogs from High Milndovan sold to £64.50 with Blackfaces from Keilator to £51. Bluefaced Leicester gimmers from Muir edge fetched £140 and correct ewes to £102.

Refocus says NFUS

SIGNIFICANT changes to the Scotland Rural Development Programme (SRDP) would defocus this important source of funding and ensure that it better delivers for the whole of rural Scotland, the NFUS has said.

The SRDP will put a total of £1.6 billion into the Scottish rural economy between 2007 and 2013. A first stage review is currently being carried out by independent consultant Peter Cook on behalf of the Scottish Government.

The NFUS has sug-

gested a number of measures to address a range of current issues.

These include the difficulties facing hill and upland farming, new entrants, environmental challenges such as water quality and climate change, and improving the application procedures to ensure that all elements of the crucial programme are more accessible to the industry.

'In an ideal world, the SRDP would be delivering for rural Scotland but we feel that some aspects have lost their

way, said Jim McLaren, NFUS president, 'It is certainly our view that the SRDP must be significantly modified, with urgency, to ensure that this important pot of funding plays a far more central role in supporting those who are actively farming the land.

'Farmers and crofters across Scotland deserve to be rewarded for the public goods and services they provide if these are to be secured for the future, a fact recognised by our Cabinet Secretary Richard Lochhead in recent speeches.'

Spring Weddings



THERE is an air of hope and the start of something new when the first flowers of spring open to a warming sun and longer days.

Equally there is nothing quite like a spring wedding to echo that hope, freshness and warmth.

And there is no place that can provide a better backdrop to complement all that a spring wedding embodies than the West Highlands of Scotland. It has everything anyone could possibly ask for – beautiful churches in idyllic settings, a huge choice of top class hotels and guest houses in stunning locations, a wealth of cookery

talent, fresh produce from local sources and a warm welcome from the people there to make your day what it should be, a once-in-life-time experience and a memory forever.

Traditional Island Weddings At the réiteach or formal betrothal, it was often said by the bride to be's father :

“Ma tha ise deònach, tha mise ro-dheònach, agus mura bi sin mar sin, cha bhi seo mar seo” which means “If she is willing, I am very willing and if that weren't so, then this wouldn't be so”

The banns were called three Sundays in succession (this is no longer done) and on the Tuesday after the last calling the wedding would take place.

The greatest chore for a wedding was the plucking and cooking of innumerable hens presented for the party by friends of the bride and

bridegroom from all over the island. A delegation was formed just to deal with this part of the feast which consisted of cold chicken, roast mutton, scones and bannocks, fresh and salt butter, new cheese and many another special delicacy of the island, with the ever-present tea, and whisky and port wine for the toasts. Chickens were considered such an essential part of these feasts that when an epidemic killed a lot of hens on the island, Seonaidh Caimbeul, the local bard, made a song about it in which he refers to the grief of prospective brides at the impossibility of making proper wedding feasts without them.

After the religious service, the wedding party was met at the church door with the firing of guns and the skirl of bagpipes, which, playing the fine tune Highland

Wedding, led the procession home to the wedding breakfast. The celebration continued through the day and night. The guests sat down to the banquet in relays while songs and toasts were given, the songs often starting with a new song composed by the local bard especially for the occasion. Dancing began with a Scots foresome reel for the bride and groom and best man and first bridesmaid. Then the guests joined them on the floor and danced until morning. South Uist is famous for its pipers and a great delight of such a day was to listen to their perfect playing and pointing of the lovely tunes.

The old village hall has been, for the last one hundred years, a very important part of the cultural and historic heritage of the Tarbert area. Positive outlook needed

Look on the bright side to weather economic storm

ARGYLL business men and women have been told to look on the bright side to weather the economic storm.

Against the grain of economic doom and gloom, experts from Glasgow and Inverness said the region was well placed harness opportunities in the current climate.

David Sutherland, chief executive of Tulloch Homes, said if business leaders saw the glass as half full it would have a knock on effect on employees and customers.

He told an audience of 60 in Lochgilphead last week: 'Keep positive. You have got to maintain your confidence. In Argyll and Kintyre, you have some really vibrant businesses.'

Admin error concerning for West Coast fishing quotas

CLYDE Fishermen's Association played David to the EU's Goliath when the European bureaucracy added up wrongly and wouldn't admit it.

It gave west coast boats 28 days at sea less than those in the North Sea fishing fleet.

Now the European Ombudsman, P. Nikiforos Diamandouros, has asked the European Commission to correct this administrative error concerning fishing quotas in the West of Scotland.

This followed a complaint from Patrick Stewart, the association's secretary who is its sole employee, about an EU Regulation concerning fishing quotas for the year 2007.

He said: 'The determination of our fishermen, against the advice of some and the indifference of many, has proved that it is still possible for a David to right the wrongs of

a Goliath. However we cannot allow our vigilance to be dimmed as the Commission continues, in the name of the recovery of cod stocks, by constantly increasing restriction, which is often illogical and unwarranted, to render the future of the fishing communities, on the western fringes of the United Kingdom, ever less viable.'

Mr Stewart went on to thank those few that supported the association in its struggle. He was able to mention publicly Jamie McGrigor MSP and Alan Reid MP who had, very effectively raised the matter in their respective Parliaments.

'The Commission must accept the Ombudsman's finding and correct its mistake, otherwise there could be knock-on effects that could reduce the number of days at sea available to west coast fishermen in future years,' said Mr Reid.



Forestry debate

Sir,
I represent a local group who work in the forest industry and I have been a supporter of the SNP for 36 years and did indeed vote for Mr Mather, I am dismayed at the Tartan Tearing from a minority.

The questions being asked have not been answered. Two-thirds

of the responses to the consultation are opposed to leasing. If we are going to lease this much public land, we should have a national debate on the future of public forestry.

The Forestry Commission only manages the forest estate for the people of Scotland and the government should serve them, and not override their wishes. One of the main Forestry Commission objectives in multi-use forest is combating climate change. This priority would likely not be the case in private hands - their first priority, and rightly so, is to make money.

I have seen no evidence that this leasing will be beneficial to the forest industry or the environment.

The minister and our local MSP have not made available any business case for their proposal to lease public land. Unlike the rhetoric, the bill promises no money towards afforestation.

If this was a reasonable proposal, the ministers and local MSP would have made the time to counter the alleged rabble-rousing and scaremongering that has taken place. Hopefully our MSP, when he does come to Argyll, may wish to meet with us.

The Brooch of Ugadale - a gift from Robert the Bruce

THE BROOCH of Ugadale is a gift from Robert the Bruce in recognition of the hospitality of the Mackays, now Macneals of Ugadale, when he fled from Arran to Rachine.

Colonel Hector Macneal wrote a fascinating account of the events leading to the gift and of the history of the brooch itself for the Kintyre Antiquarian and Natural History Society in its magazine in July 1997 and this can still be read in their archives and online.

For many years after 1745 the brooch disappeared, and was supposed lost but was found again at Lossit when the old house was rebuilt in 1824.

What makes the village special for you?

My childhood. As a child we lived at Ugadale and I went to Peninver Primary School before we came to Lossit but it has been a family home for generations. The earliest photograph we have is captioned Lossit Park in 1842. I've seen it spelled as Losset and even Loffet on very early documents but today it is just known as Lossit.

There used to be two wings with a glass covered courtyard which was pulled down; it was full of the heads of animals that my great-grandfather had brought back from Africa and it was a great place to ride your bike on rainy days.

My own children and my nephews and nieces all love coming here and the minute I reach the village I'm home.

How would you describe the village to someone who has never been there?

The beach, of course, Machrihanish is famous

for its beach. We used to ride our ponies along the beach, and there's the golf course.

The houses along the front have been there for a long time and have got a lot of character; they haven't changed for years and years.

The air here is so good my children sleep like logs when they're here and so do I.

Do you have a favourite place in the village?

The Gauldrons, the beach there is really wild.

How much has it changed since you were a child?

When I was a kid the old Ugadale Hotel was open and they used to have a buffet lunch on Sunday where you could eat as much as you liked for 50 pence!

There was also a shop, which I think was important for the village.

Is there a time of year when you just want to

be there?

May and June when the rhododendrons here are in bloom; there are some spectacular specimens, in fact there's one just starting to come out now.

Do you have family there?

My parents. The family has lived here for generations; the house has grown over the years. The porch was added and also parts have been demolished to make it more man-

ageable today. The Macneal family have a Bruce Brooch as a family heirloom and my father is very proud of it.

How would you improve your village?

Reinstate the shop and the old Ugadale Arms was such a good place.

Do you have a favourite building?

It has to be Lossit.

Is there anyone famous from your village?

Well, the golf course is world famous.







AUDIT OF BEST VALUE AND COMMUNITY PLANNING

Argyll and Bute Council considered a report by the Accounts Commission on the follow-up Audit of Best Value and Community Planning in Argyll and Bute at its meeting on Thursday 22 January 2009. In the report the Accounts Commission acknowledged recent improvements in a number of areas particularly in the Council's leadership and strategic direction. The Commission accepted the conclusion of the report that more remains to be done to develop a culture of continuous improvement, and endorsed the areas highlighted in the report as requiring particular attention, which the Commission encouraged the Council to act on to increase the momentum towards a position where it is fully implementing best value.

The Council has agreed an overall Improvement Plan which brings together key improvement actions for the Council, designed to ensure that it operates with clear and systematic corporate frameworks in place, with outcomes within the following themes -

- Improvement** - Ensuring the Council delivers Best Value
- Process for Change** - Transforming key processes to deliver improved service, and efficiency savings
- Community Planning** - Delivering the vision for Argyll and Bute with our partners
- Communities and service users** - Communities and service users are involved in planning the services they receive
- People Management** - Ensuring employees are motivated, know what their role is and have the necessary skills to deliver
- Risk Management** - Ensuring the Council is aware of risks and is taking action to address them
- Asset Management** - Ensuring the Council is making best use of its assets
