Skykon Saved?

- Joint venture given 'preferred status'
- Takeover on cards 'within weeks'

IT is the news that Kintyre has waited to hear for so long; Skykon's future now looks secure.

First Minister Alex Salmond made a surprise visit to the factory at Machrihanish on Wednesday afternoon as the announcement was made that Scottish and Southern Energy (SSE) and Marsh Wind Technology have created a joint venture to save the factory which has been in administration ever since its Danish parent went bankrupt.

'It's what we've all been waiting for; we've been in

meetings every Friday since November hearing what's been happening,' said one shop floor worker.

The joint venture is called Wind Towers Ltd and has been granted 'preferred bidder sta-

Now that administrators, Andrew Davidson and Colin Dempster of Ernst and Young have agreed this, Wind Towers begins a process of due diligence when it has full access to the company details, and also has to present its own business plan.

Workers were told during a meeting with Andrew Davison on Wednesday morning and also that Wind Towers plans to have completed its diligence on the business by the end of April.

'There are a number of significant matters to resolve but we hope that today proves to be a milestone in our endeavours to find a buyer for the business,' said Mr Davidson.

Mr Salmond said he was delighted: 'Scottish and Southern Energy is one of our biggest developers in wind energy.'

He pointed to their plans not just for on shore but off shore, a market that Wind Towers will be able to serv-

He also paid tribute to the workforce and thanked Siemens for their co-operation and helpfulness; Siemens had been footing the supply chain.'

wage bill for the company for most of the time Skykon had been in receivership while an order for its Clyde wind Farm was completed.

The First Minister added his praise for the administrators, and SSE and Marsh.

Ian Marchant the chief executive of SSE said: 'With the right business plan and management, it should be a sustainable business in every sense.'

Councillor Ellen Morton, Argyll and Bute's spokeswoman for education, said: 'No councillor would ever close a school on a whim.'

'There is a danger of this process becoming a tick box list and that is not the right approach,' she added.

'I have looked at every school considering the number of pupils, how many placing requests, the capacity of the receiving school, educational benefits, transport, the journey to the receiving school, school building conditions and so on.'

Coastguard debate off

JIM Mather MSP has expressed dismay at the news that the House of Commons Backbench **Business Committee** has postponed a key debate on the future of UK Coastguard services that was due to be held on Thursday afternoon.

The topic will not now be debated until March 24, which is the last day scheduled for the consultation process that proposes a radical and damaging reduction in the Coastguard service, particularly in Scotland where it is proposed that only one full time station will be retained in Scotland at Aberdeen with a part time, daylight presence in either Shetland or Stornoway.

'The utter disregard exhibited here by ditching this at less than 48 hours notice beggars belief and has to be questioned,' he said.

'There seems to be little or no perception down there in Westminster of how essential Coastguard services are to our fishing, ferry and marine transport.'

Cash at last for all-weather sports pitch?

CAMPBELTOWN could have an all weather pitch (AWP) in time for next winter, it was claimed this week.

Funding for the pitch would come from the remainder of cash earmarked for a new marina through an Argyllwide project.

Councillor John Semple said that false assumptions made in a business case for Campbeltown through the Campbeltown, Helensburgh, Oban, Rothesay and Dunoon (CHORD) project by consultants DTZ, meant that there might be money available to use towards an all weather pitch.

There has been an ongoing campaign for an all weather pitch for Campbeltown for a number of years, and it was due to be included in Argyll and Bute Council's capital programme, which was being discussed by councillors as the Courier went to press yesterday (Thursday).

Councillor Colville, chairman of the Campbeltown CHORD Project Board, told a meeting of the South Kintyre Sports Council that it was not going to be included in the capital programme.

He told The Courier that by yesterday (Thursday) he expected to have secured the agreement of the council to provide almost £500,000 for the pitch, to allow them to access the sportscotland funding of just under £400,000 confirmation of which is due late March.

'I have been successful

in persuading the council administration that given the very exceptional circumstances, some of the money for the marina should be transferred to the AWP.

Councillor Semple said he is pressing the administration to accept that both projects, the marina and the all weather pitch, could go ahead and that false assumptions have been made in the business case for the marina that indicate it isn't a viable proposition.

'When you address these assumptions it becomes very much a viable proposition. Savings in the capital cost of the marina would allow the all weather pitch to be funded as well. So you could do both,

'The leader of the council needs to recognise this but he has not, he added.

Proposed cut in duty on fuel

THE plight of remote rural petrol stations has been recognised with a proposed five pence duty cut.

Danny Alexander MP, Chief Secretary to the Treasury said at the Scottish Liberal Democrat spring conference in Perth on Friday said the discount was intended to help 'hard-hit families' who generally pay higher fuel prices due to their outlying locations.

Mr Alexander said: 'We will be submitting a formal application to the European Commission to deliver a 5p discount on fuel duty for Highland communities, the Northern Isles, the Inner and Outer Hebrides, the Islands of the Clyde and the Isles of Scilly too.

'These are places, more than anywhere in the country, feeling the pressure of high fuel

'The pressure is huge on families in these areas, and I'm delighted to be part of the Government that, for the first time ever, is going to deliver that help to hard-hit families.

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Petrol pumps to run dry in Carradale

CARRADALE has had its last delivery of petrol and diesel as James Semple and Son is closing down its pumps.

The rest of the business, the shop, post office and garage will continue but as proprietor Kenneth Semple said about selling petrol: 'I'm working as a tax collector.'

The high level of taxation and, he added, bank charges for handling payments by card made selling fuel unviable for the small retailer, especially as the business now faces the need to replace both pumps and tanks.

'The youngest tank here is over 40 years old,' he said.

East Kintyre Community Council is now considering a community buyout of the petrol and diesel sales.

Cameron, chairwoman, told the March meeting of the council last week that she would research the possibility of a buyout if the rest of the council were agreeable, and they were.

'Applecross was in the same situation two years ago and got some help from Highlands and Islands Enterprise; they formed a trust and bought out the petrol station and run it as a not for profit organisa-

Having no petrol sales in the village could hit tourism and will be especially difficult for pensioners or others who keep a car only to travel about the village or the Carradale area.

'It will mean a round trip of 32 miles into Campbeltown to buy petrol,' she said. 'Semples also provide an excellent service and will open up if there is an emergency and you need petrol.'

Clachan station operators to retire

CLACHAN Petrol Station would like to see the proposed discount introduced for petrol sales in remote rural locations but as owner Cathy McLean said, she's not holding her breath.

'It's been talked of before,' she said.

Cathy and her husband Calum have been running the petrol station with its store, newsagents and post office for 14 years and they are now ready to retire; they have put the business up for sale and hope that a younger buyer will come along.

Ever since they took over the business the couple have kept the profit margin on fuel at a minimum and frozen.

'So who's ripping who

off?' said Cathy. 'Rural petrol stations

do not make money; they have to have a store alongside.'

If it were not for the thriving shop alongside, Clachan would not have a petrol station.

'You supply petrol more as a service,' said Cathy.

Cathy and Calum have enjoyed their time running the business but now feel it is time to retire.

'Clachan is a friendly wee place and we have enjoyed our time here. It would be a lovely business for someone younger to take on,' she

Motorist refused to give a blood sample

A MAN who refused to give a blood sample when the breath test machine at Campbeltown Police Station broke down was fined £300 and disqualified from driving for 12 months when he appeared before Campbeltown Sheriff Court on Thursday.

Derek Robertson, aged 45, of Sound of Kintyre, Machrihanish, pleaded not guilty to failing to provide a specimen of blood at Campbeltown on November 27 last year, after he failed a roadside breath test near his home.

When taken to Campbeltown Police Station Robertson said: 'I don't give blood.

'I will blow in your machine but I don't give blood.

The court heard that Robertson, a self-employed woodcutter, had a previous bad experience when giving blood.

He also claimed he was never offered the alternative of giving a urine sample, which he would have done, and his request for a lawyer was refused.

He claimed part of the breath test procedure had not been carried out in that one of the statements that officers should have read to him was not done.

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

Maybe God will give us a 'Dougall' on the way to make us smile and carry on with the journey.

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
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Down Memory Lane

However, I have been successful in persuading the council administration that given the very exceptional circumstances, some of the money for the marina should be transferred to the AWP.

The Campbeltown Project Board today agreed this recommendation, which will go to the main Project Board and the Executive Committee on Thursday.

Increase in price paid to milk producers

FIRST Milk is keeping price momentum going with the news that from April 1 it will increase the standard litre price it pays to producers in its liquid pool by 1.2 ppl to 26.2ppl.

From the same date it will boost the price it pays to producers in its cheese and balancing pools by 1ppl to 25.52ppl.

These increases include a 0.5ppl production bonus.

The production bonus is a simple monthly calculation and will be paid on all litres if the volume produced in the month is higher than the same month in the previous

'These moves mean that in 2011 alone, we have lifted the liquid pool price by 2.57ppl and the cheese and balancing price by 2.25ppl as a result of negotiating increases from our customers and continuing to run our own business more effectively,' said Bill Mustoe, chairman of First Milk.

'In recognition of the leap in farm input costs and the strength of alternative markets for milk, we are maintaining price pressure on all our customers to enable us to pay a sustainable return to our members.'

European ruling could spell disaster for bracken control

THE ability of Scottish farmers to prevent bracken from encroaching on hill pastures is under threat with the key product used to control it possibly being banned in two weeks.

There is a very real possibility that a European committee could ban the use of Asulam, marketed as Asulox, the primary chemical used to combat bracken in Scotland.

NFU Scotland is deeply alarmed and views the continued use of Asulox as vital to keeping many of Scotland's hills and uplands in a grazeable condition. Its loss could be an environmental disaster in terms of uncontrollable bracken

'There is nothing else to keep bracken back apart from a massive amount of manual labour cows,' said Duncan Macalister of Glenbarr Farm; and both of these are impracticable.

'Part of our cross compliancy for subsidies is to keep bracken under control.'

The NFUS has lobbied Scottish MEPs to speak to their colleagues in other member states, as although bracken may not be an issue in their own coun-

or hundred and hundreds of tries, representatives from their countries will nevertheless be involved in making the decision on whether to licence Asulox for its control.

> NFU Scotland Vice-President, John Picken, said: 'Such is the importance of Asulox to Scottish hill farmers that we are throwing every resource into seeking its continued use in controlling bracken.'



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

Entries sought for the ultimate test of stamina

ENTRIES are now open for 'Scotland's friendliest trail-run' along the length of Kintyre.

The Kintyre Way Relay, which takes place on Saturday May 7, along the Kintyre Way from Tarbert to Campbeltown is making a name for itself in the running world.

The annual event is known for its warm welcome and tasty home baking at checkpoints in Clachan, Tayinloan and Carradale as well as the 'Runners Revels' ceilidh in the evening.

It is really two events in one: the ultra-marathon race along the full 66 miles of paths and forestry tracks; and the relay race where teams of up to six runners share out the same overall distance.

The relay record, at 8 hours 38 minutes, was set by a team from Dumfries Running Club in 2010, but there are high hopes that this year will see the record broken by a team from Campbeltown Running Club on its home ground.

The individual record for the 66 miles was set by Lucy Colquhoun from Edinburgh in 2008 (11 hours 1 minute)

with the male record (11 hours 53 minutes) set by John Kennedy the same year.

An innovation this year will be a 'mix and match' get-together on the Friday evening in Tarbert.

In the past, some people who were keen to take part in the relay event found it difficult to persuade five other runners to make up a team, so this year entrants can sign up individually for a chosen distance (for example 15 miles), and then come along to the pre-race social evening on Friday, May 6, and

form on-the-spot relay teams with other unattached entrants.

The relay event is also a great opportunity for people who fancy trying their hand (or rather their feet!) at going beyond the standard marathon distance without being committed to the

40plus miles of most ultra runs, because a relay team of two can split the 66 miles into 31 and 35, with a handover at Tayinloan.

Or people who simply want a taste of trail running could enter a team of three doing an average of 22 miles each.

Race organiser Rob Reid said: 'It's amazing how trail-running has really taken off in the last few years.

'In the 90s, you either did half-marathons or hill races, and that was that.

'But runners who came for the Kintyre Way Relay last year obviously saw it as much more than just a running event, with many staying for the weekend and commenting on the stunning scenery and the friendly welcome both from local people and fellow-runners,' he added.

TRAINING schedules for week two for the Mull of Kintyre Run and 10k on May 30 are detailed.

These schedules are aimed at beginners who wish to complete the 10k event comfortably and a separate schedule for the half marathon.

The half marathon schedule is suitable for a beginner who aims to run a half marathon in just under 2hours 30minutes.

If you find the schedule difficult it may be better to adopt a more gradual one, or move onto the 10k one.

As a guide, 11minutes 20 seconds per mile pace will results in a 2h 28min half marathon.

All running should be at a steady, even pace, and you should consult your GP before embarking on any training schedule.
