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Seasports plan sails into view

TWO Campbeltown groups are sailing ahead with a plan that could breathe new life into an historic part of the town. Set to bring 'longterm benefit' to Dalintober, a former village steeped in history, the three-pronged plan to improve Dalintober Pier, once the site of a short ferry to Campbeltown itself, as well as Dalintober beach and Campbeltown Sailing Club, on nearby Low Askomil, was announced this week.

Dalintober Beach Regeneration Group and

Campbeltown Sailing Club, the two main groups behind the project, are working with several other parties to create a special facility called Kintyre Seasports.

Campbell Fox, commodore of Campbel-Sailing Club, town whose professional background is in project management, said: 'Our club is long established in Campbeltown, formed in 1958, but has had static membership for a number of years, so we wanted to create a development plan to at-

tract young people and broaden our family appeal, as well as offering a modern facility to take part from.

'At the same time, the Dalintober beach group were keen to make headway with their own plans for the area.

'After discussions between our two groups and South Kintyre councillors John Armour, Rory Colville and Donald Kelly, who all offered their full support, it quickly became clear that by working together and developing a plan we could achieve our objectives.

'The result is a plan for a Kintyre Seasports centre, offering opportunities for residents and visitors of all ability levels to enjoy water-based sports in a safe and organised environment. with a modern, multi-purpose building as a base.'

The Kintyre Seasports project aims, set out in a development plan, are; to establish a single organisation to include lead group Campbeltown Sailing Club's water sport partners and the wider Kintyre community; to increase local membership to 200;

Strike action will disrupt island ferries

CALEDONIAN MacBrayne (CalMac) ferry passengers face disruption next week due to industrial action by the RMT union.

The union claims that the Clyde and Hebrides service is being set up for takeover which could affect jobs, conditions and pensions.

RMT members will start an overtime and call-back ban, on Clyde and Hebridean services, from Wednesday, June 24 until 11.59pm on Thursday, June 25.

In addition, if a ship is in port, RMT members will be instructed not to book on for duty between one minute after midnight on Friday, June 26 and 11.59pm.

RMT members have voted by well over 90 per cent for action in a ballot that covers both strikes and action short of strikes.

RMT general secretary Mick Cash said: 'RMT members on CalMac rightly feel that they are caught in the crossfire of an unnecessary and damaging tendering battle that leaves jobs, conditions and pensions hanging by a thread. That is simply intolerable.'

'RMT wants cast iron assurances and we want them now. We are prepared to engage in talks around that agenda as we prepare for the first phase of industrial action.'

In a letter to the minister calling for the meeting, Mr MacNab said many fishing communities are 'deeply troubled' by the new MPA management measures.

Mr MacNab added that the meeting should be held in one of the coastal communities most affected by the measures,

so that the minister can hear for himself the concerns of fishermen and their families. Consultation

He said: 'We were in consultation with Marine Scotland to develop these MPAs and we thought we had a way forward.

'We appreciate that the marine area around Scotland is a common resource with many stakeholders, each hav-

ing their own right to comment and input. 'Fishermen are firsthand stakeholders and sustainable users and

guardians of the marine environment. 'Projects like the re-

cently celebrated Fishing for Litter scheme and the continuing efforts in conjunction with Marine Scotland to improve gear selectivity go some way to demonstrating our industry's

progressive commitment.

'Many industry representatives feel they positively and genuinely participated throughout the MPA consultation process in good faith.

'It would certainly have been possible for the fishing industry to lobby publicly against the management measures process earlier had we known the full extent of the outcome'.

CAMPBELTOWN fied in 1958, the clock town hall planners are seeking urgent help to get the building's iconic clock keeping time again.

At the heart of Campbeltown since the 18th century, the three-faced clock is on borrowed time and those behind the town hall's refurbishment are keen to get it back in working order. Eric Spence, of South Kintyre Development Trust (SKDT) and Campbeltown town hall project co-ordinator, said: 'The clock tower is synonymous with Campbeltown. Prior to its removal during the on-going building work, we intended to clean up the faces and refurbish the mechanism. Unfortunately, further investigations by professional clock engineers exposed a far worse condition than expected, meaning the additional costs will be difficult within our current budget.' Replaced and electriruns on a single motor with a chain pulley system to operate the faces, however, with that motor badly worn, the pulley system needs constant adjustment to ensure all three faces show the same time.

Mr Spence continued: 'The clock faces themselves are badly corroded.

'As well as this, the lighting system needs replacing.

'While we could clean up and reinstall the clock as it is until it stops altogether, or even remove it completely and block off the portals, we have a responsibility to future generations to retain a functioning clock tower for the benefit of Campbeltown and Kintyre residents, as well as visitors to the area. Ideally we would install a new motor, with spindles to each face, which update automatically during British Summer Time, Greenwich Me-

ridian Time or after a ed: 'We need to make power cut.

'We also aim to overhaul the clock faces and replace the lighting system with energy-efficient LEDs.'

SKDT is now urgently seeking additional fundraising or sponsorship to raise the necessary funds to renovate the clock. Mr Spence adda decision quickly so that the clock can be renewed and re-installed prior to the scaffolding being removed. This would avoid the cost of re-erecting the scaffolding. Our goal is to not only renovate the motor, clock faces and to hear the bell ring, but to re-establish the building and clock back to being the Campbeltown icons they once were - and can be again.'

Linda's haven of peace set to open every day

THINGS are looking rosier for a muchloved Campbeltown garden after regional bosses announced it would open seven days a week

The Linda McCartney Memorial Garden, based on Shore Street behind the Argyll and Bute Council-owned Burnet Building, was opened in 2002 as a tribute to the late animal rights activist and wife of former Beatle Paul McCartney. It will now be opened each day between 8.15am-4.15pm by council staff.

The peaceful spot, featuring a Bronze statue of Linda herself and information about her life and work, as well as

arrangements will, despite evening closure, be enjoyed for more hours overall.

Last month it was reported in the Courier how tourists had often been left disappointed by the garden's limited opening hours, which saw the attraction closed at weekends and on bank holidays.

Sean presents proficient pupils with their cycling certificates

TV weatherman, Sean Batty, began his coast to coast challenge cycling from Tarbert to Dunbar as part of the STV Children's appeal.

But before he set off, he presented pupils at Tarbert primary school with their iCycle cycling proficiency certificates.

Then the children and their cycle trainers from the school accompanied Sean on the first part of his journey.

The iCycle programme was developed by the road safety units of Argyll and Bute and North Ayrshire councils in consultation with end users - teachers and pupils - as a one-stop-shop resource, linked to the Curriculum for Excellence, for all their cycle training needs.

Sean said: 'I am excited to be visiting the school and am thrilled to be presenting the pupils with their iCycle certificates. 'Cycling is a perfect way to keep fit and it can take you all over the countryside so it's great to see the kids getting involved.'

Margaret McCulloch, primary 6/7 teacher and qualified iCycle trainer, said: 'This is a great programme which not only teaches the children basic cycle proficiency and road safety, but also has a direct link to the Curriculum for Excellence.

'This really helps children gain key road safety skills, become responsible road users and ultimately gain a degree of independence, travelling as independently as they can and applying their learning to real life situations.'

The programme is currently provided at 76 primary schools across Argyll and Bute and sees pupils trained for three weeks in the playground then, once they

have built skills and confidence, three weeks on the road.

TARBERT

There are three elements to the training - bike maintenance, theory and road work.

The council's road safety team trains the trainers – anyone from head teachers to janitors to ordinary parents or grandparents - and provides mentoring and support while they carry out the face-to-face training and final assessments with the children.

Across the area, both mainland and island, 95 per cent of those going through the programme receive on-road training, well above the national average of 38 per cent.

Parents from Helensburgh to Oban and all points in-between have reported that more children are cycling to school after iCycle training, up from under 30 per cent to more than 50 per cent.

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First cut of silage in Kintyre a bit late

A COLD May delayed the first cut of silage by about two weeks for one Kintyre farmer.

Dugald Young of Drum Farm, near Campbeltown, made his first cut last Sunday.

Mr Young said: 'Bulk wise it is pretty good but we will not know about the quality until later in the year when either a feed company or the Scottish Rural College (SRUC) do an analysis for protein and the dry matter, basically all the goodies in the feed.'

Scotland's Rural College has suggested that farmers whose first cut of silage is less than expected should consider ensiling draff, a valuable residue from the whiskymaking process, to boost winter feed supplies.

Although April was warm, May was cold and, so far, June has been unsettled. It means many livestock farmers have less grass than expected and lower yields of first cut silage.

According to nutritionist, Karen Stewart, from the Perth Office of SAC Consulting (part of SRUC) the silage pits on many farms will have less feed for the winter than normal. She said: 'Fortunately this coincides with a reasonably cheap and plentiful supply of draff with many loads currently going south of the border as far as the midlands. There is an opportunity for Scot-

tish farmers to use this

draff, or in some areas

brewer's grains from

beer-making, to help ensure they have sufficient feed available for next winter.'

Mr Young already supplements his feed with draff during the colder months.

He said: 'We get our draff from the Glen Scotia distillery in Campbeltown and currently are filling up the pit for the months when it is needed.'

Mrs Stewart added: 'Draff has a higher energy and crude protein than average silage.

'It will add nutritional value to winter feed supplies. Typically

ensiling draff in the summer offers a discount of £6-10 per ton versus buying in the winter on a 'ready to feed basis.'

McCallum, who achieved the rank of sergeant, made the ultimate sacrifice after less than a year of the conflict.


Mr Hooker said: 'My great uncle Alex served in Squadron 729, the 1st and 8th Battalion of the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. He was killed on June 15, 1915,

HOMAGE was paid to aged just 21. I wanted to remember him, and all those from Kintyre who fell in both world wars. 'I often visit Campbeltown but especially wanted to make sure the 100th anniversary of his death was properly remembered.

His loss was mourned in wartime, but it was also in the years of peace he was respected in Kintyre for his achievements as a footballer.


