New creamery, new Tesco

THE LARGEST ever Scottish government pay out to the dairy industry has been given to Kintyre to build a new Campbeltown Creamery.

The deal, with First Milk co-operative and Tesco has seen the world food giant buy

the site of the existing creamery to build a new store with petrol station; the creamery will relocate and up and running by the middle of 2011 and the old Tesco store will go on the open market.

The sale of the former whisky distillery to

Tesco, First Milk funds and up to £3.9 million from the Scottish Government will finance the new creamery.

This secures the future of the 42 dairy farms in Kintyre and Gigha which supply milk to the creamery, creating £11 million for the local

economy. It also secures more than 100 other jobs serving the creamery and farms - feed, haulage, maintenance and plant.

Announcement

As Richard Lochhead made the announcement on the steps of the creamery in front of the

farming community he said: 'Our largest-ever grant for a dairy company in Scotland proves that we are willing to turn words into action. I made it clear we are committed to doing all we can to support the Scottish Dairy sector.

'The Campbeltown

Creamery is a huge part of the social and economic fabric of Kintyre.'

Argyll and Bute Council has also given its backing to the plans.

'Argyll and Bute will do everything to assist in

Youth could end up severely injured or killed

'It's a life for a loser' - Sheriff

AN 18-YEAR-old sentenced to four months at a young offenders' institute was warned that he was either going to end up severely injured or killed if he did not change his way of life.

Sheriff Ruth Anderson QC was sitting at Campbeltown Sheriff Court on Thursday when she issued the warning to William Durnion and added that he also ran the risk of severely injuring or killing someone else.

'It's a life for a loser,' she told Durnion.

Durnion, who now lives in Wishaw had previously pled guilty to having a

sword with him on May 14 on Main Street, Campbeltown. Sentence had been deferred for reports.

His defence agent said Durnion was 'realistic' about the prospect of imprisonment.

Support

'You started off life with few advantages and I accept that you have had a pretty awful up bringing,' said Sheriff Anderson, 'but you are getting older and it is up to you to decide whether you take the support offered to see if you can make something of your life.'

Disqualified for 18 months

A SOUTHEND farm worker was disqualified from driving for 18 months after pleading guilty to driving in the centre of Campbeltown under the influence of alcohol.

Robert George Jones, aged 19, of 2 Lephensrath Bridge, admitted to driving along Main Street and Hall Street on April 12 of this year with 73 microgrammes of alcohol in 100 millilitres of breath.

Procurator fiscal Alistair McSporrán told Campbeltown Sheriff Court last week that police had seen Jones staggering about Main Street before the incident was reported. 'Witnesses had then seen him driving down Main Street and along Hall Street towards the ferry terminal at about midnight; they were alarmed and phoned the police,' he said. 'Police went to the area a short time later and met the car which was being driven at this point by his friend with Jones as a passenger.'

Defence agent Chris-

tian Kane said: 'He had been in Campbeltown drinking. He wasn't foolish enough to drive the Southend road; this was a grossly stupid act.'

Sheriff Ruth Anderson QC told the accused before also finding him £300: 'You Mr Jones, have a bad driving record. If you do not change your attitude you will get into serious trouble.'

Warned not to drink and drive

A BARMAID and a police officer both told an Islay man he was too drunk to drive, but he went ahead and did so, Campbeltown Sheriff Court heard on Thursday.

Donald Stephen McPherson, aged 38, whose address was given as c/o White Hart Hotel, Port Ellen, had admitted the offence which happened in Port Ellen on March 22 this year; he also pleaded guilty to failing to tell the police the identity of the person who had been driving a car.

Strictly for the birds

PLANS for a new house and garage at Portnahaven have had to have 'an appropriate assessment' under European legislation to see that no harm comes to wild birds.

The land, on a croft at 6 Church Street, Portnahaven, is within the Rinns of Islay Site of Special Scientific Interest and Special Protection Area.

The land is also within the boundary for development in Portnahaven laid down in the new local plan and as such planners recommended to councillors at the Mid Argyll Kintyre and Islands Area Committee that they approve the plans, which they did.

Hay fever!

As high as an elephant's eye – the grass needs cutting at the A83 Kilmory roundabout. 'I think TranServ are taking the **** but don't put that in the paper,' said one member of the area committee.

THE A83 at Kilmory looks more like a hay field than a roundabout and to add insult to injury it's 'the front door' of the Argyll and Bute Council head offices giving a less than flattering first impression.

Members of the Mid Argyll Kintyre and the Islands Area Committee have been told that the grass cutting here is the work of TranServ, which is in charge of

trunk road maintenance.

'It's nearly three feet tall, you can't see where cars are coming from,' said Councillor John Semple.

Budget

The 'de-littering' of trunk roads falls to the council, but TransServe cuts the grass.

Councillors were looking at the roads maintenance budget and the 'street scene' day-to-day

care of areas. The maintenance revenue budget for roads is nearly two-thirds short of what is needed according to the council's own asset management plan.

But by using some of the capital budget for reconstruction and resurfacing works the council can cut this shortfall to under a quarter.

The surface dressing of roads will increase this year in an attempt to

clear a backlog. While this does not strengthen the roads it does seal the surface and stop skidding.

But this does mean

that other parts of the roads budget are being cut back. Street scene – the planned programme of small jobs not taking more than four hours but

doing a great deal to keep the area looking smart - are also suffering.

'It's been a bit hit and miss in Minard,' said Councillor Alison Hay.

Holy ground safe from house plans

HOLY ground will not be disturbed by plans for a new house near Tayinloan.

Council officers gave this reassurance when plans for a house and new access at Achnafad, Ballochroy, near Tayinloan, were discussed and approved by councillors at the Mid Argyll Kintyre and the Islands Area Committee.

Letters of objection said the site lies too close to the historic 13th century township of Kilmichael which has a listed burial ground and would run the risk of disturbing graves in sanctified ground and ancient archaeological remains in one of Argyll's important historical settlements.

But both the West of Scotland Archaeological Service and Historic Scotland have seen the plans and raised no objections.

Tories call for more action on A83

JAMIE McGrigor, Highlands and Islands MSP, and Kintyre Councillor Donald Kelly have called for more action to improve the A83.

The pair say they are continually being contacted by people complaining about the road and have called on TranServ and Argyll and Bute Council to step up their efforts.

'While TranServ Scotland have completed repairs on some stretches of the road, constituents and businesses who use the road regularly con-

tinue to contact me and express their concerns at the potholes and rough surfaces on large parts of the A83, conditions that have led to expensive damage to many vehicles, said Donald Kelly. Jamie McGrigor MSP, has been told by Transport Scotland that it hoped to remove the traffic lights on the A83 at the Rest and Be Thankful in spring 2010 said: 'Concerns have been raised with myself and Donald Kelly about the state of the Kennacraig-Campbeltown section of

the A83 which is the responsibility of Argyll and Bute Council and I share my constituents' worries. 'At some sections of the road drivers virtually have to drive in the middle to avoid the rough

surfaces and pot holes at the sides. While I am very conscious of the pressure on local authority funding, Argyll and Bute Council needs to treat this as a matter of the utmost priority.'

Crossroads AGM

CROSSROADS Dalriada and the Isles held their annual general meeting in Whitehouse Village Hall last Wednesday (June 24).

A cross section of people attended with most interested in a talk from David Hanley from Argyll and Bute Council's Quality Assurance Department.

The main theme to come out of the AGM was the lack of communication between the council and local carers and organisations and the booking system for Fyne View.

Homestart volunteers

VOLUNTEERS from Mid Argyll, Jura, Islay and Kintyre Homestart presented councillors with a 'cheque' at their meeting on Islay on Tuesday.

Karen and Annabelle handed over the sum of £5,000 which they said represented the amount of cash that Homestart volunteers have contributed in kind to Argyll and Bute Council on Islay and Jura in the last financial year.

'It represents the work of five volunteers providing an average of two hours a week of family support work,' said Karen.

Experiences

Annabelle told the councillors that she became a Homestart volunteer after her own experiences when she was a young mum.

'I was very isolated; my nearest neighbours were seven miles away,' she said.

Ardfern nearly out of land

ARDFERN is nearly out of land for new housing, councillors have been told. The councillors have granted permission for 17 new homes with access and their own sewage treatment plant on Lunga Estate land, between Collaig and Soroba, at Ardfern. 'There is no other housing land left for Ardfern,' an officer told the meeting of Mid Argyll, Kintyre and the Islands Area committee.

This site and land adjoining could create space for up to 30 new homes. The 17 will comprise five two-bedroomed houses; 11 three-bedroomed houses and one larger one with five bedrooms. The two-bedroomed hous-

es 'resemble the modern equivalent of a croft house', councillors were told.

Five of the new properties will be available for rent under the Scottish Government rural homes for rent scheme.

The new sewage system is needed because the village septic tank scheme cannot take any more. 'There have been no objections from Ardfern,' said a planning officer. 'Probably a first for Ardfern,' muttered one councillor under their breath.

Councillor Alison Hay said that the new houses would have children there and she added: 'I would like to see a footpath down to the primary school.'

Second World War building can be demolished

A 'TEMPORARY' building from just after the Second World War can be demolished and a new home can be put in its place, councillors have ruled.

Mid Argyll Kintyre, and the Islands Area Committee met on Islay and amongst the planning applications was a move to demolish the old shop at 146

Frederick Crescent, Port Ellen, and build a new house in its place on the shoreside. Because of its location the councillors not only granted planning permission but had to refer the matter to Historic Scotland with a recommendation that 'conservation area consent' be granted.

The proposal is to replace the derelict old

building which is in a prominent spot on the waterfront.

Councillor Robin Currie said he agreed with demolition but didn't agree with rebuilding; the new home has had to comply with flood risk legislation and has had to be raised higher than the original building but other members agreed with the idea.

Royal Highland Show 09

KINTYRE and Mid Argyll caught the eye of the judges at the Royal Highland Show with some impressive showings in dairy and horses and even the cheese came home with a prize.

In the dairy section there was a host of awards for the Ayrshire herd of J&M Barr, Clochkeil Farm, Camp-

beltown who lifted a first place with Calderglen Rene by Sanderson Last Talisman and out of Calderglen Jerry, and there were second place tickets for Calderglen Martha and Calderglen Patricia, with a fourth place for Calderglen Rowan, another by Sanderson Last Talisman, this time out of Calderglen Megan2.

Amongst the heavy horses, David MacPhail Jnr of Campbeltown with the stylish eight-year bay roan Clydesdale mare Oswald Highland Nancy by Dillars leader out of Fieldhead Lady Jane, and her foal at foot by Glenside Master Tom, took first place in their opening class, while veteran Highland Show campaigners McFadyen Contractors, Campbeltown took their yearling colt Whinhill Clansman by Collesie Whinhill President out of Millhouse Miss Ellie to a second place. Amid a host of lighter horse entries, there was a first and second for a yearling coloured colt called Honeypot Solo from the yard of Fiona Wilson, Minard, who also took their three-year old coloured stallion Colourville Tyson to second place from a class of 23 – quite a feat for Fiona's partner Robert who only started showing horses in the last two months.

Campbeltown Creamery is celebrating a gold award for its Mull of Kintyre cheddar.

The creamery won the top prize in the 'speciality flavour added' category with the smoked cheddar truckle. The Campbeltown team also scooped silver at the show.

Creamery manager, Chris Wareham, said his team was absolutely delighted at the success. The Campbeltown Creamery, which employs 32 staff, with 41 producers in Kintyre and the Isle of Gigha. The creamery also supplies a number of the key retailers in the UK with private label cheese.

'Regional provenance is important to consumers who want to know where their cheese is coming from – and that they are also supporting local farmers,' said Mr Wareham.

Buying the Mull of Kintyre brand means that consumers can trust that the milk is local and the cheese is guaranteed

to be 100 per cent Scottish.'

Among the prize tickets this year were J and J MacPherson, Ballicmeanoch, Dalmally with a Blackface tup lamb which was judged second in class; there was also a second place for young Tíree crofter Iain MacInnes, Ruaig with his recently calved British Blue cow Ridge Dean Valletta. Becoming a Highland Show regular, Iain also appeared this year in the Simmental ring with his two-year old heifer Strathisla Venus's Haka. Also in the beef cattle showing was Islayman Gilbert McNab who took J R Galloway, Cardona, Doune's yearling Aberdeen Angus bull Cardona Eagle by Bleack Blacksmith to a first place in a very competitive class.

Away from the showing Susan Ralston picked up first prize in the associate members section for the photography competition. Susan had to collate six photographs which kept to the theme of celebration.

Secret sub runs into trouble off Kintyre

Built by Vickers of Barrow-in-Furnace, the vessel had been undergoing trials in the deep waters around Campbeltown for over three weeks.

According to locals the submarine reportedly sank to the bottom, remaining there for almost three hours before eventually re-emerging stern up.

Said local councillor Mr George MacMillan: 'I understand there was quite a bit of a flap on.'

While refusing to confirm this version of events, a spokesman for the Navy admitted that a problem had occurred under water but insisted that there had been no danger.



What makes the village special for you?

'It is the peace and quiet of the place and the house. The family belong here. I still have one aunt left on the Mitchell side and our grandparents were here. Grandfather Mitchell was the roadman, he worked on the road.'

How would you describe the village to someone who has never been there?

'It's a nice place to come for a holiday with a good safe beach for

swimming; other places on the west of Kintyre have shelving beaches but not here; it goes out a long way.'

Roy added: 'We have a very good shop in the village. In days gone by there used to be a post office which was down the side of the village in a garden shed. Tourists used to take photographs of it all the time.'

Do you have a favourite place in the village?

It has to be the beach! And there is a nice walk on the hill away above

EVER since Muasdale Cottages were built in the post war housing boom the Mitchell family has lived there – at one time all 11 brothers and sisters with their parents.

The oldest of the Mitchell children, Roy, tells us what his home means to him.

Roy, now aged 61 lives at 10 Muasdale Cottages along with brothers David, 57, and Donald, 53. They are three of the 11 children raised by parents Jean and John in the house – six girls and five boys all told.

'We all lived in this house at the same time at one stage,' said Roy.

the village but I'd probably say the beach.

'You look out of our front window and the view is never the same twice.'

How much has it changed since you were a child/arrived?

'The biggest difference is the road and the amount of traffic and there are more houses in the village – more are being built on either side of the village.'

When you have the weather there is no better place than Muasdale, Roy believes.

'As I remember when we were young the weather was far better then! It was that hot the

tar on the road would melt.

'We spent all summer outside. There was not the traffic on the road then, you just opened the door and crossed the road onto the beach. You spent all summer on the beach.'

'In those days the village was full of kids to play with - there was a dose of them in this house itself!'

The coast itself has changed with time, Roy said.

'The sea does not come in as far as it used to; it used to come right up onto the road sometimes.'

'I remember as a small


child a light ship broke away from southern Islay, off Otter Rock, and drifted in here and came up right in front of the village. The light was still flashing. It was pretty frightening for a kid! It was cut up for scrap but there are still bits of steel still there to this day.'

Muasdale used to boast a number of lobster fishing boats in the past, the beach lending itself to small boats.

Roy said: 'The fishermen were real characters, like Neil Thomson, Duncan Graham and Nicol Cameron. There was a lot of lobster fishing in the 1950s and

right up into the 70s and 80s. The bigger boats moored out and the smaller ones used to come right up onto the beach. They used to have an old mangle which they used to wind them up onto the shore.

The lobsters used to go away on the old BRS 'trunk' lorry in the evening to get put on the overnight train in Glasgow for London.

Is there a time of year when you just want to be there?

'My favourite time has to be the spring time, it's a time when everything starts to grow and you hear the dawn chorus and the days are getting longer.'

'Muasdale is a wonderful place to watch the seasons changing, and

plot the course of the sun and the stars.

'As you watch the sun setting each night it travels further and once it goes down behind the house in the middle of the island of Cara it starts to go on its way back again.'

Were you born there?

'Ten of us were born at home!'

Do you have a favourite building?

'It has to be home! There are three of us still here.'

Is there anyone famous from your village?

'Well my aunty said to tell you she once won a medal at the Mod in the 1960s and my niece Fiona is a very talented prize winning solo piper.'

Mike O'Driscoll, Managing Director, Jaguar Cars, said: "The essence of the Festival is speed, making it the perfect venue for fielding Jaguar's fastest car ever – the record-breaking XFR Prototype.

"The XKR 'Goodwood Special' has been developed as a one-off to explore the harder

side of the XKR's character and allow our engineering team to explore some performance boundaries. The Festival of Speed gives us the opportunity to have fun in a high performance car without all the practical and legal requirements of driving on the road getting in the way!

"These stunning modern Jaguars will be accompanied by a terrific selection of our 'fastest' and most significant historic vehicles."

In keeping with this year's endurance theme, Jaguar's illustrious heritage will be represented on 'The Hill' in the form of Le Mans winners – the D-type and the C-type. Jaguar will also field the unique XJ13 a car designed for endurance racing in the 1960s but which never competed – yet is still considered by many to be one of the most beautiful racing cars of all time.

Long Nose D-TYPE returns to The Hill The 1957 Le Mans winning long-nose D-

type will roar its way up the hallowed hill climb once again. Duncan Hamilton won the Reims 12-hour race in this car in 1956 along with Ivor Bueb and that same year, Mike Hawthorn entered the 1956 24-hour race at Le Mans with Bueb, finishing sixth. Hawthorn and Bueb drove this car again in 1957 at Sebring, finishing third.

First victory for Jaguar at Le Mans 24-hour race – Jaguar C-TYPE The C-type brought Jaguar its first victory in the Le Mans 24-hour race. Once the XK120 had finished twelfth in the 1950 Le Mans, demonstrating its abilities in racing, it was clear Jaguar had the makings of a world-beater spurred on chief engineer William Heynes to create a competition version for Le Mans – the C-type.

The only one in the world – Jaguar XJ13 The XJ13 is one of the most beautiful racing cars of all time, thanks to the extraordinary work of aerodynamicist Malcolm Sayer. Although the XJ13 was

built as a potential Le Mans contender, it never competed in a race due to various business reasons but the potential of this unique 502bhp, 5-litre V12 engine was never doubted.

Bonneville XFR Running with minor aerodynamic and safety modifications to meet the requirements for a Bonneville run, the 225mph top speed was achieved with additional horsepower liberated by a remapped ECU, a modified air intake and exhaust system and revised supercharger settings. No internal engine components were changed and the six-speed automatic transmission was standard, including the gear ratios. Paul's link with Jaguar comes from his success with the XKR in the American Trans Am Series – he has achieved five series victories between 2001 and 2006.






