Ambulances had to come from Tarbert, Lochgilphead and on one occasion, Oban

cover for Kintyre have led to Scottish Ambulance Service saying it will publish details of response times.

The Courier contacted the service after a number of people spoke to the paper saying they had had to wait for ambulances to come from as far away as Tarbert, Lochgilphead an on one occasion, Oban - a journey of two hours.

Patients and Campbeltown-based ambulance staff are reluctant to go on the record – but *The* Courier put their concerns to the Scottish Ambulance Service.

One man, whose mother had to wait 50 minutes for an ambulance said: 'It had to come

FEARS over ambulance from Tarbert and took 50 minutes.'

> Spokesman for Scottish Ambulance Services John Morton, said that cover has come from Tarbert, Lochgilphead and Oban but added: 'If it was a life threatening emergency we would use the helicopter; if it is life threatening we have other resources to get to a patient.'

> He added that if resources are tied up and the call for an ambulance is not very serious the service might prioritise and take slightly

> As part of their remit ambulance staff can 'self-fatigue', that is sign themselves off if they have been called **Continued on Page 2**

Kintyre School pipe bands 'will rise again'

BOTH of Kintyre Schools Pipe Bands were well placed and got into the prizes at the World Pipe Band Championships on Saturday in Glasgow, even though neither managed to achieve top spot.

At the end of a long day, Kintyre's Juvenile Band was awarded fifth place in its Grade and the Novice Band was placed sixth in its grade. Both bands put in solid performances, but didn't manage to do quite enough to impress the judges on the day.

'The Kintyre Bands, though a little disappointed right now, will rise again and set their sights high for 2010,' said Robert Ferguson.

In the meantime, Kintyre's hearty congratulations go out to George Watson's College Pipe Band from Edinburgh on achieving an impressive double in becoming World Champions for 2009 at both Juvenile and Novice Grades.

Hospital standards now high

Improvements in hand hygiene sees hospital score leap to 98 per cent

STAFF at Campbeltown Hospital have drastically improved their hand washing record, after being found well below average in a Health Protection Scotland study.

In May, just three out of four staff observed met the health board's hand hygiene standards, far below other hospitals surveyed. By July, though, the figure had leapt to 98 per cent after posters were put up and staff informed.

Donnie Cameron, hospital manager, said the hospital's results were brought down by one department, which was not up to scratch, though he declined to publicly name it.

Technique

He added that the staff had been using the wrong technique rather than failing to wash their hands at all.

Mr Cameron said hand hygiene was a priority for the hospital: 'Cleanliness and hand hygiene obviously are very high on our agenda and we are keeping an eye on it very closely. I think generally the standards of cleanliness in Campbeltown hospital are very high and this was just an unfortunate blip.

He added that information on how each ward was performing has gone on display, so the public can see the improvement.

The hand hygiene audits began in 2007 and Pat Tyrrell, lead nurse

for Argyll and Bute, said and at the same time tarthey had added their own tests to drive up standards.

She added: 'Argyll and Bute Community Health Partnership takes these audits very seriously and we are continually looking at ways of increasing our compliance rates

NHS Highland agreed a policy on hand washing in June 2009 and is currently working on an action plan to tackle infections picked up in hospital.

The teams lowered two vets into the gully before members of Oban Mountain Rescue abseiled down before using a special system to pull it out of the gully.

CalMac ferry to the rescue A BOAT which broke its mooring in West Loch Tarbert and began drift-

ing out to sea was rescued by the quick-thinking crew of CalMac's Islay ferry.

The small yacht Breeze broke free during stormy weather on Saturday night and was found on Sunday morning.

But as the boat's owners, Jane and Angus Stewart, began hunting for their 14ft yacht, the crew of the Isle of Arran were towing it safely back to Kennacraig.

The ferry was on route

to Islay at 9am when the Coastguard issued an alert.

Skipper Roddy MacLeod and his crew then deployed the Fast Rescue Craft to bring the boat to safety.

Susan Robb, port assistant at Kennacraig, said: 'The crew of the *Isle of Arran* really went above the call of duty. They were heading to Islay at the time so it put the ferry back by around an hour. I got a couple of phone calls on Sunday morning from bewildered folk asking why the ferry was going in and out but at least it all turned out fine.'

The yacht's owner, Jane, said: 'My husband had checked the boat late on Saturday night and although it was pretty stormy it seemed

Jane added: 'We would like to thank Skipper Roddy MacLeod, Vineet Muley, the second mate, as well as Ian MacGilvary, Duncan McSporran, Susan Robb and Colin Duncan for the parts they played in the rescue.'



Funds for **Tarbert** not Tarbet

A SCOTTISH government press release created confusion last week over where £1millon in re-generation funds destined for an Argyll and Bute village would be spent.

The village of Tarbet on the shores of Loch Lomond was disappointed to learn it would not be receiving money to regenerate a play park, despite being included in the government's initial list.

Instead the money was bound for Tarbert, Loch Fyne, some 60 miles away. The mistake was later corrected on the Scottish government's website.

Man fined while on bail


A TARBERT fisherman landed himself a £450 fine after admitting a breach of the peace while on bail.



The public is being asking to avoid the Esplanade and town centre with their cars during the festival's Homecoming Grand Parade between 12noon and 1pm on Saturday.


