Glasgow doctor fined for Tarbert school bus smash

A junior doctor who caused a school bus to veer off the road down a steep embankment has been fined.

Graham Stewart Walker, 27, of 34 Riverside Road, driving a Eaglesham, sporty hatchback, was travelling from Mid Argyll Community Hospital, where he worked at the time, to a clinic in Campbeltown when his car collided with the bus on the A83 at Inverneil.

The bus driver saw Walker's car in his lane, but could not avoid him. The car smashed into the bus, damaging its steering and causing it to veer off the road.

Guilty

At Campbeltown Sheriff Court he pleaded guilty to a charge of driving carelessly on May 15 at 9am, by failing to keep a proper look out and failing to keep the car under proper control.

Procurator fiscal depute Eoin McGinty told the court that the section of road where the crash occurred was notorious for its series of bends and it was when exiting one of the bends that

Town is not a homeless dumping

Argyll and Bute Council has quashed suggestions that it is using Campbeltown as a 'dumping ground' for homeless people. A 'very

concerned' Campbeltown resident contacted the Courier after noticing that the only telephone number on the council website's 'contact us' section with a Campbeltown area code is the one attributed to 'homelessness'.

There are 19 landline telephone numbers listed, with everything from benefits, pest control

and planning to council tax, roads and social care, and all the rest have a Mid Argyll 01546 code.

The man, who did not want to be named, said: 'I was on the council's website looking for another contact number and I happened to notice that the only one with a Campbeltown code is homelessness.

'It is very concerning if this is the area that the council has designated to accommodate all of the area's homeless people. "The council's headquar-

ters are at Kilmory, in Lochgilphead, so why are all calls not passed through head office first?'

Another concerned Kintyre resident approached West Kintyre Community Council with similar fears that the area is being targeted as a place to house homeless people.

MSP investigates NHS Highland bullying claims

Bullying and intimidation allegations concerning NHS Highland have surfaced in a letter sent to a daily paper by

a group of doctors.

The doctors from the Riverside Medical Practice in Ness Walk, Inverness, have claimed there is a culture of bullying at the health board, which runs all hospital services in Argyll and Bute.

Scottish Labour's shadow health minister David Stewart said: 'I am extremely concerned and will be calling for a full and frank independent investigation into these allegations, carried out by senior staff from another health authority.

'I will also be asking for an urgent meeting with Elaine Mead and David Alston as these claims are unprecedented in my experience of NHS Highland.

'I will contact the Scottish Health Secretary to see what action she plans to take.

'Bullying and intimidation have no place in our health service.

'The public expect transparency and honesty from their health boards.'

The 40,350-gross tonnes ship, commissioned in 2014 and delivered to its owners in April, measures 210m by 28m and is on a 16-day circumnavigation of the United Kingdom on its Jewels of the National Trust cruise.

One disgruntled hotel owner's letter stated: 'We had a Canadian family staying with us, and they were asked if they had enjoyed it.

'They said the disturbance from about 1.30am onwards was 'like a revolution' - they could not believe what was happening.

'This was one of hundreds of weekends that have been ruined, and thousands of pounds must have been lost just because people will not return.

'The only way we could sell weekend breaks would be to advertise them as Wild West

Weekends. The situation is rapidly declining, and if action is not taken, all business will suffer.'

One Main Street resident, who also contacted the crime prevention panel, wrote: 'There is a lot of trouble and many fights, and even double glazing does not keep out the beat of the music.'

Glasgow firm gets advance factory

A Glasgow firm has been granted the tenancy of the advance factory in Campbeltown and it hopes eventually to employ about 150 workers. It is Afocal Optical Works, Ltd, of West Nile Street, which recently set up a small factory at Northbay in Barra where it started off making spectacle frames with seven employees and now has 20 on its payroll.

In Campbeltown, it hopes to start off with about 20 men and 40 women and over a period of five years, it expects to build up the labour force to its maximum for the present factory.

In the advance factory, Afocal is to extend its optical components field to include special lens-making and plastic injection moulding.

The firm has been assisted in its plans to set up in Campbeltown by the Highlands and Islands Development Board.

A spokesperson for the board said recruitment was expected to start in December and maybe earlier for key personnel.

Production was expected to start early next

year. Work on fitting out the factory is to start immediately and should be finished late in November.

ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO Saturday September 28, 1918

Our blinded service men

In aid of St Dunstan's Institute for Blinded Soldiers and Sailors naval sports were held in the Showfield on Saturday, 14th inst.

The day was not of the best description for an outdoor fete, the morning being wet and unpromising; but fortunately the weather improved sufficiently to allow of the events taking place under dry overhead conditions, albeit the afternoon was raw and cold.

An attractive programme had been arranged, embracing 24 events and had included all the popular features of an athletic gathering, and several items of a novel and highly-amusing order.

The prize-list shows that 22 of the catalogued events were pulled off.

There was a fairly large attendance of the public but the climatic conditions no doubt militated against the sports in this connection and kept many from being present who would have been on the field had the day been more genial.

The events were all timed to start at stated intervals, and from the outset to finish, everything proceeded with that precision and celerity that is characteristic of naval control; and the thoroughness of preparation and performance were also such as the 'handy men' of the Navy always exhibit.

Of the players pictured, he said: 'Four of them are no longer with us but the rest are hale and hearty - just getting old!'

Mr McMillan, who would have been aged 24 at the time, is on the back left of the photograph.

Beside him on the back row are: Alex Brown, Charlie McMillan, Hamish Paterson, Robbie Scott and Robert Lang.

On the front row, from left, are: Archie Clark, Archie Greenlees, William Craig, William Kelly and Bruce McMurchy.

Mr McMillan, of Crosshill Avenue, Campbeltown, lived in Drumlemble at the time. He said: 'The photograph would either have been taken by Betty MacVicar or her pal Irene Munroe who were always about with their cameras.

'There was a summer league and it would have been taken at one of the matches, probably at Kinloch Green.

'Some of the boys were only 15 or 16 and still in school.

Three years

'Drumlemble AFC only lasted about three years. We had to come into Campbeltown to get a couple of boys to make up the team – there weren't that many out in Drumlemble.'

Mr McMillan played on the miners' football team after Drumlemble AFC broke up, and then with Southend.

He added: 'We weren't any good, right enough, but it was good fun!'

There was a lot of interest in the Down Memory Lane article two weeks ago (September 7) on Campbeltown pupils' perfect attendance more than 100 years ago.

Ian Lindsay, 69, of Cambuslang, who supplied the photographs which accompanied the article, told the Courier that he was lucky to be alive to share the information after a Second World War bomb almost killed his parents before he was born.

Mr Lindsay said: 'My mother's uncle was Archie Stewart of Stewart Balfour and Sutherland. He was the fiscal when she was about 20 years of age and she used to drive him in a motor car, and I think there were very few of them in those days, up to Lochgilphead on business.

'The story goes that neither I nor my brother or sister would be here to tell the tale had it not been that my parents had been late for tea at my uncle Archie's, whose home was out at the end of Low Askomil.

'It was bombed by the Germans and he was killed. Had they been there, they would have been killed as well as it was a direct hit.

'Anytime I walk Low Askomil, I think thank goodness they were late.'

Mr Lindsay inherited the photographs showing pupils, of either Dalintober Primary School or Campbeltown Grammar School, with 100 per cent school attendance from his mother's side of the family.



'Who would think that 210


years later sea cadets would be learning navigation, meteorology and getting RYA qualifications up to sailing instructor and day skipper.'





Roberts 'wakened' each person who had been under his influence and promised them that they would feel like they had had 12 hours' sleep.


When he asked each of them if they had been hypnotised, or if it was even possible, they all firmly stated: 'No.'



Stolen tractors used as criminal currency

Farmers are being warned to ramp up security as demand for agricultural machinery is increasing from criminals across the world.

Speaking ahead of a rural crime event in Ayrshire on October 5, Robbie Wallace, NFU from Mutual's Kilmarnock agency, said: 'Through NFU Mutual's work to combat agri-vehicle crime, we know that tractors, telehandlers and quads are currently in high demand from organised crime networks.

They are using stolen goods as a form of currency following tougher money laundering legislation.'

The Tackling Rural Crime Together - Back to Basics event, which has been organised by NFU Scotland at Dumfries House, will include presentation from NFU Mutual's Kilmarnock office on rural crime trends and agricultural-vehicle theft.

As the main insurer of Scotland's countryside, NFU Mutual is part of the Scottish Partnership Against Rural Crime (SPARC) and has invested more than £135,000 to fund the scheme.

Tractor, telehandler and quad theft costs in Scotland have fallen by almost half in the three years since NFU Mutual, Police Scotland and other partners including NFU Scotland joined forces to tackle farm machinery theft.

However, Robbie Wallace said it was no time for complacency. He added: 'Farm vehicle

theft is big business for the organised gangs who are stealing expensive vehicles and farm equipment and either cloning it for sale here, or shipping it across the world.

'A new breed of brazen and determined thieves is using a combination of brute force and technological knowhow to target the countryside.'

NFU Mutual works closely with the National Vehicle Crime Intelligence Service (NaVCIS), the Plant and Agricultural National Intelligence Unit (PANIU) and the police to trace stolen tractors, which have been found in the UK, Europe and as far afield as Africa and the Far East.

Two of the most recent vehicles to be repatriated, to Scotland, by NFU Mutual were a Manitou telehandler and a John Deere tractor worth £96,000, which were seized in Eastern Europe following a coordinated operation.

Despite being given fake identities, the vehicle details were circulated through the police and specialist theft registers which led to their detection and recovery in Lithuania.

As well as offering workshops on how to protect vehicles and property, the

event will include sessions on cybercrime, avoiding commonplace scams and what to do if wildlife crime is witness ed on the farm.

Encouraging all members to register and attend by calling 0131 472 4000, regional manager Christine Cuthbertson said: 'Thieves and scammers are becoming increasingly devious when it comes targeting farm and rural businesses.

'A recent cybercrime incident in the region robbed one farmer of thousands and this incident must serve as a sharp reminder to all to be alert at all times

'Whether it is your bank account, your property or your pick-up, the event at Dumfries House will offer back-to-basics guidance on how to protect what is yours.'

Chief Superintendent John McKenzie, chairman of SPARC, said: 'Across Scotland, rural partners and police have worked extremely hard and the continued downward trend of crime figures in rural communities is linked to this approach.

'The close working with partner organisations means that we can quickly respond to emerging trends and crime hot spots and target those who pursue criminal activity.'





Last weekend the Baxters group chief accountant was counting her luck after surviving storm Ali although that day, which finished in Dumfries, was cut short at 49 miles, meaning distance had to be made up on
