Recycling workers in danger

RECYCLING has boomed in Kintyre since three-weekly bin collections began.

However, as people race to recycle, the workers processing the material, many of whom are disabled, are finding increased amounts of food waste and smashed glass mixed in with regular items.

Amanda Card, the boss of Kintyre Recycling Limited (KRL), speaking to the *Courier* on Wednesday, said that before the three-weekly collections started on October 3, recycling was sitting around 35 per cent but has now virtually doubled.

Ms Card said: 'There has been a major increase among our regular customers and we have seen a large number of new customers. We anticipated the rise and had a new baler in place.'

'KRL has new processing and sorting methods and this week has employed two more staff on 15-month placements who previously had some form of barrier to work.'

'This is very positive for our future but there are challenging aspects as we are receiving lots of non-

recyclable items which are disgusting to sort and plastic we cannot recycle.

'Also, from a sanitary and health and safety viewpoint, we need to stop it.'

The social enterprise collects recycling in clear plastic bags which are left outside properties on the uplift days.

One bag is for wet items such as plastic bottles, tubs, trays, yoghurt pots and drinks cans, while the other is for dry items such as newspapers, clothes, card and textiles.

Workers have been finding items in the bags such as food tubs still partly full in a stinking mess.

In addition, some customers have put bottles in the bags which smash when the bags are thrown off the lorry resulting in glass fragments being mixed in the recycling items.

There are leaflets explaining the items which can be recycled.

The charity, with partners South Kintyre Development Trust, Zero Waste Heroes and Argyll and Bute Council, will hold a session open to all on recycling at Campbeltown Town Hall on Thursday November 24 from 2pm to 6pm.

The ignorance about recycling has been highlighted by a woman who told the *Courier* a neighbour had said: 'Recycling is a waste of time as everything goes to the same place,' unaware that Kintyre recycles, due to the sorting method, is of the highest quality and commands the best prices at Highlander in Glasgow.

At Campbeltown Commu-

nity Council on Tuesday, members expressed concern about food waste, particularly as Argyll and Bute residents living in Helensburgh have dedicated collections.

Council member Catherine Dobbie said: 'I would like something done about food waste.'

'Everyone in Campbeltown has the same rights as Helensburgh so we are sec-

ond rate citizens paying the same council tax.'

Councillor John Armour told of already seeing the plastic recycling bags blowing across the road in Drumlemble and said something should be done to stop that happening.'

KRL will be on Campbeltown Esplanade from 10am to 1pm next Monday to collect clothes and textiles.

Police officer slams TV story of station closure

KINTYRE'S most senior police officer has claimed recent media reports of the Campbeltown station closure are a work of fiction.

Addressing Campbeltown Community Council on Tuesday night, Chief Inspector Marlene Baillie clarified a number of Kintyre police stations are currently under review but not necessarily under threat of closure, as reported.

Reports of 58 police buildings being under threat across Scotland

surfaced last week and among those listed, five were in Argyll, including Campbeltown.

CI Baillie explained the review process has been ongoing for a number of years and, specifically in Campbeltown, involves looking at ways in which space in the police station can be used more efficiently.

She said: 'There are some premises within

the area that we would want to retain, such as Campbeltown police office, but it is clear some buildings are not being used to their potential.'

Stating the police station at Campbeltown was purpose-built for modern policing, she explained they are not currently using all the space available.

As part of the review process, discussions

are ongoing with other blue-light services in the area regarding co-location. Highlands and Islands MSP John Finnie, justice spokesman for the Scottish Greens, shared the concern of locals, stating: 'While there is much

to be said for co-location of public services, we must prevent withdrawal from communities.'

Ms Bailey reassured: 'We are committed to maintaining a presence within local communities across Argyll.'

Cross party bid to save Auchinlee Care Home

ALL Campbeltown councillors are united in a bid to save Auchinlee Care Home from closure when its operator CrossReach withdraws.

As reported last week, its operators are losing vast sums of money because the home is operating below capacity.

Councillor John Armour told a meeting of Campbeltown Com-

unity Council on Tuesday evening that CrossReach has given notice it is withdrawing.

He added: 'There's no other provision in Argyll and Bute (for the people currently at Auchinlee). We will do all we can to stop it happening.'

Argyll First councillor Donald Kelly said: 'I am extremely disappointed that local elected members have not been kept in the loop regarding the current situation at Auchinlee. To find out through a press release is totally unacceptable. 'Everything possible

has to be done in order to provide a way forward for Auchinlee and all options and partnerships need to be considered.'

Mr Colville added: 'I have had discussions with the Health and Social Care Partnership and with my colleagues in the Integrated Joint Board. 'I am reassured that everyone is working to find a permanent solution.'

Fresh hope for Billy's release from prison

By Fiona Hendrie THE FIANCEE of a Campbeltown man jailed in India on firearms charges has been given fresh hope about a possible release.

Yvonne MacHugh last week received news from the Foreign Office that Theresa May would be raising the plight of her fiancée, ex-paratrooper Billy Irving, with India's Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

The development refreshed the campaign to bring Mr Irving home and his family posted a message of support on the 'Bring Billy Back' Facebook page. It read: 'As Theresa May travels to India today she has assured us she will raise the men's case. We still have time to get Billy home for Christmas.'

India's prime minister has reportedly told Mrs May he is 'closely following the case'. Yvonne said: 'We have not heard from

the Foreign Office since the visit.'

A spokesperson for the prime minister at Number 10 Downing Street was unable to make any further comment.

Billy was arrested in October 2013 along with five other British men, now dubbed the Chennai Six, while aboard the anti-piracy ship MV Seaman Guard Ohio.

He is currently serving a five-year sentence in a Chennai prison after being found to be in possession of firearms.

Since his arrest, the father of one, along with his family, have been fighting to clear his name.

Earlier this year Billy rejected the chance to be transferred to a Scottish prison as he would have had to plead guilty to the crime of which he and the other men he is imprisoned with insist they are innocent.

Chance to buy piece of town hall history

CAMPBELTOWN folk could soon have the chance to buy a piece of town hall history.

The civic furniture – the old desks and chairs from the town hall – are to be sold off.

Argyll and Bute Council currently has the furniture stored at Aqualibrium. It has 20 wooden desks, three red leather and wood armchairs and 21 red leather and wood chairs.

The council has taken advice and a valuation from McTears of Glasgow, and the furniture would make between £1,500 and £1,900 before any fees or charges were made.

At a meeting of the Mid Argyll, Kintyre and Islay area commit-

tee last week, the committee agreed to dispose of the property in the near future, probably through an online or local sale. The money will go to the Campbeltown Community Good Fund.

The sale is sure to generate plenty of local interest.

When the free church in Campbeltown sold off its old pine pews, they were all snapped up within two hours of the news being announced in the *Courier*.

'People liked the idea of owning a piece of local history,' said Calum Ferguson from the church.

'I think it will be the same with the old furniture from the town hall.'

Islay farm brings first crop of speciality snails to the table

AT RONNACHMORE Farm on Islay they are celebrating the first harvest of a new ingredient to add to the impressive list of food from Argyll and the Islands: snails.

Scott Chance and his wife Wendy have brought their first successful crop of snails to harvest at their new business Scotsnail in what they believe is the first commercial snail farm in Scotland and one of very few free-range growers in the UK.

'We have successfully reared our first batch of free-range edible snails – the large helix aspersa maxima, often called the gros gris in France, and its

smaller relation, the petit gris,' said Scott.

The snails are just in time for selling on to restaurants and the general public for the annual French celebration of the release of Beaujolais Nouveau.

This is a small, sam-

pling harvest and the couple hope for a bigger harvest next year.

Their first attempt at growing snails last year proved to be a steep learning curve.

'Snails are at the bottom of the food chain. A lot of things want to

eat snails: frogs, mice and birds,' said Scott.

He added that many growers use controlled indoor systems to get a continuous supply. 'I believe the meat is of poorer quality and is more labour intensive and, with humidity and temperature controls, is also expensive. Growing snails in a free-range paddock means the area can be planted up with a selection of greens and fodder to ensure the snails can grow and mature happily.

'The advantage over wild collection is the knowledge that each snail is young and the meat will be tasty and tender.'

Scott and Wendy

started growing snails when investigating farm production possibilities on a small area. They needed to find a product that could withstand the salty winds blowing in from the loch, be happy in a cooler climate and enjoy a lot of rain.

The distribution network set up to serve Islay's seafood industry will give Scotsnail ready access to markets across Europe and the UK.

Scott said: 'Snails are perfect. In fact, their needs are quite simple: good quality feed, moist environment and not too hot.'

'The other plus is you don't need a dog to round them up.'

Learn to teach in Argyll

'The school placements give an excellent context to develop teaching practice and vital practical skills, and the staff in schools are really supportive.'

Course tutor Caroline Boyle added: 'We currently have students from all over Argyll who combine the university study weeks in Oban with teaching practice nearer to their homes elsewhere in Argyll.'

'The balance of the course allows the students to learn from teachers in schools,

and put into practice all they are studying at university. I am delighted to be supporting such a dedicated and hard working group of students, seeing them develop their skills, and gain in confidence as the course progresses.'

Fraser Durie, principal of Argyll College UHI, said: 'We are delighted that the PGDE in primary education is becoming such an integral and successful part of our curriculum and we are excited about the prospect of introducing the secondary teaching option in the coming academic year. Previously, students would have had to leave the area to access this level of qualification. As part of the University of the Highlands and Is-

lands, we can deliver here in Argyll and the Isles, where the requirement for this qualification is. It's particularly pleasing to have the diploma available with a Gaelic-medium pathway thereby reflecting the linguistic heritage of Argyll and Bute.'

Campbeltown set to remember in silence at services this weekend

IN THE year that marks the centenary of the bloodiest battle of the First World War, Campbeltown will this weekend fall silent to remember those who have lost their lives in conflict.


On Saturday at 10.30am, there will be a small public service taking place at the Kilkerran cemetery where crosses will be laid at each war grave.

On Remembrance Sunday itself, an act of remembrance will take place at the war memorial on Campbeltown Esplanade from 10.50am.

A parade, including a pipe band, the Royal Navy and the Royal British Legion, will march to the war memorial before a two-minute silence takes place at 11am followed by the laying of the wreaths.

Parade

The service, led by the Reverend Willie Crossan, is an open invitation and marching contingents and members of the public who wish to parade to the war memorial are asked to gather at 10.30am outside the Tourist Information Centre, Old Quay,

Campbeltown. There will also be an opportunity at the end of the official wreath-laying ceremony for individuals to place their floral tributes

on the war memorial. Following the act of remembrance, a service led by the Rev Crossan, will take place at the Highland Parish Church.

On Tuesday Argyll and Bute MP Brendan O'Hara spoke in a House of Commons debate to raise awareness of a new generation of veterans

and service personnel emerging from the armed forces.

Speaking to the *Courier*, Mr O'Hara said: 'Veterans are an asset to society and deserve our thanks, our support and our respect.'

'This is an opportune time to consider today's veterans and service personnel and their place in society.'

'Every year, around 1,800 service personnel make the transition into civilian life and 40 per cent of those report health or welfare difficulties.'

'But they can also suffer from financial issues, employment issues, social issues

and need relationship support. Much of that support comes from charities.'

'In 2014, the Scottish Government launched their first Veterans' Commissioner, which has resulted in a number of funded initiatives for Scottish veterans.'

'Military service fosters leadership, organisational skills, resilience and specialist skills such as medical or technical expertise. Veterans – and their families – are a great asset for the private sector, and a growing number of employers are actively targeting veterans to fill their skills gaps.'

Recycling workers should not face risk of dangerous waste

SORTING recyclate by hand is one of the toughest jobs in the modern world.

Since Kintyre moved to three-weekly bin collections, the work at its recycling charity has become dangerous and unpleasant. Filthy unwashed containers and smashed glass threaten human hands and we should remember half the workforce is disabled.

So far, the charity has not taken any action other than reminding people of what should be recycled. It may eventually have to take a zero tolerance line if the problem does not go away. The issue of waste is here to stay and although food waste is not currently collected separately in Kintyre, as it is classed as a rural area, that will change in 2021. Food waste collection should be just as much a priority as any other kind of waste.

Guy Fawkes fun could have ended in dreadful tragedy

BONFIRES blazed across Kintyre and children saw the November 5 spectacle in superb dry weather on all three nights.

At one event, though, despite all the precautions of police and the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service, it could all have ended in tragedy. As the Carradale fire burned down and the final revellers gathered at the pavilion for burgers and coffee, two unidentified youths threw rockets on the fire. They almost immediately exploded. Apart from the possibility of maiming or injuring these yobs, they could have blinded or seriously, possibly fatally, injured a spectator.

Luckily, no-one was hurt but it is astounding that safety messages about fireworks are not heeded.

Fishing for Leave has hooks in Brexit

Sir,
Fishing for Leave wonders how fisheries minister George Eustice's latest comments – that it is 'pretty clear that Brexit can be a good deal for British fishermen because we regain control' and 'that things will change in a very fundamental way' – squares with the government's agenda.

Things must change as the EU's Common Fisheries Policy (CFP) has been an environmental and economic disaster by its own admission.

However, nothing will change under the government proposal to adopt all EU law into UK law with the erroneously named Great 'Repeal' Bill – with a 'remain' political class in parliament unlikely to start shredding transposed EU rules. We would be in the EU in all but name.

They would continue the EU CFP policy of 'equal access' to UK waters for all EU fishing vessels and the misappropriation of 70 per cent of UK fisheries resources to other EU member states under a disastrous EU quota system.

An EU quota system that forces fishermen to dis-

card up to half their catch to comply is unsuited to UK mixed catch fisheries. This equates to the abhorrent mass discarding of an estimated one million tons of prime fish annually.

Article 50, Section 3: 'The treaties shall cease to apply' and consequently the CFP.

This would automatically repatriate all control and all resources to the UK as we revert to the terms of international law outwith EU rules.

There would be no 'new reciprocal' arrangements to strike, no 'negotiations about fishing quotas', no need to 'hope to get a better deal', and no 'imbalance'.

The only way this happens is if the government backslides on Brexit by adopting and continuing the disastrous CFP by continuing the status quo.

Britain has some of the richest fishing grounds in the world, which belong to the British people, and these can revert in full to UK control automatically if fisheries are exempted from the Great 'Repeal' Bill.

We can then manage our automatically repatriated resources with an independent, fit-for-purpose UK fisheries policy that works environmentally and benefits the industry, re-building a thriving, sustainable industry, worth billions to the UK economy and revitalising coastal communities just like Norway and Iceland.

If the vote was about 'taking back control' and 'controlling our borders', then fishing is the acid test of

Brexit. If the government squanders the clean break and a clean slate for political duplicity, convenience and vested interests then Brexit doesn't mean Brexit.

Having risked their political necks to follow their convictions, we hope Mr Eustice and Mrs Leadsom can ensure fishing isn't betrayed a second time and is symbolic in showing that the results of.



Jamie Oliver tastes Ballywilline beef

SALES of beef for a Campbeltown farmer are set to receive a boost with the opening of a new farm shop.

William Taverner is to open a new beef shop at Ballywilline to allow his customers to buy from him more regularly.

Mr Taverner began selling beef a year ago from his herd of 30 Galloway cattle which keep the grazing in good condition for his sheep.

Along with his wife Rachel, they have sold their beef successfully at farmer's markets in both Campbeltown and Lochgilphead.

He said: 'Opening the shop is a natural extension of what we al-

ready do. We don't know where subsidies will be in the future, if at all, so we want to maximise what we are already doing.

'We get tremendous feedback for our mince and if the mince is good, you know the rest of the animal is going to be good too.

Quality

'You tend to get what you pay for and from us that is good quality grass-fed red meat.

'Topside in supermarkets is around £8 per kilo and topside from us is £17 per kilo which is in line with what you'd pay from a butchers.'

The Ballywilline Beef Farm Shop will open its doors to the

public on Saturday November 19 and will be a family affair with Mrs Taverner's sister Abigail Fawcett,

a member of celebrity chef Jamie Oliver's team, on hand preparing taster samples.

Mrs Taverner said:

'I know Abigail took samples of our beef down to London for Jamie Oliver to try. I think he will like it as

our beef is grass-fed.' From November 19 Ballywilline Beef Farm Shop will be open on Saturdays between

10am and 1pm, weekdays between 4pm and 6pm and anytime outwith this when the open sign is displayed.

Call for farmers to take part in wellbeing study

NFU SCOTLAND and rural charity RSABI have joined forces to encourage farmers, crofters and those working in the agricultural industry to take part in a pilot study by University of Glasgow.

The study is aimed at those working within the agricultural industry in Scotland who suffer from low mood and/or anxiety, and would involve taking part in a short online course. If the pilot study is successful it could be made readily available to assist those in need of support.

Previous research has indicated that farmers and crofters may be par-

ticularly vulnerable to these difficulties and that they may not want to, or be able to, access formal health care services for support. Once individuals agree to take part in the study, they will be asked to complete an initial questionnaire to assess their current wellbeing. Participation will be fully confidential.

As a need to support those working in the agricultural industry has been identified, this study is being organised and funded by the Institute of Mental Health and Wellbeing at the University of Glasgow.

Allan Bowie, presi-

dent of NFU Scotland, commented: 'We know farmers and crofters can work in isolated areas, and often can go days without speaking to someone. This can impact on health and wellbeing, particularly at this time of year, and it's fantastic that tools are being researched to help improve accessibility to help for those within our industry, in an unobtrusive, confidential way.

'One in four people in Scotland will suffer from poor mental health at some point in their life. And we know with the pressures that are currently facing our industry, it can have a significant impact on how we feel and how we cope in the running of our businesses.

'I would encourage as many people as possible to take part in this study as it can only

bode well for helping our industry to be the best it can be going forward, with suitable resources available, no matter where you are in Scotland.'

Mags Granger, RSABI's welfare manager, commented: 'We are pleased to support this research which will assist in identifying suitable support for those working within the agricultural industry here in Scotland.

'We know that people in rural communities can sometimes experience difficult and stressful times, and, as a charity, RSABI has been working to improve the resources available for those people.

'This research by the University of Glasgow is very welcome and it is hoped that we will get enough farmers

and crofters, and people working with the industry, who have suffered low mood and/or anxiety at some point in their lives to come forward to take part. This survey could result in practical help for farmers and crofters for the future.'

Harriet Bowyer, of the Institute of Health and Wellbeing at University of Glasgow, said: 'The current study is investigating the usefulness of providing farmers and crofters with an online course that teaches key life skills based on cognitive behavioural therapy. Research suggests online life skills training can help with low mood and anxiety, and that it works best if it is relevant to the people using it. Red kite numbers soar again

REINTRODUCED red kite numbers are on the rise throughout much of Scotland, with at least 283 pairs in 2015.

But a new Scottish Natural Heritage (SNH) report has found the population in north Scotland continues to grow more slowly than other reintroduced populations.

The report suggests illegal killing is still considered the main reason red kite numbers are not higher in north Scotland.

The report, commissioned by SNH and carried out by RSPB's Centre for Conservation Science, found

there are currently around 70 breeding pairs in north Scotland. The report shows that, had there been no illegal killing, there could have been as many as 1,500 pairs.

However, it also estimates that, even with this mortality continuing, there could still be around 131 pairs by 2024.

Survival rates, and the proportion of illegally killed birds being found, were similar to a previous study. Of 57 dead red kites re-covered between 2007 and 2014, 24 (42 per cent) were confirmed to have been illegally



killed. This compares with a figure of 40 per cent of recovered dead birds confirmed to have been illegally killed throughout the period from the start of the reintroduction in 1989 to 2006.

Most red kites being killed are young birds, resulting in lower numbers reaching the breeding population.

Assuming the level of persecution remains unchanged, the study also assessed the impacts of a 2014 incident of illegal poisoning of red kites in Ross-shire as well as potential risks from wind farms.

The incident in Ross-shire, in which 16 red kites were found dead with 12 subsequently confirmed to have been

poisoned. The report found that when modelled as a one-off event, the Ross-shire incident had a relatively small impact in the short-term, but reduces the predicted 2024 population by five per cent to 124 pairs and the estimated 2044 population by seven per cent to 513 pairs.



TWENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO NOVEMBER 15, 1991

Divided we stand

A RIFT between Argyll Conservatives has deepened after a party meeting decided to overturn a motion asking their parliamentary candidate to resign.

Argyll and Bute Constituency Conservative Association met in Inveraray last Saturday and voted to rescind a decision to ask candidate Mr Bill Hodgson to step down on grounds of ill health.

The meeting failed to heal deep disagreements in the association.

Now the association's executive committee is to meet again on December 7, when it hopes Mr Hodgson will attend to answer questions about his health and other matters.

'Feelings are polarised and I don't honestly know how things will recover,' said executive committee member Mr Douglas Robertson, of Tarbert.

'For the sake of the party we have to support Bill Hodgson as candidate. Things may eventually come out in the wash, but it's a very dirty wash,' he added.

FIFTY YEARS AGO NOVEMBER 10, 1966

Archie gave lifejacket to others

WHEN it was seen that there were not enough lifejackets for everyone, 77-year-old crew member Archibald Stewart refused one for himself – though he cannot swim.

Mr Stewart, of 6 Pensioners' Row, Campbeltown, explained: 'I would rather some young boy got away than me.'

The last to leave the stricken ship, Mr Stewart lashed himself to an anchor davit until the crew of the Moira threw him a rope.

He said that four men had no lifesaving appliance so far as he could see – himself, Mr McMillan, Mr Gillies and Mr Johnston.

A retired fisherman with 60 years' experience at sea, Mr Stewart, too, disagreed with criticisms of the Quesada's handling.

'She steered very well,' he said, 'even in a high wind.'

He had brought the boat from Perth when Mr McMillan bought her, and sailed in her regularly afterwards.

They had experienced some bad weather, but he had never been worried about the boat's behaviour.

ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO NOVEMBER 11, 1916

The plot against Poland

THE FIRST thing that strikes the observer about the Austro-Hungarian 'gift' of a pretended autonomy to Poland is its tardiness.

It is only after more than two years of war that circumstances, which on the face of it suggest inquiry into the motives of the 'givers' have induced the German and Austrian Governments to reconstitute, in name at any rate, a 'Kingdom of Poland', incidentally finding means in so doing to compose between themselves a conflict of aims which has hitherto been irreconcilable.

It is an old saying that 'needs must when the Devil drives', and the proclamation issued on November 6 by the German Military Governor of Warsaw is a sufficiently clear indication of the satanic character of the impulse under which a reluctant and ungracious concession has been made.

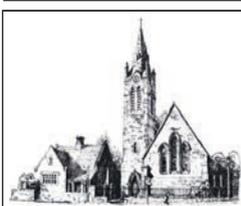
